OLOF HANSON SPEAKS—SKEENA IS VITAL TO WAR EFFORT; MUST BE DEFENDED TO THE LAST

Urges Swift Removal of All Japanese From Coastal and Appeals for Immediate Construction of Northern Highways.

OTTAWA, Feb. 10: (CP)—Olof Hanson, M.P. for Skeena, told the House of Commons last night that his constituency is vital to the war effort and should be defended to the limit.

AGREEMENT IS REACHED

Union and Management of Local Dry Dock in Accord on Wages and Working Conditions.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 10: (CP)—Alex McAuslane, vice-president of the Canadian Congress of Labor, said today that representatives of the shipbuilding union of the Prince Rupert dry dock and officials of the Canadian National Railways had reached complete agreement on wages and working conditions after a seven-day conference here.

The Canadian Congress of Labor head said that wages and working conditions agreements were similar to agreements now in force in Vancouver plants and they are "highly satisfactory" to both parties.

URGED TO BUY BONDS

Trans-Canada Air Lines Asks Support of Employees.

MONTREAL, Feb. 10:—H. J. Symington, K.C., president of Trans-Canada Air Lines, is making an appeal in support of the Victory Loan and has addressed a message to each individual employee of the air lines.

"Canada is in imperative need of more money with which to carry on the war," states Mr. Symington in the letter sent to all members of the staff, and he continues: "The Dominion, through its government, asks every man and woman employed by Trans-Canada Air Lines to answer the call by subscribing to the Second Victory Loan."

"It is an invitation, without coercion, to invest in the future of our country, and it is one to which we will readily respond. To strengthen the war machine, to provide greater quantities of aircraft, ships, tanks, guns, food, as well as equipment for the men in the field and at defence posts is the duty of all of us."

In order to facilitate purchases of bonds Trans-Canada Air Lines will arrange that members of the staff may authorize payroll deductions for that purpose.

JASPER TO HAVE JAPS

First Migration From Coast to Interior to Be Carried Out Next Week.

OTTAWA, Feb. 10: (CP)—First Japanese nationals to be moved from British Columbia protected areas will be sent next week to a work camp at West Jasper, Alberta. The camp will accommodate one hundred men at first and it is understood they will be engaged on road work.

BRITISH ON OFFENSIVE

Striking Again at Axis in Battle of Libya—Air Force Particularly Effective

CAIRO, Feb. 10:—Having regained their striking power, the British forces have once again seized the offensive in the Battle of Libya and are again striking west of Tobruk.

The Royal Air Force continues endless pounding of the Axis supply lines, hitting them with much damage as far west as Tripoli.

Vichy Helping Axis in Libya

LONDON, Feb. 10: (CP)—Rt. Hon. Hugh Dalton, minister of economic warfare, charged Vichy today with permitting deliveries of food and gasoline to reach Axis troops in Libya from Tunisia in French North Africa.

MEIGHEN DEFEATED

Conservative Leader Loses to C.C.F. by 4,000—New Ministers Endorsed.

OTTAWA, Feb. 10:—Seeking entry to parliament in his capacity as leader of the Conservative party in Canada, Senator Arthur Meighen was defeated in the South York federal by-election yesterday. His Co-operative Commonwealth Federation opponent, J. Nosworthy, had a majority of four thousand. Hon. Humphrey Mitchell, the new minister of labor, was elected in Welland, and Hon. L. S. St. Laurent, the new minister of justice, was successful in Quebec East. Dr. Gaspard Fauteux, Liberal, won in Montreal-St. Mary.

In addition to the two most recent additions to Mackenzie King's cabinet, a supporter of the prime minister retained a third Liberal seat at stake in the by-election, this being Dr. Fauteux in Montreal St. Mary. Mr. Nosworthy, the successful C.C.F. candidate in the fourth seat who had the distinction of beating Mr. Meighen, twice head of a Dominion government, is a fifty-year-old Toronto school teacher.

