Negotiations Continuing

INDIA IS RICH PRIZE
LONDON—Belief is growing that the Australian mainland is not so much likely to be the prize of the moment. India is believed to be a much more tempting prize. A large Japanese expedition is in process of being assembled at Singapore for pivot.

UNITED STATES LOSSES
WASHINGTON—The United States Navy Department announced late Friday that three United States naval vessels were sunk in South Pacific waters late in February and early in March. They were the aircraft tender Langley, the destroyer Perry and a naval tanker. Twelve men were lost in the Langley which went down as a result of enemy action south of Java. The officers and crew of the Perry kept fighting until their ship sank under them.

ATTACK ON SIBERIA?
LONDON—Feeling is growing in military quarters that a Japanese surprise attack on Siberia may coincide with the instituting of the new German spring offensive against Russia.

GNEISENAU HIT AT KIEL
LONDON—Announcement is made in London of the German battleship Gneisenau having been severely damaged at Kiel naval base by British bombers. Royal Air Force pilots describe how the vessel was hit.

TO DESTROY NAZI INDUSTRIES
LONDON—Britain plans through heavy aerial assault to bomb German industries into complete destruction this summer, it is declared in London.

22,000 NAZIS KILLED BY REDS
MOSCOW—Further notable successes have been achieved by the Red Army over the Nazis, Moscow claims that 22,000 Nazis were killed in fighting with the Soviet forces between March 20 and April 1.

NAZIS-U.S. NAVAL BATTLE
RIO DE JANEIRO—There are rumors of a German-American naval battle in the Atlantic off the coast of Brazil where Nazi submarines are known to have been operating. Coastal shipping was ordered into port.

POWER IS SATISFIED

Minister of Air Expresses Gratification With Progress Being Made on Coast Air Defences

VANCOUVER, April 4.—Hon. C. G. Power, minister of national defence for air, before leaving the Pacific Coast on his return to Ottawa, said that he was immensely pleased with the progress that was being made with the establishment of air defences on this coast.

MORE SHIPS TORPEDOED

Two United States Merchantmen Sunk in Caribbean—Norwegian Vessel and Small Tug Off Atlantic Coast

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 4:—Torpedoing of two United States merchantmen in the Caribbean Sea and the shelling and sinking of a small tug off the Atlantic coast were announced by the United States Navy yesterday.

Another victim of the Battle of the Atlantic was a medium-sized Norwegian ship torpedoed and sunk off the United States coast on Thursday.

A.R.P. HAS PRACTICE

Workers at Westview Acquaint Themselves Well.

On Thursday evening all sections of the Westview A.R.P. turned out in full strength for a work-out which proved very realistic.

A series of incendiary bombs dropped between the residences of Alex Turnbull and Frank Dobb's on Graham Avenue. Sixteen bombs in all fell. One dropped on the walk of Thomas Priest's residence. Before the fire wardens could get there Mrs. Priest had put it out expeditiously with sand. Several of the bombs fell in dangerous spots and could not be handled with sand. One fell in the bush near Dr. Mandy's residence with danger to the house. Fire wardens quickly connected hose to the fire hydrant there and the situation was soon well in hand. Another which fell near the porch of J. Christensen's residence had to be carried away with a special A.R.P. shovel to a point where it was less dangerous.

Telephones being out of commission, the police were stationed at every half block and passed the message to the station when a person was injured. The ambulance, with first aid equipment and men, quickly eased the injured and got them back to the station where they were given further attention.


An explosive bomb fell in front of Frank Dobb's house. The police kept all persons a safe distance from bomb. Still there were two casualties when it exploded. The police, having been busy preventing the people from getting near the bomb, were not in a position to pass a message so a runner with a bicycle was sent to the station. The result was very satisfactory, the ambulances was there in a short time and the injured taken care of.

A bomb fell in thick bush near J. Christensen's house and started a bush fire which at first looked as if it would burn the house. The water main being broken, the pump was quickly in action at the water hole and the situation was very satisfactorily taken care of in a short time.

R.A.F. BLASTS FRENCH FACTORIES WORKING FOR NAZIS



Clouds of smoke pour from the Matford motor truck factory at Poissy, 17 miles northwest of Paris, France, as British Royal Air Force bombers rip it apart in low-level bombing raid in broad daylight. The factory was turning out war equipment for the Nazis. The raid was made without enemy opposition, and was one of the heaviest to date of those staged on occupied France by the R.A.F. The same factory was again bombed this Thursday night.

