FIFTEEN FEET OF ASHES BURY KODIAK ISLAND

NO RENEWALS FOR THE BOTTLE SHOPS ALL EIGHT HOTELS AGAIN LICENSED

APATHETIC MEETING HELD IN SUPPORT OF THE BY-LAWS

Board of License Commissioners Yesterday Afternoon Met and Dealt With Applications for Renewal of License and One Application for a Fresh Bottle License---Hotels and Wholesalers Re-Licensed---Both Existing Bottle Shops Must Close---New Application Tabled

After the uneventful renewal of all the eight hotel licenses in Prince Rupert at yesterday's meeting of the board of license commissioners, when even the hotel which underwent a suspension of license in the early part of the year was granted renewal without comment, the license board introduced the element of upheaval into the business by passing a motion refusing to grant renewal for either of the two bottle licenses.

Commissioner Kerr's Motion.

This move was not altogether a surprise. At last meeting of the commission Commissioner Kerr had given notice of motion that these licenses be not renewed and the license holders had been notified that their applications for renewal might be refused. Petitions in favor of the continuance of the bottle licenses had been prepared, including one from women only, and a letter was read from Messrs. Carss & Bennett pointing out the advantages of the bottle shops to a certain law abiding section of the community whose members, while using wines and spirits or ales in moderation, did not desire to obtain their supplies from bar rooms and did not require such quantities in several months as would warrant their dealing with the wholesalers. This letter was laid on the table. Later Mr. Carss himself argued in similar terms, adding the argument that for medicinal purposes stimulants can be secured of very much better quality in the sealed packages of the bottle shops.

The Mayor's Stand.

Mayor Newton, whose attitude toward these licenses during last municipal election is well remembered, maintained a stolid stand pat attitude when Commissioner Kerr declared that his motion stood and would now be made formally. Commissioner Cade waited. Presently Commissioner Cade threw out a feeler to the Mayor to see how the cat was going to jump, so to speak.

"It's up to you," returned the Mayor stolidly. "I know what my move is going to be whatever you do. It is for you to make your move now."

"I should like to make the motion a unanimous one," said Commissioner Cade, "and am willing to be guided by the majority of the board in this."

"Will you then second Commissioner Kerr's motion?" asked the chairman.

"If that will make the commission's attitude a unanimous one I am willing. I second the motion," said Commissioner Cade.

"Carried," said the Mayor, and the bottle licenses went by the board. Immediately there was a rapid retreat from the city hall of the spectators to spread the news. During the scuffle of feet the Mayor suggested that in fairness to Mr. George Sutherland, whose application for a bottle license had been in for some time, this application should be laid on the table so as to keep it in order should the board be disposed later toward renewing the bottle license system. This was agreed to.

Two wholesale licenses were renewed yesterday, one to C. F. Partington with transference to the name of the Beaver Liquor Co., and the other to W. S. Marshall for the Northern B. C. Liquor Co.

Mayor and Various Members of the City Council Argue at Length Upon the Merits of the Measures---Club of Increased Taxation Brandished With Terrible Effect Upon an Audience of About Thirty-Five Citizens Including Aldermen at Presbyterian Hall Last Night

In spite of the lavish use of newspaper space in the medium by which the Mayor editorially expresses himself now and then, little interest was taken by the public in the meeting announced last night to be held in the Pres-

byterian Hall to discuss the by-laws which come before the people so soon. A crowd of at most thirty assembled, including members of the city council. Mr. J. W. McKinley was chairman.

Mayor is Eloquent.

Mayor Newton enlarged upon the matter in his usual voluminous style and left no stone, real or imaginary, unturned, no smallest point, patent or obscure, unexplained. All the other members of the council had their say in favor of these bylaws, and every possible point was thrashed out. On minor issues regarding the Carnegie library scheme and the suggested sale of fee simple land to develop the recreation park speakers differed little in the main, though they strenuously upheld the bylaws. But the burden of their song was ever, "Pass the bylaws or pay for your folly through increased taxation." It was even threatened that taxation of improvements would be resorted to by this council unless the bylaws are passed. That is the club. The bait is less apparent, but the council realizes that the money must be raised as the expenditures are already incurred. The system of spending first and then seeking the necessary legal sanction of the citizens to provide payment for the piper has been followed.

Suggested Resignation.