Commenting on the results of the by-elections, Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King gave the opinion that they constituted an expression of disapproval by the people of bad faith and broken pledges. The Prime Minister requested that an end be now put to controversies which made for disunity in the war effort. Mr. King said in his statement: "The voters in the four ridings showed the Canadian people they did not propose to allow bad faith and broken pledges to be erected into principle of action in this country."

MORE AXIS SHIPS SUNK

British Torpedo Vessels Continue Active Against Enemy in Mediterranean.

LONDON, Feb. 10: (CP)—British submarines sank one Axis ship and torpedoed two others, one of which almost certainly sank, in new attacks in the Mediterranean, the Admiralty announced today.

Pacific War Council Meet

LONDON, Feb. 10:—The Pacific War Council met today in London under the chairmanship of Prime Minister Winston Churchill. Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand and the Netherlands being represented. The Australian representative took it that Canada was not represented because it was in no immediate danger of attack.

NORMANDIE GOES DOWN

Great Liner Sinks Into Hudson River Mud Following Explosion and Fire.

NEW YORK, Feb. 10:—The flames which ravaged the United States naval auxiliary vessel Lafayette, formerly the monster French trans-Atlantic liner Normandie, were started by a welder's torch, it has been ascertained. Like a great wounded monster, the fire-seared and waterlogged vessel succumbed to the surging tide today and toppled to ignominious rest in the Hudson River mud. The great vessel rolled over early today and now lies on her port side in forty feet of water.

The flames, after being touched off by sparks from the welder's torch, swept through a large quantity of kapok packing and raged over the vessel for three-and-a-half hours yesterday before being brought under control about 6 p.m. when she had a twelve degree list. One hundred and ten workers on the ship were taken to hospital but, as far as is known, there were no deaths.

NEW DRIVE IN SPRING

Axis Will Make Bid to Control Mediterranean and Cut Off India

LONDON, Feb. 10:—An Axis drive with a view to closing both ends of the Mediterranean—at Gibraltar on the west and Suez on the East—is foreseen for the coming spring. Gibraltar would be attacked through Spain and Suez from North Africa. This would be part of a plan whereby, with the Japanese moving from the East, India would be cut off.

More Japs Landing; Forces Swarm In On Last British Fortress

London Itself Indicates Infiltration of Enemy Into City Proper—Further New Blows Towards Netherlands Indies and Australia.

LONDON, Feb. 10: (CP)—Japanese troops swarmed on to Singapore Island in new landings today, forcing the British Imperial defenders to execute a new withdrawal in the struggle for Britain's last great stronghold in the Far Pacific. Informed London quarters said it was possible the Japanese had infiltrated into Singapore city itself and attacked the radio station there. The station was blanked out this morning.

Dispatches said that the din of battle for the city intensified after dawn and a great pall of smoke hung over the fighting. Japanese planes flew low over Singapore's outskirts and residents heard the whine of machine gun bullets. Even as Singapore's fateful hour approached, the Japanese were striking new blows in the Netherlands East Indies and toward Australia.

AIR SCORE IS 20 TO 1

United Nations Have Best of It Over Japs at Burma

RANGOON, Feb. 10:—The score in the air war over Burma is running 20 to 1 in favor of the united nations over Japan. A Dutch communique said that Japanese troops had landed near Macassar, chief port on the southwest coast of Celebes Island, in what was seen as a move toward assault on Java itself.

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VAST SUMS ARE VOTED

Roosevelt Signs Huge Naval Appropriation Bill and Seeks Like Amount for Army and Maritime Commission.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt yesterday signed the \$26,000,000,000 naval appropriation bill, largest fiscal measure ever enacted in the history of the country, and immediately asked for another appropriation of similar size for the army and the maritime commission, all for the prosecution of the war.

FIRST SIREN IN VANCOUVER TRIED

Air Raid Alarm Signal Tested Out in Southern City This Afternoon.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 10:—The first of nineteen air raid alarm sirens to be installed in Vancouver was tried out at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Results of By-Elections . . .

