POWER TEST OF PIONEER INDUSTRIAL PLANT

DOMINION DAY PREPARATIONS

Publicity Committee Placarding the Principal Centres of Northern B. C. in Manner to Make Known Rupert's Demonstration.

Every care is being taken by those responsible for the proper publicity of Prince Rupert's preparations for a fitting demonstration on Dominion Day to have the literature prepared for this purpose widely distributed. A quiet wedding, of interest to a large number of people of Prince Rupert, was solemnized last evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Carmichael of Alfred street. The contracting parties were Mr. Tom McCubbin, a pioneer of Prince Rupert, and Miss Douglas of Kippen, Stirlingshire, Scotland. Miss Douglas only arrived a few days ago direct from the old country. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Warren H. McLeod, and the happy couple will leave in a day or two for the new town of Nicholl, where Mr. McCubbin will be in charge of some contract work for J. W. Patterson of Kit-selas.

SUFFRAGETTES' TERMS EASIER

Women's Sentences Made Somewhat Milder Owing to Intervention of Labor Members, Appealing to the Home Secretary.

London, June 18.—The sentences on the militant suffragettes, Mrs. Pankhurst and Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence, joint editors of Votes for Women, were today modified by Reginald McKenna, home secretary, and the prisoners will finish as first class misdemeanants, the terms of nine months' imprisonment to which they were condemned at the Old Bailey sessions on May 22nd instead of serving as ordinary criminals. The labor members of the House of Commons had been pressing the home secretary for some time to grant to the suffragettes the privileges of political prisoners.

ROLLING STOCK AND LUMBER

Hulk and Barge Arrive Yesterday —oG South Today.

Yesterday the tug Escort II, Captain Foster, arrived with the big barge Georgian and the hulk North Bend in tow. Captain Foster stated that the trip north was a slow one, a westerly wind blowing continuously. The cargo of the Georgian consisted of 11 box cars for the Grand Trunk, and the North Bend was loaded to the brim with 500,000 feet of lumber from Balkin & Co. of Ballard, Washington, consigned to Foley, Welch & Stewart.

On the return trip the Escort will tow the Georgian with the equipment recently landed here off the contracting firm of Harris & Rich. She will probably leave for the south tomorrow. On the return trip still more rolling stock will be brought up from the south for the railway.

In Supreme Court.

The case of Helgeson vs. Drew for delivery of certain Third avenue property was concluded today. Judgment was reserved. C. V. Bennett represented the defendant and Williams & Manson appeared for the plaintiff.

Mr. S. S. Taylor, K. C., who conducted the case for the plaintiff in the libel suit yesterday, is one of the foremost lawyers in British Columbia. He came to Vancouver four years ago and established the firm of Taylor, Harvey, Baird, Grant & Stockton. Mr. Taylor is well pleased with Prince Rupert and is confident that it will make one of the biggest cities on the coast. He says that one railroad will soon be insufficient for the commerce of the city and that other roads are bound to come here. Mr. Taylor will remain in town a few days and may possibly make some investments here before returning to his home in Vancouver.

