# Japanese Lose Twenty-One Ships

## War News

### ASSAULT ON MALTA

VALETTA—There has been a continued Axis air assault upon Malta. Twenty-seven enemy planes were brought down, making a total of 50 to 60 in two days. While the new governor, Lord Gort, was being sworn in, there was an air raid.

### RAIDS CONFIRMED

WASHINGTON—The United States authorities today confirmed the recent raid by United States planes on Tokyo and other Japanese cities.

### RUSSO-GERMAN WAR

MOSCOW—Reports are heard here that Hitler will start his offensive against Russia at the end of this month. Over the week-end the Reds were particularly active around Bryansk and Kalinin. German siege lines were further broken around Leningrad and there were signs of new activity in the Ukraine. Seventy-one German planes were shot down Friday.

### IN WESTERN EUROPE

LONDON—The Royal Air Force was out in force again yesterday over Northern France but there was no report last night of much activity. Spitfires attacked targets in German-occupied territory this afternoon after bad weather had restricted morning activity. Two southeast coast English towns were bombed and machine-gunned last night with some deaths and injuries.

## Joins Wartime Prices Board

R. S. Gilchrist, Former City Commissioner of Prince Rupert, Takes New Post

The Chamber had taken the matter up recently with Wartime Housing Ltd. and Mr. Piggott is now in touch with the local administrator, W. F. Eve, on the matter.

As it is not expected representation from here will be possible, the correspondence was filed without discussion.

## Churchill Cheerful—VICTORY IS NOW ASSURED

Sea and Air Power As Well As Military Operations Will Defeat Japan—Speaks of Use of Gas

LONDON, May 11.—"I have no doubt that British and United States sea power, overwhelming air power and vigorous military operations will lay them low," declared Prime Minister Winston Churchill in speaking of Japan in a world broadcast last night. The Prime Minister suggested, however, that the end would come much sooner if anything should happen to Hitler. "Tonight I give you a message of good cheer. Drive on to the end. Do your duty. Win or die. God helping us, we can do no less," Mr. Churchill referred to the German invasion of Russia and winter campaign as Hitler's "fatal errors." He promised Germany greater and more destructive British raids and promised that fitting measures would be used against Germany if Germany used gas against Russia.

Mr. Churchill showed how the tide of the war had now definitely turned in favor of Great Britain which no longer stood desperately alone.

## BOOST NAZI COURAGE

ZURICH, May 9.—The Germans have issued orders to soldiers' families that letters to men at the front must contain "messages of optimism and expressions of courage and faith in final German victory."

## Home Nursing Examinations

Members of Red Cross Women's Service Corps Take Tests

Some thirty members of the Red Cross Women's Service Corps, who have been receiving instructions for some time in home nursing under the directions of Miss E. D. Priestly R.N., local public health nurse, took examinations last Friday night at the home of Mrs. James Hadden, Ambrose Avenue.

The examiners, besides Miss Priestly, were Surgeon Lieutenant E. Hetchins, Capt. H. L. C. Begg, Mrs. Alex McRae and Mrs. G. A. Hunter.

## Bader Grows Out Of His New Legs

British Air Hero In German Prison Camp Gets Another Fitting

LONDON, May 11.—Wing Cmdr. Douglas Bader, legless hero of the R.A.F. is to have a new pair of "tin pins," his own name for artificial legs. His wife says Swiss doctors are to visit him at his prison camp in central Germany to take a plaster cast for the new legs. Through lack of exercise he has been putting on weight and has grown out of the artificial legs he has.

The artificial legs Bader finds too small were dropped by parachute from British fighting planes sweeping over Germany—held France last August. He acknowledged receipt of the limbs in a message through the Red Cross.

Bader lost his own legs in an accident before the present war. Before landing in enemy territory a prisoner he was promoted and decorated for his achievements. For some time before the larger organization of the R.C.A.F. in England he commanded an Allied Canadian squadron of the R.A.F.

## DR. HAMBRO IS COMING

Celebrated International Statesman To Visit Prince Rupert

Dr. Carl J. Hambro, president of Norwegian Parliament and president of the League of Nations, will be here to address the people of Prince Rupert Friday and Saturday May 15 and 16. The original plan was that Mr. Hambro would be here also over Sunday, May 17. Unforeseen circumstances make it necessary for the visitor to leave for Vancouver by boat Saturday evening. Appropriate programs have been arranged for both evenings. Friday evening, the program, including Dr. Hambro's address, will be exclusively in English. Saturday evening, Norway's Seventeenth of May Festival, will be observed with Dr. Hambro speaking in Norwegian. The meetings will be held in First Presbyterian Church.

## LOCAL BOY IS MISSING

Ralph Morin Unreported After Operations With Air Force Overseas

Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Morin received a cable from the Royal Canadian Air Force in England Sunday announcing that their only son, Sergeant Pilot William Ralph Morin, aged nineteen, is missing on active service. Details are not given but it is believed he was engaged in recent operations over Germany.

