SLASHING REDUCTIONS IN RENTS ARE ORDERED HERE; ROOMING HOUSES AFFECTED

Rates Drastically Cut by Rentals Commission at Instance Of Wartime Prices and Trade Board

Slashing reductions in rents have been ordered at Prince Rupert following two hearings presided over by Judge W. E. Fisher, sitting as a rentals committee. Approximately 300 units of accommodation, chiefly rooms in boarding houses, have had the rates reduced. The Wartime Prices and Trade Board has made exhaustive inquiries into the Prince Rupert housing situation and the reductions announced are the result.

In the King George Hotel rooms which rented at \$1 and \$1.50 a night, have been cut to 25, 35c and 45c a night; monthly rates of \$10 and \$12 reduced to \$5, \$7 and \$8.

At the Dominion Rooms, the rates for 18 rooms renting for \$14 and \$15 a month for one person and \$18 and \$20 for two, are reduced to \$10 and \$14 respectively.

In the Eagle Rooms, rates have been lowered from \$5 to \$4 a week. The Star Rooms, which were rented to transients at rates of \$1.50 to \$2.50 a night, have been cut to 50c a night for one person or \$75c for two. York Rooms have had monthly rates cut from \$12 and \$15 to \$10 and \$12.

Rentals at the Tassie Rooms have been lowered from \$16 and \$20 a month to \$12 and \$14.

Other premises where reductions have been ordered are the Bayview, Westholme, Regent and Vogel.

Some rents were slashed from \$1 a day and \$20 a month, to 50c a day and \$10 a month.

One dwelling was cut from \$15 a month to \$5.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—The Royal Air Force attacked the Nazi submarine base of St. Nazaire on the French coast last night. Fifteen enemy planes were shot down. Four British planes failed to return.

RULES OF MILITARY

National Selective Service Will Have to See That Job Seekers Comply With Service Regulations

OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—Seekers of employment through national selective service will have to produce proof that they have complied with all the regulations dealing with compulsory military training. Hon. Humphrey Mitchell, minister of labor, announced today. It will be an additional duty of all selective service offices to see that this is done. Employers will be held responsible to see that their employees have complied with the regulations.

Solomons Score Officially Given

United States Lost Nine Ships to Twenty-eight For Japanese

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 24.—It is officially stated that nine United States naval vessels were destroyed and another damaged while the Japanese lost twenty-eight sunk and ten damaged in the recent series of naval battles off the Solomons.

RETREAT IN LIBYA GOES ON

Rommel Has Now Fallen Back Toward Tripoli, Passing El Agheila —No Change in Tunisia

LONDON, Nov. 24.—While the Anglo-American forces with the collaboration of the Fighting French continue to move toward Tunis and Bizerte where heavy resistance is expected, the British Eighth Army in Libya to the east has now advanced to a point thirty miles beyond El Agheila.

It had been at first thought that Marshal Erwin Rommel would make a stand at El Agheila but it is evident that the Afrika Korps is now continuing its retreat towards Tripoli.

OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—An agreement has been reached whereby the further occupation of the French island of Martinique by United States forces will be no longer necessary.

Tighter Grip On Business Being Taken

OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—Expansion of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board authority to accomplish the release of manpower from non-essential industries and control business undertakings and activities in the national interest is contained in an order-in-council made public today.

The board is given power to prohibit "formation, com-

mencement, operation, amalgamation, merger or trans-

fer" of any business or under-

taking." Any person engaged in business may be required to discontinue or limit such business or undertakings in whole or part.

National Government and Left or Right Swing Will Come Up At Winnipeg

OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—The question of national government may be the keynote of the speech of Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen at the National Conservative convention in Winnipeg next month.

Another question which the Conservatives will have to deal with will be whether there is to be a turn to the right or a turn to the left in policy.

EDITORIAL

Conservatives Have Duty . . .

Every Canadian has a vital interest in what the Conservatives achieve at their Winnipeg convention early next month—and that means every Canadian, whether he belongs to one political party or to none says the Financial Post.

For the decisions made at that convention will affect the course of Canadian history for generations.

Vigorous political parties are the very essence of healthy and effective democratic government. The C.C.F. is by no means a satisfactory second party because it is a party of revolution. Once it came to power it would end the democratic party system and establish the tyranny of the totalitarian state. Democracy can only function when all parties agree upon the fundamental principles of freedom and the right of the people to change their government when they want to. The Liberal and Conservative parties are agreed on these principles. The C.C.F. stands for an opposite principle. It can destroy but not contribute to successful maintenance of the democratic way.

It is important that the Conservatives at Winnipeg should not fail to bring forth a strong leader. For Canada's sake they must not fail to produce a statement of policy that is attune with today's needs and aspirations. They must offer a political faith that appeals to the imagination of that great mass of Canadians unattached to any political party and, perhaps for the first time, fervently and alertly concerned about this country's welfare.

If the Conservatives at Winnipeg fail in these things, then they have done much more than wasted their own time and wandered further into the political wilderness. They doom Canada to an unhealthy, dangerous and inefficient political situation today, and to grave and perhaps irreparable dangers tomorrow.

Choice of a leader is the most crucial decision facing them. It is the leader who can win a following or repel. It is the leader who transmutes party policy into public policy.

Will the Conservatives select a man youthful enough to revitalize Conservative ambitions; stimulate imagination; rejuvenate principles? A little powder and paint makes any girl look what she ain't," but will the new Conservative choice be really more than a dolled-up dandy of the Conservative Old Boys Association? Will the Conservatives select a man that can get along with Quebec; win some following there? Since Sir John A. MacDonald, Conservative leaders haven't got to first base in Quebec. That is a serious failure of a national political party to fulfill its national functions under our democratic system.

