Turning Point In War On Pacific

TWO SHIPS SENT DOWN STRATEGY PLANNED

Important Decisions for Counter-Blows Against Axis Believed Made at Moscow

WASHINGTON, D.C., August 18:—Two more United Nations vessels have been sunk by German U-boats. One Panamanian vessel was sent down with loss of seven lives and one United States merchant ship with loss of eleven. These were the first sinkings to be reported since last Wednesday.

EFFECTIVE AIR RAIDS

United States Pound at Haiphong In Indo-China as Well as Targets in Japanese-Occupied China

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 18—A recent effective air raid by United States planes on the French Indo-China port of Haiphong has been revealed. Enormous fires were started among Japanese installations.

At least fifteen other effective raids have been staged on Japanese-occupied points in central and southern China, large quantities of war materials being destroyed.

OLD GUNS FOR NEW

Souvenirs of Last War in United States to be Broken up and Used

NEW YORK, Aug. 18—Captured guns and tanks of the last war, which have been kept as souvenirs in New York are to be broken up and used in the manufacture of arms and ammunition for the present war. This is to be done in the course of a scrap metal drive, a move which, it is expected, will be followed in the rest of the country.

Birthday Of Manuel Quezon

Anniversary of Philippine President To Be Observed Tomorrow

WASHINGTON, D.C., August 18:—The sixty-fourth birthday of Manuel Quezon, exiled president of the Philippine Islands, will be observed here tomorrow. There will be a literary and musical program.

Rudy Vallee In Navy Now

Noted Orchestra Leader Will Conduct Band in Capacity of Chief Petty Officer

LONG BEACH, Aug. 18—Rudy Vallee, noted crooner and dance orchestra conductor, has joined up as a chief petty officer with the United States Navy. He will carry out the duties of a bandmaster.

LONDON, Aug. 18—Royal Air Force bombers attacked the industrial Ruhr Valley of Germany last night. There were a few Nazi raiders over Britain.

PASSING UP LABOR DAY

No Time Out Will be Taken by Vital War Industries in San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18—Feeling that even one day's production of vital war materials should not be lost, San Francisco labor unions have unanimously adopted a plan to give up the traditional Labor Day holiday this year. The day will be given only passing notice this year in factories and shipyards here.

Rotary Governor

Fred K. Jones, prominent Spokane real estate and insurance man, will be in Prince Rupert tomorrow to pay an official visit to the local Rotary Club in his capacity as district governor. He will arrive in the morning from the south and, after attending a special dinner of the club, will proceed later in the evening to Ketchikan. BIG EFFORT OF CANADA

C.N.R. Chief Hints of What Railways Are Doing in War

TORONTO, Aug. 18—The tremendous unknown contribution that Canada's railways are making to the United Nations' War effort, was touched briefly upon by R. C. Vaughan, president of the Canadian National Railways, at the conclusion of his inspection trip of the National system's facilities for handling the great volume of war traffic in the London and Niagara districts.

MORESBY ATTACKED

Twenty-four Japanese Planes Visit Port of New Guinea

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN AUSTRALIA, August 18:—Twenty-four Japanese bombing planes attacked Port Moresby on New Guinea yesterday but no serious damage or casualties resulted.

PREMIER SPEAKING

Prime Minister Mackenzie King to Be on Air Tomorrow Evening

OTTAWA, Aug. 18—Prime Minister Mackenzie King will speak at 6 o'clock Wednesday night (Pacific War Time) over a national radio network on the manpower question, announcing measures for the better use of the services of men and women for the winning of the war.

TWO YEARS IN PRISON

Three Winnipeg Men Sentenced For Robbery With Violence at Terrace

Following their arrest at Terrace and after being committed for trial by Stipendiary Magistrate Will Robinson, William Harvey Orr, Ralph Collett and James Sim of Winnipeg were sentenced yesterday to two years in the penitentiary by Judge W. E. Fisher, for robbery with violence in Terrace on July 27.

California Harvesting

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18—The California fruit and nut harvest will reach its peak within the next three weeks. There is a serious shortage of harvest labor.

