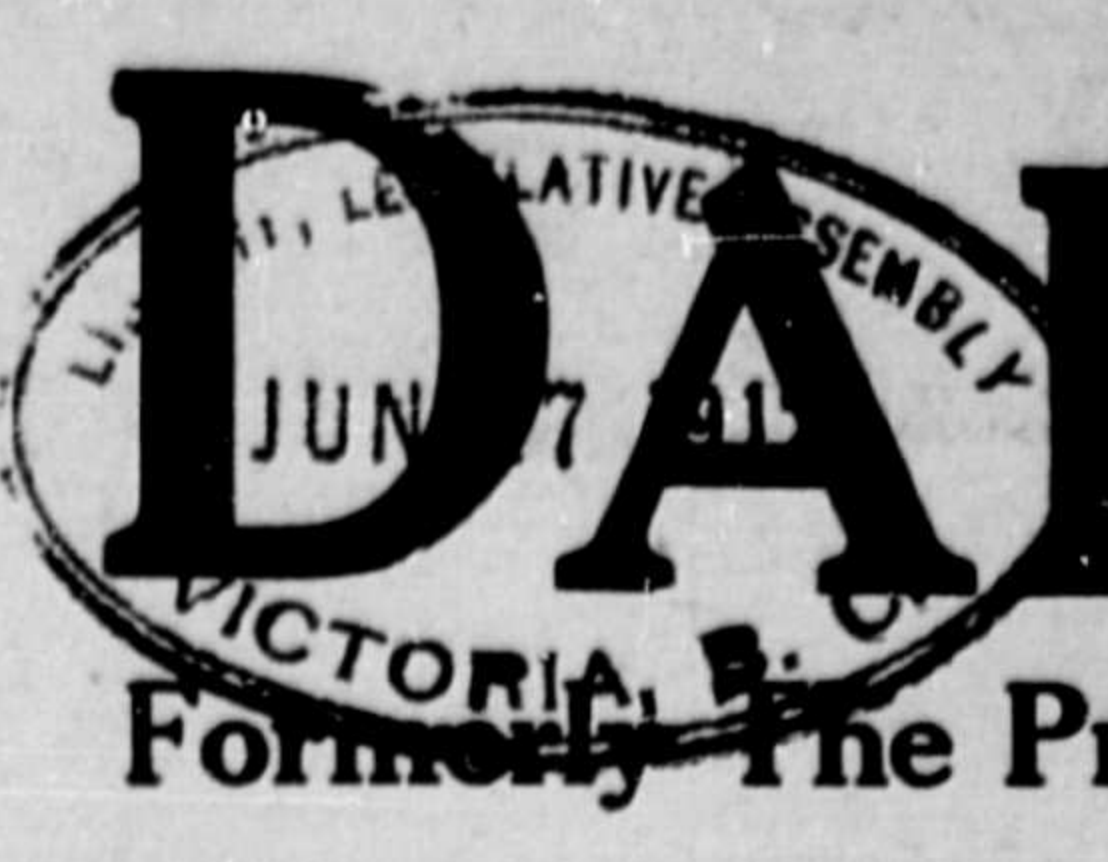

TWO WELL KNOWN RUNNERS WILL COMPETE ON TUESDAY

POWERFUL AND IMPRESSIVE ADDRESS BY DR. ERNEST HALL

NOTED SURGEON AND LECTURER BEFORE LARGE ASSEMBLIES IN THE EMPRESS THEATRE AND METHODIST CHURCH ATTACKS PROBLEMS OF SOCIAL AND MORAL REFORM

Last night's address by Dr. Ernest Hall on the burning subject of the white slave traffic is admitted to be one of the most severe indictments of the communities on the Pacific coast for their share in this national evil. Dr. Hall condemned the evil and those connected with it in wholesale manner, slashing at the morally depraved root and branch. A tremendous crowd attended the lectures, both afternoon and evening, and it was particularly noticed that many women were present, taking a vital interest in the problem which affects the well being of the young and ignorant of their sex.

Dr. Hall, who is a powerful speaker, use no euphemisms in his treatment of the subject of social impurity. His words were deliberate, forceful and to the point. He called a spade a spade and did not mince matters. There can be no doubt of the intense impression caused upon the large section of the community of Prince Rupert which heard the addresses and that Dr. Hall's strenuous struggle for the bettering of the conditions of evil undoubtedly existing and for the awakening still more of the public conscience regarding them will have good results.