The results of at least three of the by-elections held in eastern Canada yesterday indicated, if nothing else, the steady determination of the voters not to disturb the present government in its work of carrying on the business of the country—which business at the present time is, of course, almost exclusively concerned with the prosecution of the war effort. The majority of the voters concerned in these elections, despite the conflicting issues and diverting arguments which were brought before them, showed unwillingness to embark upon anything in the way of political experimentation at this critical time. With the endorsement of the two new cabinet ministers—Mr. Mitchell, minister of labor, in Welland, and Mr. St. Laurent, the minister of justice, in Quebec East—the political situation in the government is stabilized.

Surprising to many was the defeat of Senator Arthur Meighen for Youth South seat in parliament. This was a bad blow for the Conservative party and, of course, eliminates Mr. Meighen finally from active public life.

As for Montreal-St. Mary, where there was no official government candidate, it is notable that the candidate most sympathetic to the government was successful.

Reasonable Criticism . . .

Reasonable criticism must always be expected but military criticism is always difficult because information is usually incomplete. That is why it is desirable to give the public as much information as possible as long as it is consistent with public safety and does not give information that may be useful to the enemy.

It seems that just recently there was a shortage of rifles for Canadian soldiers and in some cases obsolete weapons were handed out to them. The matter was aired in parliament and it was found that the new Canadian rifles had been sent to Singapore where they were badly needed. We think that Canadians will be glad that they were able to provide effective weapons for the troops who are holding the British fortress against the hordes of brown men now attacking. Even if they do not succeed in keeping the Japanese out we shall feel glad that they were given at least a fighting chance as a result of the efforts of Canadian factories.

Where Is Best Point? . . .

It is quite impossible for we arm chair critics to describe where our men or munitions shall be used to best effect. We look across at Libya and wonder if the best possible use is being made of the men and material available. We hear that some of these are being sent to Russia and wonder if instead they should not have gone to Libya. Our leaders have made certain promises of help to Russia and we agree that these promises must be kept, if it is possible to do so. The Russians are doing glorious work and so are the troops in North Africa. Our leaders see the whole picture while we see only a small part. Let us trust them and believe that while they sometimes may make mistakes they are doing the best they know how.

Not Asked to Give . . .

Just now we are being asked to loan to the limit of our money so that no man may be without the best possible weapon when the day of trial arrives. We are not being asked to give any money. If our cash is in the bank it is drawing probably one and a half percent interest. The government is offering three percent. It does not need the patriotic urge to buy that way. We can scarcely look upon ourselves as patriots if we invest that way. Let us help buy a few more rifles, a few machine guns and at the same time improve our own financial position.

FAVORED AS NEXT PREMIER

Most People 'Don't Know' About Successor to Mr. King.

TORONTO, Feb. 10. — The Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Defence Minister James L. Ralston and Ontario Premier Mitchell Hepburn receive the largest number of mentions in a nation-wide survey by the Canadian Institute of Public Opinion, designed to discover which men stand out in the public minds today as potential heirs to the premiership of Canada.

Since few national observers believe there is any immediate likelihood of Prime Minister King's retirement, the survey is less important for its political indications than for its picture of Canadian thinking at this moment.

Using a question which has also been asked in Britain by the British Institute of Public Opinion, the present survey asked a cross-section of the Canadian voting public:

"If anything should happen to Mr. King, is there any one you would particularly like to see succeed him?"

No list of names or other suggestions were put before the individual voter, so that the replies are entirely spontaneous.

Apart from the fact that Mr. Meighen, Colonel Ralston and Premier Hepburn received the largest number of mentions, the most noteworthy finding is that more than half of those interviewed (55 per cent) were undecided on the question or had no suggestion to advance.

Without Definite Choices

B. Hanson, M.P.; former Premier R. B. Bennett; former Conservative Party Leader Robert Manion; Finance Minister James L. Hsley, and Premier Adélard Godbout, of Quebec.

Scattered votes were also given in the survey to General McNaughton; Resources Minister T. A. Crerar; Hon. Maxime Raymond, M.P.; Justice Minister Louis S. St. Laurent; Premier William Aberhart of Alberta; J. S. Woodsworth, M.P.; Pensions Minister Ian Mackenzie, and others.

