Anyox Is Wiped Out By Flames

Confidence Voted In Churchill Despite Grave Picture of War In Near East; Prospect Is Grim

BATTLE IN SEBASTOPOL

Fortifications Broken Into But Nazi Claims of Capture Are Ignored By Soviet

MOSCOW, July 2: (CP) — Overwhelming German forces today carried the battle into the city of Sebastopol itself after breaking through its fortifications but the defenders of the Black Sea base continued fighting against heavy odds, Soviet dispatches said. Two successive Russian communiques have ignored the German claims that Sebastopol was captured.

FLEET IN NO DANGER

Even Should Alexandria Fall, Declares Sir Andrew Cunningham

WASHINGTON, July 2: — Admiral Sir Andrew Cunningham, former commander-in-chief of the British Mediterranean fleet, says that the fleet is in no danger even should Alexandria fall to the Axis and there are other bases beyond such as Port Said, Haifa and Beyrout.

Vote Was 475 to 25—Hope of Victory Pinned on Dispatch Of Considerable Reinforcements to Mediterranean Area

LONDON, July 2 (CP)—Prime Minister Churchill won an overwhelming confidence vote from the House of Commons today after he gravely assessed the Allied position in the Middle East and Mediterranean war zones as near disaster with the hope of victory pinned on "very considerable" reinforcements now in progress. The vote was 475 to 25.

The Parliamentary victory on the confidence vote came for Prime Minister Churchill at the end of a speech by the Premier which was nearly an hour and a half long. In the course of the speech Mr. Churchill defended the direction of the war as the best possible under the circumstances. He sketched a dark picture of the Battle of Egypt, saying it had developed a "recession of our hopes and prospects in the Middle East and the Mediterranean unrivalled since the fall of France." To this he added, without elaboration, the statement "at any moment we may receive news of grave importance." His sombre portrayal was relieved only by the statement that very considerable reinforcements have reached or are approaching the battlefield.

Mr. Churchill also touched on the recent consultations with President Franklin D. Roosevelt in Washington which he said were concerned "only with the movement of troops, ships and aircraft and measures to be taken to combat losses at sea and replace sunken tonnage."

In Mr. Churchill's opinion the war is likely to be a long one and moreover, he said, "there is no reason to suppose hostilities will cease when the final result becomes obvious."

The Prime Minister paid tribute to the Russians for their resistance to the Germans and predicted they would "surprise Hitler again."

Meanwhile the German forces are continuing their advance towards Alexandria and the Suez Canal.

In the Russo-German war, the Axis claims the fall of Sebastopol, Moscow falling to confirm it.

WAR NEWS

The War In Russia

MOSCOW — The Red Army has repulsed wave after wave of German artillery and infantry in the Kursk area where Adolf Hitler is paying a heavy toll in men and tank equipment for his offensive. The Russians trap the German tanks and men in pockets, then encircle and annihilate them. General Timoshenko's forces have staged a series of successful counter attacks in the Kursk area. Meanwhile the Soviet defenders continue to withstand the continued heavy assault of German infantry and tanks as well as dive bombing attacks at Sebastopol, the fall of which is claimed by Berlin but not admitted by the Russians.

Japanese In China

CHUNGKING—The Japanese are now heading through Kiangsi Province toward Faki on the coast which appears to be the latest objective. This will help to open up an overland route from Shanghai to Singapore for the enemy. Only twenty miles of the Nanchang-Hanchow Railway remains in Chinese hands.

Situation In Egypt

CAIRO — Axis forces have passed El Daba in Egypt and are pressing on. General Erwin Rommel's forces, having advanced seventy-five miles in two days, are now seventy miles from Alexandria. Now Axis forces have swung southward in the direction of Cairo and Euez. Alexandria has been dive-bombed for a second successive night.

Jap Attack On Russia?

LONDON — A military commentator said today that Japanese air and land forces were concentrating on the Manchukuo border, evidently preparing to attack Russia at the proper moment.

Auchinleck Predicts Victory

CAIRO—General Auchinleck declared in the order of the day that the "battle was not over yet and will not be until we have defeated the enemy and defeat him we will." Officials said that the Germans were within seventy miles of the Nile Delta today.