The Mayor mentioned that a section of the citizens seemed anxious that he should resign office with his council. He did not believe any majority of his supporters in January wanted

him today to resign. If he thought so he would resign all right, but as it is he expects to second of his official term. Here and there either an alderman or an ordinary citizen feebly applauded, but somehow the glory seemed to have departed from the Newton who once evoked the thunderous applause of theatre and auditorium. The bylaws may pass, but it will not be because the eloquence of those responsible for them has awakened any more public interest in them than has existed from the first.

Loyal Order of Moose.

Messrs. Kibride and Keyes, organizers of the Loyal Order of Moose, report that their efforts to organize a lodge of the order in this city has met with most flattering success. The charter for the lodge has already been sent for and on receipt of same the lodge will be instituted. It is expected that this will take in the neighborhood of two weeks. Over 100 members have already been secured, and it is expected the number will reach the 200 mark before the charter is closed.

PEERAGE PROBABLE FOR HEAD OF BRITISH HOUSE

Mr. Asquith's Withdrawal from the Commons Chamber at Westminster to Take His Place in the House of Lords Accepted as Practical Certainty---Winston Churchill Probably Next Liberal Premier

London, June 11.—The early withdrawal of Premier Asquith to the House of Lords is now accepted as an absolutely assured certainty, and it is not at all unlikely that he will at the same time relinquish the leadership of the government and the Liberal party.

Mr. Asquith smiles at the recurring rumors, but they are known to have good foundation. He has carried such a tremendous load during the strenuous years which have marked his successful direction of the Liberals that it is a wonder his health has at all survived the strain. His physicians have frequently advised him to seek a temporary rest so that he might give his splendid vitality a fair chance and extend his political life for the good of the country.

Mr. Asquith has proved a Moses to the Liberals during a time of upheaval, which called for unusual powers of suasion and action. Neither the great Gladstone, nor the witty but otherwise mediocre, Campbell-Bannerman could have solidified the mixed coalition elements as Mr. Asquith has managed to do. Therefore if the Liberal-Labor-Irish alliance is to continue after Mr. Asquith rests on his laurels, his successor will require a great deal of tact and not a little personal magnetism. The

man who seems most likely to fill the bill is Winston Churchill. Mr. Churchill is even now the master spirit in the cabinet. He has not failed to carry every point upon which he has set his heart. And he soothes, reconciles and satisfies everybody. Even Mr. Lloyd-George, who at one time showed a disposition to do with

the Liberals what Joseph Chamberlain tried and failed utterly to do when he was the most radical of radicals, now accepts with the utmost good nature at his command, the Churchill dominance. The substantial money powers in the Liberal party would not accept the chancellor of the exchequer as leader.

CHEAP FARES FOR FIRST JULY

G. T. P. Announces to Dominion Day Committee Their Schedule Concessions for the Big Day---Other Notes of Committee Additions.

It has been announced to the Dominion Day committee that the G. T. P. will concede the favor of fare and a third returns from various points reaching Rupert by rail, these fares being in force incoming from the 28th of June to the 1st of July, and outgoing up to the 4th of July.

The publicity committee will have their posters ready soon with full details of the contests, etc. Judges have been appointed as follows: F. Mobley, William Manson, S. M. Newton and G. R. Naden. Starters will be Rev. W. H. McLeod, B. H. Clark and S. P. McMorde for the land sports. As clerks of the course will act W. H. Vickers and George Kerr. To the Sports committee have been added J. J. Sloan, R. W. Cameron and Cyril Orme.

ENGLAND AWAKE TO RUPERT'S FISH TRADE

Greatest Interest Shown at Grimsby in Sir George Doughty's Development of the Fine Fisheries of Our Coasts

Prince Rupert is gradually growing greater on the horizon of the world's commerce as a fishing centre. The following from the report of Mr. J. M. Mussen, Dominion Government Trade Commissioner, in Leeds, England, shows how Prince Rupert prospects are impressing English fishing centres.

Great Industry Assured

The greatest interest is being shown at Grimsby in the efforts undertaken to develop the fisheries between Vancouver and Prince Rupert, and as many influential members of the trawling industry at Grimsby are taking active parts in the organization of schemes for firmly establishing modern trawling methods in that part of Canada, the opinion is generally held that the industry will assume great proportions in the course of a few years.

Some time ago, experienced trawler skippers were sent out to report upon the state of the fishing grounds, both adjacent

to and distant from the British Columbian coast, and according to the reports received from these practical fishermen, everything is highly satisfactory for successful trawling and lining. Since that time the necessary arrangements for opening out in a big way have been quietly maturing, and now that the first order for British trawlers have been placed, the building of a large fleet for British Columbian interests is expected to proceed without further delay.

