Newfoundland Ship Is Torpedoed

Stalingrad Crisis—

DARK HOUR FOR GREAT RUSS CITY

Red Army Forced to Retreat Four Times and Give Up Important Industrial Section

MOSCOW, Oct. 17 (CP)—Red Army troops, defiant against odds that forced four retreats through a strategically important industrial section of north Stalingrad, battled fiercely today to prevent the Germans from fanning out along the banks of the Volga and breaking into the flanks of defence. Stalingrad was experiencing the darkest hours of the siege as the Germans occupied the industrial settlement which had been a battlefield for weeks north of the city's heart and attempted to expand both north and south against the Soviet flanks. Although the Russians were forced to abandon the settlement, newspaper Red Star said they had checked the enemy outside that district. Dispatches said the battle was intensified as further Nazi reserves moved into line.

Berlin broadcasts asserted that the Germans had won the west bank of the Volga on a two-mile front.

CUTTING ON GOLD MINES

Further Curtailment of Precious Metal Industry to Produce Essential Metals

OTTAWA, Oct. 17 (CP)—Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King, in a prepared statement yesterday, said the government had found it necessary "to issue instructions that plans be formulated for further curtailment of gold mining as well as other non-war industries."

Pittsburg Has Big Explosion

Serious Blast and Fire in Steel Works Last Night

PITTSBURG, Oct. 17 — A huge explosion followed by rapid spread of fire occurred in the Continental Rolling and Steel Foundry, a large Pittsburg steel plant, last night. Casualties were not immediately announced although at least twenty men were known to have been taken to hospital suffering from injuries.

WAR NEWS

WORST MARINE DISASTER

OTTAWA—Canada has suffered its worst marine disaster of the war in the loss early Wednesday morning by torpedo attack from an enemy submarine of the steamer Caribou plying between Nova Scotia and Newfoundland. The vessel foundered soon after the attack which occurred as she was nearing Port Aux Basques from Sydney. The loss of life totalled 137, mostly passengers but including the master of the vessel, Capt. Benjamin Tavenor.

PREPARING FOR OFFENSIVE

LONDON—The disclosure of the sinking by British submarines of Axis supply ships in the Mediterranean coupled with the continued Axis aerial siege of Malta strengthen Allied suspicions of new shipments of reinforcements and material being sent to enemy armies in Egypt where an early resumption of intensive warfare is anticipated.

SITUATION IN SOLOMONS

WASHINGTON—The Japanese have landed large reinforcements with equipment including artillery on Guadalcanal and are now shelling American positions on the Island, the United States Navy has also been discovered near the Shortland Island about twenty-five miles northwest of Guadalcanal in addition to enemy naval units in the southeastern Solomons.

EXPLOSIVES FOR FRANCE

NEW YORK—Columbia Broadcasting System reports hearing a Vichy radio broadcast of a Laval government statement that "arms and explosives" had been dropped by parachute in French territory, ostensibly by Allied planes. The government at Vichy has warned French people against the use of such arms.

STALINGRAD IN PERIL

MOSCOW—The Red Army acknowledges the fourth withdrawal within Stalingrad inside of three days. Enemy forces outnumber the Russians and the situation is described as perilous. A factory district in the suburbs has been yielded to the Nazis whose new salient threatens the general defences of the Russians.

Naval Battle Looming Up

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 17 — With another large enemy fleet moving forward, the outlook for United States Marines holding strategic Guadalcanal Island on the Solomons is serious. The main base of the Japanese on this new drive against the Solomons is at Rabaul, New Britain. The newest enemy naval force is at Shortland Island. There are indications that a major naval battle may be due. Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox says that a "real, tough fight" is now in progress at Guadalcanal.

HONG KONG CASUALTIES

Names of 279 Canadians Listed as Being Prisoners Following Battle

OTTAWA, Oct. 17 (CP)—Names of 279 Canadians now officially reported prisoners of war in the hands of the Japanese as a result of the battle of Hong Kong were announced today in two casualty lists based on official reports received from Tokyo through the Red Cross.

