OFFENSIVE VIGOR GRIPS CANUCKS HOME AND AFAR

Two-Corps Army Brought to Fighting Trim During 1942 With Dieppe Attack Symbolic of Its Strength

OTTAWA, Dec. 19 (CP)—The Canadian army went on the offensive in 1942. The bloody battle of Dieppe in which Canadian soldiers came in grips with the German foe for the first time in the Second Great War was, in a sense, a symbol of the spread of the offensive spirit through the whole of the Canadian military history at home and overseas.

That spirit was in evidence in the perfect training for the offence and in the formation of new striking arms, like parachute units and the Canada-U. S. special service force. Opportunities for offensive action were still limited, however, and the main contribution of the Canadian army to the maintenance and improvement of the fortunes of the United Nations was in defence.

In the United Kingdom the army grew in numbers and from a corps became a two-corps army. There it formed a key part of the defence force which would deal with an enemy invasion attempt.

In Canada, due to the entry of Japan into the war at the end of 1941, the military defences of the west coast were strengthened. Completion of the organization of two divisions, the 7th and 8th, designed primarily for the defence of this country against attack, was pushed.

Two-Corps Army

The midsummer arrival of the 4th (armored) division in the United Kingdom all but completed the year's overseas army program for the creation of a two-corps army of three infantry and two armored divisions, plus two army tank brigades. Lt.-Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton became army commander with Lt.-Gen. H. D. G. Crerar stepping up from command of a division to command of a corps.

Other changes in commands during the year saw the return of Maj.-Gen. G. R. Pearkes from command of a division overseas and withdrawal of Maj.-Gen. C. B. Price of Montreal from command of a division to become overseas commissioner of the Canadian Red Cross. New divisional commanders appointed overseas were Maj.-Gen. H. L. N. Salmon of Toronto and Maj.-Gen. R. F. L. Keller of Kelowna, B. C.

The August 19 attack on Dieppe marked the first major United Nations thrust at the strongly-defended coast of enemy-occupied Europe and the Canadian army was chosen for the job. Casualties were very heavy during the nine-hour attack, with more than 3,300 of the 5,000-odd Canadians who took part in the raid subsequently reported dead, wounded or missing. Hundreds of Canadians are in German prison camps.

WAR IN RUSSIA—

STALINGRAD AREA STILL UNDER FIRE

German Air Force Trying Desperately to Relieve Hard-Pressed Nazi Army

MOSCOW, Dec. 19 (CP)—Major air battles were fought on the Stalingrad front today as the German air force sought to relieve the hard-pressed Nazi army between the Don and Volga rivers with mass bombings while all along the battle line German troops were reported counter-attacking bitterly.

Near Velikie Luki on the central front the Russians were reported to have taken a strategic height from which new operations could be launched.

German aerial blows failed to dislodge the Red Army from positions and ground activity resulted in heavy losses to the Axis legions, the Russians claimed.

Fighting has been particularly heavy southwest of Moscow and southwest of Rzhev where a fierce Nazi counter attack was repulsed. There have been substantial gains for the Russians in the direction of Smolensk and towards Latvia in the north.

Smolensk, to within eighty-five miles of which the Red Army is now reported to have driven, appears likely to now become a key defence position for the Russians.

Ninety-nine German planes, including eight transports, were shot down in Russia yesterday.

A major air battle over the Stalingrad front was reported in progress today.

JEWS ARE DEGRADED

Further Anti-Hebrew Program is Being Planned in France

PARIS, Dec. 19—A million and a half Jews in France will be involved in a new program of Nazi degradation, it is stated there.

Smolensk Is Objective Of Russians Now

MOSCOW, Dec. 19 (CP)—The Red Army has now driven to within eighty-five miles of Smolensk which some observers believe may be definitely threatened with Russian recapture. Smolensk ranks second only to Kiev in importance as a point which the Nazis hold in occupied Russia.

