Madagascar Is Now In Limelight

HELD UP BY THAW

Northern Front Sees Principal Activity In Russo-German War Heavy Nazi Sea Losses

MOSCOW, April 23:—The spring thaw has reduced to a minimum the Russian offensive against the Nazis on the southern and central fronts but to the north in the sector west of Leningrad, where winter still holds sway, the Red Army continues to smash Finnish resistance with the main fighting between Lake Ladoga and Lake Onega.

It is announced at Red Army headquarters that 126 German tanks were destroyed in recent heavy fighting on the southern front.

Another Russian statement says that 83 German ships, totalling 200,000 tonnage, have been listed as sunk in northern waters. The latest Nazi victims have been a 5,000-ton tanker and a 5,000-ton transport.

An official Russian spokesman, Kubyshv, declared today that Germany had recently called up a total of 1,900,000 reserves.

PACEMAKERS ON DIAMOND

Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Yankees Continuing to Show Way in Big Leagues

BROOKLYN, April 23:—The Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Yankees continue uninterrupted in their roles as pacemakers in the big league baseball season. The Bums and the Yanks played scoreless ball yesterday until the twelfth inning when Brooklyn made four runs to break the deadlock. The Yanks slugged out an 11 to 5 victory over the Philadelphia Athletics in American League.

RAID WAS VALUABLE

Commandos Got Useful Information and Carried Out Sabotage—Canadians Among Them

LONDON, April 23:—British commandos, returning yesterday from their raid in the vicinity of Boulogne on the French invasion coast, in first hand accounts, reported having found thousands of laborers engaged in the building of fortifications, evidently against an Allied invasion. The raid was valuable as a reconnaissance and sabotage operation. Not a single man was lost. The commandos ranged up and down the coast for a couple of hours as naval boats stood off shore.

Douglas Amaron, Canadian Press correspondent, accompanied the commandos among whom were Canadians.

Dispatches from Stockholm to London today said that, following yesterday's commando raid at Boulogne, German expectancy of land preparations for an Allied invasion in western Europe had considerably increased.

OTTAWA—M. J. Coldwell M. P. was yesterday unanimously chosen C.C.F. leader in succession to the late J. S. Woodsworth. The choice was made at a C. C. F. caucus.

ARCHBISHOP ENTHRONED

Most Rev. William Temple Elevated At Solemn Ceremony At Canterbury Today

CANTERBURY, April 23:—In a solemn ceremony such as had its origin centuries ago, Most Rev. William Temple was installed today as Archbishop of Canterbury and Primate of All England, succeeding Most Rev. Cosmo Gordon Lang who resigned January 21 at the age of seventy-eight.

Archbishop Temple said: "If the Christian movement and all hopes connected with it are to prevail, the Axis must be defeated."

Only Two Jap Families Are Left Locally

Of the many Japanese who were formerly resident in Prince Rupert area only two families are now left and their departure for the central pool at Hastings Park, Vancouver, has been delayed only because of illness. One of the families is at North Pacific and the other at Osland. There are seven in one family and five in the other.

Port Arthur Bear Cats and Ottawa Flyers Now On Even Terms

TORONTO, April 23:—Port Arthur Bear Cats defeated Ottawa Flyers 4 to 3 last night to extend the Allan Cup senior hockey final series to the fifth and deciding game which will be played Saturday night. Each team has now won two games.

War News

R. A. F. ACTIVE AGAIN

LONDON—The Royal Air Force reopened its weather-interrupted offensive last night with attacks on enemy objectives in the Rhineland and at LeHavre on the French invasion coast.

SOVIET NAVY BUSY

KUBYSHEV—Soviet naval units are reported to have sunk two more Axis vessels in Arctic waters, a maritime accomplishment to the Red Army drives against German-Finnish positions on the northern front.

SICILY AIR-RAIDED

ROME—An Italian announcement admits that two Sicilian towns were raided by the British Royal Air Force last night.

BRITISH NAVY OFF TOULON

VICHY—A strong British naval squadron is reported to be cruising in the Mediterranean off Toulon in which port important units of the French fleet are undergoing overhaul. A new British 35,000-ton battleship is said to be one of the squadron.

CIVILIAN PROTECTION COMMITTEE (A. R. P.) PRINCE RUPERT AREA

A test of all sections of the A. R. P. will be carried out on Sunday afternoon, April 26.

On the sound of the sirens, which will give the Imminent Danger signal of five blasts, repeated three times, all members will proceed immediately to their posts and will continue to man their posts until the signal of three blasts is sounded, repeated three times.

On the Imminent Danger signal all civilian cars will pull into the curb to a stop and will remain stationary until permitted to proceed by the police.

RESUMING OFFENSIVE

Royal Air Force Is Again Bombing Western Germany and Occupied France

LONDON, April 23 (Canadian Press)—On the eve of St. George's Day the Royal Air Force resumed the aerial offensive against the Rhineland and occupied France last night. Four of the British planes are missing. LeHavre was the principal point on the French coast to be attacked, its docks being bombed.

Yesterday the Cherbourg Peninsula with its enemy airdromes had been attacked, all planes returning safely.