Parachutists Being Poised

Massed in Greece For Possible Attack on Asia Minor

ATHENS, July 2:—Thousands of German parachutists have been moved from Sicily to Greece. They may be used to strike at Palestine and Syria should the Axis campaign in Egypt continue successfully.

Boys and Girls On Western Trip

WINNIPEG, July 2. — On their way to Jasper National Park, where they will spend three days sight-seeing by bicycle, 17 members of the American youth hostels — 13 girls and four boys—were in Winnipeg yesterday on the Continental Limited. They began their Canadian tour by cycling about Montreal, visited Ottawa and North Bay, and spent a day at Minaki Lodge. With a car to themselves, the young people do their own cooking as they travel. They have their own bikes. The party is in charge of Miss Dorothy Plaisted.

Leaving Winnipeg last evening, they will have about an hour in Saskatoon today and will then leave for Calgary. On Thursday, where they will remain until Monday afternoon, July 13, when they will return to their homes through the United States.

Headquarters of the youth hostels is at East Northfield, Mass.

LOSE OUT AT KURSK

Nazis Reported To Be Suffering Reverses At Hands of Reds In That Area

MOSCOW, July 2: — Whole companies and battalions of Nazi shock troops were reported knocked out by the counter attacking Russians on the Kursk front yesterday. The Germans suffered huge losses including 350 tanks.

One Time Important Copper Mining Town Victim Of Bush Fire

Famous Old Camp Had Been "Ghost" Community For Several Years—Thirty-two Residents Saved Without Casualty

Corp. Oldham, on his return from Anyox this afternoon, stated that, on leaving Anyox at 4:20 a.m. today, the wharf was blazing and all that was left of the old camp was the coke plant towards which the flames were sweeping. Everything had been destroyed including mine and smelter buildings, power house, and a great conflagration was still raging over an area estimated at twenty-five square miles. There were some who felt that Alice Arm, eighteen miles distant, might be menaced unless a change came soon. The survivors are on their way by scow in tow of a local tug to Alice Arm whence some of them will come on to Prince Rupert. Corp. Oldham described the fire as the "largest I have ever seen."

The old Granby smelting and mining town of Anyox, ninety miles from Prince Rupert on Observatory Inlet, was completely wiped out by a forest fire during the night. Corp. Oldham of the provincial police, who was rushed north from here by Royal Canadian Air Force plane, reported back to headquarters this morning. Thirty-two persons who had been in residence there were saved with few effects and are being brought to Prince Rupert or taken to Alice Arm. There were no casualties, Corp. Oldham reported. The officer was dispatched north after a message had been received that the old camp was in imminent danger of being wiped out. The fire is believed to have been started some eighteen miles away by lightning, the flames sweeping rapidly upon the "ghost town" over dry deadfall.

Anyox, which came into being as a copper mining and smelting centre some thirty years ago, was for about two decades one of the most important industrial points on the northern British Columbia coast. Mine, smelter, flux mine, concentrator, coke plant and other establishments during those years maintained a payroll which sometimes was about the 1,000-man mark. Several years ago, Granby abandoned the working and later sold the property to Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. which, in turn, disposed of it to Ventures Limited, an Ontario mining concern, which formed Anyox Metals and was developing a small iron plant.

The buildings involved in complete destruction of Anyox would include such imposing structures as hotel, hospital, community hall, churches, school houses, bank, government buildings, general store and possibly substantial wharf buildings, some quite large. The buildings, with one or two exceptions, were of frame construction. During the past few years the place had been stripped of much of the machinery and fittings by the A. R. Williams Machinery Co. of Vancouver, leaving but the shells of the buildings. Much of the machinery had been left in the old smelter on the hill above the community. The Hidden Creek power plant, however, was still intact and had not ceased producing power.

George M. Lee, a former official for the Granby Co., was in charge for Anyox Metals and earlier this week had been in Prince Rupert on business. Among well known pioneers of northern mining camps who were in residence at Anyox were Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Falconer, well known in the Vancouver district from which they come north many years ago and to which they were soon planning on returning.

The Armour Salvage Co.'s tug-boat Crofton left at 1 o'clock this morning for Anyox to assist in the evacuation.

Corp. Oldham is returning to Prince Rupert by plane and is expected back this afternoon.