Fishing Vessels for Rupert

An order has been placed with English builders by a prominent steam trawler owner at Grimsby acting on behalf of a company in British Columbia, for the immediate construction of three large, powerful steam trawlers, which are to be delivered at Grimsby by the end of September in order to receive their equipment of gear and be ready to sail early in October for Vancouver. From this point they will immediately commence trawling op-

erations with a view to inaugurating an industry on similar lines to that now carried on at Grimsby. Curing houses will be established and it is also intended to erect fish oil and manure factories on the British Columbian coast.

Market for Cod

This, further, from the report of Commissioner Ray, in Birmingham, England, is of interest in the light of Prince Rupert district fishery trade:

"Inquiries in this centre reveal an opening for cod roes, a by-product that apparently has received very little, if any attention, by the fish packers of Canada. From authoritative sources it has been ascertained that large quantities of these salted cod roes are consumed in the United Kingdom. Newfoundland finds it profitable to export approximately \$10,000 worth annually, so that the subject is worthy of consideration by Canada."

LATEST FROM KATMIA DISTRICT.

(Special to Daily News.)

Seattle, June 13.—A wireless report received from the cutter Manning states that there has been no loss of life on Kodiak Island from the eruptions, but still nothing is known as yet of the fate of those residing on the shores or the mainland, only a short distance from Katmia. People at Kodiak are returning to their homes as it is considered that the danger is past. Practically all the houses in the village have been destroyed, and in some places it is said the ashes are from fifteen to twenty feet deep. All animal life on the island is believed to have been destroyed.

Letters to the Editor

AN IMPORTANT CRITICISM OF THE BYLAWS.

Editor Daily News:

Dear Sir—The importance of the question the rate-payers will be asked to pass upon next Friday leads me to call attention to some very incorrect statements that have been made by the Empire in dealing with the matter. The statement made "that if the bylaws are defeated the people will be taxed the \$121,000, which will nearly double the ordinary rate," implies a belief that power is in the hands of the Council to levy a tax of more than \$242,000 in this year.

The Empire well knows that they cannot collect this amount. Using their full powers they cannot get more than \$160,000 from all kinds of property except G. T. P. for ordinary expenditure. They will stay within the fifteen mill limit except for hospital and schools and they cannot use moneys collected for the latter purposes for any other. The bylaw authorizing the borrowing of \$35,000 for the city hall when reduced to a simple statement of the facts shows that we are asked to use the credit of the city to obtain the \$20,000 spent or to be spent on the city hall in the present year and which we must obtain by borrowing in this way or by the levying of rates this year.

This in itself would have been a proper matter for the consideration of the ratepayers of any city, but we find included in the amount we are asked to borrow a sum of \$15,000 which this council has no use for as far as the city hall is concerned. This money was provided for by last year's council, the money collected and paid out and the only use this council can make of the money if you vote it to them is to use it as a larger fund in their hands to spend as they will; or else the money obtained on the city's credit in this way may be used to lessen the rates for the year 1912. This kind of business may be cute, but it is hardly wise.

The using of this flimsy pretext to break into the city's credit in order to be able to lower the rates for ordinary expenditures for the present year perhaps one and one-half mills will not add to our credit with the world. Any city that I know of even in hard times will try and finance its ordinary expenses within the current year, and if this city in these times of rapidly advancing values and general prosperity resorts to such methods it will appear that we have not the confidence in our values that we would wish to inspire in others, and that our only care is to make the most of today with no care for tomorrow. The cultivation of this idea of handling our affairs along the lines of evading in every manner possible the putting of our own money into the work of developing our city may result in the world's using our own measure of our values and refusing to put its money either into the work of individual development or into our city securities.

There is no cause for alarm that we may ever be unable to find use for all the credit the city may possess. We have a very pressing need for water and sewers. The present council find that they are unable to finance all they would like to undertake along those lines. We will need every dollar we can borrow in the next few years even if we pay this year for our city hall and our light and telephone extensions. The present council can manage very well with the resources they have in their hands. A little pressing need for care and economy is often useful to the individual and may not hurt a city council.

