Today's War Summary

Battleships Escape

The German battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau and the cruiser Prinz Eugen, bottled up for months at Brest, escaped yesterday and sailed for the Straits of Dover, where they were heavily escorted by the British. At least one of the battleships was bombed. The British suffered destroyer loss.

Singapore Still Holding

Singapore defences are still holding out against tremendous odds. The Japanese are still fighting fiercely to further establish themselves across the Salween River in Burma. There is a lull in fighting in the Dutch East Indies and the Philippines.

Further Russian Successes

Further successes are claimed by the Russian newspaper Izvestia in the Petrograd and Crimea areas against stiffening Nazi resistance.

Japanese Suffered Heavily

Washington reveals the smashing success of the United States naval thrust at the Marshall and Gilbert Islands on January 31. The Japanese lost five warships, including a 17,000-ton aircraft carrier, eleven auxiliary vessels, thirty-eight planes and important shore installations were shattered.

SINGAPORE HOLDS ON BITTERLY

Japanese Onslaught Is Murderous—Situation Like Dunkerque—Battle of Burma Next.

LONDON, Feb. 13.—Singapore is still holding out today in the face of what appears to be hopeless odds against the British garrison following rejection by General A. E. Percival of a Japanese demand for unconditional surrender. The enemy is drawing its lines closer around the city. The defenders are counter-attacking desperately, holding a line from the self-destroyed naval base on the north to a village on the south of the island. The Japanese claimed today to be in control of the urban area of the city and of the main fortifications.

The enemy are acknowledged to have complete mastery of the air and London admitted that the fall of the fortress could only be a matter of days at the most. Relay after relay of Japanese planes plunged low to dive bomb and machine gun the defenders, assisting tanks, artillery and ground forces in the murderous assault. The situation is such as to resemble another Dunkerque. Yates McDaniels, Associated Press correspondent, sent his last dispatch before leaving Singapore. He was observing the fierce battle from a hill and wrote dramatically of the valor of the defenders.

Battle of Burma—Meanwhile, a full-scale battle in Burma appears to have begun with Rangoon, the capital and terminal of the Burma Road, China's life-line, as the immediate goal. No attempt is made to belittle the loss of Martaban, 80 miles from Rangoon in a direct line and 140 miles by railway. At two points the enemy was turned back in further attempts to cross the Salween River. Chinese troops are now in action in the endeavour to stem the Japanese drive.

With the conquest of the rich island of Java undoubtedly an early item on the Japanese program and the enemy drive in that direction already under way, the Dutch are getting ready for a last ditch stand. There has been a lull in fighting on the Philippines, giving General Douglas MacArthur a chance to brace his American and Filipino forces on Batan Peninsula against new attacks in force which are undoubtedly coming. Union Jack Still Waves

GREAT NAVAL BATTLE IN STRAITS OF DOVER; HUGE ENEMY WARSHIPS ESCAPE

Scharnhorst and Gneisenau as Well as Prinz Eugen Make Gateway From Brest to Heligoland—Many Aircraft Lost in Terrific Duel.

LONDON, Feb. 13: (CP)—The German battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau and the cruiser Prinz Eugen were heavily bombed in Dover Straits Thursday, it was officially announced today. This occurred while the two powerful battleships and the heavy cruiser, the bulk of Germany's remaining heavy warships, were making a sensational escape from a one-year-old dry dock internment at Brest. After the engagement, one of the most spectacular battles of the war, the great vessels, hidden by mist during a rain and sleet-storm, fled up the English Channel.

Everything from minesweepers to great coastal guns took part in the engagement which began on Thursday when the 26,000-ton Gneisenau and Scharnhorst and the 10,000-ton cruiser Prinz Eugen slipped from Brest and were met by British naval vessels and aircraft. Royal Air Force planes, destroyers and motor torpedo boats attacked the enemy ships which were accompanied by destroyers, E-boats and heavy fighter aircraft escort. On account of poor visibility the final result of the terrific duel and the extent of damage done was not immediately ascertained, but official communiques expressed the belief that all three main targets had been hit along with one destroyer. At least eighteen Nazi aircraft fighters were known to have been destroyed by being shot down. The Royal Air Force lost forty-two planes—twenty bombers, sixteen fighters and six other planes.

