

INTEREST WAXES IMMENSE OVER U. S. POLITICS

CANADA BEST OF INVESTMENTS

Big Banquet to British Business Men, the Guests of the Government—Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. W. White Sound Praises.

(Special to Daily News.)
Ottawa, June 18.—At a banquet to the visiting British manufacturers who are the guests of the government at the Chateau Laurier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. William White were the principal speakers. The latter declared that the trade of Canada this year will amount to over a billion dollars, and that half a million immigrants will come to the country this year. He claimed that no other country offered better opportunities for safe investments than Canada.

GEOLOGISTS VISIT SKEENA

Members of International Congress Will Pay Visit to District Soon—Advance Man Coming to Make Examination of Region.

Most of the members of the International Congress of Geologists, which will be held in Canada next year, will later visit this province. Mr. McConnell, who is acting as advance guard for the expedition, leaves Vancouver in a few days for a tour of the Skeena River district and the Bulkley Valley. He will make a geological examination of the region, and the result of his observations will be published in an official guide book for the information of the visitors.

The International Congress of Geologists meets every three or four years, and is attended by leading geologists from all parts of the world. The last congress was held in Sweden and the previous one in Mexico. The visit of so many distinguished men to the province will be an event of the first importance.

Mr. McConnell is one of the oldest members of the Geological Survey department, and has conducted geological examinations in all parts of the Dominion. Next year he will resume his survey of Texada Island, at which he has been engaged for several years.

OPINIONS ON BRITISH VIEW

London Despatch Attempts to Estimate the Attitude of the British Public to the U. S. Election—See-Saw Expression.

(Special to Daily News.)
London, June 17.—The bitterness between President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt for the Republican nomination has been followed so closely in this country that the convention at Chicago is being looked forward to with tremendous interest. Ordinarily British feeling would be strongly in favor of the President as the man in office, but in this political instance the force of habit has not held good. Taft's advocacy of reciprocity with Canada, his famous parting of the ways speech last fall just before the Canadian election and finally this publication of the Taft-Roosevelt correspondence containing the remark that reciprocity would make Canada "an adjunct of the United States," have prejudiced British opinion against him. On the other hand, there are many Britishers who have not forgiven Col. Roosevelt for his gratuitous advice in the Guildhall speech of two years ago on how to run Egypt.

COST OF THE HEALTH DEPT.

A Little Over \$300 Has Been the Expenditure on the Undertaking of Keeping Prince Rupert Healthy for the Past Month.



NOT NEEDED IN B. C.

American Inventor Has Apparatus for Killing Frost.
San Bernardino, Cal., June 17.—C. M. Grow, a citrus grower, announced today the perfection of a frost dispelling apparatus for orange and lemon groves, which he believes will save annually in California fruit worth \$1,000,000.

The invention was given a final test last evening. It consists of a system of underground gas mains connecting with mushroom burners beneath each tree. The temperature of the grove was raised 30 degrees and maintained equally throughout the night.

LATEST ROYAL DANCE WAS A MARVEL OF DRESS

King and Queen Present at a Perfect Pageant of Rich, Historical Costumes Worn by Rank and Beauty of Great Britain—Famous Dances of History Repeated

London, June 17.—The Royal Albert Hall was the scene recently of the greatest function of the season, the "ball of a hundred years ago."

All the notable figures of English society were present and the splendor of the costumes and the loveliness of the setting never have been surpassed in any spectacle in London. The ball was under the special patronage of the King and Queen, and was organized in aid of the Soldiers and Sailors' Help Society by Princess Christian, the president of the society, assisted by a committee comprising Lord Cheylesmore, Admiral Sir Albert Markham, Lady Arthur Paget and Mrs. Dick Conyngham.

In Guise of Ancestors.
Members of the famous families in England appeared in the guise of their ancestors of a century ago, and a series of brilliant quadrilles represented the court, society and the government and the navy and army clubs of 1812, the year made

memorable by Napoleon's Russian campaign, the Peninsular war and the war between Russia and Turkey.

The Duchess of Richmond's famous dance before the battle of Waterloo was danced again, the glories of India in the days of the Nabobs were lived once more, and the ladies of the peerage brought to life the pictures of their stately predecessors and the fashions, uniforms and jewels. The beauties of 1812 glowed once more in a stage setting representing the lawn before Brighton pavilion in the palmiest days of the regency.

