STRANGE PHENOMENON. TWO BOARDS OF TRADE ARE

Commencing some time during last night and continuing all day a volcanic ash has been falling, lightly covering the townsite with a grayish dust. The wind is in a west northwest direction and the prenomenon is attributed to what is probably an eruption of one of the volcanoes on the coast of Alaska. 