SEVEN JAP SHIPS SUNK

Further Heavy Blows Dealt in Pacific by American Submarines

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—American submarines have sent seven more enemy ships to the bottom of the Pacific, the Department of the Navy announced last night. They included a large tanker, a large cargo vessel, a medium-sized tanker, two medium-sized cargo vessels, one medium-sized transport and a trawler.

This makes a total of 105 cargo carriers of the Japanese known definitely to have been sunk with the possibility that there were twenty-two others.

French Admiral Not Co-operating

Commander-in-Chief at Alexandria Refuses to Join With Allies, Paris Says

PARIS, Dec. 19—The Nazi-controlled Paris radio says that the admiral of the French fleet at Alexandria has refused the proposal of Admiral Jean Darlan to co-operate with the British and United States navies in the Mediterranean.

WARTIME SCOTCH

LONDON, Dec. 19 (CP)—For a few months, at least, Scotch whiskey made in Britain, is going to have a special wartime taste. Many distilleries are using more peat than usual in drying barley and the "peaty" flavor will not be altogether eliminated during blending.

REPORTED PRISONERS

Some 238 Men Reported Missing After Dieppe Are Alive

OTTAWA, Dec. 19 (CP)—In three simultaneously issued casualty lists the Canadian Active Army last night announced that 238 men previously reported missing after Dieppe battle of last August were now reported prisoners of war.

AIR FORCE RECRUITING

Unit Now Here Seeking Girls and Air Crew Particularly

A mobile recruiting unit of the Royal Canadian Air Force, seeking both men and women recruits, is visiting the city. It arrived yesterday from Vancouver and is returning south tonight. More particularly are girls and air crew recruits desired at this time. The recruiting sessions opened yesterday afternoon in the city council chamber and will continue until tonight.

The recruiting party consists of Flight Lieutenant J. C. Hackney, medical officer; Flying Officer R. J. Williams, administrative officer; Section Officer L. E. Glenn, women's division officer. Aircraftman One W. Harbord, clerk, and Corp. K. E. Ramsay, women's division clerk.

Good Response
Exceptionally good response was received yesterday by the recruiting party, according to a statement this morning by Flight Lieutenant Hackney. Twenty-five applicants were submitted on Friday afternoon, with eighteen local lads offering their services for flying duties and seven applying for ground crew.

No approaches for enlistment in the women's division had been received up to Friday night but it is hoped that a considerable number of local girls will offer their services before the recruiting unit returns to Vancouver tonight. The unit is prepared to accept applications and administer most of the tests prior to enlistment.

Kiska Island Bombed Again By U.S. Army

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 19 (AP)—Heavy United States Army bombers splattered Japan's base on Kiska Island in the Aleutians with heavy explosions on Thursday, the Department of the Navy announced today, causing heavy explosions and starting fires.

All of France is Out of Communication

LONDON, Dec. 19 (CP)—The whole of Vichy France has been cut off for two days from outside communication. There are many rumors, one that the Petain government is moving back to Paris.

Japanese Withdraw as Forces Cross Border, Coming Out Of India

Move Follows Recent Heavy Aerial Bombardment—Initiative Changes Hands For First Time Since Last May

NEW DELHI, Dec. 19 (CP)—British troops, in a surprise blow, have crossed the Indian border and advanced some forty miles into Japanese-occupied Burma to the Manugdaw-Buthidaung area about sixty miles northwest of Akyab on the Bay of Bengal, the British command announced today. The advance started after terrific aerial bombardment of Japanese positions between the Indian border and Akyab and was made without opposition. Japanese forces withdrew before the approaching troops, a communique said.

ALL OUT BATTLE—

AFRICA WAR TEMPO NOW MOVING UP

Italian Cruiser Hit off Bizerte—Africa Korps Being Hit Hard

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Dec. 19 (CP)—Flying Fortresses, continuing daily attacks on Bizerte, one of the principal Axis ports in Tunisia, scored a direct hit and set fire to an enemy warship believed to be a cruiser off the naval base in addition to registering numerous hits on a tanker. The warship is believed to have been an Italian vessel.

