Flying Fortresses

Russian Defences Forced to Five Further Ground Although Still Holding Out Resolutely

Counter-Attack At Novorosissk

Huge Losses Being Suffered By Both Sides in Terrific Warfare-Figures Given

MOSCOW. Sept. 10-The Russian position west and southwest of Stalingrad has become more critical, it was admitted today, although the main defences were still holding in the face of the massive Nazi assault. The Soviet forces were compelled to give up two more towns in front of Stalingrad yesterday and the enemy have taken up positions on dominating heights to the west only five miles. from the centre of the city. This is according to a Berlin claim which has been given no denial. a muddy terrain may hold up the Nazis' mechanized advance.

CAIRO-A joint communique from British military headquarters and the Royal Air Force reports 'a continuation of patrol activities on all fronts in the Egyptian Desert. There have been artillery exchanges on the north and central sectors and small groups of enemy tanks have been engaged on the south. Their is air activity on a reduced scale. Enemy lorries were hit in the Sidi Barrani and Matruh area. One Messerschmidt was brought down over the desert and two Italian planes were downed over Sicilly.

FRANKFURT, BUDAPEST ARE HIT

-LONDON-When Frankfurt was the target of the Royal Air Force for the second night Tuesday, heavy explosive and fire bombs were dropped and large fires were left burning. Allied bombers and fighters also smashed at occupied France. For the second time Soviet bombers attacked Budapest and other Hungarian points last night.

ADVANCE BY JAPANESE

MELBOURNE - Japanese jungle fighters have succeeded in pushing through the Owen Stanley Mountain range on New Guinea and, making a twenty mile advance over a narrow trail, have reached a point only forty miles from Port Moresby.

STALINGRAD SITUATION SERIOUS

MOSCOW-The Russian position at Stalingrad has become even more critical, a Moscow communique admits. However, the first extensive fall rains have fallen in this area and this may slow up the advance of Nazi tanks and motorized infantry. An enemy breakthrough on the outskirts of Novorossisk is admitted.

one-half hour after sunset and one-half hour before sunrise cause or permit any light, illumingtion, sparks, or glare, to emanate from any lighting apparatus, burning or smouldering material or other source, such apparatus, material or other source not being completely enclosed within a roofed building and for greater certainty but not so as to restrict the generality of this prohibition the same shall apply to advertising and display signs, whether neon lights or not, and to porch lights and to lights on or in front of residences or business houses whether for lighting purposes or otherwise, and to clearing and camp fires.

(b) As to inside lights-no person shall between one-half hour after sunset and one-half hour before sunrise cause or permit any light, illumination, sparks, or glare to emanate from inside any building or enclosure, unless a person is constantly present with authority and the means cc instantly extinguishing or maskin; 'e li t, illumination, sparks, or glare.

This Regulation shall not apply to lights operated exclusively for street lighting purposes or to lights used on any vehicle or to navigation lights.

The Police have een instructed to take action in cases where these regulations are not complied with.

Chile is one of the few countries 'Iscor" is South Africa's giant in the world producing paprika time steel works at Pretoria. and red pepper.

The Steel Controller has ordered that, after September 15, 1942, no person may retain in his possession scrap iron or steel weighing a total of 500 pounds or more unless he has a permit.

(For the purposes of the new regulations, scrap metal includes machinery, structural steel, or any other article or commodity containing iron or steel, which is not serving an immediate vital purpose.)

The order also provides:

That anyone, coming into possession after September 15 of scrap iron or steel weighing 500 pounds or more, must dispose of it within 20 days.

That any person having a valid reason for not disposing of scrap metal as scrap metal or who believes that it can serve some essential purpose, must send in a report by September 15 to the Used Goods Administrator of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, Lumsden Building, Toronto. His report must reveal the exact description, quantity, and location of his scrap metal.

The provisions of the order do not apply to scrap dealers who are already subject to previous orders; nor do they affect metal fabricators and processors who are in legal possession of metal to be used in manufacturing.

A copy of the order, S.C. 16, may be obtained from the Steel Controller, Department of Munitions and Supply, Ottawa.

Infractions of the new regulations are subject to a fine of up to \$5,000, or imprisonment of up to five years, or both fine and imprisonment.
