# Alaska Base Is One British Force Is Mopped Up But General Rommel's Nazis Attacked By

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 3 (CP)—The United States Navy announced today that four Japanese bombers and about fifteen fighters attacked Dutch Harbor, Alaska, about 6 o'clock local time today and the attack lasted fifteen minutes.

Dutch Harbor is an important United States air and naval base on the westerly tip of the Alaska Peninsula to the east of the Aleutian Islands. It is about 1,800 miles by a direct line west of Prince Rupert and about 2,000 miles east of Japan.


