Russians Seize Initiative In Dramatic Eleventh Hour Rally; Bloody Street Battle

Thousands Of Fresh Siberian Troops Are Moving Into Defence Of Great Soviet Industrial City

MOSCOW, Sept. 18 (CP)—Chancellor Adolf Hitler's siege armies, twice hurled back in bloody street fighting, were reported to be hastily erecting defences in the northwest outskirts of Stalingrad today as the Russians seized the initiative in a dramatic eleventh hour rally. Dispatches said that Red Army defenders were backed down tree-lined avenues to cliffs overlooking the Volga River at one time. Then they struck back in a supreme effort to save the big steel city and forced the invaders to retreat.

CORVETTE TORPEDOED

Loss Of Another Canadian Naval Vessel — Lieut. Commander John Bonner Among Dead

OTTAWA, Sept. 18 (CP)—Loss of the corvette Charlottetown by enemy submarine action with the commander, Acting Lieutenant Commander John Willard Bonner of Halifax, killed, five of the crew missing and three other ratings dead of injuries was announced today by Hon. Angus Macdonald, Navy Minister.

AIR BLOWS EXCHANGED

Royal Air Force Hits at Bordeaux And Luftwaffe at Southwest Port

LONDON, Sept. 18: (P)—While weather shielded Germany proper from attack last night, Royal Air Force bombers struck at Bordeaux. Considerable damage and casualties were reported on Britain's own coast when at least four Nazi planes strafed a southwest point. A few enemy aircraft were also over county districts of East Anglia during the night. Bombs were dropped and a little damage was done with one person injured. One enemy ship was shot down.

Miss G. Lewis and Miss Fraser left last night for Vancouver. Survivors were rescued by another naval vessel and brought to an east coast Canadian port. Among those seriously injured are Lieut. George F. T. Gregory of Victoria and Stoker John Albert Brown of Vancouver.

BATTLE OF NEW GUINEA

Allies Pound Heavily From Air While Jap Advance on Port Moresby Halts

MELBOURNE, Sept. 18: (P)—In the Pacific theatre of war Allied headquarters in Australia reported today that fighter planes had sent 35,000 rounds of cannon and machine gun fire crashing into the Japanese supply base at Buna, New Guinea, while United Nations bombers set fires visible for thirty miles in an assault on Rabaul, New Britain. The Jap advance on Port Moresby has been halted.

WILLKIE IN RUSSIA

MOSCOW — Wendell Willkie arrived in Russia today from Teheran. He was met by United States Ambassador W. H. Standley and high Soviet officials.

Rapidity Of Construction Of Alaska Highway Work Through Northland Amazes Bishop Rix

Home after a trip into the Peace River district on ecclesiastical inspection, Rt. Rev. G. A. Rix, D.D., Bishop of Caledonia, expresses amazement at the rapidity of progress that is being made with the construction of the Alaska Highway through that area. There is none of the old pick and shovel type of work. Everything is being done on a mass scale by huge and modern machinery which digs through at such a pace and on such a scale that one has to see to believe. The country is seething with activity with thousands of men on hand for the road construction work.

RADIO IS APPROVED

High-Power Short Wave Station In New Brunswick Is Given O.K.

OTTAWA, Sept. 18: (P)—The government has approved the immediate establishment of a high power short wave broadcasting station at Sackville, New Brunswick, it was announced today.

FOUR MORE JAPS SUNK

United States Submarines Have Been Active In Pacific Ocean

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 18.—Four Japanese ships — two large freighters, one medium-sized freighter and one patrol vessel — have been sunk in the Pacific by roving United States submarines and four others — a large tanker, a large freighter, a transport and medium-sized cargo ship — have been damaged, it is announced by the Department of the Navy. The tanker was set afire.

These vessels had nothing to do with Solomon Islands operations and bring the total of 362 the number of Japanese vessels sunk or damaged since December 7, 1941. The American submarines, by sinking the Japanese vessels, are preventing the enemy from cashing in on conquests in the Philippines and East Indies.

MANY NAZI SHIPS SUNK

Allied Aircraft Have Been Striking Hard At Enemy Off Coast Of Norway

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 18 — Allied airplanes have sunk twenty-four German vessels off the coasts of Norway recently, the majority of them having been off Oslo and Stavanger.

According to an announcement yesterday by the Royal Air Force coastal command in London enemy shipping was attacked by British planes and two German ships were torpedoed.

