According to one authority Japan has today approximately three thousand planes with 33,000 trained men. There are supposed to be twenty coastal units attached to the navy. The force also includes a reserve of 850 second line machines, but this second line possibly numbers one thousand of all types. These estimates may be all wrong but their effectiveness depends altogether on the number of first-class machines arrayed against them. The trouble at Singapore is blamed largely on the disparity of British and American as against Japanese planes.

#### Effect on Churchill . . .

How will the present situation in the Far East affect Churchill? Some think he, as the responsible party, will have to go but who is to take his place? There was quite a storm of criticism of his policies just about the time he arrived home from Washington and it seems quite likely that these may be revived.







1/4 cup butter, 1 cup onion, chopped, 2 cups celery, 2 cups carrots, 111/2 cups string beans, 1/2 medium green pepper, chopped, 1 can tomato soup, 1 cup water, 1 teaspoon FOR SALE-'30 Chev sports coupe, salt, 14 teaspoon pepper, 3 cups mashed potatoes, 4 to 5 frankfurters, split.

Tommy Burns, born Noah Brusso at Hanover, Ont., June 17, 1881 won a 20-round decision from Marvin Hart in San Francisco Feb. 23, 1906, and held the title till Christmas Day, 1908, when Jack Johnson in Sydney, N.S.W. whipped Burns so terrifically that police jumped in and stopped the fight in the 14th round. One would never guess that the 34 portly, bespectacled, soft-spoken, smiling 220-pounder behind the beer taps was 60 years old last June 17. And one would never 86 guess that at five feet 61/2 inches 210 and 170 pounds he was one of the lightest men ever to hold the heavyweight crown.

But this fellow with hardly wrinkle in his smooth face and hardly a trace of gray in his sparsely thatched pate is the Tommy Burns who holds the record for a quick knockout in a championship fight. A few weeks ago Tommy skipped the rope 100 times in a minute and 52 seconds. "Not bad for a fellow whose legs were swollen with arthritis seven year ago, eh?" he asks.

Ask Tommy whence spouts the elixir of youth he apparently has discovered, and he'll answer: "It's 79 all in thinking. What one thinks -that is what one is. 

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
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