The knowledge in the world that we are ready to put some of our own money into the development of the city will help our credit and that will be a very useful asset in good shape in the near future. Last, but not least, it may be well to discourage without further delay any disposition on the part of city councils to throw to the winds the cherished safeguard of the people which the law provides and teach them that it will be well for them in the future to stay within their legal powers and refer such matters to the people before they are undertaken. **FREED FROM MURDER CHARGE
 MRS. J. QUINN FAINTS AWAY**

JURY FINDS WOMAN NOT GUILTY OF DEATH OF THREE HUSBANDS WHOSE BODIES WERE ALL FOUND UNDER STRANGE CIRCUMSTANCES—RETURNS TO HER DYING DAUGHTER.

Chicago, June 11—As soon as she recovered from a fainting spell which overcame her when the verdict of not guilty was read, Mrs. Jane Taylor Quinn, acquitted of the murder of her husband, John Quinn, this evening personally thanked each of the jurors who had given her life and liberty.

"I want to thank you as much on behalf of my daughter, who is dying, as on my own behalf," she said several times, and tears poured down her cheeks. "Your judgment has enabled me to go and see her and it will help her to die happily."

The daughter, Mrs. Catherine Huber, who is dying in Omaha, was not mentioned while the woman was facing the charge of murder. At times during the trial, when Mrs. Quinn bent her head and sobbed, persons in the courtroom thought it was because the state was piling up

irrefutable circumstantial evidence that would mean her death or imprisonment for life.

"The verdict proved that Mr. Quinn was killed as I said—by a robber who had entered the house and shot him," said she. "I would never have been charged with the crime had it not been

that I was once before unjustly suspected. The first charge grew out of the enmity of the relatives of Warren Thorpe. He committed suicide, as was proved at the trial. The second indictment was against me only because of this former unjust suspicion."

Her first husband, John Macdonald, died in London, Ontario, in 1901, under mysterious circumstances; her second spouse, Warren Thorpe, was found dead in bed on the morning of June 13, 1903, a bullet wound indicating murder. At that time Mrs. Quinn was charged with the murder, but was acquitted.

John Quinn, the third husband was shot to death as he lay in bed on the night of November 4, 1911. There were powder burns on his night shirt. The revolver from which the shot was fired was found later in the Quinn bathroom, wrapped in a towel which was identified as one which Mrs. Quinn had been seen to carry into that room.

DESCEND INTO CRATER

Scientists Lowered Into Crater of Kilauea

New York, June 11—Prof. Shephard and Day, two geological experts whom the Carnegie foundation sent to the Hawaii a few months ago, completed an unusual and somewhat hazardous experiment at the volcano of Kilauea last Tuesday, according to advices just received here. The two scientists were lowered by ropes into the crater of Kilauea which is the largest active volcano in the world, and for several hours remained suspended over the bed of boiling lava, making a study of the gases discharged and gathering specimens of molten stone for analysis.

It is the first time in history that scientists have gone into the "lake of fire," as the pit is called, although a party climbed to the top of the outer pit in 1909. Mount Kilauea is 6000 ft. above the sea, and the oval crater is nine miles in circumference. The last time it was dangerously active was in August, 1910. The experiments are expected to result in important findings in support of certain theories of volcanic activity.