More Volunteers Are Needed For Coast Reserve

VICTORIA, April 4:—Before leaving on his return to Ottawa after a visit of inspection to Pacific Coast defences, Hon. J. L. Ralston, minister of national defence, said that British Columbia men were not joining the reserve army in sufficient numbers.

FUTURE OF BIG MISS

Consolidated Superintendent Says Usual Spring Shut-Down Will Take Place—What Next Uncertain

M. M. O'Brien, general superintendent of mines, Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co., was a passenger aboard the Prince George yesterday bound from Trail to Stewart to pay a visit to the Big Missouri mine. It is Mr. O'Brien's first trip north in a year and a half. During about half of that time he has been in Ontario in connection with munitions work.

On account of low water conditions, the Big Missouri mine will be having its annual spring shut-down, Mr. O'Brien states. He did not commit himself, however, on what the future policy in regard to the operation of the big low grade property.

Olof Hanson In Vancouver

M.P. for Skeena on Coast Now and Will Be Here Next Week for Easter Recess.

Olof Hanson, M.P. for Skeena, arrived in Vancouver a few days ago from Ottawa following the adjournment of parliament for a month's Easter recess and will be here on the Prince Rupert next Wednesday from the south to spend a few days here and at Smithers before returning to Ottawa.

Sergeant Clarence Finley, in training with the Royal Canadian Air Force, is home from Lethbridge, Alberta, to spend leave with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Finley, 323 Eighth Avenue East. He will be leaving on Monday evening's train.

AIR BLOWS ARE HEAVY

Royal Air Force and Luftwaffe Exchange Blows of Greatly Increased Intensity

LONDON, April 4:—Air war flared anew as the Royal Air Force inflicted heavy damage on the Matford truck plant outside of Paris, raided docks at Le Havre and carried out fighter sweeps while the Germans countered with blows at the southeast coast of England Thursday night in a raid of extraordinary intensity.

The Nazi aerial armada Thursday night subjected southeast English coast points—concentrating on Portland and Dover—to one of the largest bombing attacks of the war. The country virtually rocked with aerial battle. Early reports said that at least two enemy planes were brought down.

Across Atlantic In Record Time

Bomber Makes Flight in Less Than Seven Hours

LONDON, April 4:—A new record was established Thursday for a bomber flight across the Atlantic Ocean. An American pilot made the 2400-mile flight in six hours and forty minutes, more than one hour being cut off the previous record. Tail winds favored the flight.

DRIVE OFF JAPANESE

Defenders of Bataan Are Mopping Up On Enemy Whose Break-through On Bataan Was In Vain

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 4:—Bataan defenders are reported to be mopping up pocketed Japanese units which Thursday burst through the main line of the American and Filipino forces in two assaults, only to be thrown back.

OUTLOOK IN INDIA MORE FAVORABLE

Possibility of Compromise Looms As Others Enter Into Negotiations In Support of Sir Stafford Cripps

NEW DELHI, April 4:—Negotiations between Sir Stafford Cripps and Indian leaders took a more favorable turn today with the possibility of a compromise looming up more strongly. General Sir Archibald Wavell, British commander-in-chief in the Far East, has joined Sir Stafford Cripps, special British envoy. Former Assistant Secretary of War Lewis Johnson has arrived in New Delhi to take part in the negotiations in which Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek of China has also become actively interested, having intervened to urge India to accept.

India's millions are still wrangling over the British proposals to grant India self rule after the war in return for fighting support during the war.

REVERSES IN BURMA

Situation For Allies Is Becoming Increasingly Serious Near Frontier of India

NEW DELHI, April 4:—Grave news reverses marked the Allied defence of Burma yesterday as British headquarters acknowledged that the Japanese had cracked the right wing anchor at Prome, the key to Burma's vital oil fields, which has been abandoned.

The enemy has made a new landing on Burma only seventy-five miles from the frontier of India proper and 325 miles from Calcutta. Thus the British forces in Burma may be cut off both from India and from communication with the Chinese army in Burma. The supply line between India and Burma would also be interfered with.

Ambassador To Spain Is Named

Dr. Carleton J. H. Hays Is Choice Of President Roosevelt For Diplomatic Post

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 14:—Dr. Carleton J. H. Hays, member of the faculty of Columbia University and prominent in Roman Catholic Church affairs, was yesterday nominated by President Franklin D. Roosevelt as United States ambassador to Spain.

NIPPONESE SHIPS SUNK

United States Navy Announces Bag Taken By Submarines in East Indies Waters.

WASHINGTON, April 4:—American submarines have sunk or damaged four Japanese warships in recent action in the Java Sea and Indian Ocean, the Department of the Navy announced today.