Obscurity Lifted—LIGHT ON FIGHT OF SOLOMONS

United States Marines Well Established—Japs Were Surprised—Only One Naval Clash

WASHINGTON, D.C. August 18:—A United States Navy communiqué has lifted some of the obscurity on the twelve-day old battle of the Solomon Islands. Extending beachheads already announced captured, United States Marines have become well established in the shore positions which they took in their surprise attack. That the action was a complete surprise to the Japanese is indicated by the fact that the enemy lost eighteen planes and all their opposition was speedily overcome by amphibious squadrons, only minor damage being done to the United States forces. In all, at least thirty-six enemy planes have been destroyed.

A force of Japanese naval vessels—cruisers and destroyers—was driven off. There has been only one action between naval surface vessels, this being by night when both sides sustained damage. While the operation in the Solomon Islands continues, Allied bombers have harassed Japanese bases and supply lines in the southwest Pacific. The outcome of the Battle of the Solomon Islands is taken by military observers to indicate that a turning point has been reached in the comparative strength of the Allied and Japanese forces in the Pacific. Between the Battles of the Coral Sea and Midway Island, the Japanese had fifty-five naval vessels sunk or damaged and it is estimated that some twenty more have been put out of action around the Aleutians.

Allowances To Dependents To Come At Once

WASHINGTON, D.C., August 18:—Congress yesterday voted in favor of immediate payment of dependency allowances to men in the armed forces instead of waiting until November as had been originally planned.

EDITORIAL

Canada's War Effort...

To say that Canada can and must make a much greater war effort is by no means to imply that Canada has not done a great job so far in this war. Possibly we have been so insistent in our demands that the Dominion should much more speedily achieve than it has been doing the war tempo of which it is capable that we have assumed the belief and disseminated it that very little has been done thus far. If such an impression has been created, it is untrue and unfortunate.

Prince Rupert, for various reasons, some of them quite valid reasons, too, may have been slower than it should have been in getting started but one has but to travel across the Dominion as the editor recently did to realize that it is far from a mean accomplishment that Canada has already achieved in the way of war production and war preparation. Things are to be seen far and near that one could hardly have believed possible. It is certainly a fact that people who may have not been far away from Prince Rupert have no idea whatever of what is going on, particularly in the field of war production in arming ourselves and our allies for the great conflict. The part that Canada is playing is too little appreciated. It is unfortunate that regulations regarding the dissemination of information on such matters make it impossible for the story to be told or the picture drawn at this time.

Canada, we can say from what we have observed, has indeed done much of which she may feel proud in regard to her war effort to date. It would be fatal, of course, for us to rest contented on our oars and pretend that it is enough. The blessing is that we are capable of doing so much more if we will co-ordinate our resources of materials, manpower and equipment and bend ourselves courageously and co-operatively to the task with the resolve to work and win. It is not discounting what we have already done to say that it has been by no means good enough or nearly what we can and must do.

Another week-end makes us remark that the nocturnal goings-on from a certain type of people may not be considered surprising but there are others of the supposedly more solid and responsible who might conduct themselves with a little more decorum and consideration of others.

Civilian Rights...

There are further complaints in Prince Rupert of the trampling down of civilian rights and privileges in connection with the pursuit of war activities, not necessarily those of the service themselves. The day may come, of course, when the situation might make it necessary to drastically disturb the civilian population but that day, there is good reason to assume, has not yet arrived. Meantime, those who have made their homes here these many years and whose possessions and interests all are here are worthy of some consideration and, if necessary, should insist upon seeing that it is forthcoming. Possibly, there is a tendency to justify and excuse too many things in the name of the war.

SPORT CHAT

In Canada spectators sit down to watch baseball. It so amazed members of the Canadian and United States' army when they put on a match before 6,000 people in a British soccer stadium to discover that most onlookers stood up throughout. (Incidentally, the Canadians lost by the basketball score of 19-17).

What the players didn't understand was that in Britain football clubs usually prefer to spend great sums for players rather than on improving the comforts of the masses who watch. The stadium seats won't hold nearly the thousands who pass the turnstiles.

Of the game itself, a London sports writer said he doubted whether baseball would attract English crowds. He added most of those present "went out of curiosity" and that "while they had a slight knowledge of the sport and were helped by a Canadian commentator, they could not appreciate the finer points of play."

