FINE PROSPECT FOR RUPERT'S FIRST OF JULY

ENGLISH ROSES CHALLENGE THE FAMOUS CALEDONIANS

IF ARRANGEMENTS CAN BE SATISFACTORILY COMPLETED DOMINION DAY WILL WITNESS A LIVELY FOOTBALL TUSSELE BETWEEN TWO GOOD TEAMS.

Organized now into a fully established football club, the English Roses today throw down the gauntlet to their hereditary foes, the Caledonians, to meet them, not in mortal combat, but in fair football for badges on Dominion Day if arrangements can be made to their satisfaction.

Fairplay Football.
With the challenge goes the stipulation that the game shall be played fairly and free from roughness of the class that mafs clean football. The challengers desire that any rough play on either side shall be immediately followed on detection by the removal of the man at fault from the field.

Referee to Be Chosen.
A referee chosen by both teams will be appointed for the challenge game, and his decision shall be final on both teams. Under these conditions Dominion Day should witness a very good football struggle between two good teams. The roses' line-up will be published shortly. Secretary Bell has got some good ones signed.

A pleasant practice game was played off last night, the result being a score of 3 to 2 in favor of S. Currie's team. It is now

definitely announced that Mr. Frank Ellis has kindly consented to act as president of the English Roses team.

DIocese OF CALEDONIA'S NEW POWER BOAT ON STOCKS

MISSION LAUNCH TO BE USED BY REV. W. RUSHBROOK IN HIS WORK ON THESE SHORES IS BEING BUILT IN VANCOUVER—DIMENSIONS TELL OF A POWERFUL CRAFT.

The authorities of the diocese of Caledonia have accepted Morris, Eulkeley & Halliday's designs for a power boat to be used in mission work in northern waters. The dimensions are: Length, 45 feet; beam, 10 feet; moulded depth, 5 feet 6 inches. She will have a 22 horse power engine.

This note from a Vancouver paper refers, no doubt, to the new Church of England mission boat, which is to take the Rev. Mr. Rushbrook to and fro on the work of his important mission in this district. The following further shows the development of power boat missionary enterprise in northern waters and on the coast:

The launching of the Thomas Crosby, a mission boat connected with the Methodist cause among the lonely settlers of the northern parts of British Columbia, took place last week near Heap's saw mill, Burrard Inlet. The boat is 97 1/2 feet long, 20 foot beam and is being fitted with engines built in Scotland. The boat will burn oil fuel and will make a speed of twelve miles an hour. The approximate cost is \$21,000.

"She will ply between Van-

couver and places as far north as Stewart, at the head of Portland Canal. There will be a chapel on board capable of seating forty-five men, and the boat will carry a small gasoline launch to take the captain and chaplain ashore where the larger boat cannot land. In addition to a white chaplain, the boat will carry Chinese and Japanese chaplains and will represent the Canadian Bible Society, carrying a stock of Bibles and Testaments for sale at the various places of call.

The Methodist Church was the pioneer in the work of visiting the lonely settlers by boat, and the Thomas Crosby will be the fourth ship of the fleet. It is expected that at a not far distant date one, or possibly more, boats will be built, one for the west coast of Vancouver Island and the other to ply in more southern waters.

The launching will take place from Mr. John McPhee's wharf and there will be a short service before she takes the water. "The boat is to be christened the Thomas Crosby to commemorate fifty years of service among the Indians of British Columbia by Rev. Dr. Crosby, now resident at Kitsilano."

DOMINION DAY IN RUPERT WILL BE THE BIGGEST EVER

Arrangements are Being Made for Novel and Spectacular Events in the Way of a Mammoth Calathumpian Parade With Prizes for Horse and Make-Ups---Regatta, Horse Races, Athletic Sports, Children's Sports, and Grand Concert in Evening---Nearly \$1000 Contributed So Far

Dominion Day celebration in Prince Rupert this year promises to be the biggest affair of the kind ever yet planned. New features besides the ordinary athletic events are being arranged for, the special attraction being the novel calathumpian parade with decorated floats and all kinds of picturesque and humorous characters. There will also be races for the children and a regatta, these two features taking place early in the day, the athletic events on land for adults being scheduled for the afternoon. There will also be a horse

race if it can be arranged for, and a grand concert in the evening.

Funds Come Forward.