With an all out struggle for Tunis and Bizerte now appearing imminent, the tempo of land and air fighting in Tunisia is rising steadily in every sector.

Allied aircraft are steadily gaining domination over the Tunisian war front. The Axis is rushing in troops to north and south Tunisia by sea and air.

From the east there are still indications that Marshal Erwin Rommel intends to move the remainder of his shattered Afrika Korps from Libya through Tripolitania to Tunisia.

Radio broadcasts from North Africa say that one British column, pursuing one fleeing part of Rommel's army, has reached a point 158 miles west of El Aghella.

Another trapped portion of Rommel's army is being steadily pounded by air and artillery and faces annihilation or surrender.

Chase Continues

With heavy fighting, the British Eighth Army chase of Marshal Erwin Rommel's retreating army rolled swiftly westward today and the Morocco radio reported vanguards of pursuers were within eighteen miles of Sirte, 155 miles beyond El Aghella, starting point of the current drive and only 240 miles from Tripoli. The crushing of the trapped portion of Rommel's army continues.

A British communique said only that Axis forces continued flight yesterday under day long ground and air blows.

CHECK UP ON RADIO

Permanent Committee is Asked by Leader of C.C.F.

OTTAWA, Dec. 19—M. J. Coldwell, C.C.F. leader, has asked the Dominion government to re-appoint the radio committee of 1943. He believes there should be a standing committee on radio.

GENERAL GANONG HERE

Major General Harvey Nelson Ganon, general officer commanding, Eighth Division, is paying a visit to the city in the course of one of his periodical visits. He will be here for the next couple of days.

BIG FIGHT ON GUINEA

Intensity of Battle Mounts as Allies Close on Japanese

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN AUSTRALIA, Dec. 19 (CP)—Tightening of Allied rings about trapped Japs on either side of Buna village erupted into heavy fighting in northeast New Guinea today. Allied planes kept up incessant pounding of enemy ground positions.

The Japanese staged another air raid on Port Moresby, but with little serious effect.

Allied bombers meanwhile raided enemy installations on Portuguese Timor.

Around Buna Mission there has been particularly heavy fighting with artillery, machine guns and mortars under increased air activity as the American forces steadily close in on the enemy.

The heavy air raids on the area west of Buna have been almost continuous during the past week.

Hogs Wanted On Vancouver Mart

Warime Prices and Trade Board at Vancouver Asks Ottawa to Take Action

VANCOUVER, Dec. 19—The local office of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board has asked Ottawa to take action if possible to get hogs back on the market here with a view to relieving the pressure on other kinds of meats.

Tide Turned By Secret Weapon

NEW YORK, Dec. 19—A war correspondent, returning home from Africa, says that a new secret weapon of the British turned the tide against Marshal Edwin Rommel in the Battle of Libya. It was a powerful self-propelling anti-tank gun mounted on a tank with armor-piercing shells which ripped open even the most powerful tanks of the enemy.

EDITORIAL

More Air Force Casualties . . .

Yesterday we recorded the official listing of Flight Sergeant Clarence Finley, well known local boy who had spent practically all his life here, as "missing" in action overseas with the Royal Canadian Air Force.

Though neither may have been so widely known as some we have already lost, two more young men, in whom Prince Rupert can claim a personal interest as having been almost her own, are also listed in the fast-mounting toll of Royal Canadian Air Force casualties.

Don't Help the Axis . . .

A warning recently issued by the Defence Department indicates that far too much talking is being done by the people of Canada and that information valuable to the enemy is reaching the ears of those who are sympathetic to the Axis.

"The man who sits next to you in a restaurant, street car, pullman smoker, or at a private conversation may be a man who sends information over a short-wave transmitter to submarines operating off our shores—even if the man is not in uniform," the warning states.

Apparently some people do not realize that the Axis agents are smart. Some information, if published, would permit them to calculate with reasonable accuracy the time of departure of a convoy carrying troops.