But it will be the leader and the men around him who give expression to that policy, who put the fire and fighting dynamism into that policy, that will determine the future of the party and perhaps the Canadian way of life.

Those Conservatives who go to Winnipeg in December shouldn't delude themselves. The death, suffering and horror which war brings makes people think and feel deeply. Never before have Canadian men and women been so determined that the world for them and their children shall be a better, wiser world. Never before has so much been demanded of political leaders. The Winnipeg men have a grave and tremendous task ahead of them. The old performance won't be good enough.

Federal Minister of Labor Endeavors to Speed Coal Production

pension rights to ex-coal miners now in their employ and the government will pay transportation costs to the job and return fare after thirty days' work to skilled men willing to return to the mines for this national emergency.

Wages will be those negotiated by employees organizations and approved by the National War Labor Board for the various fields.

Volunteers are asked to contact the nearest employment and selective service office or regional supervisor, National Selective Service in Winnipeg or Vancouver. Ex-miners are urgently requested to co-operate by accepting this work in order to increase production and to prevent civilian hardship, a retardment of the military training plan and a general slowdown in the war effort.

Mr. Mitchell points out that the situation can be met on a voluntary basis if all citizens of western Canada will co-operate and mine operators, union officials and employees will all join together to speed up coal production. "As you are doubtless aware," says Mr. Mitchell, "the coal situation is exceedingly grave and I hope that I may have your full support in persuading skilled miners to return to the coal fields."

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

**OPEN SHOW
ON SUNDAY**

I.O.D.E. Strongly in Favor of This
In Canada

TORONTO, Nov. 24—Copies of an Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, resolution favoring the opening of moving picture theatres to provide free entertainment to uniformed men and women in crowded Canadian centres are being sent to Hon. Maj.-Gen. L. R. LaFleche, minister of National War Services, Col. J. L. Ralston, Minister of National Defence, and his two associate ministers, Hon. C. J. Power and Hon. Angus MacDonald, for their information.

The resolution reads:

"Whereas the welfare of the fighting forces is our first concern, and whereas the lack of facilities for the care and entertainment of such men and women on Sundays is very evidently causing countless numbers to have to wander the streets aimlessly with results detrimental to personnel and the war effort, and whereas conditions have developed to make immediate action imperative, it is recommended to the National Executive Committee that as a wartime measure only, theatres in certain Canadian cities be opened on Sundays to men and women in uniform and the merchant marine, subject to certain arrangements being made with authorities in the various provinces."

It was emphasized that only uniformed men and women and men of the merchant marine would be admitted to the theatres opened, and that the hours for the showing of moving pictures would not conflict with the established hours of church services. The motion picture industry has assured the I.O.D.E. that they would not only provide the latest and best moving pictures for the entertainment of the troops, but they will assume all costs of operators, doormen, ushers, etc.

In several Canadian centres strong local organizations and church groups have endorsed the stand of the I.O.D.E., and have expressed an understanding of the project to provide wholesome entertainment for the troops. A letter from the chairman of the executive committee of the Citizens Committee for Troops in Training, M.D. No. 2 reads: "The committee is definitely of the opinion that moving picture productions of a high standard given in downtown theatres each Sunday afternoon would be most valuable in keeping our men in uniform off the streets of Toronto."

The executive of the Active Service Canteen in Toronto wrote:

"We would like to go on record as being in complete sympathy with the efforts of the I.O.D.E. in this regard. After three years of experience in running the Active Service Canteen we should like to stress the great need for entertainment being provided for the thousands of lonely men who roam the streets on Sunday."

The Dominion Secretary of the Canadian Corps Association writes: "I am instructed to write to you on behalf of the Canadian Corps Association heartily endorsing the plan proposed by the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire to open certain of the moving picture theatres on Sunday, for the entertainment of men and women of the Armed Services and the Merchant Marine."

Mrs. B. B. Osler, film convener of the national executive of the I.O.D.E. said today: "Through the various committees of the I.O.D.E. engaged in war work we have been made aware of a lack of entertainment on Sundays throughout Canada. It is having a detrimental effect on the morale of our men and women in the forces. Our observations indicate that while the uniformed men and women acknowledge with gratitude all that is being done for them in the way of hostels, canteens, libraries, field comforts and home hospitality, these facilities are totally inadequate for the increased number of men and women in uniform seeking recreation on Sundays."

**MILK NOT
PLENTIFUL**

But One Dairy of Former Three
Maintains Delivery Service—
Only Essential Needs Met

One dairy is trying to maintain the milk distribution service in Prince Rupert which was formerly carried out by three, this in spite of a population which has about doubled in the past year. One of the other dairies is now confining its service to distribution to stores from which the customers have to pick up their milk. The other dairy has gone out of business all are trying to get organized to meet it. Lack of help is the principal difficulty.

There are at present about thirty-five dairy cows in Prince Rupert. There are an estimated 2000 fresh milk customers in the city and seventy-five percent of the milk supplied to them is shipped from Vancouver and interior farms, the remaining twenty-five percent being locally produced milk.

At this time of year, milk is at the lowest point of production with the stock being largely stable fed together.

In spite of this distribution situation, it is still possible to have milk delivered to meet essential needs on a six day a week basis. The sole remaining delivering dairy has a long waiting list and under-