VOLCANIC DUST SPRINKLES MAINLAND FOR MANY MILES

Leaf and Blade Thickly Powdered Throughout Skeena River Valleys Down the Wind---Sun Obscured by Dry Haze Unlike Fog, Cloud or Smoke---Citizens Collect Phenomenal Precipitation by the Tumblerful---Report Reaches Rupert of Terrific Eruption in Aleutian Islands

For a distance of some hundreds of miles from its source the curious dust fall noticed in Saturday's Daily News seems to have traveled. Not only is the whole of Kaien Island covered with the tiny precipitation but the bush for miles and miles down the wind over the main land is similarly strewn. In the Khatadha Valley, fifty miles away, on Sunday every leaf and grass blade was sprinkled, and in places the dust rose like white smoke behind the feet of those passing through the underbrush. Citizens of Prince Rupert have collected ash samples, one city employee having half a tumblerful.

Aleutian Eruption.

It was reported today by wire that an eruption had been witnessed by the U. S. cutter Bertha in the neighborhood of the Aleutian Islands. A triple volcano was seen there to belch forth in awe inspiring splendor from the island group which stretches out toward Kamskatcha from the curved horn of Northern Alaska. The sight was one of extraordinary grandeur by night, say the report, vast columns of flame and smoke hurtling upward with muttered detonations and a steady muffled roar as of a subterranean furnace. There can be no doubt that the dust precipitation noticed in this district originates from this reported eruption.

Krakatoa Most Famous.

The famous ash precipitation of Vesuvius and Aetna, which, falling to an immense depth, destroyed in ancient times the cities of Herculaneum and Pompeii, are well known, but the most famous volcanic as distribution of modern years was that of Krakatoa, the volcanic eruption which blew a whole island clean off the map and made the most awful noise the world ever heard, noise that echoed for a thousand miles and more. Krakatoa covered the whole surface of the world more or less with a fine sprinkling of ashes. It did more. It blew its ashes so high that the cloud of them caught the upper currents of our atmosphere high above the trade winds and seven times circled the globe causing wonderful solar effects recorded by astronomers everywhere.

Four Feet Deep.

At Valdez, Alaska, the fall of ashes was so thick as to resemble a perfect blizzard. News reached Rupert this morning that the streets were covered to a depth of four feet by the white, silvery powder, which rose under foot like the famous snow in the poem about Lucy Gray. Incidentally it filled eyes and noses most unpleasantly and caused a good deal of alarm. The Indians on the northerly coasts have been steadily praying since the dust shower began, but so far without apparent result.

Previous Famous Eruptions.

Far spread dust sprinkling from volcanic sources has been noted very often in other parts of the world. Clear snow in the distant range of the Antarctic volcanoes has been found strewn

PAYMENT FOR THEIR MAYOR

Grand Forks Aldermen to Subscribe \$50 all Around to Pay Their Civic Head---What is Rupert Doing?

At the meeting of the City Council at Grand Forks last Monday night consideration of the aldermen's salary bylaw in committee began and it passed through this stage and also received its third reading. On motion, the salaries of the aldermen were raised from \$200 to \$250, it being understood that each alderman is to refund \$50 of this amount as a salary for the mayor, who is prevented from drawing direct remuneration by provincial laws. Alderman Morrison explained that he intended to donate his salary to the city, to be placed in a fund to be used for the establishment of a park. He said there was a splendid park site on the south side of the river opposite his ranch. If he carries out his good intention, there will be a deficit in the mayor's salary which will have to be made up in some manner.

FIGHTING OIL FIRE

Burning Well Will Be Attacked With Live Steam.

Taft, Ca., June 7.—The Pacific fuser, ignited recently, is still shooting its roaring column of fire 300 feet into the air. There is little wind and the danger to surrounding property is correspondingly lessened.

The stream is eight inches thick at the base and is sprouting thick at the base and is spouting 7,000 barrels a day.

At a meeting of the officers of the Pacific Crude Oil Company it was decided to station a number of boilers as near the blazing crater as practicable and from the boilers to push out a half dozen or more pipe lines of live steam. The same methods was successfully employed here two years ago in extinguishing a pusher that had been on fire for more than a month. Five thousand barrels in a nearby pump hole have burned out.

"GRUB STRIKE" DEMONSTRATION

Nineteen Hundred Prisoners Run Amuck in San Quentin Penitentiary---One Dead and Several Wounded.

(Special to Daily News.)

San Quentin, Cal., June 10.—A continuation today of the "grub strike" demonstration which began yesterday in San Quentin penitentiary developed into a riot in the general mess hall, as a result of which one prisoner was shot and killed and two others wounded.

The dead man, H. L. Lynwood, a naval prisoner, was serving a six and a half year term for desertion and impersonating an officer. The wounded are Frank Taylor, a negro serving twenty years for robbery committed in San Francisco, shot through hand; H. A. George, struck in leg by a glancing bullet.