According to the report of the committees in joint conference last night funds have been liberally provided so far by contributors. Close on \$1,000 is available at present and there may be something coming from the city if, as Alderman Douglas put it, "the people come through with the bylaw vote on the 14th." This is a kind of bribe, but let it pass. Citizens generally are supporting the movement well, and there is

nothing drowsy about the committees.

The Athletic Events.

There will be a ten mile race, jumping and flat races, as usual. The events will take place on the best street grounds available, probably the same place as last year. Prizes for best horses in the parade will be awarded, and the horse race will likely be held on Third avenue. The great parade will be held from about 11:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. and will form the break in the day's features to be followed by the adult athletics in the afternoon.

BLUE FUNNEL BOAT BREACH

Famous Steamship Line Breaks with Trans-Pacific Conference—Orient Shippers May Boycott Company's Liners.

Victoria, June 6.—The Blue Funnel Line has withdrawn from the North Pacific Trans-Pacific Conference, and the other lines in the combination, the C. P. R., Nippon Yusen Kaisha, Osaka Shosen Kaisha, Great Northern Steamship Line, Pacific Mail Steamship Company and Toyo Kaisen Kaisha have issued a notice to shippers, giving them notice that any consignees of freight by the Blue Funnel steamers will invalidate all claims to participate in the deferred rebates payable by the lines.

The withdrawal of the Blue Funnel Line from the Pacific Conference followed the attempt made by the Nippon Yusen Kaisha to advance the freight rates between the United Kingdom and Yokohama via the Suez Canal 10 per cent. The rate was to have gone into effect at Yokohama on May 15, and the same day Messrs. Butterfield & Swire, agents in the far east for the Blue Funnel Line, gave notice of the withdrawal of the Holt steamers from the Trans-Pacific Conference, and the proposed increase on the Suez route was then abandoned. The dispute was brought into the trans-Pacific trade by reason of the negotiations between the Japanese Tea Growers' Association and Japanese lines for reduction in freight rates across the Pacific on tea.

One case of drunk and disorderly and one of frequenting occupied the attention of the magistrate in police court this morning. H. Lavine, billed to sail on the George, was obliged to await trial and a fine of \$10 for frequenting before his departure from the city.

LANDING HARD AT VANCOUVER

Several Steamers, Including the Prince George, Have Met with Trouble in Making Their Berths Owing to Bad Cross Currents.

Navigators invariably have trouble in bringing their vessels alongside the Vancouver piers at high tide, as the currents there are exceptionally strong. In order to counteract these currents the Grand Trunk Pacific dock was built at an angle running from southwest to northeast and the Canadian Pacific piers are built the same way. Shipping men are of the opinion that piers built at an angle greatly facilitate the docking of ships.

It was only a few weeks ago that the Harrison liner Crown of Arragon was carried by cross currents bow-on into the Blue Funnel steamship Talthybius, the one berthed at the Johnson and the other at the Evans dock. These piers run at right angles, and are very close together, and the result was that the Talthybius suffered serious damage to her bulwarks.

Slight damage to her upperworks was sustained by the Grand Trunk Pacific steamer Prince George when she steamed amid the treacherous cross currents to her berth the other afternoon, after arriving from Seattle northbound. Captain Duncan Mackenzie avoided serious mishap to his vessel when he successfully cleared the piling at the end of the dock. The scraping of the port side which followed twisted several stanchions and carried away part of the steamer rail.

WHO RUNS MAY READ.

"It transpires," announces the Empire solemnly yesterday in a labored attempt to discredit The Daily News. On any live newspaper the very sight of the trite old phrase used by junior reporters in the days of our great grandfathers would be enough to brand the "copy" as the work of a bungling amateur and to warrant its consignment, unread, to the wastepaper basket. But the Empire, the paper which has neither art nor manners, and often not even grammar, to boast of, prints the whole crude attack as it has printed many a coarse, crude and unwarranted attack before. Because the attack contains a lying assertion, the very imagining of which betrays a total ignorance of the first principles of newspaper office honor, The Daily News spares space to deny the ignorant, clumsy charge.

No "fake" despatch concerning any city's financial affairs would ever be published by any decent newspaper under the British flag. Certainly The Daily News never published any fake despatch about the sale of Prince Rupert's treasury script. The Daily News duly received a wire, clearly described as a special cable, from London, England, to the effect that the treasury script had been privately disposed of at 99%, exactly as published. The original despatch is preserved in The News office and can be produced. A copy of it exists at the Dominion Government telegraph office. There is no fake about it. No matter what the bank may see fit to tell our worthy editor-mayor (to whom it has absolutely refused further funds without the sanction of the citizens) The Daily News has the backing of a bona fide despatch for the announcement it made. Further, it may be mentioned that the same information regarding the price at which this script was sold was received by Canadian Finance and published in that paper, as also by the Vancouver Province. The Evening Empire did not publish the news. Perhaps it was too cheerful an item for that lugubrious sheet.

