# 22 Nazi Divisions Are Surrounded

### POST-WAR PROBLEMS

Maximum Home Rule and Minimum Centralized Authority Advocated by United States Vice-president

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 29 (P) -A world council to settle postwar problems as part of international machinery to keep peace and rehabilitate the world was proposed here last night by Vicepresident Henry A. Wallace. He laid down the guiding principle for international organization after the war as the maximum degree of home rule that can be obtained along with minimized central authority that must come into existence to give necessary protection.

### GIRAUD IS APPROVED

General Eisenhower and British Government Are Well Satisfied

LONDON, Dec. 29 (P) - General Dwight Eisenhower, commander of the Allied forces in North Africa. expressed delight at the selection of General Henri Giraud is French High Commissioner of North Africa and an authoritative quarter says the appointment of Giraud by the French Imperial Council as successor to the assassinated Admiral Jean Darlan with full military and civil powers is entirely satisfactory to the British government.

In a radio broadcast from London, General Charles deGaulle, leader of the Fighting French, paid | + + + + tribute to General Giraud and suggested that he might make a trip 4 to Washington D.C. soon. This trip . Approach would supposedly be in connection with the new French colonial government which deGaulle is understood to be in favor of setting up in Algiers.

Meanwhile in Vichy, Marshal, Henri Phillippe Petain criticized French leaders who had collaborated wth the Allies. The French citizenship of Giraud in Vichy had been cancelled.

### LDITORIAL

### Satisfactory Economic System . . .

The capacity of Canadian industry to produce in almost unlimited quantities has been amply proven during the war; we have in Canada today national resources, technical skill and industrial machinery, all of which have been developed on a large and increasing scale, and there is less excuse than ever for unemployment in Canada, with its consequent poverty and discress, says A. R. Mosher, president of the Canadian Congress of Labor, in | N a message for the New Year. If Canadians, enjoying sucl a fortunate situation, cannot develop an economic system which will provide a high standard of living, the problem must be considered insoluble, but there are growing indications that the people of Canada, and particularly the organized workers, have determined that they will not go back to the conditions which existed prior to the war. and that whatever changes may be necessary in the economic system to provide for the security and well-being of every citizen, will be demanded.

The name which a satisfactory economic system will bear is of no importance; it is the fact alone which will be insisted upon. The war has proven beyond any doubt that financial barriers to industrial development are artificial, and that what is physically possible is financially possible. The same nation which, in the depths of the depression, was forced to maintain hundreds of thousands of people on relief, now finds it necessary to organize its manpower in order to utilize the services of every ablebodied adult, and this is a lesson which surely will not be readily forgotten. When the war ends, there will be a vast market in Canada and in many other countries for the commodities which Canada can produce. In the field of housing alone, there will be room for enormous projects, and there ought to be work available for all who are able and willing to perform it. By a realistic approach to the problem, forgetting ancient economic myths, Canada will be able to produce in peacetime on a scale quite as great as that required in war-time.

But the reconstruction of a world of peace and security must go farther than economic readjustments. Canada must take her place among the nations of the world in laying the bases of an enduring peace through the provision of adequate machinery for mutual protection against injustice and oppression. This will require a clarity of vision, a breadth of view, a confident courage far beyond anything which we have known in the past, both in domestic and foreign policy. But the people of Canada, whose sons are fighting in far-off lands, are learning that the world is a small one, after all, and that it may be made a happy home for the human family.

### Encouraging War News...

The recent news from the battlefronts is so encouraging that we may enter upon the New Year with greater confidence than ever in ultimate victory. While we are properly warned that there may still be a long and bitter struggle before us, with setbacks and disappointments and heavy losses, we are nevertheless justified in feeling that the period of preparation has passed, and that the Allied Nations are now in a position to take the initiative and hold it until the war is won.