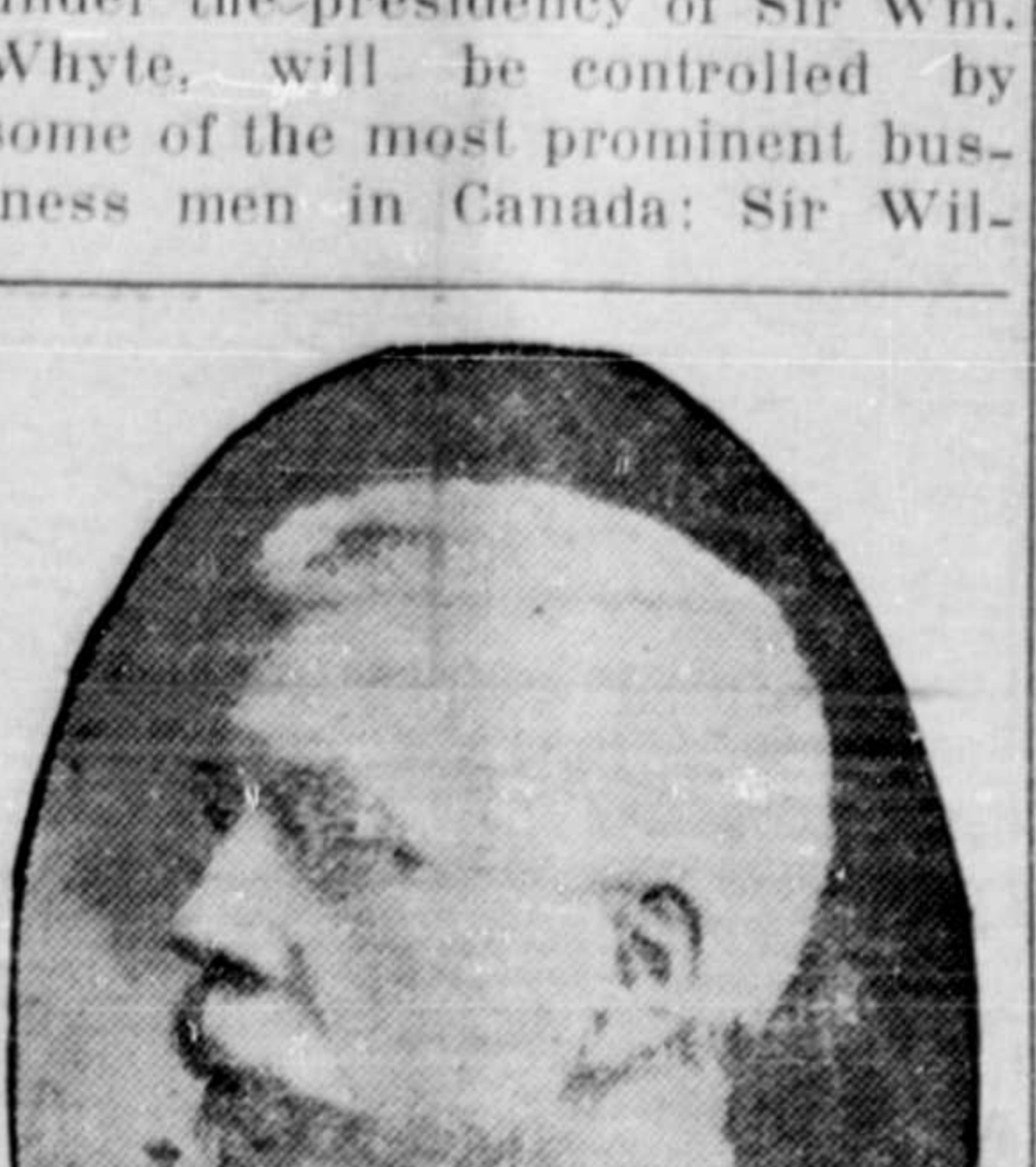

NEW LAUNCHING DEVICE SHOWN

Sir Bryan Leighton Has Produced Contrivance for Lowering Life Boats from Steamships by a Water Chute System.

Sir Bryan Leighton has invented a new device for launching life boats, and a model of the contrivance has recently been shown at the Hotel Cecil, London. The idea is to launch life boats from both sides of the ship by an apparatus on the water chute system. The end of the chute or launching way rests on a pontoon, which in the case of a ship of the dimensions of the Olympic would be 40 feet long, 8 feet deep and 10 feet wide. A ship of the size of the Olympic would carry two of these launching ways, one on either side. They are attached to the side of the ship by means of a swivel, and lowered by a crane which swings them free of the ship into the water. The passengers enter the boats on the deck. The boats are run along a set of rails to a turning table immediately at the top of the chute, and are lowered down to the water level by means of a wire hawser. Toward the end of the chute is a knuckle, which causes the bow of the life boat to have a tendency to shoot upward on touching the water. The launching way can be placed at an angle, according to the state of the sea. It is assumed that an experienced seaman is placed in each boat, and directly he gets within a couple of boat lengths of the water he manipulates the releasing apparatus, the boat then shoots into the sea and the rope is pulled up for another boat.

A Board of Trade expert spent an hour in examining the device and did not offer any serious objection to it. The inventor claims that it is a simple and inexpensive contrivance, and it is understood that it will be brought before the notice of the leading shipping lines.