Nineteen hundred prisoners were sitting down to dinner shortly after 2 o'clock this afternoon when two or three hundred of the men began a concerted demonstration. Not content with voicing their protests with shrieks and cat calls, the demonstrators began throwing dishes and food about. Some made a rush for the adjoining kitchen and began hurling pots and pans around the room. These were driven out with hose, spouting live steam, several of the rioters being severely burned. No sooner was the mutiny over than the prison bell was sounded with the "lock up" signal.

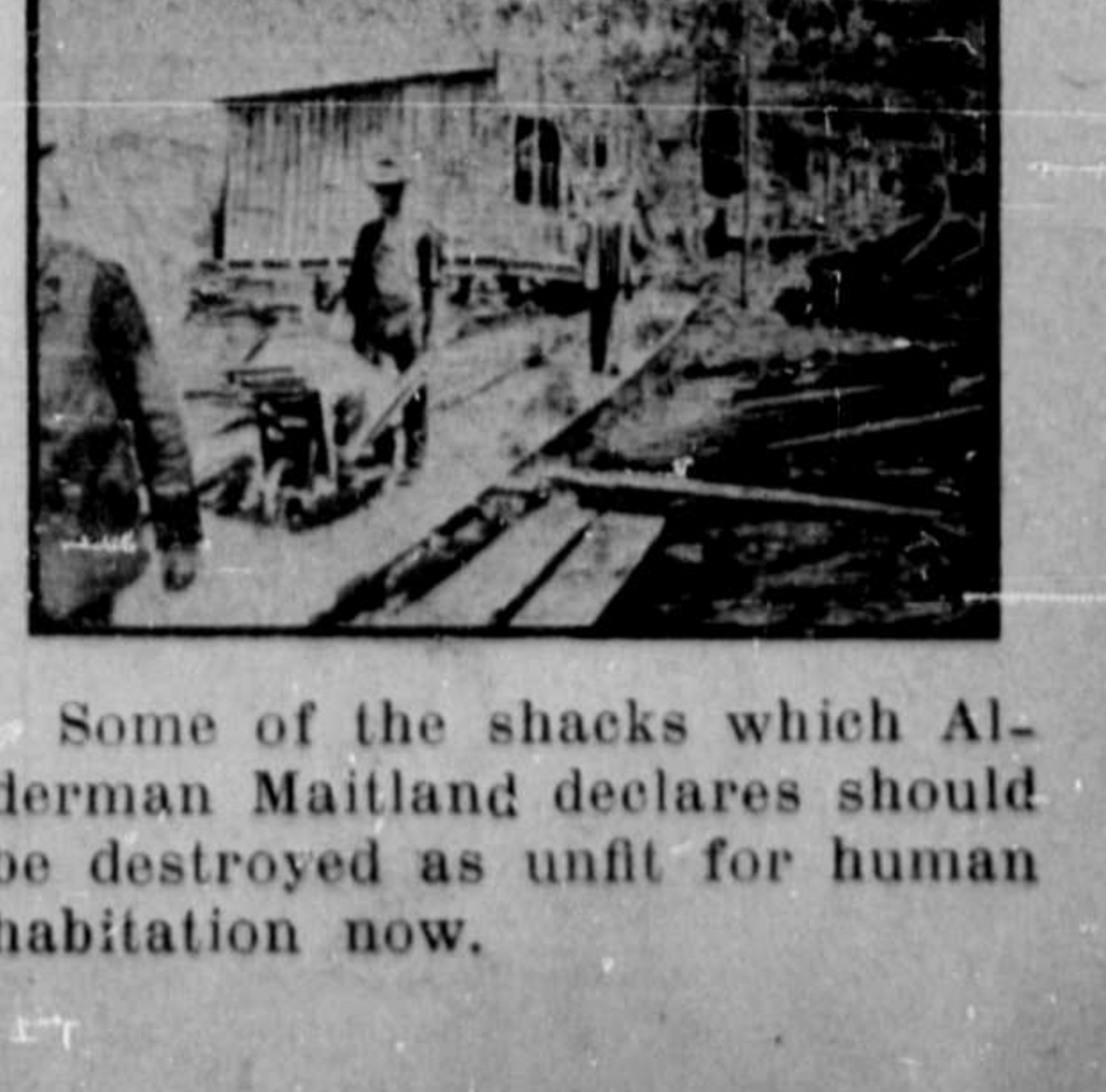
PREPARED AT LAST

FLOATING COURT GOES TO ALASKA

Justice Hall on Steamer Makes Return Trip North—Method Originated to Hold Session at Isolated Places on the Coast.