The enemy ships were heading west towards the Straits of Dover when discovered by the Royal Air Force. By the time they were first engaged they had, apparently, negotiated nearly half of the seven hundred miles from Brest to Heligoland.

The composition of the parade will be a detachment of provincial police, mechanized units, military, standard bearers, sea cadets, air raid protection workers, women's service corps, fire department and ambulance auxiliaries. The program at the inauguration service will include a brief address by Bishop Rix, singing by a massed choir under direction of J. S. Wilson, selections by the Canadian Scottish pipe band, singing of well known hymns and national anthems, with sea cadets as guards of the flags, standard bearers will carry the British, United States, Norwegian and Chinese flags.

FINED FOR HOARDING

People Who Bought 100 and 50 Pounds of Sugar Fined in Toronto.

TORONTO, Feb. 13.—Four Toronto persons, two women and two men, were fined \$5 with option of five days' imprisonment yesterday for receiving deliveries of sugar in excess of the new rationing regulations. Three of the accused received 100 pounds of sugar and one 50 pounds. They were charged with hoarding.

Japanese Invaders Drawing Closer To Singapore's Centre

Emergency Session of Australian Parliament Is Being Called—Netherlands Will Fight to Finish—More Activity in Burma.

The Union Jack waved over Singapore city today but Japanese shock forces, alternating between inching crawls and suicidal rushes, had reached suburban Tanglin, little more than two miles from the heart of the city. That was the position on the southern part of a 14-mile battle line, while on the central front the Japanese appeared to have seized most of the water supplies. A 10:30 p.m. (8:30 a.m. Pacific Daylight Time) Singapore newscast referred, however, to the situation as being unchanged and earlier in the day Hon. Francis Forde, army minister of Australia, received a message from Lieut. Gen. A. E. Percival, British commanding officer at Singapore, saying that the defenders were still putting up "stout resistance against great odds." Even the Tokyo radio spoke of the firm resistance at Singapore but it was apparent the net was drawing steadily tighter.

In Australia Prime Minister John Curtin summoned parliament to meet a week from today "because of continued deterioration of the Pacific situation." In the Indies the Netherlands East Indies command reported slackening of the Japanese drive aimed at Java while Batavia dispatches said the Netherlands would never abandon the islands without a fight even if the British decided to pull out to Australia. Reports from Rangoon said that heavy fighting had broken out again in the Paan area, thirty miles from the mouth of the Salween River, where the Japanese are attempting to force a subsidiary landing in their drive towards Rangoon. Masbate Island, one of the archipelago lying between Luzon and Mindanao, the principal islands of the Philippines, has been seized by the Japanese.

WATER HOLE TRIED OUT

Section Two A. R. P. Fire Wardens Have Work-out

Last evening the fire wardens with H. R. Hill, chief warden, in charge of Westview ascertained to what extent a water hole would last with one of the Ontario gas-line pumps. At 8 p.m. the wardens took pump and equipment to a dam at a natural drain at the end of Water Street. It was satisfactory inasmuch as they got an idea of the amount of water these pumps throw. When the pump started the general idea was that the amount of water in the hole would last for hours—but in 30 minutes the water was down four inches and in forty minutes down another three inches. To have pumped as low as suction pipe would take it would possibly have lasted one and one-quarter hours. There are not any buildings that the pumps would not throw water over in Prince Rupert.

TO PROBE HONG KONG

Chief Justice Lyman Duff Asked to Conduct Inquiry for Government.

OTTAWA, Feb. 13: (CP)—Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King has requested Chief Justice Lyman P. Duff to act as a royal commissioner to conduct an inquiry into circumstances surrounding the departure of Canadian troops for Hong Kong.

What We Can Do . . .

Our position in the Far East is increasingly serious. The enemy is still gaining. Where he will be stopped, as stopped he will be, is a matter of speculation. Combat may spread much farther afield before it ends.

We should not give up hope even if danger should be imminent. What we must do is steel our courage and, not fearfully but realistically, face the future and consider very carefully what may come our way.

Here in Prince Rupert there are two things which we can do and do at once. They are two things which are very easy to do and not unpleasant.

One thing we can do is to invest in Victory Bonds—providing our government with the wherewithal to finance the sinews of the war and helping to insure our own security.