POTOMAC RAMPAGE

Washington, D.C., Is Faced With Worst Flood Condition in Many Years

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 17—The Potomac River has gone on the rampage and Washington is threatened with the worst flood in years. Special precautions are being taken against possible disaster. The river has already risen 17 to 18 feet whereas the normal flood stage is seven feet. Elsewhere over a widespread region of this district flood conditions prevail. Four are known dead, scores missing and thousands homeless.

ANOTHER GAS CUT

Unit Now Uniform Throughout Canada at Three Gallons

OTTAWA, Oct. 17—The gasoline unit for ration purposes in Canada has been reduced from four to three gallons and is now uniform in nine provinces of the Dominion. Motorists with AA tickets will get forty-eight gallons—two gallons per week—between now and April 1. A, B and C licences will get from 180 to 243 gallons.

MANY AXIS AIRCRAFT ARE DOWN

No Less Than 105 Machines Destroyed Over Malta During Six Days

CAIRO, Oct. 17 (CP)—British fighters have shot down 105 Axis planes over Malta during the past six days and the Royal Navy torpedoed seven Axis troopships. Most of the enemy raiding planes were engaged by the British planes before they were able to do any damage. The Royal Air Force has announced. Yesterday nine more Axis planes were brought down over Malta. There were three air raid alarms there last night.



REAR-ADMIRAL G. C. JONES who has been appointed Vice-Chief of Naval Staff at Naval Service Headquarters, Ottawa. He succeeds Commodore H. E. Reid, R.C.N., who has been appointed Flag Officer Newfoundland Force. Since Sept. 3, 1940, Rear-Admiral Jones has been Commanding Officer Atlantic Coast.

Ration Boards Being Formed

Formation of local ration boards in British Columbia is now in progress under Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

To assist the committees which are to be set up, liaison officers have been appointed by the board. These officers will work in close collaboration with the local organizations and serve as a direct link between them and the regional and local offices of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

The needs of Prince Rupert and district will be looked after by Bruce Abel who will act both as ration officer and liaison man.

Foreigners Put On Spot

OTTAWA, Oct. 17—Nationals of neutral countries or of allied countries other than the United States, which are not raising forces in Canada, will be subject to compulsory services but may claim exemption on the grounds of their nationality, it is announced. When exemption is granted for that cause, the applicant forfeits forever the privilege of qualifying for Canadian citizenship and faces immediate deportation, when deportation becomes physically possible.

Bulletins

PREMIER KING GRAVE MONTREAL — Speaking here last night in support of the Third Victory Loan campaign, Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King struck a grave note. There was no sign, he said, of the tide of war having definitely turned as yet. He expressed the opinion that the people of the new world failed to realize the danger of their position.

FIGHTING AT DAKAR? VICHY—Axis sources report a fight at Dakar with an unidentified plane. It is supposed that hostilities have already commenced at the strategic west Africa coast port.

FURTHER REPRISALS BERLIN — Germany threatens further reprisals which may affect all Allied prisoners of war. Canadians who were taken at Dieppe have been transferred to a new prison camp.

RED CROSS UNLOADS AT A WEST COAST CANADIAN PORT—Red Cross supplies, which were to have been sent to Hong Kong but were denied safe passage by the Japanese government, have been discharged at this port. The shipment included flour, sugar, blankets, canned goods and other essentials.

DUKE PAYS VISIT OTTAWA—The new Duke of Connaught is paying a visit here with the Governor General and Princess Alice. He has come from Egypt where he has been on active service.

NEW MANPOWER PLAN OTTAWA—Elliott Little, director of selective service, is working on a plan for the diversion of 50,000 men monthly from non-essential industries into the armed forces and vital industries.

HELGELAND MISSING KETCHIKAN — The halibut schooner Helgeland has not reported from her final trip of the season to the fishing grounds and some fears are held for her safety.

AUSSIES SLOW UP

Bad Weather and Increased Resistance Hamper Advance on New Guinea

MELBOURNE, Oct. 17 — Bad weather and strong reinforced Japanese resistance has slowed up the Allied offensive against the Japanese on New Guinea, General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters announced.

The Japanese have occupied new positions on the northeast coast of New Guinea, extending their gains to several more villages, and now appear to be digging in.

RAID ON ENGLAND

Luftwaffe Attacks Three Towns on Northeast Coast—Light Damage and No Casualties

LONDON, Oct. 17—Three towns in a district on the northeast coast of England were attacked by German bombing planes last night, one of the raiders being brought down. Some damage was done and there were no casualties. British bombers were inactive over enemy territory last night following daylight attacks yesterday on northern France and Holland.