Seward, Alaska, June 5.—Word was received here from Juneau that the famous "floating court" will be in session again this summer and that all of the cases from what is known as the westward, or that part of Alaska that lies west of Seward, will be heard before this court.

The Thetis will go as far west as Nushagak and it is possible that the court will order the cases that have come up at Ungava and Unalaska to be heard at Nushagak, as this will greatly reduce the cost to the government as well as facilitate the work of the court.

The floating court was originated several years ago in order to administer justice at points where offenders are held by the local marshals pending a hearing. The idea has worked out to the complete satisfaction of all and it is thought that it is the solution to the problem of enforcing the laws on the chain of islands that lie to the westward.

BLOOD COST OF AVIATION

Question of Whether the Conquest of the Air is an Achievement Worth Its Price in Human Life Exercises Press.

Is the game of aviation worth the candle of life it consumes with so insistent a rapidity? Are the benefits real or sentimental that come from the conquest of the air a fair return for the price paid in blood?

Today there are within a short radius three bodies in the morgue to testify to the full that rational man cannot fly with the skill and surety of the irrational gull. We have come into the habit of making enlarged photographs of the future; we talk glibly and vaguely of the benefits that will accrue from aerial navigation; we do not know just what these benefits will be, but we are, for some reason, certain that they will be invaluable.

Aviation is not a sport. It is an occasion for homicide or suicide. It has been demonstrated that under certain conditions man can fly. If it is any satisfaction to know this, it is generally known, and we may require. But that is about as far as it goes.

We have lately learned that the unsinkable ship has not been built, and we have been building ships for a long time. It is sensible to assume that it will take some time to make the aeroplane reasonably safe. The imperfect ship has long since proved its value; that of the aeroplane is conjectural. There is no demand for it.

As long as the public will pay to see men risk their lives there will be men and lives to risk. The difference between the bull fight and the aviation, but as long as the skull and cross bones remain on the price tag of aerial achievement it behooves us to examine the quality of the material we are buying.

BEATS HUSBAND; IS SENT TO PEN

Suffragette Gets Busy at Beating Her Husband and is Sentenced to Three Months in the Penitentiary.

Binghamton, N. Y., June 7.—Mrs. Mary Dubal of this city is the first suffragette in the United States to be given a penitentiary sentence for husband beating.

She was arrested on a warrant obtained by Mr. Dubal, who complained that in a fit of rage she gave him a sound beating.

City Judge Albert Hotchkiss found her guilty and declared that if women desire men's prerogatives they should also have men's punishments when found guilty of violation of the law. He always dealt severely with wife beaters, he said, and accordingly he sentenced her to three months in the penitentiary.

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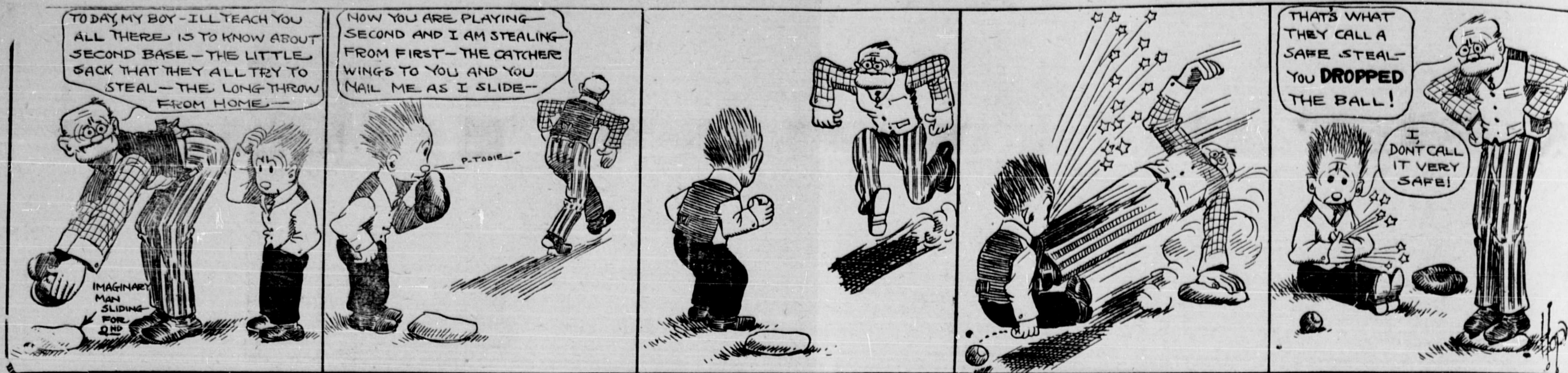