Another thing we can do is to assist in some way in bolstering our own local defences such as finding a place in the A.R.P. organization.

Some of us, of course, may participate even more actively in the war effort.

One or the other or both of the two things we mention here can be done practically by all of us and we suggest that they are sensible things, in view of the situation, for us to do.

Agnes Joins Peace Movement . . .

Perhaps no stranger phenomenon has appeared as a consequence of the movement for total war than the sight of Miss Agnes Macphail among its supporters. It is true that she still admits some mental reservations.

As the movement for total war gains more adherents from those who held Miss Macphail's pre-war opinions, they will come to realize that they are not in uncongenial company. Our cause is still directed by a love of peace, but the method of pacifism has been proved ineffective.

Japan's Air Force . . .

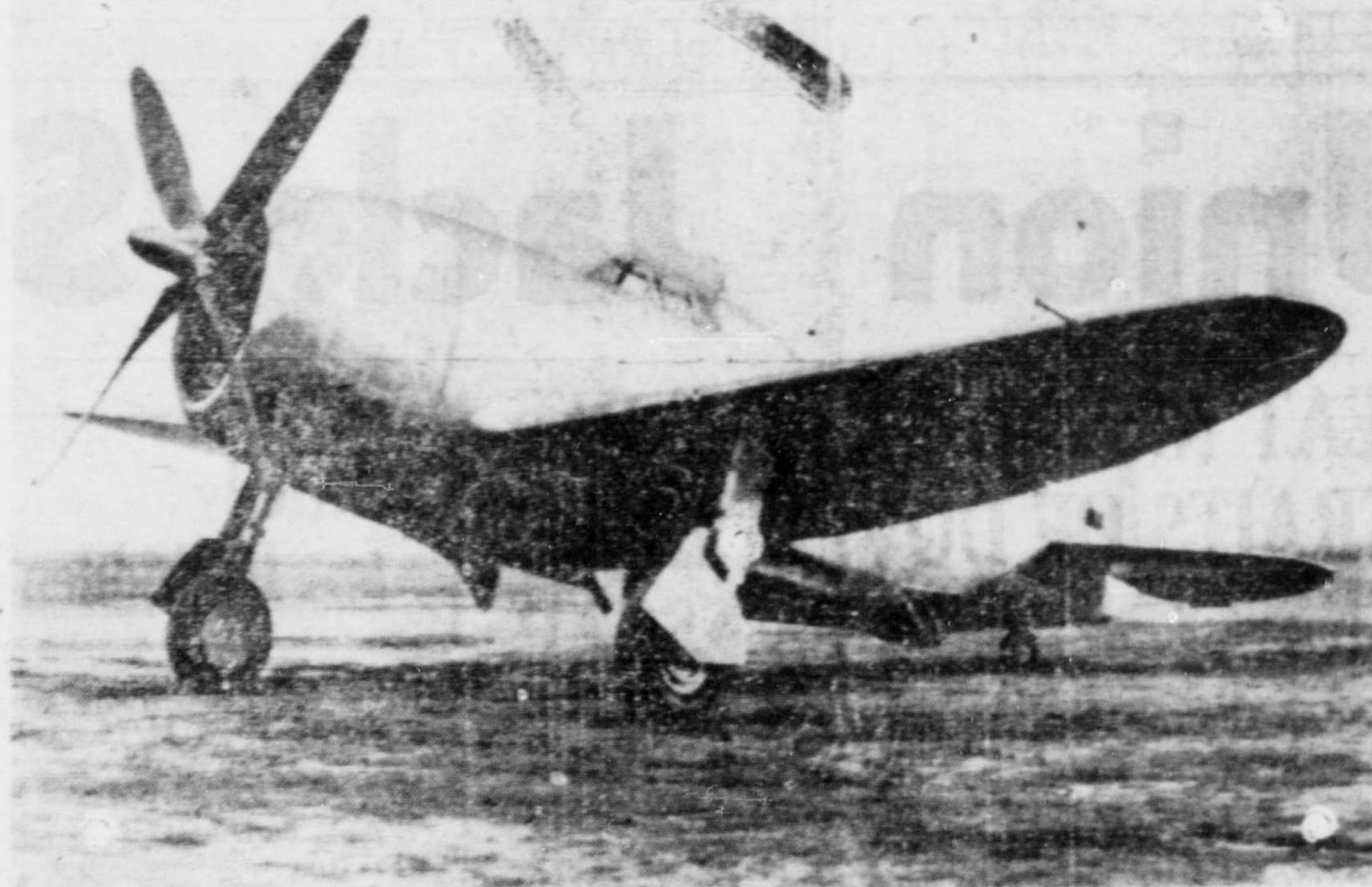
According to one authority Japan has today approximately three thousand planes with 33,000 trained men. There are supposed to be twenty coastal units attached to the navy. The force also includes a reserve of 850 second line machines, but this second line possibly numbers one thousand of all types.

