Tea-Coffee

Coupon rationing of tea and coffee went into effect on Monday The five coupons at the top of the present temporary ration card, marked "A-B-C-D-E," will be used to purchase tea or coffee in the five weeks between August 3 and September 8, at which time ration coupon books will be issued

The tea and coffee rations are one ounce of tea per person per week or four ounces of coffee per person per week. Each lettered coupon is good for one week's ration of tea or coffee—but not both -and all the coupons are valid on and after August 3. Ration coupons issued for children under 12 , years of age cannot be used for tea and coffee purchases. Sharp curtailment of tea and coffee consumption by coupon rationing is necessary because of the acute supply position. This results from shortage of shipping, The great over-water distances involved in bringing tea and coffee to Canada and the fact that tea is grown in theatres of war. It consumption of tea and coffee continued at the present rate and new supplies were not forthcoming present supplies would run short in a matter of months. It was, therefore, decided to institute coupon rationing, thus ensuring equitable distribution of available supplies over a longer period. Coffee comes from South America through submarine - infested waters, while tea has to be brought over water from Ceylon and India, themselves in the war zone, through more than 8,000 miles of hazardous ocean lanes. Before the war, Canada imported an average of 42,000,000 pounds of tea annually from Ceylon. India, Netherlands East Indies, China, Formosa and Japan. Today. Canada's only sources of supply