One light cruiser is reported sunk, another damaged and two Japanese seaplane tenders damaged near the Indies island of Bali.

At the same time the Navy announced that a medium-sized United States merchant vessel, a medium-sized Latvian merchantman and a small Canadian vessel were torpedoed and sunk but gave no details.

LOCAL BOYS WON MATCH

Had No Difficulty in Defeating Ocean Falls—Rupert Girls Lost Out in Closing Seconds.

OCEAN FALLS, April 4: (Special to Daily News)—Ocean Falls High School girls defeated Bonneville girls of Prince Rupert 21 to 39 in a nip and tuck basketball game here last night. While the Prince Rupert girls led, the boys from Prince Rupert had no difficulty whatever in winning by a score of 37 to 18. The Prince Rupert boys played in top form and led during the whole of the game, the half time score being 19 to 17. Ocean Falls had some tough luck. Ted Arney accounted for ten of Prince Rupert's points while Shorty Santerbane made six. The Prince Rupert girls were robbed of the game as they had led until the finishing seconds of play.

Stanley Cup Series Gets Off Tonight

TORONTO, April 4:—Opening game of the best four out of seven series between Toronto Maple Leafs and Detroit Red Wings for the Stanley Cup will open at Maple Leaf Gardens here tonight.

RAILWAYS CONGESTED

Heavy Movement of German Troops To East and Southeast Europe

STOCKHOLM, April 4:—There are reports here of railways in east and southwest Europe being congested by traffic consisting of heavy movement of German forces and supplies, probably preparatory to the spring offensive that the Reich is planning.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 4:—In the opening game of the Pacific Coast Baseball League on Thursday, San Francisco Seals defeated Los Angeles Angels by a score of 10 to 6.

NEW AIR SERVICE

Trans Canada Extends Its Operations To Newfoundland

MONTREAL, April 4:—Looking toward the commencement of scheduled, commercial service to Newfoundland on May 1, Trans-Canada Air Lines started familiarization flights to St. John's Friday, it was announced by H. J. Symington K. C., president of the Trans-Canada Air Lines.

Moncton will be the Canadian terminal of the new service and connections will be made with T. C. A. service throughout Canada. Enroute to Newfoundland, a stop will be made at Sydney, Nova Scotia, thus bringing this industrial centre at the most easterly tip of the Dominion into the domestic airline network.

Two stops will be made in Newfoundland. The important air base at Gandor Lake will be one and St. John's, the Island Capital, the other.

Flight crews assigned to the service have already reported for duty at Atlantic division headquarters at Moncton and ground staffs are now on duty at Sydney and in Newfoundland. April will be a shakedown month during which arrangements for regular air mail, passenger and air express services will be completed.

"The extensive developments being undertaken in relation to hemispheric defence by Great Britain, the United States and Canada lend considerable importance to this new service," said Mr. Symington.

"By rail and boat transportation the trip from Moncton to St. John's is now 54 hours. It will be about four hours by air.

"Canada is interested in trans-Atlantic air service and Newfoundland is the North American gateway in such service. We are very happy to further this service and also further the war effort of the allied nations."

Bicycles Frozen In United States

All Sales and Deliveries Halted—Industrial Workers Get First Call.

WASHINGTON, April 4:—All sales and deliveries of new bicycles in the United States were frozen as from midnight Thursday. Henceforth defence workers will get the first call on such vehicles.

Peace River Oil . . .

The offer of the provincial government to turn over the Peace River oil resources to the Dominion for the duration and one year after is an admirable gesture. Incidentally, if the offer is accepted, it will relieve the provincial administration of the responsibility of deciding whether or not private interests shall become identified with the development of the resource.

Of course, no oil is as yet available in the Peace River, the ground being so far only in the drill testing stage. Conceivably, however, and the former premier, T. D. Pattullo, has always been very emphatic about his confidence to this effect, it may become one of Canada's most important oil producing areas. Whether or not it will be in time for the war is, of course, problematical. No doubt, the operations of testing out could be greatly speeded up.

Turning over of Peace River oil to the federal government would just be another of many other important contributions British Columbia, first through the Pattullo government and later through the coalition, has been making to Ottawa in furtherance of the war effort.

PUBLIC NOTICE Defence of Canada Regulations

Prohibition of Photography of Specified Places in the Province of British Columbia.