Death Toll Placed at 137 in Worst Tragedy For Canada on Ocean

Ruthless Nazi Submarine Sinking of Steamer Caribou Nearing Port Aux Basques From Sydney

SYDNEY, Nova Scotia, Oct. 17 (CP)—An Axis torpedo, launched in pre-dawn dark, sent the steamship Caribou to the bottom and 137 passengers perished in the sinking of the passenger vessel on her run across Cabot Strait from Nova Scotia to Newfoundland. The blackest maritime tragedy in the history of naval warfare off

Canada's coasts was lightened only by the Canadian Navy's rescue of 101 out of 238 men, women and children who started off on the trip only six hours before the torpedo struck on the morning of October 14. Fifty-four of the dead were Canadians and thirteen Americans. A large group of fifty-seven Newfoundlanders and a number of Royal Navy seamen were also among the victims. In all 57 service men perished. Sixteen were women—one the first Canadian navy nursing sister to die on duty—and fourteen were children. The Newfoundland crew of forty-six gave up thirty-one men fighting to the last to push their ship at the surfaced U-boat in an attempt to ram her.

As the U-boat, launching the torpedo from underwater, came to the surface to watch the end of the Caribou, it broke water directly beneath a lifeboat and one of the two life rafts, upsetting them and adding to the toll.

Ten survivors struggled in the sea for three hours and it was another two hours before all were taken aboard naval vessels of Canada which came to the rescue. A mother, with baby in her arms, was among those picked up. Many of the survivors are suffering from exposure.

Westerners lost on the Caribou were Wilfrid Hathaway of Victoria, Preston Holloway of Edmonton and Mrs. Randell of Winnipeg.

The Caribou had almost made her destination of Port Aux Basques, Newfoundland, when the attack occurred. She went down within a few minutes.

Commenting on the sinking of the Caribou, Minister of the Navy Angus Macdonald said that nothing more could be needed to bring proof to Canadians of the hideousness of Nazi submarine warfare.

MASSED IN MACEDONIA

Seven German Divisions Ready For Attack Upon Egypt or Iran

ANKARA, Oct. 17 — Seven German divisions have been massed in Macedonia, according to reports received here. They may move upon Egypt and possibly Iran at the same time.

EDITORIAL

Third Victory Loan...

The sale of Canada's Third Victory Loan commences this coming Monday. Confident that Prince Rupert people appreciate the vital necessity of this loan being a success and convinced that this is a most easy way to support the war effort and at the same time protect one's own future, we unhesitatingly forecast that this campaign, increased though the quota may be, will be just as great a success as the two previous ones have been. We really do not believe it is necessary for us to try to persuade our readers of the desirability in every way of buying Victory Bonds, even if we have to go without something else to do so, but, on the eve of the campaign, we might offer a few appropriate thoughts on the matter.

When an individual, either as an enemy agent or as an honest person who believes what he says, whispers that Canada's Victory Loan bonds will not be cashed after the war, he does not go far enough. To be consistent, and fair, he should add that any future condition in this country which would cancel out the value of Victory Bonds would also make all life insurance policies worthless. He should explain that savings accounts would be wiped out. He should point out that all dollar bills, five dollar bills, or any other kind of currency, including silver coins, would be just something to toss into the ash can.

Victory Bonds cannot be set aside as something separate and apart from other obligations of this, our country. They are just as sacred a "promise to pay" as the one dollar bills we carry in our pockets.

These bonds are held by the people of Canada. And the only way through which they could be repudiated would be by a decision of the people of Canada not to pay themselves back.

The pessimist is out of order in Canada. The assets and resources of this country which back up these loans from the people are billions and billions of dollars in excess of the loan totals. Even with all the borrowing that has had to be done since the start of the war in 1939, the interest cost of Canada's total debt to this date, is only 189 million dollars a year.

Canadians can and will meet indebtedness of that size. Fifty years from now our children and our children's children will likely smile quietly at the small financial problem which we thought was so big.

