Japs Are Working on New Guinea

RAILWAYS' BIG TASK

Being Tackled With Vigor But Resources Not Yet Fully Mobilized

CHICAGO, March 19.—Dealing in a general way, Major F. L. Bond D.S.O., president of the American Railway Engineering Association, addressing the annual convention here, stated that, while United States has six times as much railway mileage as Canada, Canada has twice the population. Canada has an excellent network of railways, with modern equipment and efficiently operated," he said. "The development of the country is the story of these railways. The vital and continuing necessity of the railroads to the country's well-being and war service has been thoroughly demonstrated."

"There is a tremendous task ahead of all of us," Major Bond said. "It is being tackled with vigor, all our resources are not yet mobilized. All non-essentials and hindering influences must go by the board. We expect, of course, that the essential nature of the railways in the war services will give us reasonable priorities in obtaining necessary supplies of manpower. So far as the railway employees of Canada are concerned, we are getting splendid and hearty response and we will go forward with one accord to do our part and win the war."

RED DRIVE CONTINUES

Soviet Guerrillas Claim to Have Taken Six Thousand Square Miles of Leningrad.

MOSCOW, March 19. (P)—Soviet guerrilla forces reported today to Pravda that they had wrested back control of some six thousand square miles behind the German lines at Leningrad and were so strong the Germans could not come into the area. Although the newspaper did not further identify the area, the Baltic state of Estonia lies just west of the Leningrad front.

JAP SHIPS SENT DOWN

Another Attack Successfully Staged Against Enemy Invasion Fleet by Allied Bombers.

CANBERRA, March 19.—Another attack by United Nations bombers on the Japanese invasion fleet of Australia yesterday resulted, it is reported, in the sinking of one heavy Japanese cruiser and other vessels off Rabaul, New Britain. Twenty-three enemy ships have been so far sunk or damaged.

CAMPAIGN IN BURMA

Battle For Prome Road, North Of Rangoon, Seems To Burst Momentarily Into Fury

MANDALAY, March 19. (P)—A big battle for the Prome Road—key to Burmese oil fields—seemed ready today to burst momentarily as Japanese troops streamed up the Irrawaddy Valley for an assault on new British defence positions.

Unofficial London advices said the British had withdrawn from Tharrawaddy, sixty miles north of Rangoon and almost half the way to Prome.

British pilots and American volunteers possibly destroyed twenty-five enemy planes in attacks on Japanese-held airfields in southern Burma yesterday, it is reported.

WAR NEWS

ITALIAN SHIPS BOMBED

CAIRO—The Royal Air Force today announced that torpedo-carrying planes had staged a successful attack in the central Mediterranean Tuesday night, setting one merchant ship afire and scoring a hit on a larger vessel.

CANADIANS LAND SAFELY

OTTAWA—The Department of National Defence announced today the safe arrival in Great Britain of a further contingent of members of the Canadian armed forces. At the same time the office of the South African representative in Canada announced the safe arrival in South Africa of a ship carrying ten Canadian nurses.

OOLACHAN FISHERY

Local Party Returns From Interesting Trip to Unique Spot on Naas River.

A visit to the native oolachan fishery near the mouth of the Naas River proved highly interesting for a party consisting of Dr. and Mrs. R. G. Large, Dr. and Mrs. N. M. Carter, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Scott and O. C. Young who returned home yesterday morning aboard Dr. Large's power cruiser Soogwills.

The party, which left here on Sunday, reached Fishery Bay during the height of the run and found some twenty-five boats of native people—men, women and children—there engaged in their unique method of netting enormous quantities of the peculiar "Candle fish." The fish, after being caught, are placed in pits for a week or so preparatory to being boiled in sort of Dutch ovens for the rendering and refining of the grease which is preserved for later use. In addition to the oil reduction, some of the oolachans are smoked and dried. Others are sold on the fresh fish markets.

The fishing and processing of the oolachans keeps the natives from Kincolith, Greenville and Aiyansh at Fishery Bay busy usually for the better part of two months.

Some eight miles below Fishery Bay on the Naas River, there is a smaller gathering of Port Simpson Indians at Red Bluff also fishing for oolachans.

In addition to bringing home some of the fish, the local party also took some interesting moving pictures.




