Knocking Germany Out Of War

ed by huge fleets of British and American bombers, air experts predicted today as the German city of Cologne lay in flaming ruins after the most devastating air raid in history. When the Royal Air Force sent more than one thousand bombers into the Rhineland Saturday, its fliers heralded not only the eventual invasion of Europe but also the systematic destruction of Adolf Hitler's war machine, these sources declared. More than one thousand Canadian airmen took part in the aerial smash which dropped the greatest weight of steel explosives ever borne on wings. Early today three waves of German raiders, totalling some twenty-five planes, attacked the ancient cathedral city of Canterbury, wrecking several historic buildings. An authoritative source said that Canterbury Cathedral was doubtless one of the Nazi objectives but it was not disclosed whether it was damaged.

Axis African corps-was reported trapped and trying to escape British forces today with the army of Lieutenant General Neil Ritchie waging a fierce battle from all sides and from the air in the attempt to wipe them out. A British communique indicated that the only hope of the Germans was to win "a battle of gaps" by holding open two narrow passage ways through British minefields to the west. It was announced that General Ludwig Cruewell, in direct command of the African corps as General Erwin Rommell's chief assistant, was captured when a reconnaissance plane was shot down on the desert.

Biggest Raid SERVICE Cologne Hit

LONDON, June 1 - Some 1,250 Royal Air Force planes took part Saturday night in the greatest air raid of history on important targets in Germany and widespread damage was done, particularly to industrial plants at Cologne which was set threequarters part afire and probably dealt a mortal blow.

Five thousand airmen, including one thousand Canadians, took part

British experts see the possibility of Germany being bombed out of the war by this fall.

The Cologne raid lasted for an hour and a half. Planes swooped down at the rate of one every six seconds and overwhelmed the defences. It was twice as many planes as had ever come over Britain and four times the weight of bombs was dropped. The fires could be seen for 150 miles and smoke curled three miles up into the sky. Every sort of industrial plant and railways were smashed. The planes took off from scores of British airdromes. Fortyfour, or four per cent, failed to return. Prime Minister Winston Churchill sent a message to the Royal Air Force congratulating it upon "its remarkable feat of organization" and saying that this only heralded what Germany would receive city by city from now on.

EDITORIAL

Our Town Is Changing . . .

Within the short space of the last two years, due to conditions brought on directly because of the war, Prince Rupert's population has nearly doubled. The effect of this growth, mushroom in character and uncertain as it, may be in regard to permanency, has made the life and outlook of Prince Rupert a great deal different. It has made changes for us all one way or another and we may anticipate more changes because the end of the expansion is not yet. Indeed, the making of the change may only have begun.

The war is changing the way of living of the whole world although some parts of Canada may not have noticed the change so very much as yet. Here in Prince Rupert we are expeiencing not only a general but a local transition. We are having to accustom and attune ourselves not only to different ways but to different ideas. It is time to think of the possibility that some who are unable to or who do not desire to change accordingly! may be left behind.

Never have we had such sudden changes in Prince Rupert and for some it is proving just a little difficult. Some even say thay would prefer the good old easy days when we used to kick and grouse about the hard times and wish for great prosperity and activity. Now a new tempol is developing for many of us due to the changed conditions and, if we cannot keep in pace, we will have to drop

One of the most notable changes is the metropolitanism we are assuming. None of us can go up the street today, as some of us used to do, and personally greet every second person-or possibly-more. Today we are becoming a city of strangers. Everybody no longer knows everybody else's business. Naturally, the changed atmosphere may not be quite so congenial to some of us. It is just because it is different. We are having to change from an atmosphere to which we had been accustomed and it is not a gradual change but a sudden one.

Under far different circumstances than any of us had expected-under circumstances that are perhaps unfortunate and in a manner which we would not have wished for-Prince Rupet is coming into its own. We must watch that we do not succumb in the general rush or become demoralized in keeping up with the march of events which is having such a direct effect on our own community.

One of the greatest of our faults is our inability or unwillingness to change. It is essential that we adapt ourselves to changed conditions.