Anyway, the crowd cheered mightily and Pitcher Eddie Smith of Kingston, Ontario, added to their thrills by belting a homer.

Red Cross News

JIM SCHUBERT WRITES
Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Schubert of Ashcroft (formerly of Prince Rupert) have received a letter from their son, Jim, who is a prisoner of war in Tunisia, North Africa. He says he is getting Red Cross parcels and appreciates them very much. International correspondence with relatives in enemy-occupied countries through the Red Cross is steadily increasing. In one week last month there were 110 messages to families in 35 places in the province—Norway 44, Germany 22, Denmark 20, France 7, Netherlands 6, Finland and Channel Islands 3, Hungary 2 and one from Estonia, Bohemia and Belgium.

FOR THE PACIFIC

Mrs. H. A. Ramsden, chairman of the Provincial Red Cross Work Committee, recently issued an emergency call to the knitters of British Columbia for 500 navy blue turtle neck sweaters with sleeves and 500 navy blue toques. These together with trousers, underwear, socks, hospital slippers, handkerchiefs and necessary toilet articles are for survivor kits. These will be jumbled to H.M.C. ships for distribution among torpedoed merchant seamen and other shipwrecked survivors rescued on the Pacific. Knitters who are busy making these articles are asked to send them in as soon as possible. It is the aim of the Work Committee to keep a large quantity of these kits in the Provincial Warehouse so that all immediate calls for replacements can be filled.

