# Vancouver Court House Explosion

## Mysterious Blast Last Night In City Centre; Damage Is Considerable

Three Police Forces Pressing Investigation Into What Looks Like Case of Sabotage—Dynamite Was Used

VANCOUVER, Nov. 4 (CP)—Police today pressed investigation into two heavy blasts which about 9 o'clock last night heavily damaged one of the large granite lions at the main entrance of the Vancouver Court House, shattering dozens of windows in surrounding buildings including the Vancouver, Georgia, Devonshire and old Vancouver hotel buildings and endangering several persons near the scene.

## LOAN NOW OVER TOP

Objective on General Canvass Has However, Yet to be Reached

Third Victory Loan subscription in Prince Rupert up to last night totalled \$585,150, the objective of \$530,000 having been passed. The day's subscriptions yesterday totalled \$81,700.

While the local total is now over the top, general canvass has not yet reached the quota of \$482,000 the cumulative aggregate to date being \$450,150.

A fine showing is announced so far for the internal canvass at the dry dock, 850 applications having been made for \$74,250 of bonds. This is considered quite satisfactory for a payroll totalling 1400 men.

## CONVICTED OF FRAUD SALVAGE QUESTION

Walsh and Simmons Found Guilty At Assize Court Trial in Victoria

VICTORIA, Nov. 4 (CP)—An Assize Court jury last night convicted J. A. Walsh, Victoria shoe merchant, and Leonard J. Simmons, former provincial police quartermaster, of conspiracy to defraud the government. They will be sentenced at the end of the Assizes.

The verdict ended a nine-day trial which followed a departmental inquiry last March into alleged irregularities in quartermaster's stores disclosing shortages of \$27,000.

## Police Court Fines Higher

Increase of Nearly Fifty Percent Over Last Year is Recorded

City police court fines in Prince Rupert for the first ten months of 1942 have totalled \$11,847.75 as compared with 8,575 in the corresponding period last year. Fines this October totalled \$975 compared with \$915 in October 1941.

## Substantial Gains Are Made By Republicans in American Elections; New York Switch

NEW YORK, Nov. 4 (CP)—Tremendous re-birth of Republican strength, reflecting public impatience with the management of the war by President Roosevelt's administration, featured results of the wartime elections held in the United States yesterday. Republicans were swept into individual offices or cut down Democratic majorities all over the land but they definitely fell short of controlling the Senate and, apparently, are headed for another term as the minority party in the House of Representatives although with a substantially increased bloc of seats.

In the seven the Republicans placed Thomas E. Dewey in the New York State governor's house, it being the first time a Republican has been there in thirty years. A number of New Dealers, including the veteran from Nebraska, George W. Norris, toppled from high places. Earl Warren, Republican, is the new governor of California replacing Floyd Olsen.

## Ratepayers' Association Enters Civic Election Campaign; Favors City Manager; No Pay For Council

The Prince Rupert Ratepayers' Association will enter a slate of candidates in the civic election contest next month. Mayor and aldermen will be pledged to serve without remuneration. They will also be committed to the undertaking of establishing a city manager form of administration. The council will exercise only legislative

functions. The city manager will be the executive head. The Ratepayers' Association will also place candidates in the field for the board of school trustees.

At a well attended meeting of the Ratepayers' Association last night with President Robert McKay in the chair a committee consisting of J. E. Jack, R. A. McLeod, R. E. Mortimer, J. H. MacLeod and Theo Collart, with the president as chairman, was delegated to secure a list of names from whom the candidates of the Association will be selected at an other general meeting to be held on Tuesday evening of next week.

The meeting last night was in progress for about two hours. There was a healthy discussion of various aspects of the municipal situation in the light of the forthcoming return to the position of local autonomy with mayor and council. The feeling in favor of the city managership idea under the city council appeared to be unanimous. There was some division as to whether or not mayor, aldermen and school trustees should serve without remuneration but the vote in favor of the no remuneration plan was about two to one.

A communication from Hon. A. Wells Gray, minister of municipal affairs, which was read at the opening of the meeting, advised that it was within the power of the city council to appoint a city manager.