Citizens of Prince Rupert who remember how The Daily News, on a certain occasion in the past, detected the Empire deliberately altering a press despatch so as to make it suit the paper's own purpose, and those who saw the true despatch framed beside the false remain in undisputed proof of the fact for days in The News office window will know how to place the Empire's latest lying charge against its more honorable rival in the newspaper game in Prince Rupert. Merely as an example of how miserably the Empire keeps on betraying its doleful, mean little mind may be mentioned the manner in which it handled the news of the inspector's refusal to pass the boilers for the depot site contract the other day. After advertising its incompetence by stating that "what the contractors proposed to do could not be ascertained," it went on to say: "Assistant Superintendent McNicholl remarked in conversation that he expected to see a quiet summer"; and further made the sweeping and truly encouraging statement that "the dry dock work shut down yesterday."

The last statement was a lie; the second last was mis-reported; the first quoted was true regarding the Empire though other papers ascertained the facts with ease. In striking contrast to the Empire's doleful, knocking newspaper method is The Daily News' handling of the same theme the same day. Who runs may read.

A PERILOUS PROFESSION

Two German Airmen Plunge to Death When Their Monoplane Plows Deep into Ground in Fall at Bremen.

Bremen, June 6. — Albert Bushgeller, one of the best known German aviators, and his partner, Lieutenant Stille, were killed when their monoplane plunged to the ground just after starting on the Northwest Aviation Circuit of 425 miles. The monoplane dropped so heavily that it was half buried in the earth and had to be taken apart before the bodies of the two men could be extricated.

AMERICAN PORT G. T. P. TERIMNUS

Strenuous Canadian Opposition to the Idea of the G. T. P.'s Entering Boston as an Eastern Terminus.

Toronto, June 6.—The promise of the late Mr. Hays to lay the petition of 100,000 New Englanders before the G. T. P. directors in England, with the object of making Boston the Atlantic terminal, is viewed with alarm by Canadian manufacturers here. Strong protests are being voiced against the use of Canadian money to build railways from coast to coast to develop American ports.

Aviator Left Hospital to Carry Out Flight.

Long Beach, Cal., June 6.—Leaving a hospital to fulfil the flying contract of Frank Stites, who was injured here Saturday, Aviator Frank Champion saved his comrade the \$300 promised for the flight and today is the hero of Long Beach's colony of birdmen.

Four months ago Champion was accidentally shot through the leg at Dominguez aviation field. He was convalescing in a hospital here when he heard of Stites' dilemma. Against the advice of his physicians he demanded that he be taken to the aviation field and permitted to fly. He did brilliant work.

WAKE UP RUPERT!

French Capitalists Seek Investments in Vancouver.

A party of French capitalists, which includes M. De Slumberger, M. R. Camboul and M. B. McDonald, is at the Vancouver. These gentlemen represent a large combination of capital for which they are seeking an investment in Western Canada. They have already invested rather extensively in Victoria, and although they decline to discuss their intentions concerning Vancouver, they are making a thorough investigation of the local field.

Order of Moose Approved.

A bill legalizing the operations of the Loyal Order of Moose in the Dominion of Canada has successfully passed both houses of the Dominion Parliament at Ottawa. By this time it has, no doubt, been signed by the executive and has become a law. Some American orders have heretofore done business in Canada without the authorization of the government, but this is the first instance where an order of the high standard enjoyed by the Moose has received the approval of the government before spreading on to a wide campaign of organization. MURDERED FOUR OF HER HUSBAND

Hungarian Woman Arrested Has Confessed That She Done Away with Four Husbands—No Monetary Reason for Crimes.

Vienna, June 5.—A woman who has been arrested in Lippa, in Hungary, has confessed that she murdered four of her husbands. She is now married to an inn-keeper named Kapreuzan.

Owing to the revelations she has made, five other women of the same town have been arrested for murdering their first husbands. From the admissions of Frau Kapreuzan, it appears that she made a regular business of helping her neighbors to get rid of their husbands in order to marry other men.

There appears to have been no monetary reasons for the crimes.