SLAVS REINFORCED

LONDON — Large reinforcements are reported to have been delivered by air to the Yugoslav patriot forces by air from the Middle East. Fierce fighting goes on in Bosnia. Five thousand Yugoslav patriots have been killed and 12,000 taken prisoner by the Nazis this month.

Heavy Casualties Of Dieppe Explained; Encounter With Tanker Upset Arrangements

OTTAWA, Sept. 18 (CP)—A chance encounter with an escorted German oil tanker during the English Channel crossing was blamed today by the Department of National Defence as having been partly responsible for heavy casualties suffered by the Canadian forces which raided Dieppe on August 19.

In the first comprehensive official statement on the battle, the Defence Department disclosed that five thousand Canadian Army troops participated, of which some 3,350 were casualties—killed, wounded or missing—or sixty-seven percent.

The encounter with the tanker was described as the one mishap marring "complete achievement of surprise." The incident had two results:

First, the British commando force which had the task of attacking and destroying a battery at Berneval, six miles east of Dieppe, was unable to complete the assignment.

Second, the Royal Regiment of Canada from Toronto was twenty minutes late in reaching Puits Beach and had to land in broad daylight instead of semi-darkness.

Battling In New Guinea...

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, AUSTRALIA — While Australian troops battled Japanese forces in New Guinea jungles only 32 air line miles from Port Moresby, Allied fighter planes struck a smashing blow yesterday at the enemy supply base of Buna, Allied headquarters announced today.

Quiet In Egyptian Battle...

CAIRO — Sand storms restricted aerial activity yesterday on the Egyptian battle front as the lull in land fighting remained unbroken by any major operations, a communique said today.

Armistice Proposals Rejected...

LONDON — Armistice proposals rejected by Vichy French authorities in Madagascar were purely military terms of surrender, a British military commentator announced today.

Russians Driving Nazis Back...

MOSCOW — Soviet troops have wiped out two threatening wedges within Stalingrad in hand-to-hand fighting and the Germans now are trying to fortify themselves in the northwestern outskirts of the city against fierce, tank-led counter-attacks, the Russians said today.

More Americans In Britain...

LONDON — Thousands of United States troops arrived in Britain recently to swell the ranks of the rapidly-expanding United States Army in this country.

Europe Has Air Jitters...

LONDON — Southeastern Europe was kept in a high state of jitters last night by an air raid scare in Sofia and by reports that a mysterious balloon laden with explosives was drifting over Hungary. Hungarians were warned of the presence of balloons by the Budapest radio, but the broadcast gave no hint as to where they had come from or whether they were causing any damage. The air raid scare was announced in Sofia when the radio there shut down in the midst of a broadcast after an announcer shouted excited warnings to "keep calm."

GAS BEING CUT LOWER

Pleasure Motorists To Have Ration Cut in Half—New Books To Be Issued To Many People

OTTAWA, Sept. 18: (P)—Pleasure motorists throughout the Dominion tightened their belts today and sat down to figure out how to make the best of the remainder of their shortened gasoline rations as announced by Hon. Clarence D. Howe, minister of munitions.

Mr. Howe said that about 225,000 Canadians will have their category A gasoline ration books withdrawn after October 1 and replaced with a smaller ration in a new category known as AA which will provide sixteen units (a unit consists of four gallons) for six months to the owner of a small car. This is about half the amount available at present to holders of Category A books.

In an address over the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation network the minister announced the new AA category which will include all persons using cars for personal transportation and not for business. Housewives, students, owners of two or more cars and those using cars chiefly for driving to and from non-essential work are among those affected.

Oil controller Cottrelle said that all category A applications are being examined and letters prepared for those who may have to accept a lower category after October 1.

RED CROSS CORPS
 Prince Rupert Section
 A Dominion-wide campaign for the collection of waste material has been launched. The local Red Cross Salvage Committee is seeking every pound of steel and iron castings and is appealing to citizens to collect this metal for use in the war effort. Housewives can do their part by collecting all the only worn-out pots and pans and appliances around the house, placing them in a spot where they can be picked up, and then phoning 130 and leave the message. The committee are anxious to collect an entire carload of scrap metal for shipment south. Every ton of scrap iron combined with new, smelted iron yields approximately twice the amount of steel for twice as many ships, tanks, guns, planes, shells and other war needs. One old electric iron contains enough metal to make two steel helmets.
 The importance of scrap collection is not to be underestimated, states the committee. Every pound of steel, iron, brass, lead or rubber is another pound of grief for the Axis.