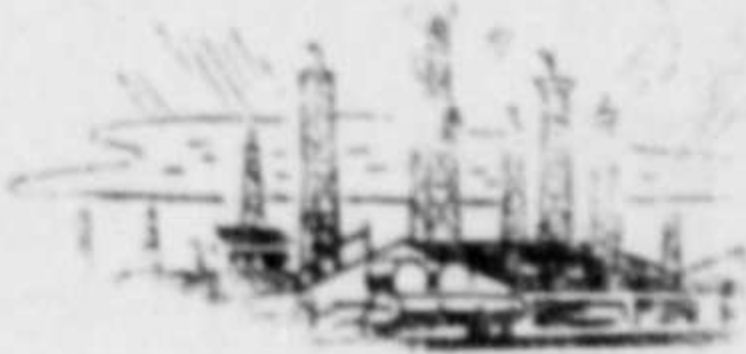

Twenty-year old Lou Melnar, one of Brantford's leading young golfers and champion of the Arrowdale municipal club in that Western Ontario city's precincts, has enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force.

Ernie Munday, former Montreal and Washington Eagles hockey ace, who holds the rank of sergeant in the Canadian army, is now sports director at Huntingdon, Quebec, Basic Training Centre.

Munday is very interested in the centre's entry in the Quebec Rugby Football Union and he's quoted as saying he'll have the best conditioned team in the league. It seems the team is never too tired to dress for evening football drills even after regular daily military training periods. Among the lads turning out for the team is Johnny Rinddy who formerly played for Ottawa St. Pats. Tommy Osborne, a newcomer to the game of football, but no newcomer to boxing fans in Montreal, is nother one of the soldiers trying for a place on the team. Bob Rand and Eddie Dyson, well-known Vancouver basketball players, both are in the R.C.A.F.

NAVY VERY IMPORTANT

It's Increasing, Says African High Commissioner—Highlights of News From the Cape

CAPE TOWN, Oct. 17 (C) — The Union of South Africa, like Canada, has established extensive price control regulations, and important changes were made in the set-up recently.

Purchaser and seller have been made responsible for observance of the maximum price, and if goods are sold above the legal price limit the vendor may be ordered to refund twice the amount of the excess price irrespective of court penalties; goods displayed for sale must bear a ticket stating the maximum price. Commodities for ex-

port now come under price control regulations as well.

Importation of goods by parcel post for trade purposes has been banned as from Oct. 1. Delivery of such parcels is forbidden unless the sender declares on the package that contents are not for trade purposes or unless the addressee makes a similar declaration.

The Social Security Congress attended by 1,000 delegates at Durban is said by authorities to indicate the mood of Union citizens. Proceedings revealed that the government is paying serious attention to the desirability of including a social security code in the constitution. Certain cabinet ministers of the Union were approached for a ruling on the legality of South African soldiers on active service standing for parliament.

South Africa's Defences

An important conference on South African defence has just been concluded in Durban. Maj-

Gen. deVilliers, officer in command of the Union's coastal defences, and Vice-Admiral Tait, commander of the South Atlantic Fleet, were among those attending.

Lord Harlech, High Commissioner in South Africa for the United Kingdom, stated recently that the strategic importance of the Union from the naval viewpoint is steadily increasing, and that the strength of the navy in South Africa is growing from week to week. Durban and Simonstown are increasingly becoming key bases of the Allied Nations, he said. Lord Harlech spoke in Johannesburg at the unfurling of the ensign flown by H.M.S. Barham at the battle of Matapan.

Lay Up Cars

The Union government has sanctioned the building program proposed by the Johannesburg city council. One scheme involves an outlay of £160,000 (\$715,200) for

the construction of 200 houses for Europeans; the other is a housing project for colored peoples costing £150,000 (\$670,500).

Natal motorists who have been forced to lay up their cars may obtain a rebate on their licence fees if the cars are sealed by inspectors. The price of gasoline has been increased one penny a gallon, and lubricating oil one penny a pint. The cost of gasoline on the Rand is two and ninepence (60 cents) a gallon.

The St. Andrews Building Society is loaning £340,000 (\$1,520,000) to the government's new drive which will be used to purchase 20 tanks.

WAR-TIME HIGH

Sweden's business trend index maintained by the Swedish Financial Journal rose 1.2 point during July to a total of 121.9, a war-time high.

