



Dimout For U.S. Pacific Coast ...

SAN FRANCISCO—The United States Army today ordered a dimout of the entire Pacific Coast from Canada to Mexico so drastic in scope that it approaches the proportions of a blackout. It called a halt to baseball and other outdoor sports at night, ordered every electric sign and theatre marquee extinguished and prescribed some form of shielding for almost every other type of exterior lighting.

All-India Congress For Allies ...

BOMBAY—A new resolution was placed before the working committee of the All-India Congress Party today stating if India were granted independence the government "will whole-heartedly and unreservedly declare itself on the side of the United Nations agreeing to meet Japanese or any other aggressor with armed resistance." The new draft was described as designed to meet criticisms following the disclosure of the draft of the Gandhi resolution stating that the first move of the independent government probably would be to negotiate with Japan.

British Bomb Ruhr Valley ...

LONDON—British bombers attacked targets in the Ruhr Valley last night while the fighter command planes raided railroads and other objectives in occupied territory. The Germans sent small raiding forces against the south of England and Wales overnight and six enemy bombers were destroyed indicating a high score for Britain's new secret anti-aircraft defences.

Heavy Bombers Harass Axis Vessels ...

CAIRO—Heavy bombers scored a direct hit on an enemy merchant ship, as well as on several troop and supply carrying barges. A British submarine sank an eight hundred ton Italian ship. Italian shore batteries unsuccessfully shelled the sub.

German Bombers Over Iceland ...

REYKJAVIK—The American Command here announced that three German bombers had bombed and machine-gunned military installations along the south east coast of Iceland.

Canada's Films Geared To War C.N.R. Personnel Change Made

Modern Pictures Tell the World What Dominion Is Doing

MONTREAL, August 5: (C) — That humongous sound you hear is Canada's motion picture industry merely turning out reel after reel of films publicizing our country's war effort. No nation has been quicker to sense the importance of films in readying the public mind for the demands of all-out war.

Of a preponderantly documentary nature, Canadian films take a back seat to no other country in this domain, and have acquired an international reputation for excellence and "punch." A New York Times correspondent recently wrote that Russia and Germany were the only nations rivalling Canada's celluloid propaganda.

Bringing all existing problems into a single solid pattern, the National Film Board, headed by active John Grierson, has centralized all government film interests and production, and made integrated use of the existent facilities of private film industry.

In 1942, the National Film Board which is the government Motion Picture Bureau under a new name, will produce and release approximately 150,000 feet of film in 150 items, of which 40 to 50 will be of two reels or more.


Appeasement Pact Now Abrogated

JAPS USE WOODEN GAS TANKS ON FIGHTERS



This is a piece of Japanese flying equipment known as the "belly tank." RUPERT MEN TESTIFY AT SHIP BODY

Present Six Day Schedule Satisfactory Union Men Say

VANCOUVER, August 5: (C) — Management and trades union representatives from Prince Rupert told the Richard Commission investigating B. C. shipyards today that the shortage of man-power caused by inadequate housing conditions at the northern port is one of the main bottlenecks in merchant ship production there. Gilbert Taylor, representing the Canadian Congress of Labor and Clarence Hogarth of the American Federation of Labor, said fourteen hundred shipyard workers in Prince Rupert are well satisfied with the present operation week of six days and clear Sunday and had no desire to see the government's continuous production plan introduced, as it had been in other B. C. yards. Taylor said the dearth of recreational facilities and the low basic pay rates in Prince Rupert drive men to seek work on nearby United States projects, where much higher pay can be earned.

ATLIN MURDER; ARREST MADE

EASTERN CANADIAN ARMY CAMP, August 5: (C) — Three men schooled in the police departments of three Canadian cities worked together recently at an army camp on the job of policing the army. Each was the deputy assistant provost marshal of a division by civilian standards the chief of police.

Capt. H. M. Baker, D.A.P.M. for the 4th (armored) division had his job organized as his division had reached an advanced stage in its training and Capt. R. T. Taft, D.A.P.M. of the 6th division and Capt. G. H. R. Wrigglesworth, D.A.P.M. of the 7th came to find out how he did things.

Baker was formerly traffic engineer with the Montreal city police department. Taft was detective sergeant with the Winnipeg city police and Wrigglesworth served for years as a policeman in Toronto.

In a sort of joint interview the three officers told how an army police department runs. The two visitors had decided to take a few tips from the 4th division men whom they had seen handle traffic during an inspection of the division by the Governor General.

"A military policeman must be a good soldier plus," one of them said. "He must know all that any other soldier knows, and some of the things better. He must be better than average at map-reading in order to handle traffic."

As the army not recruit enough civilian policemen it must train its own police around a nucleus of officers from civilian forces. In addition to Capt. Baker the 4th division has three sergeants with civilian experience which helps them: J. Perfund, a former game warden of London, Ontario; F. Manning, formerly with the Kitchener fire department and A. Daniels, formerly with the York County police force.

Nazis Press On Crisis Develops On Russian Front

Germans Drop Men, Tanks by Parachute as Oil Fields Approached

MOSCOW, Aug. 5 (CP)—The Germans were reportedly landing parachute troops in groups of 100 to 150 and small tanks in north Caucasus today as hard pressed Russians withdrew from Belaya Glina area to new defense positions in face of swarms of German armored units. The entire Caucasus front was alive with Germans battering their way toward Russian oil treasures and the Russians announced another withdrawal in Tsimlyansk area where the Red Army has been trying to stem the flow of German reinforcements over the newly established Don River bridgeheads. The entire nation was aware of a fast-developing and critical situation.