President Robert McKay, in opening remarks, expressed the hope that the meeting would hold itself to discussion of useful ideas for formulation of constructive policy. It was time to forget the old personalities and differences in undertaking the big tasks that were due for attention. There were many things that Prince Rupert needed in view of new and extraordinary growth. Some of the requirements included new water system, new sewers, new streets, new schools. There would also be the matter of agreement with the power company to be gone into in view of greatly increased power demands.

WHITEHORSE, Nov. 4 (CP)—Final link in the Alaska Highway was completed yesterday in a spruce forest of the Yukon when Corporal Rufus Sims Jr., Philadelphia negro, driving south with a bulldozer, saw trees starting to fall toward him and backed away as another bulldozer, driven by Private Alfred Jalufka of Kennedy, Texas, broke through the underbrush.

## GERMANS WEAKENED BY REDS

Finding it Difficult to Mount General Offensive in Caucasus Area

RED POSITION BETTER

MOSCOW—Soviet forces hold improved positions against German attacks in the Battle of Stalingrad and have dislodged the invaders from several heights in the western Caucasus.

MOSCOW, Nov. 4 (CP)—The Red Army newspaper Red Star says the Germans, weakened by enormous losses at Stalingrad, are unable to mount a general offensive in the Caucasus and are showing their full available strength into a comparatively small advance below Nalchik, the line being apparently aimed at Gudzhikidze, some sixty miles from Nalchik on a military road leading to Georgian Pass through the Caucasian mountains. Instead of carrying on the previously favored non-stop offensive tactics, the paper said the Germans are now taking a breathing spell after each assault in order to bring up reinforcements.

In the Nalchik area that the main German strength seems to have been gathering since the start of the week.

of the critical situation in the Nalchik area a communique says that "our troops fought very defensive engagements."

Meanwhile action at Stalingrad apparently has dwindled to small engagements in scattered sectors. The Russians have moved aggressively against German positions in the starred city and report recapturing several buildings.

## LANDING OF JAPANESE

Get Ashore on Guadalcanal—Australians Nine Miles Beyond Kokoda

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 4 (CP)—The Japanese have succeeded in landing new forces on Guadalcanal in the Solomons to increase the pressure on the American defenders of Henderson air field from the east as well as the west. Australian land forces have advanced nine miles beyond Kokoda on New Guinea.

## SIGNS OF VICTORY

LONDON, Nov. 4 (CP)—Signposts which came down when war started may reappear in some towns and villages. After consultation with military authorities it has been decided that some can be re-established "within certain limits" and subject to certain conditions.

## B.C. Makes Objective

OTTAWA, Nov. 4 (CP)—Tuesday's Victory Bond sales raised the cumulative total drive to \$715,205,800, less than \$35,000,000 from the objective, it was announced today. British Columbia passed its \$75,000,000 objective yesterday and set a new goal of \$100,000,000. Manitoba was the first province to go over the top. New Brunswick has also achieved its quota.

## LOG SCALE HOLDING ON

Volume of Sawlog Production This Year is About Same as Year Ago

Log scaling in Prince Rupert forestry district for the year 1942 to date totals 196,611,754 board feet as compared with 198,765,296 board feet at the corresponding date last year. The scale for this October amounting to 22,897,127 board feet compared with 15,338,643 board feet in October 1941.

The scale of poles and piling for this year to date is 1,518,404 lineal feet in comparison with 3,213,527 lineal feet last year in the corresponding period. The scale this October was heavy at 636,778 lineal feet compared with 169,569 lineal feet in the same month of 1941.

The tie count this October compared with 1,193 pieces compared with 265 pieces in 1941.

The cordwood count this October was quite high at 1,335 cords as against 253 cords in October 1941.

## EDITORIAL

### United States Election . . .

The Republican party, which naturally advocated a more aggressive war effort because there was nothing else upon which to base an appeal for support at this time, shows an upsurge of strength as a result of the United States general elections which took place yesterday. However, it fell short of gaining congressional control so the Roosevelt administration should have no serious embarrassment from that quarter. Had it not been for the war and the inconceivability of interfering with its pursuit by President Roosevelt, yesterday's voting would probably have resulted in a major political turnover in Congress.