Waterloo Quadrille.

In the Waterloo quadrille the Duchesses of Marlborough, Roxburgh, Sutherland and Westminster danced. The Countess of March appeared as the Duchess of Richmond in a dress which was a reproduction of that worn by the Duchess of Richmond at the famous ball on the eve of Waterloo. The Duchess of Marlborough appeared as the Comtesse Waleska.

Others in this quadrille were chosen for their beauty, and included Lady Crewe, Lady Stafford, Lady Juliet Duff, Lady Beatrice Pole-Carew, Mrs. Rupert Breckett, Mrs. Cecil Bingham, Miss Muriel Wilson, Mrs. John Ward, Lady Desborough, Lady Helen Vincent and Lady Beatrice Herbert.

For this quadrille also Lady Paget found a Napoleon in Sir Charles Hartopp. Wellington was represented by Lord Hardinge, Lord Lochfield appeared as the Prince of Orange, Lord John Cavendish personated Blucher, Captain Albert Paget represented Lord Uxbridge, and Mr. Monckton-Arundell the Duke of Brunswick. For months family archives have been ransacked and recourse has been had even to the British Museum to make sure of absolute accuracy in the details of the costumes worn.

Nelson Quadrille.

The Nelson quadrille was another fine study which necessitated much research. In this,

THE RETURNING OFFICER'S PAY

Last night City Clerk Woods presented to the city council his own bill for services as returning officer during the bylaw ballot on Friday. The amount charged by Mr. Woods for his day's work in that connection is \$25, the regulation fee. The number of hours worked continuously by him was fifteen and a half. Mr. Thatcher, deputy returning officer, is down for \$10 as his fee for the day. Mr. Woods makes no charge for the time spent on the recount.

The idea is that the much needed facility may be granted before the attorney general arrives here; if not, the council will thrash the matter out with him.

FIRE ALARM ARRANGEMENT

Makers of the Gamewell System Renew Their Offer to the City and Matter is Under Consideration—Phone Manager Reports.

At last night's meeting of the council a report was read from Mr. E. Love, superintendent of the telephone plant, regarding the proposed installation of a permanent fire alarm system for the city, a matter which has hung for some time in abeyance. The makers of the Gamewell fire alarm system, recommended by the present fire chief, as well as by Superintendent Love, have renewed their offer to install this system for a cash payment of \$2,500, the remainder to be paid in one year at 7 per cent. The Fire and Finance committees will consider.

OFFICIALLY INVITE DUKE

Mayor Reminds the Council That They Must Try to Stand on Their Dignity When Governor General Arrives.

"Gentlemen," said the Mayor at council last night, "don't you think an official invitation should be accorded from this council to the Governor General? Of course it is only a matter of form, but it seems to be the usual and correct thing to do. Of course we are all anxious to maintain our dignity on this occasion, and this invitation seems to be necessary." Alderman Douglas rose to the occasion and made the necessary motion that the city solicitor be asked to draw up the necessary invitation in proper form, and this will be done.

THE NEW C. P. R. STEAMSHIP

Princess Sophia, Latest Addition to Prince Rupert Fleet, is a Large and Comfortable Steamer—Has Speed of Fifteen Knots.

The Princess Sophia, which called at this port the other night on the southward trip of her maiden voyage on the Vancouver-Prince Rupert-Skagway run, is the latest addition to the C. P. R. fleet. He has a large freight capacity, capable of carrying upward of 1,400 tons, and maintain an average speed of nearly fifteen knots. She is elegantly equipped for passengers and with a beam of 44 feet has ideed a very roomy appearance. The large promenade deck is not unlike the big ocean liners.

Calling ports in Alaska are very proud of the new ship, as is evidenced by the following from the Daily Alaskan, Skagway: "The Princess Sophia is without doubt the best vessel running into Skagway, and it is no wonder that Agent Lowie is proud to have all his friends inspect this new addition to the C. P. R. fleet." The Daily Miner of Ketchikan says: "The Princess Sophia is perhaps the most modern and elegantly finished steamer ever seen in Alaska waters."