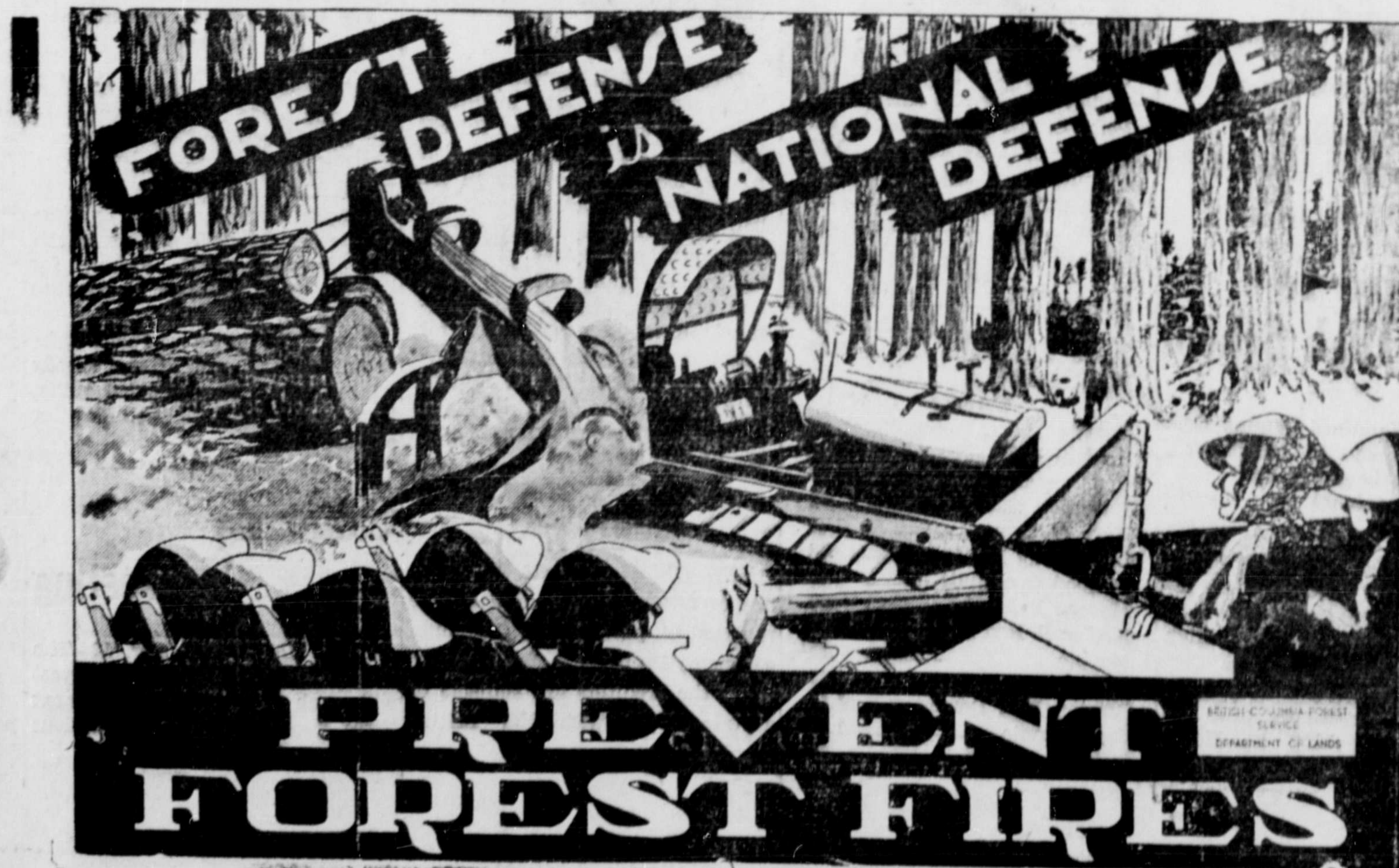

Timely Recipes

TEA BISCUITS
2 cups bread flour or vitamin B (Canada Approved) flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons shortening
3/4 to 1 cup milk
Mix and sift dry ingredients. Work in shortening with finger tips or pastry mixer. Add liquid gradually, mixing with knife to soft dough. It is impossible to determine the exact amount of liquid owing to differences in flour. Toss on floured board, pat and roll lightly 1/2 inch thick. Shape with biscuit cutter. Place on lightly buttered cookie sheet, and bake 12 to 15 minutes in fairly hot oven (425 degrees F.).

NEWS FROM EDMONTON

There has been a notable increase in recruiting for the active service of the Canadian Army in Edmonton. So far this month there has been 238 applications and 156 enlistments.

First sod was turned Sunday for the new Metropolitan United Church to be erected at Eighty-third Avenue and 109th Street here. Rev. A. B. Tuttle, moderator of the United Church of Canada, officiated with Rev. E. G. Turnbull, pastor of Knox United Church, assisting. At a cost of nearly \$60,000, the church will be erected in place of an old building which was destroyed by fire last New Year's Eve.

Pilot Officer George D. Aitken, on service overseas with the Royal Canadian Air Force, writes home telling how, after his thirteenth sweep over France on a bombing attack, his plane came down in the English Channel as a result of damage received from anti-aircraft fire. He baled out and floated around for several hours in a rubber dinghy before being picked up.

Henrik de Kauffman, Dutch ambassador to the United States, and Madamede Kauffman have been recent visitors to Edmonton. There was considerable entertainment for them, particularly among their countrymen.

Whifflets From The Waterfront

Further particulars were brought to the city Saturday of the recent fire that destroyed the B.C. Packers cannery at Wadhams in Rivers Inlet. Nothing but the manager's house and two or three other houses were left, the entire plant and equipment having been destroyed. The plant had not been in use as a cannery but as a camp with George McAllister in charge.

The Navy Department announces that commercial fishing east of a line extending from Hunt Point, Porcher Island, through Gull Rocks, Lucy Island, Green Island, is to be engaged in only at the fishermen's own risk. The naval service will not be held responsible for any loss to ships or gear within this area to the operation of naval ships. All fishermen, it is suggested, should be prepared to obey promptly signals given by vessels engaged in naval operations. Gillnet fishing is prohibited in an area within 1½ miles of the western shore of Fitzhugh Sound between Fog Rocks and Addenbrooke Island light and west of a line between Addenbrooke Island light and a point within two miles east true off Clark Point, thence to Egg Island light, thence to a position two miles west of Cape Caution.

For the purpose of conservation of the pink run, the Grenville-Principe Channel purse seineing area will be closed to salmon fishing as from midnight August 20 until further notice. It is announced by the Department of Fisheries. For the same reason, the Butedale area will be closed to purse seineing as from August 21.