Thoughtless conversation and the repeating of rumors is also doing much to harm our war effort. In many instances rumors have been traced down by the authorities and in every instance have been found to be without foundation.

When you hear someone say that they heard such and such a thing to be true it would be well to disregard it entirely. A good stand to take is that the only people who really know the truth are the government authorities and they are not talking.

WINNERS OF FIRST HALF

Dry Dock, Undeclared Hoop Champions. Defeat U.S. Transport 35-25

Lanky Angus McPhee, Dry Dock centre, stole the hoop show with his spectacular shooting as the United States Transport five went down to defeat 35 to 25 last night.

The Transport melon tossers had tough luck around the basket with numerous shots by Fernandez and Valle just missing the ring but not so the ship-builders. They missed nary a rebound.

The Dry Dock built up an 18 to 10 lead in the first half but the Transports came right back to nearly even it up at 23 to 20 in the second half. A determined rally with Santerbane and McPhee in the last few minutes widened the gap and gave the Dry Dock the first half of the league, an undefeated team.

They chalked up nine straight wins in league play, one in the semi-finals and then the final game last night—making a total of 11 straight wins, which is 100 percent in any melon league.

SPORT CHAT

Official batting records of the National League for 1942 show that 265 players took part in championship games. Of this number, 78 engaged in 75 games or more, 128 took part in 10 to 74 games, and fifty-nine appeared in fewer than 10 games.

Melvin T. Ott, New York, scored most runs, 118, and made most home runs, 10. By scoring over 100 runs, during 1942 Ott brought his lifetime scoring mark to 9 years of tallying a century of runs or more; this ties modern record held by Paul G. Waner, Pittsburgh. His 30 home runs brings his lifetime to 445. He has hit more home runs than any other National League player for all time, and has had 8 years of making thirty or more home runs for the League's high mark.

Ott tied Clifford Cravath of Philadelphia for most times leading the League in home runs, with 6, and by making two home runs in a

game twice, increased his own record to 43.

Enos B. Slaughter, St. Louis, collected most base hits, 188, most total bases, 292, most three-base hits, 17 and most one-base hits, 127. Martin W. Marion, St. Louis, made most two-base hits, 38. Leonard R. Merullo, Chicago, made most sacrifice hits, 22. Harold P. Reiser, Brooklyn, stole most bases, 20.

Three players took part in all their club's games—Daniel W. Litchfield, Philadelphia, 151; William J. Herman, Brooklyn, 155, and Berthold Haas, Cincinnati, 154. Joseph M. Medwick, Brooklyn, had the longest batting streak, 27 games in which time he made 43 hits in 107 times at bat for a mark of .402. He began it on May 23 against New York and was stopped June 26 by Cincinnati.

St. Louis and Brooklyn were tied for the longest winning streak, 3 games. Brooklyn doing it twice. Philadelphia had the longest losing streak, 13 games. The shortest nine-inning games were played by Philadelphia and Brooklyn in a twilight game May 25, and by Cincinnati and Chicago, second game of a double-header, August 23 (day

time), 1 hour and 28 minutes. The longest nine-inning game consumed three hours and 6 minutes between Brooklyn and St. Louis, first game, May 3. Chicago and Cincinnati in first game of a double-header August 9 took 4 hours and 58 minutes to play 18 innings.

For the first time since 1909, two clubs won 100 or more games. In 1909 Pittsburgh won 110 and Chicago 104. This feat was equalled in 1942 by St. Louis, winning 106 games, and Brooklyn, 104. St. Louis' great surge of winning 43 of their last 51 games brought them from 9 games behind Brooklyn on August 8 to their sixth pennant on the last day of the season.

Clyde E. McCullough, Chicago, and James Tobin, Boston, each hit three consecutive home runs in a game. McCullough accomplished his feat July 26 first game against Philadelphia and Tobin May 13 against Chicago. Tobin by hitting 6 home runs during the season tied record for a pitcher which was set by Harold H. Schumacher, New York, 1934. Norman R. Young, New

York, in a pinch hitting role, made two hits (double and triple) in eighth inning against Cincinnati May 14, which tied record held by many players.