Timely Recipes

SQUASH PIE

2½ cups cooked squash
1 egg
½ cup granulated sugar
½ teaspoon each ground ginger, cinnamon, and nutmeg
1 3-4 cups milk
1 teaspoon salt
Mix sugar, salt, spices with the squash. Beat egg, add milk and combine mixtures. Pour into a deep, eight inch pie plate lined with pastry. Bake in a hot oven 400 degrees for 10 minutes. Reduce the heat to 350 degrees and continue baking till filling is set.

The canned salmon pack for the British Columbia coast this season amounts to 1,348,201½ cases as compared with 1,668,418 cases in 1941. The Skeena River pack is 316,552½ cases as against 361,080 cases in 1941 and the Naas River pack 52,268½ cases compared with 35,694 cases. The sockeye pack for the whole coast this year has been 626,908 cases as against 454,094 cases in 1941. The Skeena River sockeye pack was 57,562 cases this year as compared with 110,332 cases a year ago. This year's pink pack on the Skeena was 145,115 cases compared with 73,901 cases a year ago. Pack for other varieties on the Skeena this year were: springs, 7,302 cases; steelheads, 4,655 cases; cohoes, 70,658½ cases; chums, 32,260 cases. These figures are not quite but almost complete for the entire season.

The Fisheries Research Board of Canada, in its latest progress report, pays tribute to Dr. H. N. Brocklesby on the occasion of his resignation from the service of the board. The acknowledgment of Dr. Brocklesby's resignation is as follows:

"Dr. H. N. Brocklesby, F.I.C., F.R.S.C., F.C.I.C., terminated on September 19 his services as Chief Chemist on the staff of the Pacific Fisheries Experimental Station to assume the position of Director of Research of the Farallon Division of the Bordon Co., Pier 92, San Francisco, California. After first becoming associated with the Fisheries Research Board of Canada (then Biological Board of Canada) as a summer worker at the Pacific Biological Station, Nanaimo, B.C., Dr. Brocklesby joined the staff of the Pacific Fisheries Experimental Station at Prince Rupert in September, 1926, as chemist. An indefatigable research worker himself, he and a succession of associates during the past sixteen years have contributed much to the knowledge of the chemistry, technology and commercial applications of fishery products, particularly oils and vitamins. It was from the chemical laboratories of the Prince Rupert Station, under Dr. Brocklesby's supervision, that attention was first drawn in 1927 to the vitamin content of B.C. dogfish liver oil; investigations of the pharmaceutical and commercial utilizations of pilchard and other fish oils followed, and in 1930-31 he and his associates were instrumental in calling attention to the high vitamin A and D potencies of the liver oil from the Pacific coast halibut. In 1933 the Board published a widely-accepted Bulletin (No. 37) entitled "The Industrial Chemistry of Fish Oils with Particular Reference to those of British Columbia," written jointly by Dr. Brocklesby and O. F. Denstedt. The publication of this Bulletin led to recognition of the Station as a centre of research on marine oils and several further lines of investigation were followed by Dr. Brocklesby, including methods for obtaining the maximum amount of oil and vitamins from fish, their livers and other organs; the stabilization of such oils, and the development of useful industrial products through various processings. To incorporate advances made in these fields at the Station and elsewhere, a larger Bulletin (No. 59) entitled "The

Chemistry and Technology of Marine Animal Oils with Particular Reference to those of Canada" was published in 1941 with Dr. Brocklesby as editor and chief contributor from the staff. Recently Dr. Brocklesby has been engaged in some research on production of vitamin A oils and their direct application in the war effort. The loss of Dr. Brocklesby's services as an employee of the Fisheries Research Board will be keenly felt even though in his new position he will not be entirely disassociating himself from Canadian industries. It is not anticipated that an appointment to the position of Chief Chemist on the Station staff will be made for the present. The Director and other members of the Station's chemical staff will carry on Dr. Brocklesby's work for the time being. We extend to "Brock" every wish for success in his new endeavour, as well as to Miss Norma Rogers, Senior Technician in Chemistry, who has also resigned and will be associated with him in his new laboratories.

Halibut fishing for the 1942 season is now completely over. Now permits for incidental halibut fishing have also expired, their issuance having been terminated this week.
