Method of Deduction at Source Is Worked Out at Ottawa-Starts September 1

OTTAWA, July 10:- Arrangements are being completed for the collection by method of deduction at the source of income tax and compulsory savings under the new Moving Eastward Toward Caucasus

Deductions from the pay envelopes will commence September 1. The entire amount of the income tax will be deducted over a twelve month period in twelve equal payments. Only one-third of the compulsory savings will be deducted at the source.



"DIFFICULT" CONDITIONS MOSCOW, July 19: (CP) -German \nk forces which crossed the upper Don River bit into the Soviet defences before Voronezh today while one hundred miles to the south a second furireinforced German troops had driven a new salient ninety miles into the Russian line. McCarthy, K.C., crown counsel, informed the court.

The Nazis must make better headway against Russia in the next few weeks than they have in the last few if they are not to have another winter of fighting in the Soviet land such as that which last year proved so costly to them and a repetition of which they probably could not endure.

### The Shipyard Matter . . .

Just why it should have been necessary to have a Royal Commission to go into the British Columbia shipyard dispute as between the seven-day or six-day week seems a little obscure. Anyway, it will be status quo in the shipyard dispute as long as the Royal Commission is deliberating and, if this one takes as long as some, the crisis will be over before it gets aound to finishing its business.

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