Born in Prince Rupert, Sergeant Pilot Morin received all his education here. He was a bright student and was also accomplished in music. Before enlisting a year ago February he was in the service of the Northern British Columbia Power Co. He received his wings at Yorkton, Saskatchewan, and visited home last September before embarking for overseas.

His many friends will hope that news may yet be received of his safety.

After the business session, over which President Neil Gunderson was in the chair, refreshments were served.

## Compulsory Saving Is Discussed

Should Be Applied to Old and Young Alike, Junior Chamber Feels

The question of deferment of wage payment or compulsory saving came up at the meeting of the Junior Section of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce Friday night. The opinion was expressed that such a proposal should be applied not to young alone but to all. However, no action was taken as it was felt that the government would look after the matter in due time.

## Marry In Haste And Know Little

London Rector Says Some Brides Very Ignorant About Husbands

LONDON, May 11.—Rev. Eric Bates, criticising wartime marriages, disclosed that several brides-to-be, when putting in the bans at his church, St. Peter's Fulham, "proved to be completely ignorant as to the Christian name or civil occupation of their intended husband." This fact, he wrote in his parish magazine, "indicates how little knowledge the parties concerned have of each other, even on the eve of entering into the solemn state of holy matrimony."

### FERTILIZER BLEND

LONDON, May 11.—A merchant in the Netherlands was fined for selling a "fine brand of tobacco" consisting of oak and beech tree shavings mixed with dried manure.

## Score Against Enemy As Result of Battle Of Coral Sea Mounts

Continuing Victory For United Nations Makes Outlook Better For Australia—Nipponese Also Being Set Back North of Burma

The grand total of Japanese ships sunk or crippled in the Battle of the Coral Sea and aerial sequel mounted today to twenty-one with bomb hits during the week-end on two submarines, a seaplane tender and tanker. Continuing victory over Japanese sea power on the north-eastern flank of Australia and the supply line to that continent strengthened the belief it could be held as a concentration point for an eventual counter-offensive against Japan although danger had not yet passed.

There has been no official statement yet in regard to United Nations losses in the battle. Tokyo said that the Allied fleet was one of exceptional strength, the heaviest the Japanese had yet met in the war.

In the Burma theatre the Chinese were said to have recaptured Maymyo, former Allied headquarters, at the same time pressing counter-attacks against the enemy in Mandalay and Lashio. However, a Chinese communiqué said today that heavy fighting continues at Chefang, 25 miles inside of China on the Burma road, where the Japanese have received reinforcements to replace two columns reported wiped out there late last week. The original Japanese invasion force of which the Chinese had previously reported they had killed four thousand was said to be still surrounded by the Chinese Army today.

## CARDIN IS RESIGNING

Cannot Stay With Mackenzie King In View of Legislation On Manpower

OTTAWA, May 11.—(Canadian Press)—Hon. P. J. A. Cardin did not attend a noon meeting of the cabinet today and a source close to him said that his resignation as minister of transport and public works was in the hands of Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King.

A source said that Cardin felt he could not remain in the cabinet in view of the fact that Prime Minister Mackenzie King was expected to introduce in the House of Commons today legislation amending the National Resources Mobilization Act in regard to the conscription of manpower.

In connection with a dispatch published in the Daily News Friday announcing that service stations would be used throughout the country as depositories for scrap rubber for salvage purposes, the local Red Cross announces that local service stations will be used. There is understood to be a good deal of scrap rubber around the city which it is hoped will be gathered up and turned in to the service stations from which it will be duly taken by the Red Cross and shipped away.

All persons interested are accordingly asked to call at the law library on the top floor of the Court House Building where Mrs. Jack Johns and her assistants will undertake the necessary registration. Registrations will be taken from 2 to 5 p.m. daily except Saturday and Sunday from the 13th to the 27th instant.

The following questionnaire is indicative of the information sought:

1. If and when it is considered future conditions warrant evacuation from the Prince Rupert area, would you wish our Committee to arrange for the evacuation of any member of your family? Yes. No.
2. Full name of head of family.
3. Occupation. Address. Tel. No.
4. If at present employed, give address of Employer.
5. Names, ages and sex of evacuees.
6. Have you friends or relatives to whom you may evacuate, if so, give name and address.
7. Assuming housing accommodation can be provided, please indicate your ability to pay board and incidental expenses of each evacuee. Yes. No.
8. Are you able to supply requirements for each child evacuee as recommended by the Evacuation Committee? Yes. No.
9. Remarks.

Following is a list of requirements by each child evacuated:

- 2 sweat shirts.
- 2 underwear.
- 2 pyjamas.
- 2 stockings.
- 1 shade hat.
- 1 pair shoes and rubbers.

- 2 single blankets with ground sheet or sleeping bag.
- 3 sheets and 2 pillow cases.

- Toilet and laundry soap.
- 2 practical bath towels.

- Comb and hair brush.

- Paper towels.

- Sewing kit—needles, thread, scissors, etc.