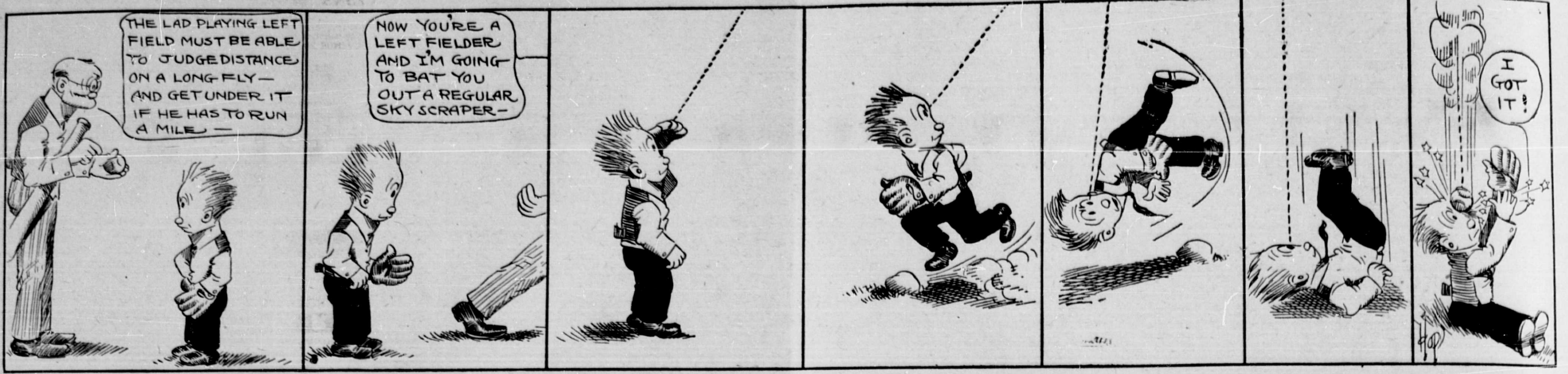

GOD SAVE THE KING

KING GEORGE'S SECOND SON PROPOSED PRINCE OF IRELAND

PRINCE BY WHICH WALES' THIRD PLUMED PRINCE WAS CREATED FROM THE ROYAL FIRST BORN MAY BE APPLIED TO EMERALD ISLE WHEN HOME RULE BECOMES FACT.

Dublin, June 12.—Dublin hopes soon to welcome the young Prince of Wales. It is expected that his younger brother will come with him. Thereby hangs a tale which is tearing Irish society into shreds. It is understood that King George is discussing with some members of the cabinet the question whether it would not be well to revive interest in the dynasty by creating a Prince of Ireland, the title to be borne by the second son of each succeeding monarch, and to be held by such son after a change in reign until the next in line attains a certain age.

Standard of Real Royalty.

The idea is to signalize the passing of the Home Rule bill and the giving of the royal assent by some act which shall show the personal interest of the sovereign in his Irish subjects and bring the court at Cork Hill up to the standard of real royalty. The Welsh got their own special prince as a sop to Cerberus for the extinction of Owen Glendower. It was England's principal pledge of peace between the hill Celts of Wales and the border warriors. It proved a

most excellent bargain, and no title in the roll of British nobility blazons with more brilliant association than those of "Ich Dien" (I serve), the motto plucked by the warlike Edward with the three plumes from his Poitiers' captive, John, the bling King of Belgium.

Would Not Please All.

If the idea is carried out, it is hardly likely to please everybody. The vice regal dignity would, of course, be in some degree lessened and to that extent removed from the ambitions of many noble peers and peeresses. And it would be a loss hard to bear now that the new Dublin is attracting so many high hopes and when the Irish lord lieutenant and his lady will be people of the most potential importance, if the offices are not abolished.

So society, among the "eligibles," is hostile to the proposition, while the lesser nobility and commoners are delighted with it. Both sides have to be considered of course, yet if the King decides that that would be a politic move and likely to receive popular support, the intrigue is not calculated to move him from his purpose.

RAILWAY KING ON CAMPAIGN

Jim Hill Very Busy Lining Up Traffic of Western Canada for Time When Panama Canal Arrives.

Winnipeg, June 12.—An evening paper has published what it claims is reliable information on the plans of James J. Hill for capturing a big share of the transportation of the Canadian prairie west. "He calculates," it says, "to gain possession of the carrier traffic eastward to Hudson's Bay and the Great Lakes, and westward to the Pacific coast for routing Canadian grain through the Panama Canal. His survey gangs are working in every province of the west, and his charters are already secured. His associates at Fort William have purchased a large section of waterfront and he is laying his plans to get there from the heart of the prairie. In British Columbia he is building westward under the name of the Victoria, Vancouver & Eastern, and has almost pierced the Rockies, whence charters he holds will carry him through the great wheat plateau into Winnipeg. Other charters furnish him avenue into the Peace River country, the very last west and a direct route to Fort Churchill on Hudson's Bay."