INVENTS NEW ANAESTHETIC

Los Angeles Surgeon Injects Through Veins and Removes Danger of Agent Coming into Contact with Heart.

Los Angeles, June 6.—Methods of producing anesthesia by venial injection, reaching the nerve centres without danger of the agent coming into direct contact with the vital organs or the spinal cord are believed today by county hospital physicians here to have proven successful.

Dr. Lars Pedersen of the county hospital conducted experiments along lines recently announced by English surgeons as failures. He declared that in four cases complete success marked his efforts, and that nausea and other after effects of the usual anesthetic were absent.

Noted Comedian Dead.

New York, June 6.—Charles H. Bradshaw, aged 67 years, a comedian, who for a number of years was Lotta Crabtree's leading man, is dead of pneumonia today at the home of relatives in Montclair.

In the World of Sport
CALLS IT A JOKE
That is a Winnipeg Paper's Reference to the Western League
The Winnipeg Free Press says "The Western Canada Baseball league was always more or less a joke organization, and as far as Winnipeg was concerned the fans could never take matters very seriously. To start with the circuit was by long odds too gigantic a proposition for any organization outside of a major league to attempt. The mileage was greater than the big leagues, and as the railway fare is higher here than in the States it meant that any profits that happened to be made at home, which did not happen very often, would be eaten up by railway fares on the long jaunt around the circuit. Last year they tried to get away from these long jumps by pairing off the teams and having them meet about 48 times or so during the season, but outside of Edmonton and Calgary they played a distinct failure, as in the case of Winnipeg and Brandon the latter team proved such a poor drawing card that the teams seldom played to more than a corporal's guard of enthusiasts. Then, again, there was the slipshod manner in which the league was run. There never was a man at the helm who was capable of handling the affairs of the organization in a manner which gave all the clubs entire satisfaction, with the result that there was always wrangling of some kind. As an example of grown-up business men trying to conduct the affairs of a baseball league the course of the club owners of the organization has been about as edifying as a large man with a goat and a red nose attempting the Grecian symbolical dance. But this does not make things any better for this year, and a few days ago it looked as if we were out of baseball for this season, but a last hope has arisen in the activity of some baseball people across the line to endeavor to resurrect the old Northern league, and it certainly would be a great boon for Winnipeg if such a thing went through. Duluth and Superior are anxious for the league, and if something can be done in a hurry it is possible that a real live organization will be formed that will mean the uplifting of the American national pastime here once again."

VARIED CAREER IN BALL
Wilson Matthews of the International League Umpire Staff Knows Game
Wilson Matthews of President Barrow's staff of International League umpires, surely has had a varied career in base ball. But for thirteen rainy days in a row, he probably would still be hobnobbing with the baseball moguls of the land. As the dice have been cast, Matthews is a newspaper man in Winter and a baseball umpire in the Summer months. Matthews had two seasons as umpire in the Texas League.
Starting his baseball career as a pitcher, Matthews was developed into an outfielder when his finger lost its cunning. He played in the South Atlantic League, Southern Association, Texas League and never came farther north than the Central League.
After several years as a player Matthews determined to take up umpiring and, attaining a reputation in some of the smaller leagues, he secured a berth on the arbitrating staff of the Southern Association, where he officiated in 1904 and 1905.
In 1906 he sought and secured the managership of the Savannah (Ga.) Club of the South Atlantic League. He succeeded in building up a strong team that eventually won the pennant over Augusta, Ga., by the margin of one and one-half games. Pitching Holmes, now one of the Hustler's best mound artists; Nap Rucker, the great southpaw twirler of Brooklyn, and Cloutie, who has given a good account of himself with the Boston Red Sox. The fight for the pennant became so close and Augusta had such a good chance to beat out Savannah that for forty-four games Holmes and Rucker alternated in the box. That season Holmes pitched sixty-two games.
Worked in Good Company
After producing a pennant winner for Savannah, the services of Matthews as a manager, were in demand and those days the South Atlantic was considered a very substantial organization, many of its players, including Ty Cobb, Rucker, Joe Jackson and a score of others, being today stars in the major leagues.
Matthews, however, had some money and, as the Charleston (S.C.) club, of the South Atlantic League, was on the market, he bought some stock and eventually controlled it. Matthews proved to be a repeater in his new venture, as Charleston captured the South Atlantic pennant in 1907. With Matthews that time was Ote Johnson. Matthews had seen Johnson play in the Texas League and he was so impressed with his work that he promptly bought him up when given chance. That Fall (1907), Matthews sold Johnson to the Portland (Ore.) club of the Pacific Coast League. Matthews still thinks Johnson is a great player.
Mr. Matthews added that he believed Johnson could be developed into an ideal third baseman. He gave as his reason for this that Johnson is better as a hitter than he is as a fielder from the plate. And, besides, he has the ideal throw for a first baseman.
Matthews finished third with his Charleston Club in 1908 and made some money. However, when the middle of the 1909 season was reached the club ran into thirteen consecutive days of rain and Matthews began loosing money so rapidly that he threw the sponge and disposed of his franchise to Knoxville, Tenn.
Journalist in Winter
Then he returned to umpiring in the Summer, taking up newspaper work in the Winter. He has had an extended experience in the latter activity. For four years he was sporting editor of the New Orleans Times-Democrat, specializing on thoroughbred horse racing. He also devoted considerable time to baseball, when not occupied with horse racing, on which he is something of an expert. He was a newspaperman in Louisiana and Texas papers, and last Winter was night editor of a morning paper at Shreveport, La.
The previous Winter he was war correspondent during the Mexican revolution for one of the New York papers. Being a native of El Paso, Tex., which is just across the border from Mexico, Matthews had acquired a good knowledge of the patois, besides learning Spanish. It was this knowledge that gave him an edge over some of the other correspondents during the insurrection.
Making his headquarters at the City of Mexico, or some other large city, he would secure the papers from the interior, and by translating their leading articles and sending them to his paper, he was able to score several "beats" over his fellow-correspondents.

