

## RUPERT TO MEET HAZELTON IN BALL GAME JULY 1

### PROTEST HAS BEEN ENTERED AGAINST THE MONEY BYLAWS

Letter From the Solicitor Acting for the Citizen's Committee in the Matter is Now in the Hands of the City Clerk, and Will be Read to the Mayor and Council on Monday Night Next---Announces That Application Will be Made to Have the Bylaws Quashed

Prince Rupert, B. C. June 19th, 1912.

To the Mayor and City Council, Prince Rupert, B. C.

Re Money Bylaws.

Dear Sirs: Regarding the recent poll on the money bylaws, I beg to state that I am acting for a certain committee of property holders in Prince Rupert, who object to the said money bylaws being carried and enforced, and in case they are carried I am instructed to have them quashed on various grounds.

I understand that at various times during the conduct of the poll, several voters were allowed in the balloting compartments at one time and also that certain aldermen were in the balloting compartments with voters instructing them how to vote, contrary to the Municipal Elections

Act. In consequence of this, of course there was no secret ballot, as provided for by this act.

I may also say with regard to several of the bylaws that the vote polled in favor thereof did not amount to three-fifths of the persons who voted upon them, which majority is required by Section 203 of the Municipal Act.

A further objection is that there was no voters' list made up from the last assessment roll and that the list used contained the names of persons who had sold their property in Prince Rupert and who were no longer the assessed owners of land in the municipality.

These are some of the reasons upon which this committee is taking the stand that it does, and I am bringing them before your attention so that you will be early apprised of the fact that an application will be made to quash the bylaws, if they are carried by the council and any attempt is

made to enforce them. Yours very truly,

Above are the terms of the protest entered against the money bylaws which were declared passed by vote of the people and further declared carried by the city council on Monday night. It is intended, no doubt, to act upon them as if all were in order, but this will certainly not be done with the consent of the citizens objecting. The facts set forth in the letter of protest quoted above are vouched for and can be proved. The aldermen who entered the polling booth may have done so ignorantly, but their doing so was nevertheless contrary to the Municipal Clauses Act and should render the ballot void. On Monday evening next the letter of protest will be read in council. It would have been read last Monday but the document was not at that time ready.

### SALMON BEAR RIVER Mining Co.'s Property Makes Good Showing.

Mr. O. B. Bush, managing director of the Salmon Bear River Mining Company, returned to the city yesterday after visiting the company's property on the Salmon River. His report is highly satisfactory, and he is more than satisfied with the progress being made. He states that another large vein of solid silver-lead ore of from 8 to 16 feet wide has been opened up in three different places. The company expects to have blocked out \$500,000 worth of ore by the fall. Altogether, everything is looking very promising for the future of the Portland Canal mining district, although just at present things are rather quiet and nothing much doing in the stock market.

### FLYING 'BUS FELL DOWN

Five Passengers in Big Airship Imperiled by Collapse of the Big Machine—One Leg Broken; No One Killed.

Nagiers, France, June 18.—The second day of the Aero Club of France's grand prix races was marked by the falling of an aero bus carrying five passengers. The legs of one were broken and the others escaped uninjured. Sixteen aviators started in the events.

### SCHOOL MAY HAVE GROUNDS

At Meeting of the Trustees Yesterday Plans for Improving the Playground Space Available Were Considered—Have \$5,000.

Prince Rupert's fine public school building stands on grounds which are capable of considerable improvement. As playgrounds parts of them are marshy still and unsuitable. At the meeting yesterday afternoon of the school trustees it was decided to look over the ground with the city engineer and see if something cannot be done during the vacation to have the playgrounds improved to the extent of the \$5,000 appropriation available. Another matter arranged for is the engaging of two more teachers, to take up duties on the resumption of school. Teachers obliged to relinquish their duties temporarily will have their time doctored and the deficiency in staff created will be filled by the services of a teacher provided by the board. Two months' salaries were passed to give the staff their holiday fund as usual beforehand.

### WET WEATHER IN LONDON

Metropolis Has First Dry Day of Month—Some Scientists Attribute Wet Weather to Volcanic Activity in Alaska.

London, June 18.—Thursday last was the first day of the present month on which no rain fell. The total rainfall to that date was two inches, nearly equal to the average for the whole month of June. The betting in consequence of this enormous rainfall is four to one in favor of a dry July and three to one that August and September will be dry.

Some scientists are attributing the unusual wet weather to the eruption of Katmai, Alaska. The eruptions of Krakatoa in 1883 and Vesuvius were followed by prolonged wet spells.