AIR TRAFFIC IS INCREASING

WINNIPEG, August 5:—Passenger, air mail and express traffic on the Trans-Canada Air Lines rose to new heights in June, according to the monthly report to the board of directors. The majority of them on war business, passengers numbered 10,317, an increase of 768 over May and of 1,668 over June 1941. Mail amounted to almost 6,000 pounds a day. The total for June was 174,104 pounds. 7,684 pounds greater than the month before and 55,201 pounds heavier than the volume in June a year ago. Express also reached its highest peak, rising from 22,184 pounds in May to 27,406 pounds, an increase of 5,222 pounds. The increase over June 1941 was 16,803 pounds.

Signal Corps Forms Unit Nerve Centre

Equipment of Divisional Signals Includes More Than 500 Wireless Sets

AN EASTERN CANADA ARMY CAMP, Aug. 5, (C) — An armored division requires what amounts to a good sized telephone company mounted on wheels in order to operate in the field and maintain order and cohesion.

The company for the division is known as divisional signals and Lt.-Col. H. N. Owens of London, Ont., heads the signals for an armored division training here.

Because of the area covered by a mechanized division in action, the speed at which it moves, the need for quick transmission of orders and information the signal corps has a bigger job in an armored division than in an infantry division. Its strength is as large as any other unit, larger than that of an armored regiment.

Its equipment includes more than 500 wireless sets and its personnel more than 100 instrument mechanics and more than 50 electricians. All personnel need intensive trade training in addition to general army training.

They use motorcycles for dispatch riding and regimental duties, blitz buggies, lorries and automatic cable layers. Land lines as well as wireless are used for both telegraph and telephone communications.

Col. Owens said his unit had to start from scratch and learn its job first for an infantry division and then expand and learn more for an armored division. In the meantime it had to provide the whole division in training with a communication service.

For two years, citizens of Canada have been advised to set up budgets for personal incomes, in view of the great need to divert as much as possible from personal incomes to Canada's war chest through the purchase of bonds and certificates. At this point, that advice holds good, but instead of being offered casually it will have to be shouted from the housetops.

Unpatriotic Canadians can continue to live the same kind of private lives during the coming year as they have enjoyed during the past year in spite of sharp increases in income taxation. They can do this by cutting out their purchases of certificates and bonds. The patriotic citizen, who realizes that his country has to meet the obligations of a war for his freedom, can not maintain the same standard of living during the coming year as he has in the past. He has to plan not only to pay his income taxes but to buy even more certificates and bonds than ever before.

It is plain that in order to carry out this program, both the wealthy and people with slender means, will be forced to budget expenditures more and more carefully, since in most cases reductions must be made in spending other than for rent, property taxes and food. And the only intelligent way in which one can cut spending on general items is to set a definite figure for every classification of spending and keep within that figure.

SPORT CHAT

There's much eye-brow lifting among the tea-drinking school cricketers who think nothing of continuing a game for a few days. The reason is a former Test player has come up with "Time-Limit" cricket and it's pronounced a big success.

Alf Glover, company sergeant major with a British artillery unit on the south coast, evolved a time-limit scheme whereby every man in the match gets a fair share of play. Every "Tommy" in his unit now is a confirmed cricket addict.

Here's how it works:

Each pair of batsmen bat for 10 minutes, regardless of how many wickets fall. Every member of the fielding side, barring the wicket-keeper, has a turn at bat, according to an order drawn up before the start of the contest. The last man in an 11-a-side game does not come out when the 10th wicket falls but has 10 minutes single wicket cricket all on his own.

The scoring system also is simple. Each man not out at the end of the allotted batting period has his runs added to his score, and if runs are deducted every time a player loses his wicket during a 20 minutes at the crease. This incidentally, makes it possible for a minus score to be carded.

Dropping of a catch is penalised by three runs and—this is really radical—fieldsmen change at a double between overs.

Speaking of cricket: The sign was set at famed Lord's for the start of a Metropolitan-Military Police match. Batsmen were in the middle field set, umpires (one of them in khaki beneath the regulation white coat) in position. Then someone discovered there was no ball. Incidentally, in eventually, Military Police lost five wickets, first defeat since formation of the club two years ago.

EFFECTIVE NOW**TEA AND COFFEE**
are rationed by coupon

The ration is one ounce of tea or four ounces of coffee per person, per week

Coupons A, B, C, D, and E, on the Temporary War Ration Card, now in the hands of the public, are to be used, and are NOW valid for the purchase of tea and coffee.

Each coupon will entitle the purchaser to one ounce of tea or four ounces of coffee - a supply for one week.

If desired, purchasers may use any or all of these five coupons simultaneously, and buy up to 5 weeks supply at one time, on the surrender of the appropriate number of coupons.

Numbered coupons are good only for the purchase of sugar and may not be used to buy tea or coffee. Similarly, lettered coupons may not be used to buy sugar.

COFFEE CONCENTRATES AND SUBSTITUTES CONTAINING COFFEE

One coupon must be surrendered for each quantity of coffee concentrate or substitute containing coffee, sufficient to make 12 cups of beverage.

TEA BAGS REQUIRE COUPONS

When purchasing tea bags, the following coupon values shall be used:
2 coupons for a carton of 18 or 20 tea bags
4 coupons for a carton of 40 or 45 tea bags
8 coupons for a carton of 80 tea bags

CHILDREN UNDER 12 YEARS OF AGE ARE NOT ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE ANY RATION OF TEA OR COFFEE.

SPECIAL NOTICE TO RETAILERS

On and after August 3rd, retailers must establish their right to purchase new supplies of tea or coffee from their suppliers by turning over to the supplier, currently valid ration coupons, equivalent to the poundage of tea or coffee ordered from the supplier.

Wipe the rolls and frame of the ringer and release pressure on the rolls when not in use. This will save the spring and the rubber. Leave the cover off the tub until it is thoroughly dry. These are little things that will take a little extra time but you will find it worthwhile to do them.