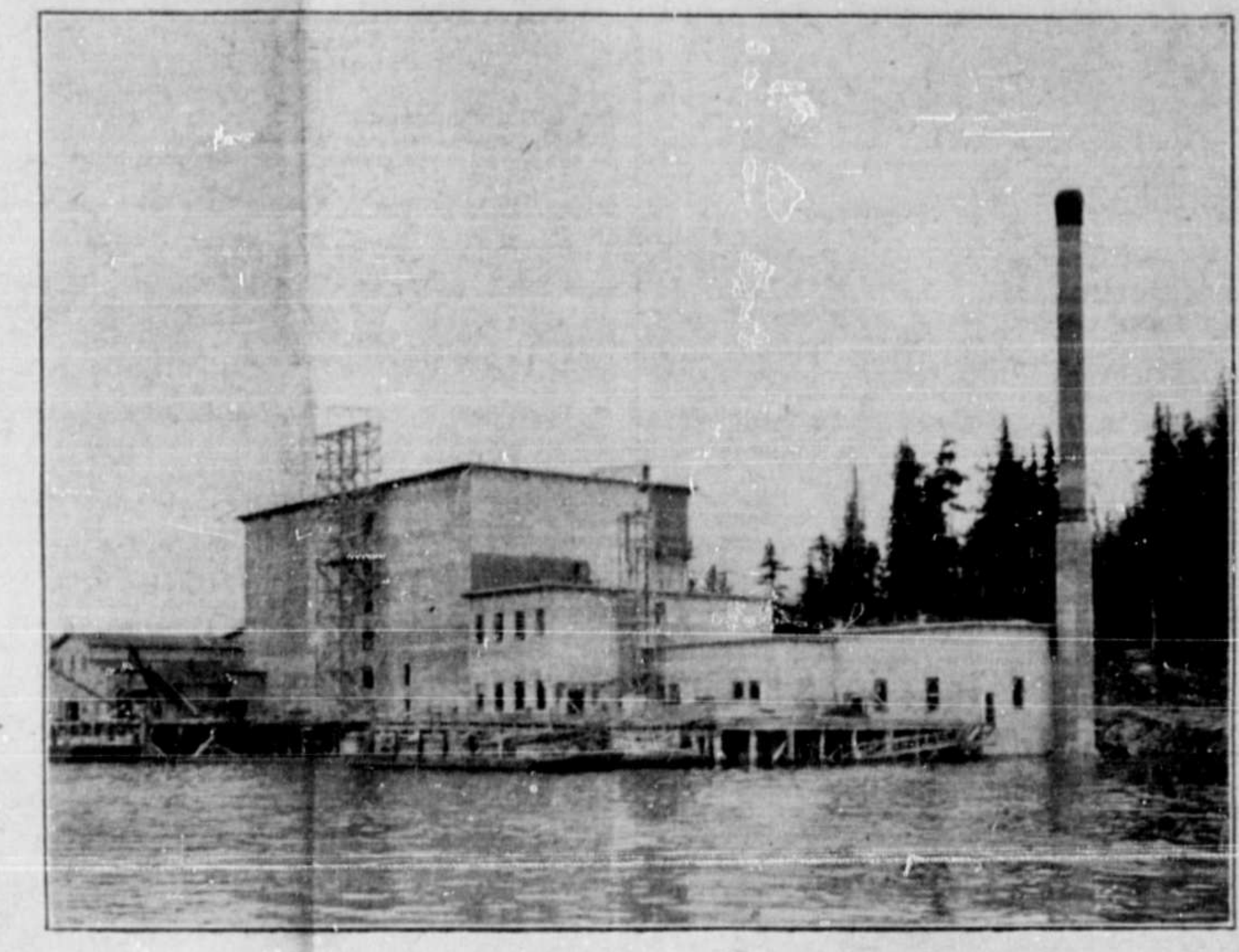

HAD STEAM UP IN RUPERT'S GREAT COLD STORAGE PLANT

First Working Test Applied With Signal Success to the Costly Machinery Installed by the Canada Cold Storage Co. in Their Substantial Five-Storey Ferro-Concrete Building at Seal Cove—Ammonia Vapor Test Before Long

Steam has been turned onto the costly machinery at the fine plant of the Canadian Cold Storage Company at Seal Cove, an illustration of which appears here. The test was in every way entirely satisfactory, and its accomplishment means that the plant will shortly be in shape to undergo the ammonia vapor test which will mark practically the completion of the plant and its readiness for service. The 39 miles of piping which pass through the many chambers of the huge building form a most important part of the plant, and will be rigidly tested. Their fitting, however, has been of the finest and most costly and there can be no doubt that the final test will show them to be in as perfect shape as the rest of the machinery. As will be remembered, on the occasion of the city council's official visit to the plant, Mr. G. H. Collins, manager of the great concern, announced that

the plant would be running in January, 1913. Work on the cannery being erected for the Canadian Cold Storage Company at Tuck's Inlet on the harbor proceeds with steady stride, and this enterprise, too, will shortly be in working shape.

"EMPIRE" EDITOR MUST PAY \$1,500 FOR LIBEL

S. M. Newton, Mayor of Prince Rupert, Found Guilty of Grossly Libelling Alex. M. Manson, a Private Citizen, by an Editorial Published in His Paper, Which He Admits Was Written Without Consideration or Attempt at Verification of the Ugly Charges it Contained

All day yesterday Mr. Justice Morrison was occupied with the hearing of the Manson vs. Newton libel suit for \$20,000, which has attracted much attention in the city. There was a considerable crowd of interested citizens assembled, far too many for the tiny accommodations of the temporary court room. The hearing during the morning hours was almost entirely occupied by the evidence of Mr. Alex. Manson, the plaintiff. In the afternoon a few witnesses for the plaintiff were examined, and on the closing of the case for the prosecution Mr. S. M. Newton, the defendant, took the box as sole witness in his own defense. Interest centred in the evidence of the principals, in the speeches of counsel on either side, in the Judge's charge to the jury and in the verdict which was against Mr. Newton with damages at \$1,500.