When Paul G. Waner Boston singled in fifth inning of game June 19 against Pittsburgh, he came the third National League to complete 3000 hits. The other two were Adrian Anson and John Wagner. For the twelfth year, five of which were consecutive, Philadelphia has lost 100 or more games, breaking tie with Boston in both respects. In addition finished last place for sixteenth time and fifth successive time, breaking tie with Boston and Cincinnati. For the sixteenth year no National League player was credited with 200 hits.

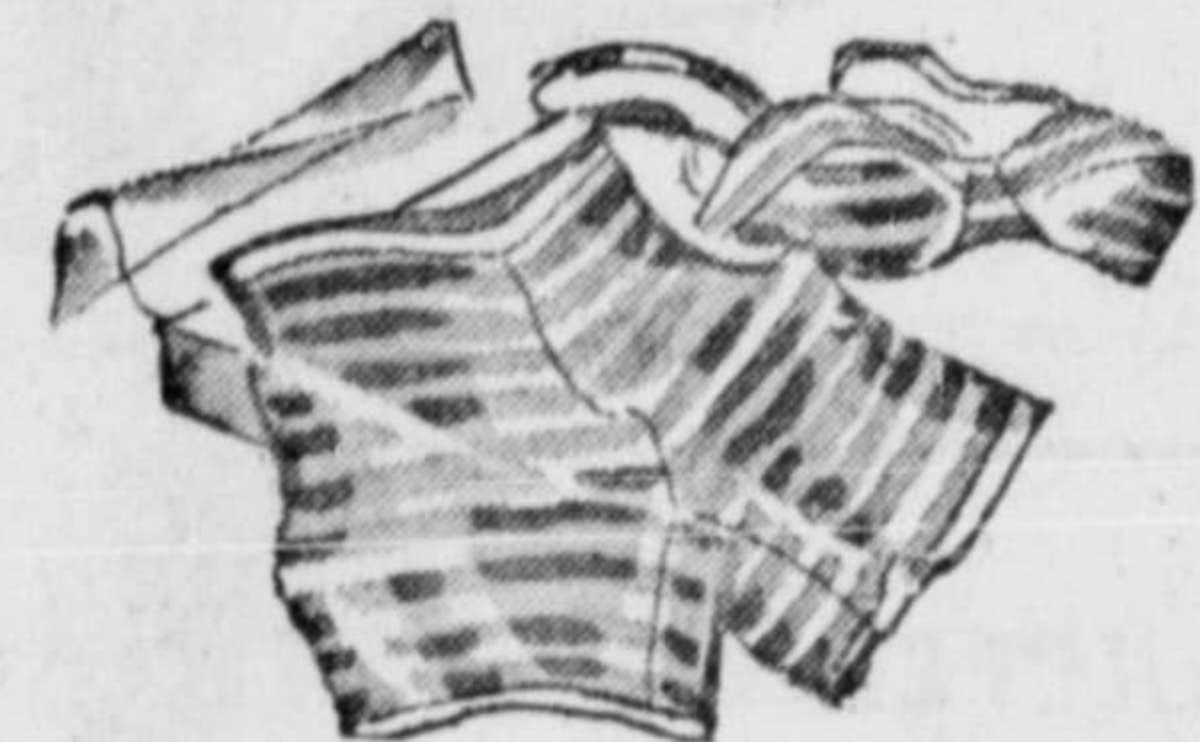

James Stewart, services administrator for the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, states that the order setting deliveries to one a day will be enforced during the Christmas shopping period.

"This Christmas will not be like the old peaceful holiday of pre-war days," says Mr. Stewart. "Labor, gasoline, rubber and vehicles are vitally needed for the armed services and war industries and must be conserved."

The board advises Christmas shoppers to carry as many parcels as they can in order to avoid overtaxing the one-a-day delivery facilities permitted under the regulations.