Berlin admitted the attacks on western Germany.

Last night British big guns fired at the enemy across Dover Straits. A few Nazi planes came over the Thames estuary and the south coastal area of England last night but no damage or casualties were reported.

IN BATTLE OF BURMA

Chinese Troops Are Still Mopping Up Japanese Near Yenanyuang Chungking Claims

CHUNGKING, April 23:— Chungking reports that Chinese troops are mopping up the last Japanese forces clinging to villages immediately down river from recaptured Yenanyuang, and the invaders' lines have been pushed back three to four miles south of that West Burma town.

This was said by a Chinese army spokesman today.

A Tokyo broadcast today claimed that, aside from hold-out fighters on Mount Baloy, Japanese troops had broken all resistance of United States and Filipino forces on Panay Island of the central Philippines.

Is Injured In Railway Yards

Alex Stormont In Grave Condition In Westminster Hospital

NEW WESTMINSTER, April 23:—Alex Stormont, aged 57, of Port Coquitlam, is in grave condition with injuries sustained yesterday in a fall in the railway yards while trying to board a locomotive.

Reign of Terror On Strategic Isle Off East African Coast

Hundreds of DeGaullists Are Arrested—Laval May Be Planning To Give It Over To Japan—Already Nipponese Has French Ships

LONDON, April 23: (CP)—Virtual reign of terror on the key French island of Madagascar off the east coast of Africa with the arrest of hundreds of sympathizers with General Charles DeGaulle's Free French movement is reported today amid quickening speculation that France's pro-German Premier, Pierre Laval, may be planning to turn the island over to Japan. Madagascar lies athwart the vital Allied communication lines with India.

These reports coincided with the announcement that the Union of South Africa had broken off relations with Vichy.

In London, meanwhile, a British spokesman said: "It is reported that fifty thousand tons of French shipping has been taken over by Japan."

In Vichy Laval himself received the Japanese ambassador - designate Takonobu Mitani.

At Washington a clean-cut break between United States and Vichy is expected. Five members of the Vichy embassy at Washington have resigned in protest against the new Laval government of France.

FOOTBALL STARTING

Local League This Year Will Consist Entirely of Military Teams

Confined entirely to military teams this year since civilians, although invited found it impossible to enter, the Prince Rupert Football Association will open the 1942 season on Tuesday of next week. There will be five teams in competition—Area Headquarters, Edmonton Fusiliers, Navy, Seal Cove and Royal Canadian Corps of Signals. There will be games each Tuesday and Thursday evening. S. P. Woodside has been appointed official referee for the season.

The first competition will be for the Gilhuly Cup with the opening game next Tuesday between Area Headquarters and Edmonton Fusiliers.

Advance Poll In Plebiscite

Voting Starts Today In Prince Rupert As Well As Elsewhere In Canada

Voting is going on today in the plebiscite advance poll in Prince Rupert among two hundred points in Canada. The poll is open from 2 to 10 p.m. today, Friday and Saturday at the office of the returning officer, T. W. Brown.

FIGHTING IN TIMOR

Allied Forces Are Still Resisting Japanese Invasion

MELBOURNE, April 23:—United Nations' headquarters in Australia report that Australian and Dutch forces are still fighting in the interior of the half-Dutch, half-Portuguese island of Timor, 400 miles off the northwest tip of Australia.

The Japanese base at Rabaul, New Britain, has been bombed again by Allied planes, Allied headquarters also reported.

Summer Train Service To Be Same This Year

Summer train service on the Jasper-Prince Rupert line of the Canadian National Railways this year will be similar to that of last year, it was intimated this morning at the office of the divisional superintendent here. Starting towards the end of June, there will be one full passenger train weekly in and out and three mixed trains.

ESTEEMED CITIZEN

Many At Funeral of Christ Johnsen—Sketch of Career

Funeral services for the late Christian Marelus Johnsen were held Tuesday afternoon at St. Paul's Lutheran Church, which was beautifully decorated and filled with neighbors and friends of the deceased. The services were in charge of the pastor J. H. Myrwang.

Peter Lien presided at the organ. A sextet, composed of members of the Varden Singers, sang one of the old favorite Norwegian funeral hymns "Bedre Kan Jeg Ikke Fare, End At Fare Til Min Gud." Hymns sung by the congregation were "What Friend We Have in Jesus," and "I Know of a Sleep in Jesus Name."

The text of the pastor's message was from Mark, 16: 3-4.

The members of the Church Council and friends served as ushers and pall bearers. They were John Murvold, Anfelt Antonsen, Peter Leland, E. Evensen, Jens Moen, Hartvik Gulbransen, Ingvar Feness and Gust Mostad. There was a large and beautiful display of floral wreaths brought by the family, neighbors and friends.

In addition, a large number of memorial gifts were presented in gifts of money that will be used to provide some specific part in furnishing the new church. Such articles will be provided as a special memorial of Christ Johnsen who had also served efficiently as a member of the building committee for the church.

