Kiska Island Is Heavily Bombed

Enemy Submarine Base In Aleutians Pounded By American Aircraft

Direct Hits Scored and Big Explosions Are Observed in Co-ordinated Attack by Bombers and Fighters

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 22 (CP) — American planes heavily bombed Japan's submarine base on Kiska island in the Aleutians on Sunday, the United States Navy reported. The Navy communique from the North Pacific said that United States bombers, escorted by fighters, executed a co-ordinated attack on Japanese shore installations on Kiska December 20. Hits were scored and heavy explosions observed in the vicinity of the submarine base. Camp areas were bombed and strafed. All United States planes returned to their bases.

FORTY-FOUR NAZIS DOWN

Enemy Fighters Had Bad Time When United States Bombers Visited Romilly on Seine

LONDON, Dec. 22 — Forty-four enemy fighter planes were shot down by United States airmen in Sunday's raid on Romilly-sur-Seine, an eighth Royal Canadian Air Force communique said today. Six were seen to crash. Twenty-three went down in flames. Fourteen disintegrated in the air and one was abandoned by its pilot, the communique said.

AIR RAID ON MUNDA

United States Flying Fortresses Again Strike at Enemy Air Field

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 22 — In the South Pacific United States Army flying fortresses executed new raids on the enemy air field at Munda in the Solomon Islands and damaged at least one cargo ship near Bougainville Island.

C.W.A.C. Is Given Formal Welcome

Head of British A. T. S. Pays Official Visit

LONDON, Dec. 22 — Maj.-Gen. Jean Knox, director and chief controller of the Auxiliary Territorial Service, accompanied by several senior A. T. S. officers, paid an official visit to the Canadian Women's Army Corps residence here shortly after the young Canadian women arrived, the first of their service group to reach Britain. In a brief address Maj.-Gen. Knox welcomed them on behalf of thousands of British women who have put on the king's uniform. Representing an expenditure on new equipment of an estimated \$5,000, a special permit has been granted by the controller of supplies to the Canadian Dry Cleaners for the installation of new dry cleaning machinery in the local plant. The installation is to take place in January.

Awake To Find Prowler Taking Her Xmas Gifts

Mrs. R. C. Mutch was awakened in her room at the York Hotel at 3 o'clock this morning to see a prowler helping himself to articles of wearing and toilet apparel which she had purchased as Christmas presents. The police were immediately notified and soon picked up a man giving the name of Arthur Brazeau whose presence around the place a short time before had caused some suspicion. Articles in Brazeau's possession in a construction camp on Acropolis Hill were identified as being the property of Mrs. Mutch.

UKRAINE MURDER

Two Million Russians Are Massacred by Nazi Invaders

MOSCOW, Dec. 22 — Soviet authorities charge that two million Russian inhabitants of the Nazi-occupied Ukraine have been murdered.

MUNICH IS HIT AGAIN

Principal Target of Royal Air Force in Big Raid Last Night

LONDON, Dec. 22 — Munich was the principal target of a raid in force by the Royal Air Force into southwest Germany last night. Twelve British planes failed to return and two Nazi machines were shot down. In their smash on Munich, the birthplace of the Nazi party, the British planes dropped a "great weight" of bombs and started fires. It was the second successive night of raids over the Reich. Clouds hampered the bombers and German night fighters rose to battle in bright moonlight above the cloud layer — mafamaham the cloud layer.



MONTREAL HAS FIRES

Three Persons Dead in One Apartment Holocaust — Quebec City Also Has Blaze

MONTREAL, Dec. 22 — Explosion and fire killed three people here last night and sent three others to hospitals with burns after sweeping through nine flats of a tenement block in the northeast section of the city.

A second fire broke out in the central part of the city during the first fire and forced fifteen families from two apartment buildings into the street.

The dead are Mrs. Jacob Croteau, her daughter, Madeline, and Walter Adams, power company worker.

Quebec City also had two large fires last night, five commercial premises, two houses and thirty flats being destroyed in the most serious. Thirty firemen were injured.

PROTECTION OF BALKANS

This Is Said to Have Been One of Matters Taken Up at Hitler's Conference with Generals

LONDON, Dec. 22 — Further particulars of what went on in a conference of Chancellor Adolf Hitler with his generals last week are reported here. It is said that arrangements were made for a special defensive force in Italy to be in readiness should the Allies attempt to invade the Balkans.

WEDGE IN TO ENEMY

Allies Using Artillery and Tanks With Good Effect on New Guinea

MELBOURNE, Dec. 22 — Using artillery and tanks, the Allies have driven a wedge deep into Japanese positions near Buna Mission on New Guinea Island and have captured a small air field.