History of the Case.

The case dates back to the occasion of the Section Two property holders' meeting on April 24th, when the repeated assertions by business men at that meeting that "the council has nothing" formed the text of an editorial in The Daily News criticizing the council and also the Mayor, while commending Prince Rupert's enterprising business

men on their determination to do without city help and get their property made accessible on their own personal guarantee to the bank that the monies borrowed were repaid. This editorial aroused one in the Mayor's paper, written under the evident but erroneous impression that Alex. M. Manson had penned or inspired The Daily News criticism, and expressing certain highly derogatory charges against Mr. Manson, both personally and professionally. Did Not Seek Proof. In the witness box yesterday, under oath, Mr. Newton admitted that he had never endeavored to make sure that Mr. Manson had written the editorial in The News and had no positive grounds for believing that he had, but was merely under the impression that Mr. Manson did either write or inspire it because he was a shareholder, director and secretary-treasurer of the Prince Rupert Publishing Co. Mr. Newton further said that though he had had twenty-five years' experience in newspaper work, he had never considered what effect the retaliatory editorial he wrote, affecting Mr. Manson personally, would have upon Mr. Manson's reputation, personal or private.

Plaintiff's Evidence.

Mr. Manson's evidence principally showed that he had had nothing whatever to do with the dictation of the editorial policy of The News; had neither written nor inspired the editorial which aroused Mr. Newton's resentment, nor ever written or inspired any editorial criticizing the Mayor and council. Plaintiff went further into the charges made against him professionally in the Newton editorial under examination by his counsel, Mr. S. S. Taylor, and cross-examination by defendant's counsel, Mr. Fred Peters. Points regarding the drawing up of the city grading contracts at the time Messrs. Williams & Manson were city solicitors were elucidated, showing that the charges made by Mr. Newton that Mr. Manson had helped "tie the city into knots" of difficulty were unsubstantiated. The judgment of Mr. Justice Clements on the city cases in dispute was entered by the plaintiff's counsel and used as further proof of this fact.

The Defense.

In his own defense Mr. Newton testified that he believed Mr. Manson was practically the whole management of The Daily News, and dictated the policy of the paper as well as attending to its financial affairs as secretary-treasurer. Closely cross-examined by counsel for the plaintiff, Mr. Newton failed to show that he had any substantial grounds for believing this, nor for any of the charges made against Mr. Manson personally. He had gone largely by what he had heard or concluded and admitted that he had not troubled to make certain of his facts before penning the editorial which brought about the libel suit. Counsel for the defense addressing the jury endeavored to show that the editorial attacking Mr. Manson was justified by the fact that frequent criticisms had appeared in The News previous to its publication. He read a few of these to the jury, especially the editorial on the Section Two situation, which caused all the trouble. The wording was far from being as violent as that used by Mr. Newton, and there were no personal attacks upon Mr. Newton as a private citizen.

Scathing Censure.

Counsel for the plaintiff in his address to the jury expressed most scathing censure of the editorial conduct of Mr. Newton, especially in view of the fact that

PRINCE RUPERT HAS A BIG PLACE

Permanent Organization Proposed of Towns Interested in Panama Canal from Moose Jaw to Coast—Convention at Calgary Soon.

A permanent organization embracing all the towns and cities from Moose Jaw to the Pacific coast will be the outcome of the Calgary Panama Canal Convention to be held on June 28th and 29th.

The committee in charge of the arrangements have decided that this will be the only way by which the purpose of the convention can be fulfilled. Mere speculation, however interesting and inspiring, cannot, they say, accomplish the purpose of the gathering. Permanent co-operation alone will enable the towns and cities represented at the gathering to grasp the full measure of opportunity presented by the opening of the great canal. The interest of each town and city in this matter is recognized to be the interest of all and a comprehensive scheme will be planned at the convention by which the whole of the west will be found ready when the great opportunity arrives.

The first boat to arrive direct from the old country to Rupert is the steamship Director of the Harrison Line, due here this week. She made good time on the run from San Francisco up the coast to Victoria, covering the 900 miles in about two days and a few hours. After discharging freight at Vancouver and Victoria she will come to Rupert and should arrive this week.

THE MAKINGS OF A YOUNGSTER

Boy Scout Rescued Three Year Old Boy in Flames from Terrible Death and Told No One of His Heroism.

Calgary, June 18.—Seeing a child with his clothes ablaze, James Fidler, a 13-year-old Boy Scout, son of Alf Fidler, showed conspicuous courage and presence of mind in putting out the flames with a football cover which he was carrying. Jim Fidler was walking along Thirteenth avenue when a 3-year-old boy dashed from behind the house toward the street, his clothes in flames.