Effect on Churchill . . .

How will the present situation in the Far East affect Churchill? Some think he, as the responsible party, will have to go but who is to take his place? There was quite a storm of criticism of his policies just about the time he arrived home from Washington and it seems quite likely that these may be revived.

Baxter tells something of the situation in an article in Maclean's, and then adds: "Churchill has given us inspired leadership and has shown extraordinary sanity in the face of ill-informed clamor and Sunday journalists who know all the secrets and all the answers. Every man in public life must be a critic of the administration in power but that is different from joining in the mad cacophony of sound that breaks out when all the dogs in the neighborhood start barking because they hear others doing it."

IS FRIDAY THIRTEENTH

It's Coming Again March 13 and November 13, First Triple Appearance in 11 Years

Yes, today is Friday the 13th. And that's not all. The old bogey turns up again four weeks from tomorrow—March 13—and makes another appearance this year on November 13.

Now there's one thing you can't pin on Hitler or the war. It's the calendar. And you have to go back 11 years to 1931 to get another twelve-month when Friday the 13th bobbed up three times, likewise in February, March and November. Once we are safely through 1942, however, it will be another eleven years before he makes a triple appearance again.

But don't worry, it has never been proven that anything unfortunate really happened to anybody simply because Friday was dated up with the 13th. And there's no more significance to the combination now than there was centuries ago when some humorist of the period announced the Gregorian calendar would present this combination ten times every five years till the end of time—or the calendar.

Talk of More Incidentally, modern calendar reformers promote a "proposed

world calendar" that would give us Friday the 13th every January, April, July and October. Four times every year—oh my!

There are various origins of the superstition about a double dose of ill-luck from the goddess of trouble for Friday the 13th. The astrologers of Babylon declared 13 an unlucky number. Mythologists of old Scandinavia gave it the curse of sages because Balder, their sun-god, had to die when 13 were found in the circle of Valhalla.

Some say the superstition came with the Christian era—there were 13 at the Last Supper, including Judas Iscariot, who next day, traditionally a Friday, betrayed Jesus Christ for crucifixion.