How Conservatives Voted
Analysis of the results on a party basis shows Conservatives listing Mr. Meighen far ahead of all other possibilities. Colonel Ralston, Colonel George Drew and Premier Hepburn were others sharing a substantial portion of the Conservative's vote.

As a member of the Liberal party, of course, Colonel Ralston also stood high on the list named by Liberals. In order, the leaders were: Colonel Ralston, Premier Hepburn, Mr. Meighen and Mr. Power.

Fifty-seven percent of the Lib-

erals interviewed said they could not suggest a successor to Prime Minister Mackenzie King. Forty-three percent of the Conservatives failed to do so.

Virtually all similar studies of political thinking in Britain and the United States testify to the fact that unless the public is faced with an imminent change of party government, or other political denouement, a substantial number of voters will be undecided or reserve their opinions in such surveys.

Hence observers of public opinion trends will not regard the present "no opinion" vote as necessarily unusual. A few months before the Republican party's 1940 presidential convention, at which Wendell Willkie was nominated as the party candidate, Gallup Polls in the United States found approximately the same number of

Republicans without definite choices.

In Britain, on the other hand, where recent tests showed Anthony Eden, Lord Beaverbrook and Ernest Bevin the leading popular choices if a successor had to be found for the premiership, 23 per cent were without definite opinions.

Regional Pattern
The Canadian survey indicates that while support for Mr. Meighen and Colonel Ralston comes from all sections of the country, most of the former's following is in Ontario, while a proportionately large share of the latter's comes from the Maritimes—including Colonel Ralston's own Prince Edward Island.

By far the greatest part of Premier Hepburn's support came from his own province of Ontario.

SWEDEN IS INDIGNANT

German Reprisals in Norway Ire of Press.

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 10. — Protection of Norwegian patriots resist the "new order" in Norway instituted by the Nazi occupation and by members of the National Samling (Norwegian National Socialist Party), has been commented upon by the Swedish press with more and more frequency. The Social Democrats in a recent editorial stated: "Norwegian resistance is deep and unquenchable. Measures directed against workers, farmers, officials and other closest friends of the royal family. With Vidkun Quisling and the National Socialist party as the Germans endeavored to organize Norway and the Norwegian along lines that violated both international law and the law of the country. In this, however, they failed. They have succeeded in welding the Norwegian nation together in a common faith in democracy, liberty and justice."

An editorial in an ironic tone has appeared in Svenska Dagbladet, quoting the complaint of Norwegian Nazi paper Fritt Folk that opponents of the Quisling party living inland have led a disturbed lives, while anti-quislings along the coast have been "exposed to risks of capture by British Commandos." Fritt Folk then stated that "clemency beyond all Christian virtue" protected the anti-Quislings in Svenska Dagbladet commented: "Among the Christian virtue of Fritt Folk evidently placed executions, mass arrests and wholesale lawless oppression is an everyday occurrence in the way. The application of measures in the arrest of former officials of the King Haakon—intimate friends of the royal family—won't break Norwegian people's spirit of resistance. Particularly repulsive procedure of punishing persons by taking them away from a group which had to belong to the same family professional circle as do the alleged culprits."

PUMPKIN PIE
(without sugar)
1½ cups cooked, sieved pumpkin
1 cup honey
1 teaspoon cinnamon
½ teaspoon ginger
½ teaspoon salt
2 eggs
1 cup milk
½ cup cream
Mix ingredients and bake in one crust. Top with honey meringue or a layer of honey and then one of whipped cream.

HONEY MERINGUE
For electric beater use ½ cup honey to 1 egg white.
For hand beater use ¼ cup honey to 1 egg white.
Put together in bowl and whip until mixture peaks. If allowed to whip for half an hour the mixture will keep well for months.
Store in refrigerator in a low uncovered bowl. Honey butter meringue is made by folding 1 cup honey meringue into 1 tablespoon melted butter (not hot).