CROKER AIDS ATHLETES
The Irishmen Are Given Privileges on His Estate
Richard Croker has come to the aid of a number of Irish athletes who have abandoned Phoenix Park as a practicing ground. For quite a number of years a place known as the "Nine Acres" has been used by members of the Gaelic Athletic Association for sporting interests, but now they think they must find more congenial surroundings.
Sentiment, more than anything else, is the guiding spirit in their determination. Their "ground" is in the immediate vicinity of the spot where Lord Frederick Cavendish and Mr. Burke were assassinated in 1882—a fact, in itself, sufficient to attract to the neighborhood quite a number of those who have no sympathy with the Gaelic movement or with anyone professing allegiance to it.
Efforts have been made from time to time to obliterate the actual scene of the tragedy, but without success, and, finding that each succeeding year only helps to attract more "undesirables," the Gaelic athletes determined to desert the "Nine Acres" and go elsewhere. On a new ground at "Glencairn" Croker's sporting estate, they will be free from the crowd to whom morbidity is more attractive than heal by sport. There will not be the same facilities for inviting all Ireland to see the athletic displays as there were in the park, but there will be sufficient room for the "boys" to wield the Camans to the delight of their friends, and to kick the ball under conditions which will be new to the majority of those who follow Gaelic sport in Ireland, especially to young athletes in the neighborhood of Dublin.

TAKING UP ATHLETICS
German Universities Showing Great Activity in That Line
There has begun at Berlin University this week a national movement destined to work great changes in the traditional routine of undergraduate life at German universities. Representatives of fourteen universities, ten technical colleges, and a score of minor institutions met to discuss ways and means for introducing sports and athletics into German universities on British and American lines.
The project has long been mooted, but never before seriously taken up. This time practical promise of something like general participation. The delegates at the Berlin meeting pledged themselves to make a vigorous propaganda among their fellow-students, in the hope that a great inter-university meeting, to be known as the "German University Olympia," and repeated annually.

