# Nazis Being Crushed At Kharkov

## NEW INTERNATIONAL ERA ENVISIONED BY PRESIDENT NORWEGIAN PARLIAMENT

Dr. Hambro, World Statesman, Talks Idealistically Yet Practically of War and Peace

Envisioning a new international order where lasting peace would be brought about by practical application of idealistic measures keeping the nations in due bounds one with the other, an order under which secret diplomacy and political intrigue would be replaced by open, honest dealings, Dr. Carl J. Hambro, president of the Norwegian Parliament (Norwegian Parliament) and of the League of Nations, one of the leading statesmen in the world today, brought a refreshing and lofty message to a large audience which completely filled First Presbyterian Church last night. Eloquent speaker in English, notwithstanding the fact that it is not his native tongue, Dr. Hambro gave an inspiring discourse which made a deep impression on all his listeners. It was something of an entirely different type, elevating and inspiring, confident and rousing.

In opening, Dr. Hambro spoke of the pleasure it gave him to address a meeting in Prince Rupert where, like elsewhere on the British Columbia coast, so many Norwegians had found a happy home under conditions and in environment greatly resembling the Old Land. In these years of war, Norwegians had come to love Canada more. They were appreciative of the hospitality here and the assistance the Dominion was giving in the war effort. The speaker referred to the government in exile of Norway, a government which was paying its way—meeting all its obligations—largely due to its merchant marine.

When it became necessary for the King and government to leave Norway, the navy and air force also made their escape intact to fight on from abroad. The Norwegian navy, although still modest, was stronger today than ever. It was on duty in waters far afield with bases at Durban, South Africa and Sydney, Australia. Norwegian sailors were sailing

with the British Navy. The air force was larger than ever before and still expanding with fighters on every front and now Norwegian infantry was being trained in Canada.

The main war effort of Norway, however, was by the Norwegian merchant marine which had lost 225 ships by bombing and torpedoing but was still a large factor in the transport of war supplies. Norwegian merchant sailors were found everywhere there was danger. They would be recorded in history as unknown and nameless heroes of the war.

**An Unknown Nation**  
President Hambro described how the people at home in Norway, although suffering almost indescribable hardship, did not complain but were determined to win the war and restore the freedom of their homeland. It was a solid nation which the Germans, even by killing, could not break.

Dr. Hambro referred to the necessity of winning the peace and it was along their line that he gave the main burden of his address. Post-war reconstruction was a most important matter for consideration even now. The Germans had never declared war upon the democratic nations so they need not and could not declare peace with Germany for long until after the last battle had been fought.

The speaker felt that there would necessarily have to be a long period of transition before there could be any peace conference. There would be many and (Continued on Page Two)

## WAR NEWS

### Kerch and Kharkov

The Germans claimed today to have occupied Kerch, important gateway to the Caucasus oil fields, while the Russians claimed that Marshal Timoshenko's forces had smashed into the suburbs of Kharkov, key city to the Donets Basin. There is reported to have been a terrible toll of Nazi dead and wounded.

### Air Force Hits Nazi Ship

Hudson bombers of the Royal Air Force set fire to three enemy supply ships and hit several others in attacks on two German convoys off the Friesen Islands in the North Sea last night. Heligoland naval base was blasted and the west coast of Denmark attacked. The British suffered the loss of five planes, the Air Ministry announced.

### Churchill Sees Victory

Prime Minister Winston Churchill, speaking today, said the Allies were still climbing uphill but the ridge was in sight and it would soon be a downhill fight to Allied victory. "Whatever we have got to take, we will take and give back in plentiful measure," he said. If Britain's enemy "plays rough we can play rough too," he said. The Germans were not so liable to attack England now, he believed, as they knew what awaited them. The Prime Minister was speaking to Yorkshire workers at Leeds. He was accompanied by Hon. Herbert Evatt of Australia.

### British holding Out

Countering yesterday's reports that last weary remnants of the British army had retreated into Burma, British military quarters said today that British troops had made contact with Japanese forces driving up the Chindwin River valley north of Shweyin. These sources said there was no general withdrawal into India. Meanwhile the Chinese command at Chungking announced the Japanese had opened an offensive in Chekiang, Chinese maritime province south of Shanghai with many columns driving southward.

## SPLENDID RESPONSE

Red Cross Chairman Gratified At Way Campaign Is Going

"Prince Rupert has responded in a magnificent and heart-warming manner to the appeal of the Canadian Red Cross Society for funds," said W. R. McAfee, president of the local branch today. "As the campaign does not close until May 23 we should exceed our objective by a comfortable margin but there can be no relaxation of effort. The main canvass has almost

been completed through hard work on the part of the canvassers. However, it is inevitable that some individuals may be missed. If any have not been contacted directly, their subscriptions may be handed to any bank or merchant and it will be looked after. "An anonymous donation of two dollars through the mail is acknowledged by the committee."

## TRAILED IT SIX MILES

Further Particulars of Sinking Ships in St. Lawrence—Was Third Victim

LEVIS, Quebec, May 16 (Canadian Press)—The German submarine that sank two freighters early this week in the St. Lawrence River is said today to have trailed one of its victims for six miles before loosing the fatal torpedo.

There is speculation as to whether or not the undersea raider might have sent a third ship down. The captain of one of the two ships definitely known to have been sunk thought it likely a third vessel had fallen prey to a Nazi u-boat although he admitted he had no official confirmation.