Retailers May Buy Butter Now

Rationing Documents Will Not Have to be Presented by Them Until Next Week

It was announced today at the local office of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board that retailers will be able to purchase butter up to midnight, December 27, without surrendering rationing documents. This, of course, does not affect consumers who already are required to use ration cards.

RE-BOOKING COVENTRY

ADVANCE IN BURMA

British Imperial Forces Continue Progress Without Meeting Opposition

LONDON, Dec. 22 — British Imperial forces, continuing their advance into Burma, have occupied Achenayaw, eleven miles south of Mungdaw, advices from Allied headquarters in India said today. Dispatches said that the advance was made without opposition from the Japanese, placing the British troops within forty-one miles of Akyab.

RAID ON TUNISIA

Daring Exploit By British Commandos—Axis Forces Trying To Meet in Tunisia

LONDON, Dec. 22 (CP)—A British commando raid on Tunisia stabbed to within five miles of Bizerte in a hit-and-run foray last week, Reuters News Agency said today. The daring foray into the core of the Nazis' last stronghold in North Africa was disclosed as Marshal Erwin Rommel's army was reported only one hundred miles from Tripoli and, apparently, planning to continue westward all the way to Tunisia to join German forces battling there with the Allies.

Most of the British raiders had to swim for it, their commander said, but losses were light as the landing was unopposed. The incursion lasted several days and the raiders had to re-gain the beach through about fifteen miles of enemy-held territory.

A million pounds of bombs are estimated to have been dropped during the last few days on Bizerte and Tunis.

CHICAGO, Dec. 22 — A former head of the German Reichsbank now residing in the United States said in speaking here that Chancellor Adolf Hitler had suffered a "major diplomatic defeat" through Admiral Jean Darlan of France.

NO TRACE OF PLANE

Mystery of Missing Canadian Pacific Transport Unsolved Despite Widespread Search

VANCOUVER, Dec. 22—In spite of the efforts of air and land search operations, there is no trace yet of the Canadian Pacific Air Lines transport planes which has been missing since Sunday evening on a flight from Prince George to Vancouver. There were thirteen persons—three crew members and ten passengers—aboard the plane.

All day yesterday aircraft kept combing areas nearby Vancouver in which the plane might have been forced down but without avail in finding any clue as to the fate of the missing transport.

One report yesterday was that a plane was heard flying low over there about 7 o'clock Sunday evening, evidently being in difficulty. Stave Lake is thirty-five miles from Vancouver.

CINEMAS LOSE SEATS

LONDON, Dec. 22 — Seat-slashing in cinemas, especially in garrison towns, is causing anxiety to cinema owners and some of the rubber interiors used to pad arms of chairs have been stolen in hundreds.

BRACKEN IS HEARD

Pledges Support to Federal Government in War Effort—Urges Undersecretaries

WINNIPEG, Dec. 22 — Hon. John Bracken, newly-elected federal leader of the Progressive Conservative party, in a national radio address broadcast last night, pledged his utmost support to the federal government in the war effort. He urged that a move toward efficiency would be the appointment of under-secretaries to the war ministers and urged the establishment of such under-secretaries to federal ministers in the Dominion during wartime.

Mr. Bracken said he wanted to help to build a United Canada and claimed that, under war pressure, the government had not developed democratic devices but was becoming a bureaucratic form of administration.

MILLEROVO IS TAKEN

Red Army Believed to Have Recaptured Important Railway Town Between Moscow and Rostov

MOSCOW, Dec. 22 — While it is not officially stated, indications are that the Red Army has recaptured Millerovo, important railway town west of Moscow and 130 miles northwest of Rostov. The objective of the Soviet forces now appear to be Rostov, the recapture of which would give Russia new access to the Black Sea in addition to entrapping Nazi forces numbering one million men in the Stalingrad and Caucasus areas. A Soviet communique said that a "largely populated place" had been taken, this being assumed to mean Millerovo.

EDITORIAL

Butter Rationing . . .

The butter ration which went into effect as from yesterday will probably be felt by Canadians, such free users of butter, more perceptibly than have any of the other rations—on sugar, coffee and tea. The average consumption of butter per person in Canada, taking into consideration what the housewife uses in her kitchen apart from merely that which the most of us have been accustomed to so matter-of-factly spread on our bread, has probably been more than the half a pound per week we are now allowed. However, we shall still get along very nicely, no doubt, and it is well for us to remember that even the half a pound a week is a good deal more than Britons have been getting for a long while now, to say nothing of what the people of stricken Europe may be getting.