Jim jumped over the fence and attacked the flames with the football cover.

"I didn't roll him on the ground to put the flames out because there were a lot of ashes and I might have hurt him worse," said he to the Albertan last night.

After he had put out the fire, Mrs. Brandon, 133 Thirteenth avenue west, mother of the child, rushed out and assisted in removing the hot and charred clothes. While she was doing this Jim ran for the doctor. Not finding Dr. Crawford in, he went back to the house to see if any more could be done. The baby had been taken into the house and Jim went home.

He did not say a word to either his mother or father about the incident, and it came to their ears only by Mrs. Brandon calling to thank the parents of the boy who had saved the life of her son.

James Fidler is a scout in the Church of the Redeemer troop. His scout master, the Rev. C. Horne, called him to the front at the last troop assembly and thanked him for the credit he had brought to the troop and to the institution of scouts as a brigade.

It is the feeling of Jim's parents that he has only done his duty as a scout. "Be Prepared" is the motto of the scouts, and Jim has shown by his presence of mind that one scout, at least, appreciates its meaning.

A LESSON IN LIBEL LAW.

From the merest "cub" to the oldest veteran of the newspaper game, which to its followers is ever "the greatest game on earth," the mere word "libel" is a warning. Few newspapermen escape perilous proximity if not actual contact with the big bogey of the news room—a live libel suit. In fact, not to have come either under the close shadow or into the very grip of a libel suit is something of a misfortune for the young newspaperman. Immunity from the experience tends to make him less scrupulously careful to avoid the quicksand from which not the most placid looking news source is ever absolutely free.

In the United States, in the west generally, and quite apparently in Prince Rupert, people seem to be considerably less particular about how their names and reputations are handled in the public press than they are in Great Britain. Here the scarcity of suitable man stuff for a staff may make an editor out of anyone from a printer to a politician, with possibly little enough actual experience of the profession to fall back upon in time of peril from the libel risk. Over there one must show qualifications and training to hold down a journalist's job, and the pre-learned hand is not allowed to practice on the particular tasks of the profession—the penning of comment or criticism, the turning of the comprehensive phrases of the head lines (in which may lurk the most lurid of unsuspected libels). It is so also in the newspaper offices of the eastern provinces and it will soon be so in the west and in Prince Rupert, for the world will keep on advancing. Yet even in the longest established publishing offices of the old land, and of the east, you will find sub-editors of the most experience armed with the newspaperman's "safety lamp," some one's "Handbook on the Law of Libel," to guide their way through the mazes of matter concerning human happenings of every day, every turn in which may mark a libel risk to be avoided. For in at least one newspaper office in London, England, the rule is "One libel suit; one man fired." The fact that he makes a better man afterward for another firm is not considered.

Prince Rupert's press has for long borne a charmed life as far as the libel peril is concerned. People of Prince Rupert are saying today, with or without good and sufficient ground, that Prince Rupert's press as a whole (not merely one newspaper) will be all the better for an event of yesterday. Possibly so, and yet The Daily News is not prepared to admit that it has ever wittingly printed anything calculated libelously to injure the business or reputation of any Prince Rupert citizen. The Daily News has criticized. It has criticized quite hard more than once. It has also been criticized a good deal harder, and may be again. But there are no bones broken, it confidently believes. Criticism, even unkind criticism, neither kills nor breaks its object. Criticism is not libelous. No newspaper need fear to criticize while its instincts of fair play in the newspaper game remain awake. Noblesse oblige, and the newspaperman knowing his power to make or mar, to help or hurt, with a stroke of the pen, has need to be careful and considerate, too. Careful for his own sake he may be; considerate for the sake of others he must be or he is but a scurvy squire of the pen.

Most unparaphrasically may any newspaperman in Prince Rupert, or out of it, learn or re-learn yesterday's "Lesson in Libel Law."

EDMONTON WANTS CEMENT

City Hard Hit by the Great Shortage of Building Stuff

The cement shortage hits Edmonton hard. Building is at a standstill; and an attempt to bring in cement from the nearest point of supply in the United States has been blocked by a local freight rate from Calgary to Edmonton which is practically prohibitive. "The best that the cement trust will promise," says the Edmonton Capital, "is that sometime within the next week or ten days they will have cement at the head of the lakes, but with freight moving as it is at the present time that means that it may be a month before any adequate supply can reach Edmonton." As a result, Edmonton is demanding a cancellation of the duty and the fixing by the railway commission of an equitable freight rate from Calgary to Edmonton.