**LEOPARD AND ETHIOPIAN.**

"What's bred in the bone" was the heading of The News' editorial written in reply to that libelous one published in the Evening Empire which has just cost its writer \$1,500 at least. Today The News will vary the proverb and ask in the words of prophet of old: "Can the Ethiopian change his skin, or the leopard his spots?"

It would be difficult to imagine an editor in his sane mind capable of coming straight from a court room, where he had just been found guilty of a gross libel on a private citizen, and sitting down deliberately to pen another page or two calculated to place not only one but several other citizens in the worst possible light in the eyes of their fellow townsmen and the outside world. Yet this is what the Empire's comment on Tuesday's libel case does.

The Empire while the case was still undecided bravely promised a full report of proceedings. After the decision, however, where is the Empire's report? Can it be that the paper which makes a boast of being "always reliable," and which can usually be counted upon to report every word of the mayoral utterances, has not courage enough to quote his evidence in the witness box on Tuesday?

With a whining headline to the effect that "Newton's bitter opponents are selected as judges," this bold editor "downed for the first time in the history of the city" throws contempt upon the high court of justice which tried his case on Tuesday. He names each and severally the citizens called to serve on the jury, and characterizes them generally as men so disreputable that they would dare to take solemnly the jurymen's oath to deal justly and impartially, and would yet deliberately perjure themselves by bringing in a partial and unjust verdict. Thus does our mayor respect a group of his fellow citizens, amongst which may be read the names of several who have been his personal friends.

Thus fresh from his lost libel suit does the editor of the Evening Empire advertise to the community that he cannot take his medicine like a man, but must whine and snarl like a whipped cur biting at the heels of those who have justly chastised it. Regarded professionally and in the light of the recent libel suit, the Empire's comments on the case show very plainly that the citizens who fancied the press of Prince Rupert would be improved by the lesson administered in libel law have been mistaken at least as regards one paper, and that one the very paper punished. Only an editor who could admit unblushingly in the witness box that after twenty-five years' experience he wrote without troubling to investigate facts or to consider effects, could so astoundingly return to his old groove. There is but one comment to make upon such conduct: "Can the Ethiopian change his skin, or the leopard his spots?"

**FAMOUS TRAIL HUSKIES ARE LIABLE SOON TO BE SUPERSEDED**

Various Suggestions Being Made for Improvement on the System of Sledge Hauling by Dog Train in the North—Reindeer Believed Likely to Prove Popular



Dawson, June 17—On the grounds that the malamutes, huskies and other dogs used for working in the north eat too much, the agitation for the more general use of the reindeer is growing apace in the Yukon Territory.

Although the Dominion Government failed to appropriate money for the propagation of reindeer, the matter will be urged on parliament until favorable action is taken. It is pointed out that Lapland, Finland and other countries whence came the reindeer, long ago learned the economy of these animals over dogs. Enthusiastic over the plan to raise more reindeer in the north, Mr. I. R. Warn, returning from the Peel river district, said recently: "Reindeer would have a three fold advantage. They would supply a dependable source of meat, would be a means of transportation and would displace the packs of dogs which new devour



a vast share of the native caribou herds.

"Many do not understand how costly the dogs are. They must live. They will eat far more than a man.

"I know of one party of three hunters in the Peel country, which killed 125 caribou, and the number lasted only one season

or less. The men ate extensively of the meat, but by far the greater share was devoured by the dogs.

"If the reindeer were used by Indians and whites, the dogs could be done away with. Not only would the reindeer be available for food, but far more caribou would be available for the use of man."

**IN NEW ZEALAND, TOO**

**WINDSTORM LAYS VILLAGE LOW**

Gale Does Immense Damage; Causes Big Loss of Life in Kayloe, Okla.—Not a House Left Standing in the Town.

Guthrie, Okla., June 18.—Sixty or more houses in the villages of Kayloe, Okla., were

smashed by a terrific gale last night, but every person in the town, which has a population of 300, escaped and only two were hurt, according to news advices received here yesterday afternoon. The message declared that not a building in the village remained standing.

Altogether, twenty persons have been killed throughout the state.

WOULD EMPLOY PUBLICITY MAN

More Scientific Methods of Advertising Considered Necessary to Keep the Advantages of South Vancouver Before the World.

South Vancouver, June 17—So that the merits of South Vancouver may be more broadly and scientifically advertised, the employment of a publicity expert is to be considered by the Board of Trade at the forthcoming meeting. The employment of a publicity manager will be taken up, and it may be that the committee will decide that this is the most modern as well as most efficient method of handling the funds contributed by the council for advertising South Vancouver. North Vancouver has a very able expert, and the fruits of his good work are already apparent.