Bulletins

CONFIDENCE DEBATE
LONDON— Debate opened in the British House of Commons on a want-of-confidence motion over the Libyan campaign. The debate will last for two days. The main body of Conservatives will not support the want of confidence motion proposed by a small group of Conservatives headed by Sir John Wardlaw Milne.

HANSON SUPPORTS BUDGET
OTTAWA—Hon. R. B. Hanson, Leader of the Opposition, told the House of Commons that he was supporting the budget of Finance Minister J. L. Ilsley as being the "proper and patriotic course" to take. J. H. Blackmore, leader of the New Democracy party, moved a want of confidence vote. He urged modernized currency and credit structure to bolster up purchasing power which the budget would further drain.

COMMANDOS IN PACIFIC

First Offensive Raid Is Made By Allies In New Guinea

MELBOURNE, July 2: — Allied commando troops Sunday night made their first offensive action in the southwest Pacific. They swooped down out of the jungle in a surprise raid attack on a Japanese garrison at Salamaua in New Guinea. Sixty Japanese were killed or wounded and their equipment seized. The British suffered only two casualties—two men being wounded—before withdrawal. The land attack was followed up with an air attack on Salamaua.

MORE SHIPS BEING SUNK

Loss of Life Is Relatively Heavy By Enemy Action In Atlantic

WASHINGTON, July 2: — Mine and submarine warfare has taken three more vessels, with sixty-nine lives, in Atlantic waters. One was a medium-sized Canadian ship which was sunk in the Caribbean with the loss of twenty-four of her crew of thirty.

THE BATTLE OF RUSSIA — ONE YEAR OLD



These three maps show the huge area over which the Battle of Russia has been fought almost without let-up for a full year. The Nazis began their attack on June 22, 1941, and in the first phase swept over the area shaded in the first map at LEFT. But the Russians kept their army retreating intact and when winter bogged down the Nazi machine, the Red Army struck back, retaking the portion shaded in CENTRE map before spring. However, when the time came for Hitler to begin

his new offensive he was still in possession of the greater part of the territory taken last spring, but his blitz technique doesn't seem to get along so fast this year. At Leningrad (1) the Reds have gained a little; at Kharkov the battle swings back and to like a pendulum (2). At Bryansk (3) the Russians still hold a position jutting into the German line wedgelike and at Sebastopol (4), the Russians still cling to the great naval base, despite all out German efforts to subdue the fortress.

- ### SOME IMPORTANT POINTS ABOUT YOUR RATION CARD
- A Ration Card is required for each individual person, regardless of age.
  - Each numbered coupon is good for a two weeks' ration of 1 lb. of sugar.
  - Coupon No. 1 is good July 1st; coupon No. 2, July 13th; coupon No. 3, July 27th; coupon No. 4, August 10th; coupon No. 5, August 24th.
  - Coupons cannot be used before the specified dates, but may be used any time afterwards.
  - Only coupons 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 can be used for sugar buying.
  - Do not use coupons A, B, C, D and E, unless instructions are issued by The Wartime Prices and Trade Board. Do not detach them.
  - Coupons must be detached in the presence of your retailer. He will not accept loose, detached coupons.
  - If you do the buying for your home, or for a number of people, you may purchase sugar for them by taking their ration cards with you to the store.
  - If you order by telephone, coupons must be detached in the presence of, or by the delivery man.
  - Retailers may hold customers' ration cards and detach coupons for them in cases where customers are not ordinarily at home to take delivery; or in the case of summer cottagers having deliveries made by mail or express.
  - If you go visiting for a week or more, you should take your ration card with you for your host to use.
  - If you are a regular boarder in a house, you should turn your ration card over to your landlady so she may secure your sugar allowance.
  - You do not use coupons for the purchase of sugar for preserving, canning, jam or jelly making. Additional quantities are allowed for these purposes, for which you sign a special Sugar Purchase Voucher, which your grocer will give you.
  - You do not require coupons for sugar that you consume in restaurants or public eating places. These places are rationed and can only serve limited quantities to their customers.
  - Misuse of ration coupons is illegal and offenders are liable to prosecution.
  - Report to the nearest Wartime Prices and Trade Board office (a) if you lose your card, (b) if you change your name or address.
  - If additional ration cards are needed for new babies, or new Canadian residents, write to the nearest Wartime Prices and Trade Board office.