ORDER

WHEREAS Regulation 18 of the Defence of Canada Regulations (Consolidation) 1941, as amended by Order in Council dated 27th October, 1941, P.C. 7987, and Order in Council dated 17th January, 1942, P.C. 227, provides inter alia that, subject to any exemptions for which provision may be made by order of a competent authority, no person shall, except under the authority of a written permit granted by or on behalf of the competent authority, make or publish any photograph, sketch, plan or other representation of, or of any part of, or object in any area in Canada as may be specified by order of a competent authority being an area in relation to which the restriction of photography appears to that competent authority to be expedient in the interests of the safety of the state and have a camera with him in any such area, and further that such competent authority may make such orders and any person acting on behalf of such competent authority may give such special directions as the said authority or person thinks necessary relating to the publication or non-publication of photographs, sketches, plans or other representations made under the authority of a written permit as aforesaid.

AND WHEREAS I, the undersigned Minister of National Defence, am a competent authority for the purposes of the said Regulation and it appears to me that the areas and objects mentioned hereunder are ones in relation to which the restriction of photography is expedient in the interests of the safety of the State.

1. NOW THEREFORE I, the said Minister of National Defence, in pursuance of the said Regulation 18, as amended, do hereby order that no person shall make or publish any photograph, sketch, plan or other representation in any of the areas or places hereunder specified or of any part thereof, or have a camera therein, or of any of the objects hereunder specified except under the authority of a written permit granted on my behalf by the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, Pacific Command or the Commanding Officer Pacific Coast (R.C.N.) or the Air Officer Commanding Western Air Command:

- (a) (1) Esquimalt Harbour, Upper and Lower Victoria Harbour, the shore line faces of banks or cliffs of Southern Vancouver Island contiguous and adjacent thereto, and extending from Sheringham Point, on the Southwest coast to, and including, Sidney Island, James Island, Coal Island and Piers Island.
- (2) The shore line and area in the immediate vicinity of Sooke Lake and Coldstream Lake situated northwest of the city of Victoria.
- (b) Vancouver Harbour and the waters of Burrard Inlet (except the North Arm, otherwise known as Indian Arm), situated, lying and being to the East of a line from the most westerly edge of Point Grey to Point Cowan on Bowen Island, including the bridges at First Narrows and at Second Narrows, and the waterfront facilities relating to shipping, and the shores and faces of banks or cliffs touched by the above described waters.
- (c) Prince Rupert (British Columbia) Harbour and approaches, including Metlakatla Passage, the whole of Digby Island and including the railway bridge at Zenard Rapids and waterfront facilities related to shipping, shores and faces of cliffs adjoining the above area.
- (d) Yorke Island, British Columbia, and the waters of Johnstone Strait surrounding Yorke Island, within a radius of one mile from low tide, including the water front facilities relating to shipping, shores and faces of banks or cliffs of Yorke Island.

Any object of the descriptions following, situate within British Columbia and Yukon Territory, that is to say:

- (1) any fortification, battery, searchlight, listening post, or other work of defence;
- (2) any aerodrome or seaplane station;
- (3) any assembly of any of His Majesty's forces;
- (4) any barracks, encampment, or building occupied or in course of preparation for occupation by any of His Majesty's forces;
- (5) any arsenal, magazine or store for munitions of war, arms, equipment, or supplies for any of His Majesty's forces, whether completed or in course of construction;
- (6) any Naval, Military or Air Force wireless, telegraph, telephone or signal station or any cable station;
- (7) any vessel of war either complete or under construction;
- (8) any aircraft or the wreckage of any aircraft;
- (9) any building, structure, vessel or other object damaged by enemy action or as a result of steps taken to repel enemy action;
- (10) any roads or railways exclusively connected with works of defence;
- (11) any electricity, gas or water works, or any gasometer or res-

MOUNTAINS TO BLAME

Regional Engineer of Broadcasting Corporation Suggests This May Be Reason for Bad Reception Here.

Mountain ranges in the vicinity of Prince Rupert are now being blamed for the poor radio reception in this city. N. R. Olding, regional engineer of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation for British Columbia, so writes to D. C. McRae, chairman of the radio committee of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce. Tests made during the past winter, Mr. Olding writes, have led to the belief that the location of these ranges are a contributing factor to the poor reception here.

Mr. Olding says that he has never lost sight of radio reception problems at Prince Rupert and states that considerable progress has been made although "admittedly inadequate."

When the new Canadian Broadcasting Corporation network extension with installation of small transmitter units at Williams Lake, Quesnel, Wells and Prince George has been set up, it may be possible, Mr. Olding suggests, to provide temporary service by short wave from Prince George or some other point on the network towards Prince Rupert.
