Bidding farewell to the fateful year of 1942, we can anticipate many jobs to do and duties to perform in 1943. Right here, close as we still are to the front line, there is particularly much to do. Many are now in the services and, before another year passes, many more of us, doubtless, will be. The path of duty may make changes for many of us. For some it will bring sorrow and sadness For some it may bring disaster.

But whatever 1943 may bring to us, one thing it is certainly bringing us is a brighter outlook for the success of the great undertaking of war upon which we are joined. Well can we recall the feeling of nigh desperate foreboding that a year ago this New Year's Eve held the most of us in its grip. And happily can we say that there has been a great change in that regard. We may have our trials and our difficulties still ahead but now we are amply confident that, long and trying as the struggle may be, a bright and shining victory is to be ours.

There is no particular reason to anticipate that 1943 boy born on a Canadian National will bring us the victory and the final peace although it is a brave person who would essay to make forecasts of the course of a struggle whiich has already been so unpredictable as this. One thing of which we may well feel certain, however, is that another twelvemonth will have brought us to a much closer view of the dawn of better and happier days.

MAJOR VICTORY SCORED BY RUSSIANS TODAY IN REGION OF STALINGRAD

MOSCOW, Dec. 31—There has been a Russian victory of the greatest magnitude in the Stalingrad area. Ninety-five thousand enemy troops have been exterminated and 72,000 captured, it is announced today. Six divisions have been destroyed. The Rumanians suffered most heavily.

A special Soviet communique said tonight that the German army in Stalingrad "is liquidated completely."

"In the course of the battle our troops completely destroyed the fifth, sixth, ninth, thirteenth, fourteenth and, fifteenth Rumanian infantry divisions," the communique said.

Twelve Persons Are Taken Into Enemy Cruiser and Destroyer Are Custody to Prevent Further Assassinations

ALGIERS, Dec. 31-General Heni Giraud, new French High Commissioner for North Africa, announces the arrest of twelve persons to prevent "further assassinations" in the wake of the slaying of his predecessor, Admiral Jean Young Manitoban Should Grow Up Darlan, who aided the Allied occupation of French Africa.

Four of the arrested were police officers, Giraud said, adding that "they knew Darlan was going to be murdered and did not warn their superiors." Some-of the arrested men were personal friends of his, Mrs. Mary Pasaraba, wife of a Giraud said. Some had collaborated with the Allies in recent events and some with the Axis. The arrests had been made, said Giraud, because it was felt "better to prevent than to punish."