Notable were the upsets in some of the state administrations such as New York, California and Nebraska where Democrats or New Dealers lost out to the Republicans. These changes, of course, will have no direct national effect.

Summed up, the United States election results indicate a decided movement back towards Republicanism in the states that normally are Republican. The south remains traditionally Democratic.

### The Municipal Election . . .

It is quite fitting that the Prince Rupert Ratepayers' Association should take steps to actively interest itself in what happens in the forthcoming civic election, an event which we are to have again here in Prince Rupert next month after a lapse of just about ten years.

While the war is on and things are so uncertain, it will be large a matter of "carrying on" as far as civic affairs are concerned. We can anticipate no ambitious program of straight civic work. To plan such under present conditions would be as unseemly as it would be impossible to hope for any accomplishment. However, besides straight war activities, there are important local services to be maintained, valuable community interests to be protected and it also will be well to be planning ahead for the day when municipal government will be of more active character than it can be at present.

It is appropriate that we should be thinking of the kind of men or women we shall be electing in December and it is all to be the good that organizations having a direct interest in civic and community affairs should be getting busy. Unfortunately, there seems to be a rather marked spirit of indifference and a "Let George Do It" attitude.

As for the ratepayers, the registrations show that they will be much in the preponderance as voters which makes it all the more fitting that they should be taking a leading and organized interest in the candidates that are nominated and elected and the policies they should follow.

### Ambulance Service . . .

The members of the Prince Rupert Fire Department are to be commended on the spirit they have shown in taking over the operation of the ambulance of the Prince Rupert General Hospital on a voluntary basis at a time when the hospital authorities were perplexed as to what was to be done about maintaining the service. The men at the Fire Hall did not need to have taken on the job but they evidently felt that some one should feel a sense of duty in the matter so they did it themselves. It is a very commendable gesture of public spiritedness. The act will at least have some measure of reward in the knowledge that it is one of mercy which will help to relieve suffering and, possibly indeed, save life. Such acts are becoming all too few these days.

She is Mary Munn, who has downed the handicap of blindness in order to take an active part in the life of the community to which she came two years ago from England. She does her share in the war effort by acting as telephonist and filing clerk in the Women's Ambulance Corps office here.

Her records are in Braille, which she fingers deftly as she makes appointments for recruits, arranges lecture classes for women of the Corps and calls members to duty.

Miss Munn was given her job on a temporary basis during a recruiting campaign for the Corps early this year but she became an invaluable assistant to Elizabeth Darling, Corps secretary, and Mrs. G. R. Vance, who completed the staff of the office. "That is what I intended to do all along," she said. "I made a big fuss about being the only one who could do any work without lights and I finally talked them into it."

A gifted musician who has given concerts here, Miss Munn learned office at the Royal Normal College for the Blind in London "longer ago than I like to say."

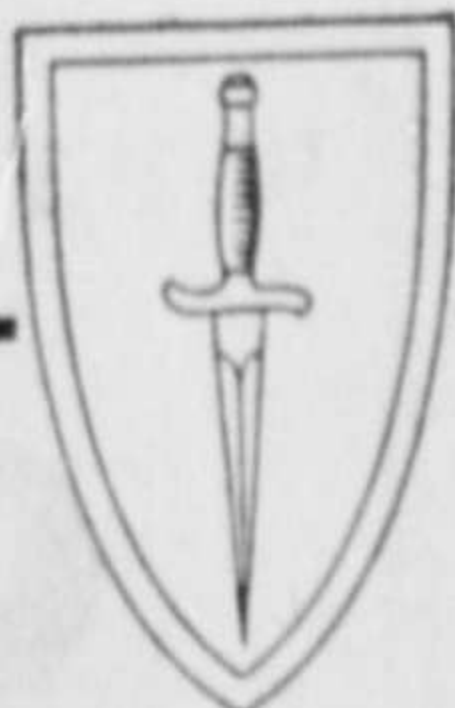