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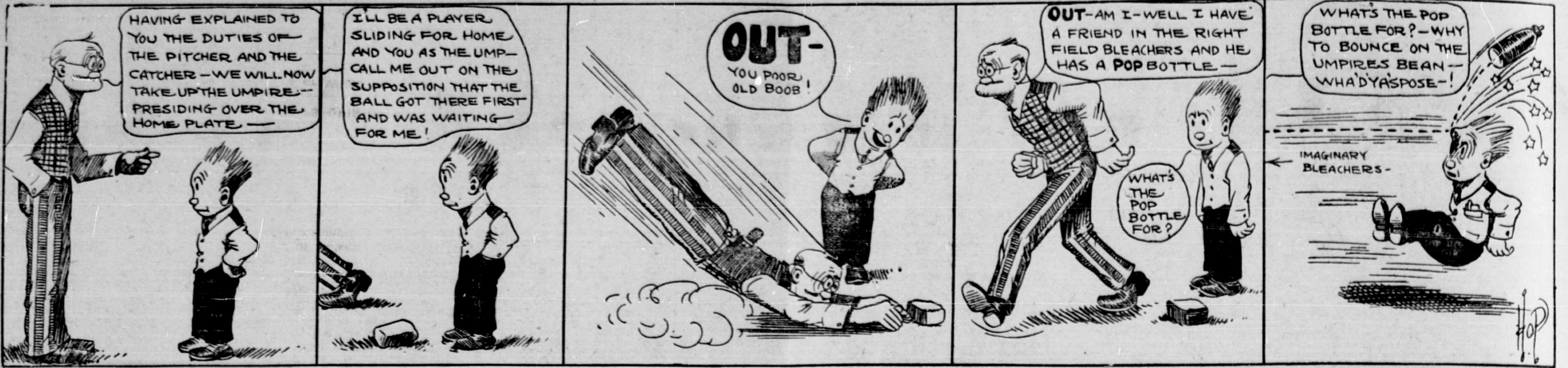

AN ORIENTAL'S REVENGE PLAN

Disgruntled Office Seeker in New Chinese Regime Tried to Shoot President Yuan Shi Kai While at Official Dinner.

Peking, June 6.—While President Yuan Shi Kai was dining with members of the cabinet and governors of the provinces and leading Chinese, Chang Ping Lin, a disgruntled office seeker, bribed the attaches and entered the hall. He drew a revolver and fired several shots at Tang Shou Yi, whom he blamed for his failure to get the position he had sought. All the shots went wild. After his ammunition was exhausted, Chang was overpowered by the attaches and taken to jail. Throughout the shooting the president watched Chang closely, but did not rise from his seat.

PARALYZED BY A MOUSE

Causes a Stampede of Five Hundred Women at Theatre—One Woman Was Hurt—Mouse Got Away.

Joliet, Ill., June 7.—Just as the heroine at the opera house here today was about to escape from the clutches of the villain, she spied a mouse on the other side of the stage. She became paralyzed with fright and was unable to move. Five hundred women who attended the performance, on seeing the cause of the interruption, stampeded for the doors. In the rush Mrs. A. Blake was hurt. The mouse got away.

TURKEY TROT IN JOURNAL OFFICE

Girls in Office of Ladies' Home Journal Are Dismissed for Indulging in New Dance Among Themselves.

CUTS BRAIN, MENDES EYES

Surgeon's Knife Starts Man on Road to Recovery After Two Years of Total Blindness—Eye-sight Likely to Be Restored.

Portland, June 6.—Able to distinguish outlines of objects and with the promise of his physician, Dr. Spiro Sargentich, formerly a prominent surgeon of Tacoma, who performed the operation which led to the recovery of sight after two years of total blindness, that his vision may become more and more clear, William Oversby, 25 years old, a railway man of Cle Elum, Wash., will leave the Good Samaritan Hospital Saturday.

When he entered the hospital on May 1, his body was largely paralyzed, and the medical men thought it gave promise of becoming totally useless. The accident which resulted in Oversby's blindness and in almost complete paralysis occurred two years ago, when he was thrown violently from a Northern Pacific freight train near Cle Elum. On May 1 Dr. Sargentich removed several cubic inches from Oversby's brain and several square inches of his skull and relieved the pressure.

HE PUBLICLY DROWNED HER

Chinese Wronged Husband's Method of Enforcing Expiation on His Erring Spouse—Co-respondent Paid Cash, She Life.

The C. P. R. liner Empress of Japan, which arrived recently at Vancouver from China and Japan, brought word of an incident which occurred at Fatshan, and which aroused considerable excitement among the foreigners. In effect, a wife who had been unfaithful was publicly drowned. The parties, of course, were all Chinese. The husband, finding a stranger with his wife, attacked with a knife and inflicted severe punishment, leaving him for dead. The husband then attacked his spouse, cutting her badly about the face and arms. The woman's relatives decreed that her sin could only be expiated by death, and she was thereupon publicly drowned. Europeans who brought the story to Canton stated that a huge crowd turned out, apparently regarding the whole thing as a treat.

Huddled on a mattress, her face covered and her hands and feet bound, the guilty woman was carried to the suburbs and then drowned. Her companion in sin recovered from his wounds and settled matters by paying a sum of money sufficient to buy a new wife for the wronged husband.