Thousands of Canadian housewives have been spending hours trudging from store to store in search of a pound of butter. If for no other reason, than to stop this appalling waste of effort the government was justified some system of rationing.

The average housewife has never had enough time at her disposal to handle her numerous tasks. To ask her to waste her time shopping for essential commodities like butter or eggs is inviting trouble.

There is no use disguising the fact that we are steadily running into a tight situation in a substantial list of foods. With domestic consumption, plus heavy exports, rapidly overhauling production, shortages such as we have experienced in butter, eggs and in beef, are likely to occur more and more frequently as the war progresses.

Under the circumstances rationing must be accepted so that our dwindling supplies will be at least evenly distributed and with a minimum of effort.

Without rigid control of distribution, there is no check against hoarding, black markets and the spreading of rumors, any of which may cause serious damage to home front morale.

Hymn Playing Soldiers . . .

An Ontario regimental band swung past our office yesterday, marching smartly to a military version of "Adeste Fidelis." We had not heard "Come Let Us Adore Him" in march time before but it made a good march and there was something inspiring and significant about it.

It is timely and thrilling that here in this country of ours the soldiers can swing along to the march tune of hymn. It suggests that the Christian religion, neglected as it may be, is still accepted as one of the fundamental principles of our way of living for the preservation of which we fight. That we can adapt the hymns to march tunes for our fighting men is indicative of our broad-mindedness—the tolerance of our democracy.

There are still psalm-singing Cromwells with us and that is well for our side.

Christmas Potlach . . .

The following from one of our service club editors we consider worthy of reprinting:

"The first inhabitants of this province had a popular celebration known as the Potlach. It culminated with the giving of gifts but, in the feasting and carousals that preceded, there were so many abuses that the "all-wise white man" banned the potlach. How many times have we heard the simple-minded but nevertheless critical Indian ask what is different in the white man's Christmas? If he stood on Third Avenue these days in front of the government liquor store, he might well ask. Is it too much to suggest that we might get back, or perhaps forward, to a Christmas which stresses the Spirit of Christmas and not the Spirit of Scotch or Rye?"

SPORT CHAT

A dog fed entirely on horsemeat, cabbage, and biscuits made from condemned flour is Britain's champion greyhound. If any trainer had suggested such a dish for those feed demons before the war he would have been laughed off the track. But that is the sole diet of Ballynennan Moon, a wonder-racer who has won more than \$10,000 in a 14-month career. He's almost as popular with greyhound racegoers as the immortal Mick the Miller, a pre-war dog who fed on eggs, chicken, meat extract, shoulder mutton broth and the best of vegetables. In short, Mick lived much better than the average

Briton today. Sidney Orton, trainer of Ballynennan Moon, does 10 miles roadwork each day with his charge who recently completed his 15th successive race without a defeat. Orto said he was getting fat on the exercise but that the dog kept down to the required weight. Moon is a lazy lad — when not racing. He runs a race in public each week and shows his paces twice a week in practice. When he chases an old rabbit skin in 400-yard sprints he runs, said Orton, "as if his life depended on it." The Moon recently broke his own track record for the 525 yards, covering the distance in 29.79 seconds to win the November Stakes. His previous record was 29.92.

The 1942 flat racing season has crossed the finish line in Eire and the winning list of owners is headed by Joseph McGrath. With 18 horses he won 33 races worth approximately \$35,000. Chief contributor was Windsor Slipper, unbeaten three-year-old who accounted for three Irish classics—the Derby, St. Leger and Two Thousand Guineas. McGrath will be trying to repeat next year. Stewards of the Turf Club and the Irish National Hunt Steeplechase Committee have sanctioned 79 days of racing in 1943, starting with a two-day meet in January and ending next December.

A racehorse trainer who since he gave up training more than 20 years ago has refused to visit a racecourse. Charlie Wood celebrated his 88th birthday. He's one of four men still living who rode







WOULD FLY ATLANTIC

Skilled Flyers Suggest This Should Be Open to Women

TORONTO, Dec. 22 (C)—Four Toronto girls would like to convince authorities that Canada should have a women's ferry command like the British women's Air Transport Auxiliary of the R. A. F. and the Women's Auxiliary Flying Service in the United States.

Right now the only ferry command operating in Canada is that of the R. A. F. with headquarters in Montreal, mainly concerned with transporting bombers across the Atlantic.