MARRIAGE BILL DECISION OUT

Supreme Court Decides Against Lancaster Marriage Bill Judgment—Marriages in Quebec Held Legal if Not by Priest.

Ottawa, June 18.—The Supreme Court's decision is against the Lancaster marriage bill judgment, stating that Parliament has no right to enact a universal marriage law and that the right remains with the provinces. Justices Iddington, Davies and Duff declared mixed marriages in Quebec legal although not performed by a Roman Catholic priest. The government will now take the appeal to the Privy Council.

NEEDLESS ALARM.

Western newspapers complain very bitterly because some of the eastern newspapers are writing up western cities and western conditions somewhat unfairly, or, at least, without the enthusiasm of the westerner. They seem to have an idea that these eastern newspapers have started out to "knock" the western cities. They refer particularly to the letters of H. F. Gadsby in the Toronto Star and Mr. Harris of the Toronto Saturday Night. We believe that the western editors are somewhat unduly alarmed.

It is annoying at times to come upon the cocksure epistles and articles of some eastern newspaper men who have just looked over the country and have got everything wrong end foremost, but that does not apply to any great extent, as far as we are aware, to the two writers just mentioned. It is true that they have expressed their opinions somewhat plainly upon certain phases of our development, but we believe, without any general desire to injure the country.

These gentlemen come west to examine conditions. They seem to be somewhat alarmed about our extensive subdivisions. That is not surprising. Some western people are alarmed about the extensive areas upon the markets. The western editors who have watched the incomprehensible development during the last few years marvel at nothing and as a usual thing have held their peace. These eastern writers have no hesitation. They have never seen a city in the making and cannot understand how such development, as we all hope for and expect, can take place. And being from Toronto, where every person knows everything, or almost that, they do not hesitate to say that such expansion is quite impossible.

However, the opinions of these gentlemen cannot alter conditions very much. They recognize the worth of the western cities. They realize that the progress of the west cannot be held up. They admit that the larger cities have bright futures, but warn investors to look before they make investments. That is the very advice that they should give and the very thing that legitimate agents desire.

These writers are somewhat alarmed at the over speculation and the far flung subdivisions. They might look at home, in Toronto, Montreal and Ottawa. But they do not do so. But even if these eastern cities will not bear scrutiny, the western cities will bear the very closest examination. As long as these gentlemen confine themselves to fact, Western Canadian cities should be satisfied, and will not be much injured even if the authors draw conclusions which are not always justified by the facts.—Morning Albertan.

Historic Regiments.

The household cavalry, the Goldstream Guards, the Lancers, the cavalry and the dragoons of 1812 were all represented. A particularly effective costume was designed from the German Lancer Regiment's uniforms of 1812, and was cleverly adapted to the ladies' dresses by the addition of short skirts of green cloth slit up to the knees and slashed with red. The black leather helmet had a metal top and coque plumes, two chains linking them to the breast. Another beautiful uniform was that of the German Grenadier Guards of 1812, made of blue and white cloth, with collar and cuffs of bright red.

The European regiments quadrille was led by Lady Constance Hatch, who had a picturesque costume as a Russian hussar. It was of blue cloth, of the shade between royal and saxe blue, with the skirt slit up one side and edged with silver lace. BUILDERS OF THE TITANIC

Harland & Wolff Acquire New Site—Now Preparing Finest Shipbuilding Yard in Glasgow—Old River Clyde Rejoices.

Belfast, June 12.—It was only a few months ago that it was announced that Messrs. Harland & Wolff of Belfast had acquired the shipbuilding yard of the London & Glasgow Shipbuilding & Engineering Company, covering over ten acres, and an announcement that has just been made shows that the former transaction was merely part of a far larger scheme.

The announcement in question is that the great Belfast firm has acquired the site of Messrs. Mackie & Thompson's shipbuilding yard at Glasgow, covering an area of some six acres and adjoining Messrs. Harland & Wolff's earlier purchase.

These arrangements, which give the firm a large stretch of river frontage extending from the Clyde Trust's docks to Govan ferry, in addition to their extensive engineering and boilermaking works at Lancelfield quay on the other side of the river, should place the Belfast firm in a commanding position on the Clyde.