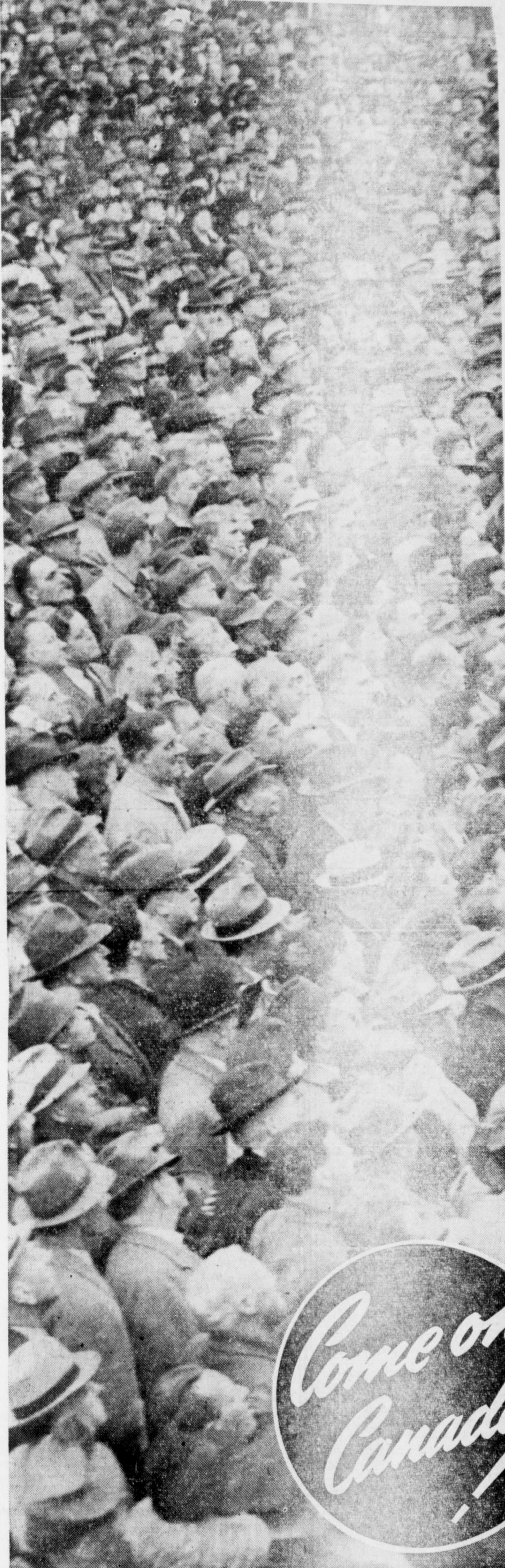

Timely Recipes

VEGETABLE CASSEROLE

1/4 cup butter, 1 cup onion, chopped, 2 cups celery, 2 cups carrots, 1 1/2 cups string beans, 1/2 medium green pepper, chopped, 1 can tomato soup, 1 cup water, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 3 cups mashed potatoes, 4 to 5 frankfurters, split.

Cut celery, carrots, into strips about 1 inch long and 1/4 inch wide. Split string beans and cut into one inch lengths. Melt butter in heavy saucepan and add onions, celery, carrots and string beans; cover pan tightly and allow to simmer slowly for 20 minutes. The vegetables should cook in their own steam, but not brown. Add pepper, tomato soup, water and seasonings, cover pan tightly and allow to simmer for 45 minutes in a very slow oven or on a part of the range where it will not boil. Pour vegetables into a baking dish cover with seasoned mashed potatoes and then arrange split frankfurters on top. Brush with melted butter and cook in hot oven 450 degrees F. for 15 minutes or until frankfurters are cooked and brown. Serves 6.

Tommy Burns, Canadian-born former world heavyweight champion and one-time cabaret operator in Prince Rupert, believes thoroughly in the power of thought and Joe Louis' fists.

Tommy Burns, born Noah Brusso at Hanover, Ont., June 17, 1881, won a 20-round decision from Marvin Hart in San Francisco, Feb. 23, 1906, and held the title till Christmas Day, 1908.

But this fellow with hardly a wrinkle in his smooth face and hardly a trace of gray in his sparsely thatched pate is the Tommy Burns who holds the record for a quick knockout in a championship fight.

Ask Tommy whence spouts the elixir of youth he apparently has discovered, and he'll answer: "It's all in thinking. What one thinks—that is what one is."

Seven years ago, Burns relates, he was taken with arthritis and various complications—"simply because I had forgotten how to live and wasn't taking care of myself."

Tommy outlines his fight career something like this: He got \$1.25 for his first fight at the Detroit Athletic Club, back around 1903—and was declared a professional.

In a title defence at Dublin against Jem Roche, the Irish champion, Tommy knocked him out in 88 seconds of the first round, which makes the Joe Louis kayo of Max Schmeling in 2.04 look like a marathon in comparison.

Burns was 40 years old when he both promoted and fought his last battle in London's famed Al-