Early Christmas shopping, of course, is urgently advocated.

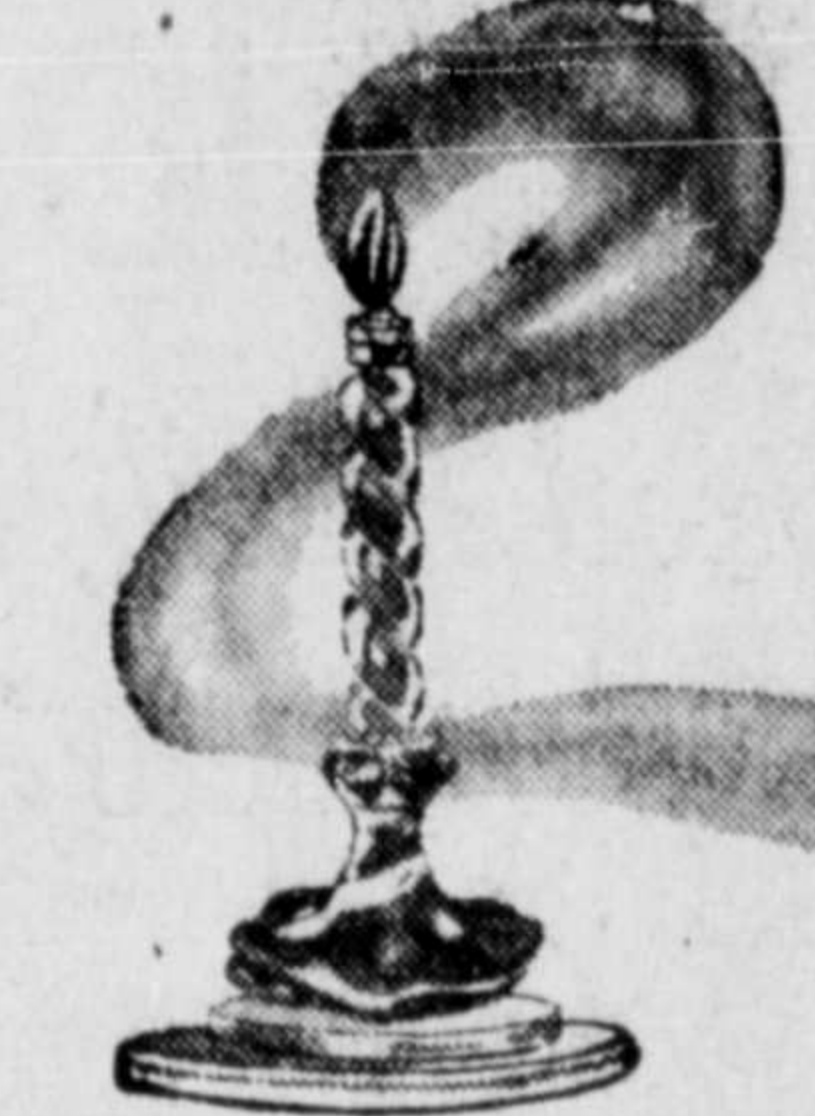

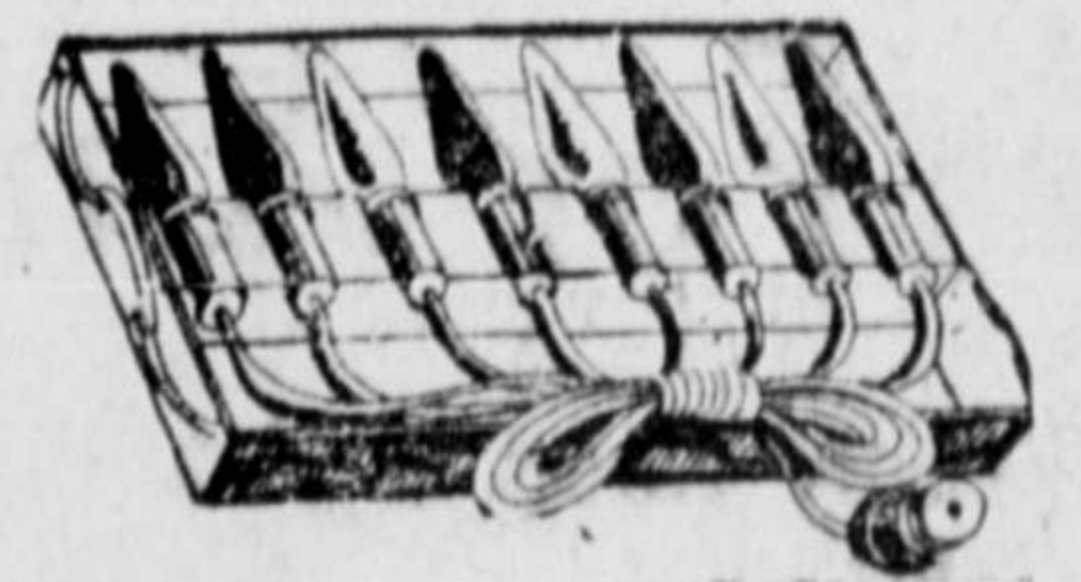

Waterfront Whiffs

B.C. Fisheries Helping to Feed Britain—
Fisheries Experimental Station in
New Home at Vancouver

A MERRY CHRISTMAS

Another Christmas will have come and gone in this busy wartime port before the Waterfront Whiffs appear again. Therefore, this institution of the Daily News takes occasion at this time to extend the compliments of the season to its readers. These are busy days, indeed, for all of us. We are, however, blessed in still being able to observe the festive season to a large extent in the old time-honored way in spite of restrictions here and there. That our Christmases may be no less merry than the impending one gives promise of being, is our hearty wish to all.

Statistics of the Department of Fisheries indicate the large quantities of canned salmon and herring that are going overseas to help feed wartime Britain, showing why, in spite of the heavy production on the British Columbia coast, it is difficult to obtain these varieties here. Canned salmon to the amount of 80,000,000 pounds has been shipped to Great Britain this year and canned herring amounting to 50,000,000 pounds. Large quantities of other varieties also have been sent overseas. Britishers always have been great fish-eaters, and the fact that Canadian fishermen are helping to maintain them on a normal healthful diet in times of stress, shows the important part the Canadian fishing industry is playing in the prosecution of the war.

