Indications point to Violent And Costly Struggle in Tunisia-London Sees Improved Picture

CRITICAL PHASE

LONDON, Nov. 25 (CP)-Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden told the House of Commons today that the battle for North Africa was "in an extremely critical phase" and declined to discuss arrangements Lieut, General Dwight Eisenhower had made with local French authorities. He added, however, that "the British First Army, strongly supported by United States forces, is making its way eastward over enormous distances with the utmost possible speed and they are greatly helped in advance by the favorable attitude of the population and also by vigorous assistance which the French troops of Tunisia are offering against the German and Italian invaders."

> ENORMOUS NAZI LOSSES MOSCOW, Nov. 25 (CP)-German losses in dead and captured alone had rocketed close to 100,-000 as the Russian counter-offensive gained momentum today and squeezed the escape corridor of the invaders from Stalingrad down to a depth of 30 miles, batlefront dispatches reported today. A communique said that there were 3,400 German dead overnight to add to the toll in the Stalingrad-Don bend sector alone, raising the official count of killed to 44,000 in six days. Dispatches said that the tally would be close to 50,000 when all reports are in. Prisoners will also total close to 50,000.

The Municipal Situation . . .

With the war engaging the energies and the thoughts of most of the people these days, it is possibly understandable although not at all justifiable that here in Prince F Rupert there is so little interest being taken in the municipal situation. The civic election at which Prince Ruperi will elect its first mayor and council in nearly a decade is less than three weeks off. Yet there is a remarkable indifference to the occasion. In casual talk it is hardly mentioned by the people at all.

With Prince Rupert almost under military control these days and undertaking of normal public works by reason of lack of men and materials being almost out of the question, it is obvious that little of a concrete nature may be immediately accomplished by the new city government. Yet there is much reorganization to be carried out in the establishment of a new type of administration. Then there should be planning for the future since conditions will not continue forever the way they are today The war may be over within a year, it may last two or three years or it may be longer. The day will, however come when actual work, and probably a great deal of it, will have to be carried out by the civic authority. T organize and plan for that day will be a duty of the 1943 municipal administration.

There is a responsibility on the part of the proper type of citizens to assume civic office and it does not be come a city that would again essay self-government that it has so few people who have time or inclination to take up the duties connected therewith.

The Position of France...

The position of France in the North African situation continues enigmatic. Dakar has evidently gone over to the Allies at the order of Admiral Jean Darlan, the former No. 2 Axis collaborator, but there is still doubt expressed as to the disposal of strong French military, air and naval forces which have been located there. History will have a lot to explain in regard to matters which now seem mystifying because the story cannot be told now. The full part of France in the conflct will comprise many interesting revelations, it already appears certain. Meantime we can but speculate and accept results as they occur and just now the results are anything but discouraging.

Canadians in African Campaign...

Navy Minister Angus Macdonald has just disclosed that seventeen Canadian corvettes and 1200 Canadian naval men took part in the North African campaign which is continuing. Possibly some Prince Rupert men Keron were included among those twelve hundred.

All Canadians will be proud at the part the Dominion has played in this campaign which has now come to be regarded as one of the turning points in the war. They will also be happy that the valorous exploits of Canadians have been carried out with little if any loss.