The office of the Department of Transport in Toronto estimates there are only 20 to 30 active women pilots in Canada. When Canadian flying was curtailed, the four Toronto girls—Marion Gillies, Margaret Littlewood, Violet Milstead and Marion Orr—were the only four active women instructors in Ontario. Two hundred and fifty flying hours are required for an instructor's license.

All these girls have trained lads who have gone on to R.C.A.F. air observer schools. Three of them have at least 1,000 flying hours to their credit. They claim that women in the Air Transport Auxiliary of the R. A. F. are flying Spitfires, Hurricanes and other types of aircraft, except the heaviest bombers, freeing male pilots for combat work. They would like to get into the air, release air force personnel here in Canada, by ferrying aircraft from factory to field or acting as staff pilots.

Women Able

Marion Gillies, 27, has been flying since 1938 and has chalked up 1,050 hours. One of her pupils was Bobby Martin, believed to be the youngest pilot in Canada when he soloed two years ago at the age of 12. She spoke for the group when she said, "Women are perfectly capable of carrying out duties of ferrying planes."

"As for the women's division of the Air Force—why, they do fine work but they don't fly and that's what I felt I could do better than anything else." Marion finds ambitions blocked in another way now that civilian flying has been curtailed. She has made a study of primary navigation and would like

to continue it. But women are barred from the only place it is taught now—Air Force schools.

Violet Milstead, 23-year old Toronto girl who got her instructor's license at 21 and runs a wool shop when she takes time off from flying, has 1,000 hours to her credit. She adopts a practical attitude toward the position of women pilots in Canada.

"We're told there are enough men pilots in Canada to do the sort of work I can do—ferrying light aircraft," she said. "Actually the fact that girls like myself cannot get the work we want to do does not mean there's an injustice being done. It's just unfortunate that Canada—at the moment anyway—seems to have no need for

women pilots."

Young Instructor

Marion Orr, at 22 probably Canada's youngest woman instructor, saw her job as civilian flying instructor go up in smoke when the St. Catharines Flying Club burned down November 1. She too would like the chance to prove that Canadian girls can be competent ferry pilots. "From all reports the English girls aren't doing a bad job," she argued.

Starting five years ago, Margaret Littlewood, 26, got her 950 flying hours the hard way. She worked as saleslady in a department store and put her money into flying lessons.

Timely Recipes

ORANGE CREAM SAUCE

2 egg yolks or 1 whole egg 1/2 cup sugar grated rind and juice of 1 small orange or 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind and 3 tablespoons lemon juice. 1 cup evaporated milk. Chill evaporated milk until ice crystals begin to form. (This will take 10-15 minutes if the milk is poured into the freezing tray of the refrigerator). Heat grated rind, juice and sugar, cook 2 minutes. Add well beaten egg yolks or whole egg and cook till thickened, about 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Whip milk in a cold bowl till stiff. Add cooked mixture to the whipped milk and blend with egg beater. Makes 2 1/4-3 cups sauce. This makes a rich sauce that is delicious with plum puddings, plain or steamed or cottage puddings or as a topping for plain cake.

Small ATS Group Does Vital Job

Twenty-Four Girls Assist Royal Corps of Signals in Secret Work

LONDON, Dec. 22 (C)—There is a group of 24 Auxiliary Territorial Service girls who hear the latest war news even before the War Cabinet itself.

They work in a secret underground radio headquarters where they help the Royal Corps of Signals. Four of them were on duty when Rommel's rout began and they had to keep the secret before the Cabinet was told and the censors had decided on the release of the story.

The women have been doing the work for five months and through their headquarters passes all communications to and from the War Office to British troops at home and abroad. They work at chromium-edged control and switch panels.

They have to be constantly on their toes and accurate in everything they do.

"You see," one girl explained, "wave lengths are changed at various hours of the day to ensure secrecy and good reception and sending has to be timed to a second."



Married Women Released First

Looking Ahead a Bit British Officials Talk of Days of Peace

LONDON, Dec. 22.—High officials in women's service organizations in Britain agree that married women should be the first to receive their discharges when the war is over.
There will be no mass demobilization, one of these officials said. Married women will be released first, then women whose jobs have been held open for them, and the services will not release single women immediately unless they have jobs to go to.
The authorities anticipate that many of the women will wish to stay in the services after the war, and provision has been made in this regard. They will be needed as long as Britain maintains a standing army, navy and air force. When peace comes the first questions to be asked of servicewomen when demobilization plans are being made will be "Are you married? Is your husband serving abroad? Have you any children?"