READY FOR THE BANG "Dynamite" Perry from Oklahoma Getting in Shape.

Guthrie, Okla., June 17.—At Colgate, Oklahoma, in a big hay shed are heard each day detonations of such magnitude that they shake the whole town. Every day a dozen men are working about the big shed with their movements shrouded in mystery. "I am making tests to find out how much dynamite can be exploded under a roof without blowing it off," said "Dynamite" Edward Perry, original Roosevelt booster in Oklahoma, delegate to Chicago and candidate for the United States Senate.

"You see," added Perry, "the Chicago Coliseum has a roof over it, and when we touch off the dynamite there I want to go the limit, but not to the extent of blowing the roof off." It is said here that Perry intends to sustain his reputation as a dynamiter at the Chicago convention. He has announced that he will charter a special train and take 125 picked men with him to the big convention, "to see that Roosevelt gets a 'square deal.'" That Perry may be expected to pull off some astonishing stunts with dynamite or something else is a foregone conclusion.

FATALITY IN WHEAT FIELD

Child Fell Off Steam Plow and Was Killed—Wheel Passed Over Baby Girl's Head—Was Daughter of Minister.

Forward, Sask., June 18.—The 6-year-old daughter of Rev. D. McReid, five miles west of town, while playing around a steam plowing outfit owned by Jacques Brothers, was accidentally killed the other evening. She was riding on the platform and fell off the gear end while it was in motion under one of the wheels, which passed over her head, crushing her life out immediately. Mr. McReid, who is attending the general assembly at Edmonton, was immediately wired for and is expected on Monday.

THE LAW'S DELAYS

Poor Man's Compensation Came Too Late.

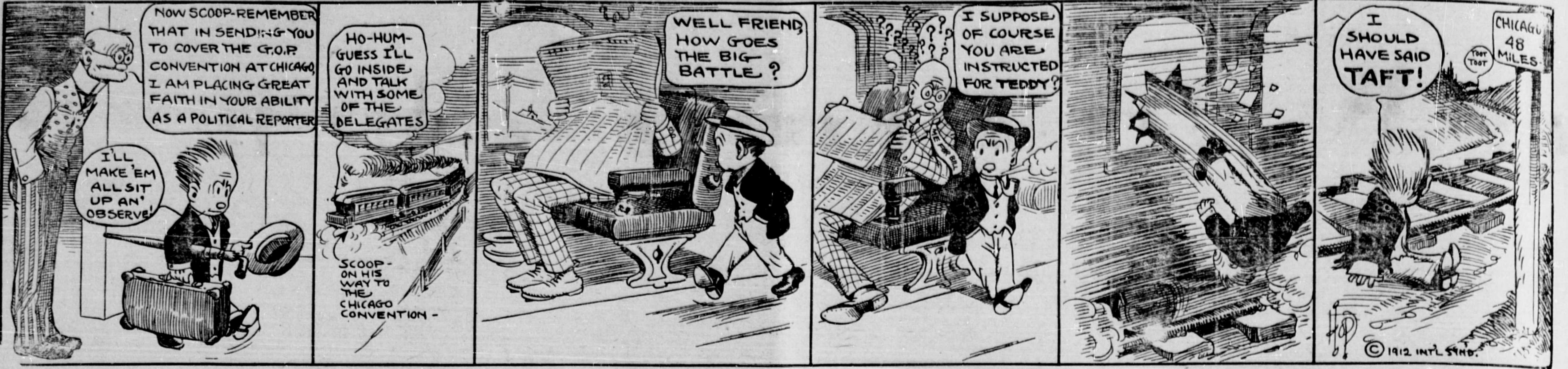

his position as mayor of the city made it natural to expect the best of him in dealing with a fellow citizen. Counsel argued that defendant had deliberately sought to work hurt upon his fellow citizen, the plaintiff, by the editorial attack on his personal and professional reputation, and held that the damage done could hardly be estimated. It might be a matter extending to years.

Judge's Charge to Jury.

Very carefully Mr. Justice Morrison explained to the jury the nature of a libel. He showed that while a certain amount of freedom to criticize is admittedly the right of the press under the British flag, when public persons are the subject or public issues at stake, still if there be any personal charges made in the process of criticism there must be proof to the hilt of these to free the paper publishing them from the guilt of having printed a libel. Reasonable allowance must be made for the person responsible for a libel if it could be shown that this person labored under a distinct misapprehension regarding the person libeled, and the Judge thought this might perhaps apply to Mr. Newton in this particular case.
