

The law requires that if you have on hand more than one pound of butter for each person in your household you must now make a report of your supply on a form similar to that below. (Make out this form yourself.)

You must then send this report to your nearest Local Ration Board and accompany it with Brown Coupons (Nos. 1 to 11 inclusive from your ration book to cover the amount of butter you have in excess of one pound per person. (Each coupon represents 1/2 pound of butter.)