Deceased's Career

Christian Marlius Johnsen, whose parents were Johan and Jonette Andersen, was born at Punsvik, near Narvik, Norway, May 4, 1886. He left Norway in 1902 at the age of 18 years and came to Wisconsin where he, as a young man, secured work on farms, and very soon also in other projects that required skill, intelligence and mechanical interest. He soon became a leader in whatever he undertook to do. A short time later he was in Montana, active as a contractor in railroad building. From there he went to Canada and worked in drilling and blasting on the new transcontinental railway that finally reached Prince Rupert. Then he went to Anyox where he soon became a leading figure in building operations connected with the mining industry at that place.

During the last World War he returned to Norway, was married, and returned to Anyox, leaving his young wife in Norway. In 1922 Mr. Johnsen went to Norway again, returning after a few months together with his wife and baby daughter, Mimi. Altogether Mr. Johnsen worked at Anyox for 16 years. During the last 17 years the family has lived in Prince Rupert where Mr. Johnsen and his family have become prominent respected and active in numerous worthwhile endeavors.

Mr. Johnsen was a very capable man in many lines. He was a builder, not only for himself, but for the city, and community as such. He succeeded in whatever he undertook to do. He and his family have been active members and leaders in the local St. Paul's Lutheran Church, where he for many years has been a member of the Church Council and also a member of the Board of Deacons.

For several months it was apparent that both his physical and mental health failed, rapidly and completely. He suffered greatly, especially mentally. He passed away at his home in the early morning of April 18.

Left to mourn the departure of a loving and faithful husband and a devoted father are Mrs. Lottie Johnsen, the widow, and the following children: Mimi, John, Peter, Arne and Clarice.

Three sisters of Mr. Johnsen are living in Wisconsin and Chicago. Relatives are also living in Seattle.

TOLD ABOUT CATHEDRALS

Ronald Bridgett Speaks To Hoc H. Here on Monday

At the regular meeting of the Prince Rupert Group of Hoc H on Monday evening, with Harold Hampton presiding, guest speaker was Ronald Bridgett who gave an interesting and instructive lecture on some of the cathedrals of England and their architecture.

Mr. Bridgett had prepared sketches to illustrate the various types of architecture in regard to the influence of each period and pointed out that architecture combined utility with beauty. Although certain columns, arches or buttresses were of great beauty, they were also integral parts of the necessary strengthening or support of roof dome or wall.

Some very fine illustrations were also shown from books dealing with this subject.

Mr. Bridgett took his listeners back to historic Stonehenge, the Roman period, Saxon, Norman, Gothic perpendicular, renaissance, and in a most interesting manner showed the gradual changes and modifications of course in many cases. In fact most cathedrals combined styles of architecture. Salisbury Cathedral proved the exception, being built entirely in the early English, began and completed 1220 to 1266.

Lincoln Cathedral was particularly mentioned as being one of the most beautiful as compared with some of the finest continental cathedrals.

Mr. Bridgett's audience was only too sorry that this would most likely be their only opportunity to enjoy a glimpse into a very fascinating subject, from one so well versed in the study of such things, as Mr. Bridgett was leaving for Vancouver.

Weather Still Holding Up Halibut Fleet—Glut Feared—George Re-Returning To Run.

Unfortunately weather is still preventing the halibut fleet from getting out to the grounds for the first catches of the season. With the second installment of fleet starting to clear yesterday while the first had been unable to get started as yet, there is every prospect of a glut of landings when all start coming in together during the next ten days or so. This was the very condition which it was hoped to avert by staggering the departures into the two alphabetical groups with eight days between the first and the second. No less than fourteen local halibut boats are reported to be held up by stress of weather at Douglas Cove, Stephens Island, while it has already been reported that many have been staying in shelter at Squadaree on Dundas Island. No Canadian boats have so far this year offered catches on the local Exchange. Another American boat, the Lumen of Ketchikan, Capt. Albrechtsen, is in today with 9,000 pounds but is holding over until tomorrow. There have been a few more scattered landings by small Indian boats the most of which have been picked up by Bacon Fisheries. Last night the first fresh halibut of the season was dispatched over the railway from here to the eastern market, there being two carloads, one shipped by Booth Fisheries and the other by Atlin. In addition to the 10,000 pounds sold here by the Ketchikan boat Pearl, there was some fresh transhipped through here from Ketchikan.

With a capacity list of passengers and a large cargo of freight, C. N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil MacLean, arrived in port at 12:15 noon yesterday from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and sailed at 9:30 last night for Ketchikan and Stewart whence she will return here this evening southbound. The steamer Prince George, which has been off the run this week, will be going back into service by arriving here next Monday afternoon at 4:30 from Ketchikan and sailing at 7 p.m. for Ocean Falls and Vancouver where she will pick up her regular schedule, arriving here Friday mornings from the south and sailing Saturday nights for Vancouver with the calls at Ketchikan and Stewart north of here.

C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, on a regularly scheduled voyage to Alaska, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver and sailed at 1 p.m. for Skagway and other northern points. The vessel had on board 154 passengers including quite a number of members of river crews of the White Pass and Yukon Route steamers going north for the season. One passenger disembarked from the Princess Norah here while six went aboard at this port for the north.