Battle of Singapore— NO CAUSE OF ALARM, WAS SAID

Fierce Fighting Continues—Burma Holds Firm—Widespread Japanese Attacks

SINGAPORE, Feb. 10:—There was no immediate cause for alarm despite the Japanese invasion of Singapore, declared Malor General Henry Gordon Bennett, commander of the Australian forces, who are taking a leading part in the defence of the fortress. That was last night when a bulletin, the first in several hours, said the position was uncertain but the defenders appeared to be holding their own for the time being at least.

Fighting continues fiercely with the traditional British stronghold as the stake. Tokyo claimed today to have taken control of Tenga airdrome, ten miles from the city, but this was not at first confirmed.

In Burma British defenders are holding firm with the Japanese, after ten days of trying, still unsuccessful in the attempt to establish themselves on the west side of the Solowen River.

Batavia, the capital of Java and headquarters of the Allied Far East command; Palangan, important Sumatra oil stronghold, and other Netherlands East Indies points were bombed yesterday by

the Japanese air force with no serious results at any point.

Once again the enemy failed to penetrate General Douglas MacArthur's defence lines on Batan Peninsula on Luzon Island. The guns on Corregidor Island and at the entrance of Manila Bay found the range of enemy guns and knocked some of them out. There is still a question, however, how long Corregidor could hold out should the enemy assault become more intense.

SECURITIES FRAUD ACT

Evidence of Prospectors and Promoters to Be Heard.
 VICTORIA, Feb. 10.—The legislature's mining committee, after detailed explanation of the Securities Frauds' Prevention Act by E. K. deBeck, commissioner of the act, will hear evidence from prospectors and promoters who consider the act detrimental to the mining industry in B.C.
 W. J. Asselstine, former minister of mines, said that in the opinion of the public there was conflict between the mining department and the administration of the act, and this should be cleared up.
 Mr. deBeck said the act was beneficial to the public, but that it was not understood.
 Members of the committee were of the opinion the act should be sold to the public.
Prospectors Object
 Several letters were read from prospectors objecting to the act. "I've come across several cases where I thought the prospectors got a pretty raw deal," said Attorney-General R. L. Maitland.
 Mr. deBeck said he deplored the fact that \$1 out of every \$5 went to the raising of money for investment. He said he would like to see sufficient confidence in B.C. projects so that the bulk of the money would go into the ground.
 Objection to the act, Mr. deBeck said, came from promoters largely.
 He said his department was continually faced with the problem of "the directors who do not direct—they leave it to one man."
 "It is with great reluctance we interfere with boards of directors so long as they direct properly," Mr. deBeck said. "We sometimes ask 'are you attending to business?'—and sometimes threaten to advertise the facts in the papers, if they don't attend to business."
 "A vindictive, disgruntled shareholder can create a great deal of trouble," Mr. deBeck said. "To have an honest promoter accused of criminal acts and all sorts of skulduggery, and held up as a crook, liar and thief, discourages others, equally honest."
Freebooting Days
 Regarding dissatisfaction of prospectors, Mr. deBeck said "some people, including many bona fide prospectors, believe the Securities Act is responsible to a whole or large extent. This situation, however, has been exploited by those who would like to see the act abolished, with a return to the freebooting days, using sympathy for the poor prospectors."
 He said he was of the opinion the act was in no way responsible for the condition.
 "On the contrary I am of the opinion the act, under a sound administration, is beneficial to prospectors," he said.

General Steffens Is Now in Russia

Norwegian Military Man, Who Visited Prince Rupert Last Year, Back in Wars
 General William Steffens, commander-in-chief of the Norwegian forces in Canada last year, who visited Prince Rupert in the spring of 1941, is now in Russia, according to word received by local friends. General Steffens is understood to be collaborating with the Russian military authorities in connection with the prosecution of the war against the Nazi invaders which is now proceeding so successfully.

These industrious women, residing at widely scattered points, meet for an all-day session once a month. Most of the materials for covering and filling are donated by other residents in the community. The "Baby Bees," a group of four ten-year-old girls have provided the wool and knitted 17 pairs of mitts for the Red Cross."
