#### Substantial Gains Are Made By Republicans in American Elections; New York Switch

NEW YORK, Nov. 4 (CP) — Tremendous rebirth of Republican strength, reflecting public impatience with the management of the war by President Roosevelt's administration, featured results of the wartime elections held in the United States yesterday. Republicans were swept into individual offices or cut down Democratic majorities all over the land but they definitely fell short of controlling the Senate and, apparently, are headed for another term as the minority party in the House of Representatives although with a substantially increased bloc of seats.

A number of New Dealers, including the veteran from Nebraska, George W. Norris, toppled from high places. Earl Warren, Republican, is the new governor of California replacing Floyd Olsen.
