In Southern Germany, Capture By Japanese of Manila l ortress-Landing Made By

Night

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 6: (CP)- The United States War Department announced late yesterday that the Japanese had taken Corregidor fortress in Manila Bay following a landing attack was in progress there since midnight Tuesday, continuing until the fall which came after 28 days of siege.

The United States defenders battled desperately for hours against the landing parties which had evidently crossed from the mainland under cover of night. A communique from General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters in Australia said the landing had been on the northeast of the island.

The landing attack followed a day during which there had been no less than thirteen air bombings and five hours of artillery shelling designed evidently to smash shore defences With the fall of Corregidor went the outer islands of Manila Bay

The Corregidor garrison of 7,000 or 8,000 men was suffering eked twenty-eight more enemy, from hunger, disease, fatigue and lack of food and ammunition. It was hopelessly overwhelmed. General Wainwright remained with his forces after the capture.