## Whole German South Front Threatened With Being Cut Off By Reds

Timoshenko's Army Sweeping Forward With Enemy's Stubborn Counter-Attacks Being Brushed Back

LONDON, May 16: (CP)—The Red Army's drive on Kharkov was reported today to be crushing stubborn German resistance in one after another of strongly defended communities on the outskirts of the city which is the pivot of Chancellor Adolf Hitler's invasion of southern Russia. Unconfirmed advices reaching London said that Russian shock troops had cracked the inner Kharkov defence line in two points and battled their way into the northwestern suburbs while wide-flanking action seventy miles to the south threatened communications network for the woe of the enemy's southern front. The Germans were putting up a desperate fight, counter-attacking in certain sectors with tanks and air support and benefitting by rain and mud.

Sweeping across the Donez River on fifty-mile front Marshal Timoshenko's Red Army was reported last night to have chused through inner defences of Kharkov in at least two places driving the Germans back before them.

Front line Russian dispatches said the Russians were forcing the Germans into continued retreat after brushing aside counter-attacks.

Red Star, official army paper, said that, despite bad weather, the Russians had deepened penetration of Nazi positions and advanced over roads littered with bodies and smashed equipment.

Stubborn fighting continued of Kerch Peninsula where the German thrust has twice forced the Russians back.

## ORGANIZING OF HEALTH

Dr. Robert J. Macdonald Arrived In Prince Rupert to Open and Direct Local Unit

To open and direct the public health unit which is being established here to take over and coordinate on a more comprehensive and efficient basis the various local health services, Dr. Robert Macdonald is now in the city. He arrived on Thursday night's train from Pouce Coupe in the Peace River district.

The balance of the health unit will be here within the next week or so. It will include two nurses—Miss Ochs from Abbotsford and Miss Graham from Duncan—and a sanitary inspector—Mr. Stonehouse. There will also be a clerk who has yet to be appointed.

As already announced the functions of the public health unit will include infectious and venereal disease control, public health nursing medical inspection of schools and sanitary inspection.

The centre of the public health unit will be the provincial government building on Second Avenue formerly used as the public museum.


Dr. Macdonald has for the past few years been in charge of the public health unit at Pouce Coupe, his successor there being Dr. J. A. Taylor from Abbotsford. The public health centre at Abbotsford is being closed as the need at Prince Rupert and Pouce Coupe is considered greater largely on account of problems arising out of increased population.

varied problems to be settled on a vaster scale than had ever before been known. Long after the war was over as far as the fighting was concerned, it would be necessary to maintain a great international army or police force to prevent civil wars while the nations were reorganizing.

The next peace conference would not be of the old type. There would have to be a series of preliminary conferences on such matters as health, transport and education. Need would have to be given to issues of moral and spiritual nature rather than to economic and military.

Problems of raw materials and colonies Dr. Hambro dismissed as problems of propaganda rather than of fact. But they were problems which would have to be settled before the final peace.

Dr. Hambro foresaw the necessity for mandating for some time under international control such nations as Germany and Italy so that they could be re-educated to a point where it would be once again possible for them to form national and responsible governments.

The next peace conference, Dr. Hambro felt, should be one where practical men and experts predominated rather than diplomats and politicians. The age of secret diplomacy was gone.

Rev. J. H. Myrswang, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, presided over President Hambro's meeting. He introduced the Norwegian president as a man who was loved and trusted in his native land.

Following request from the United States Navy passed on by the Seattle Halibut Fishermen's Union, the Halibut Marketing Board of British Columbia this week agreed to shorten the layover period in Area No. 2 from nine to eight days while the poundage of fish per man per trip is raised from 3,000 to 3,100 pounds in Area No. 2. In Area No. 3 the lay-over period in Area No. 3 the layover period 1942 but the poundage per man per trip and other regulations are unchanged. It had been understood here that the poundage quota for Area No. 3 was being raised from 4,000 to 4,100 but there appears to be no confirmation of this. The general effect of the new arrangement, of course, will be to speed up the rate of fishing and close.

May 9-15 was almost a million pound week for halibut landings at Prince Rupert. Pares for the week actually totalled 980,206 pounds of which 392,700 pounds was from Canadian vessels and 577,500 pounds from American. In spite of the heavy volume of landings prices held at a gratifying level and all boats profited well. The top Canadian price of the week—14.6c and 11c—was received by three boats—Aretic L., 15,000 pounds, Mitkof, 10,000 pounds, and R. W., 12,000 pounds. Low Canadian was 12c and 11c which the Little Partner received for 1,500 pounds. The high price of the week for American fish was 14.9c and 11c which the Lenore and Pierce received for catches of 15,000 and 14,900 pounds respectively. The low American price was 12.3c and 11c which the Aleutian was paid for 25,000 pounds. The total of landings at Prince Rupert up to and including May 15 was 2,253,800 pounds, including 893,300 pounds from Canadian vessels and 1,450,500 pounds from American.

Fishing on the trolling grounds has been rather slow during the week, according to word brought in by the packers. However, weather has been more favorable and an early improvement in the run is looked for.

An announcement by the Department of Transport advises that the Hammer (White Cliff) Island light in Arthur Passager off the mouth of the Skeena River has an arc of visibility from 282 degrees through north and east to 127 degrees.