The Pacific Fisheries Experimental Station, which was formerly located at Prince Rupert and which was recently moved to Vancouver, has now taken possession of the premises formerly occupied by the Coca Cola Co. on Richards Street, Vancouver. A contract has been placed with the Dominion Construction Co. Ltd. for the carrying out of extensive changes to the plant. The work will involve an expenditure of approximately \$18,000 and is being carried out for the federal government. It will consist of considerable alterations to each of the two floors of the structure to provide work space, chemicals rooms, laboratories, offices, storage and factory quarters. The job is to be finished by the end of the year.

Herring fishing boat tendermen have approved the offer of operators on this coast to pay the same scale as last year plus \$1.00 per ton of fish handled.

ANSWER TO COLLART

Editor, Daily News:

I have been handed a clipping of the Daily News of a letter signed by Theo Collart relating to "The wolf with a sheepskin" and the C. C. F.

It is deeply regrettable that any citizen should so grievously abuse freedom or sow dissension in these grave times, as to apply the epithet "wolf" or "wolves" to organized labor.

May I inform the gentleman that the fate of world freedom is now more dependent upon the "army" of organized labor than upon any other single factor. No other class of people on earth rate as high in honesty, loyalty and sacrifice. Labor creates the most wealth and gets the smallest share.

On what grounds then does he issue the false warning? Does he deny the right of honest labor to seek honest and sane administration by supporting the C. C. F.? Certainly all reason and logic condemn the position.

A majority of Canadian citizens established our laws.

The C. C. F. supports the sanctity of law in the protection of all without fear or favor.