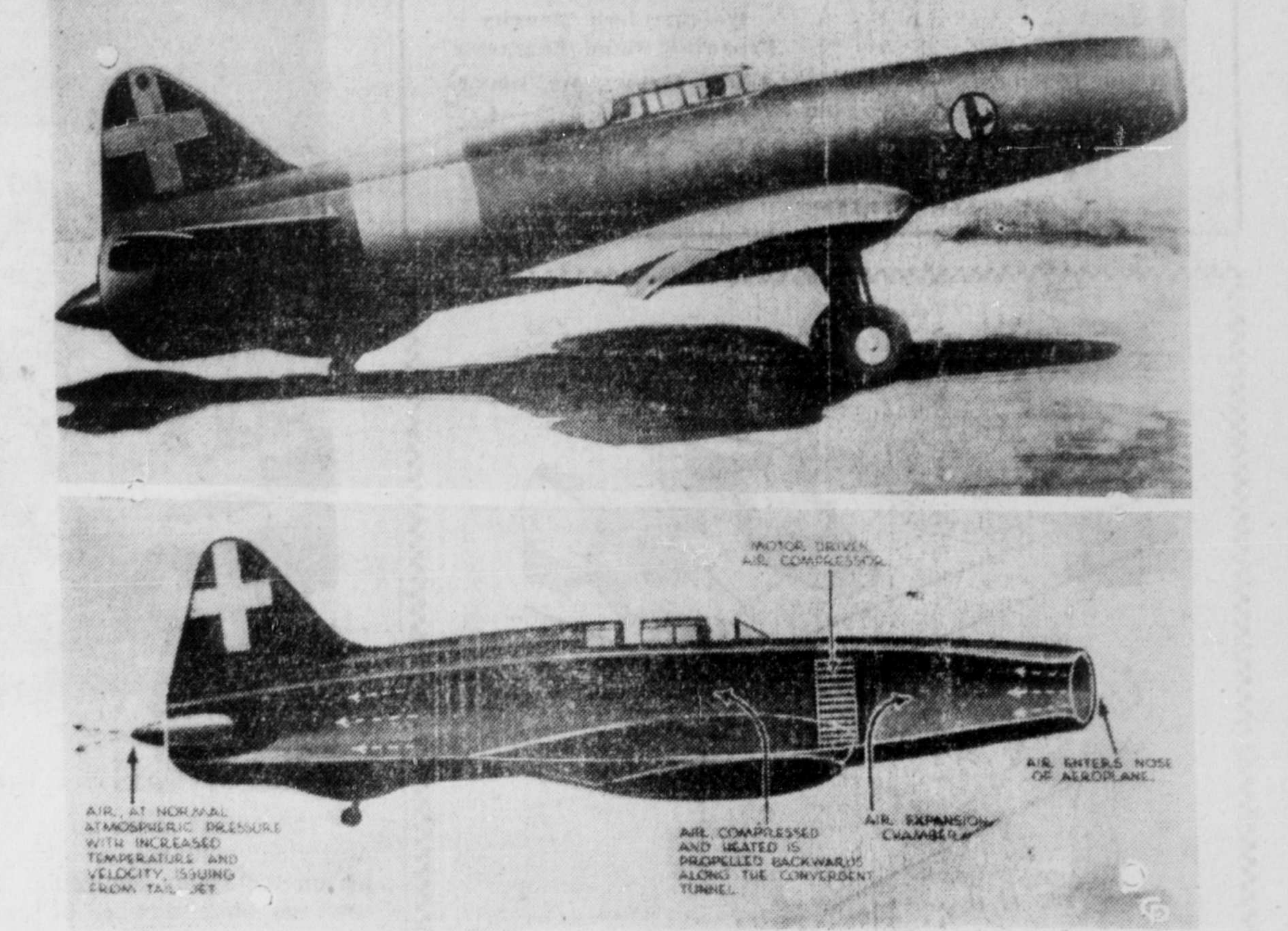

NATIVES TO DIG CLAMS

Masset Beaches Opened to Indians and Will Mean Substantial Industry on Islands.

Natives of Massett will start digging clams again this spring on beaches around their village which have been held by the Nootka Packing Co., the clams to be canned by Queen Charlotte Cannery (S. L. Simpson) at the crab and clam cannery at Old Massett. Negotiations for the opening up of the beaches were successfully carried out at Vancouver on behalf of the Massett people recently by Indian Agent James Gillett. The clams will be dug co-operatively by the natives and Mr. Simpson will direct the processing in his cannery. The industry will start about April 1 and continue until June.

The clam digging and canning industry means a substantial amount of employment for the Massett natives. During the last previous season of operation, ten thousand cases were put up and this meant \$30,000 in employment alone for the natives. Once in the last ten years have the Massett beaches been dug. A couple of years ago Mr. Simpson moved his crab and clam cannery from Naden Harbor to Old Massett.
