U. S. Subs Near Japan

Nippon Gets Taste Of Blockade; Tokyo Talks Of Invasion

Freighter Torpedoed and Damaged by Allied Undersea Craft Raid Within 100 Miles of Entrance of Yokohama.

Japan got a preview taste today of the thing she most dreads—possible blockade of the densely populated Island Empire as Imperial headquarters acknowledged an Allied submarine raid within one hundred miles of Tokyo in which a 2,225-ton freighter, the Unkai Maru No. 1, was torpedoed and damaged.

H.M.S. Galatea U-Boat Victim

LONDON, Jan. 9: (CP)—The cruiser Galatea, 5,720 tons, has been torpedoed and sunk by a U-boat, the Admiralty announced tonight.

ALIENS IN BRITAIN

LONDON, Jan. 9: (CP)—Registered aliens who are nationals of European countries total 231,000, compared with 202,559 in 1940, Security Minister Morrison said in Commons. There were 55,000 Germans and Austrians classified as refugees.

LONDON, Jan. 9: (CP)—A brown Persian carpet, valued at about \$225, was stolen from the altar steps of Christ Church.

China Ready to Enter Two Important Occupied Cities And to Give Aid in Burma

CHUNGKING, Jan. 9: (CP)—The Chinese reported today that their forces had penetrated the outer defences of two of the most important Japanese-held cities of South China—Canton and Chang, capitals of Kwantung and Kiangsi provinces respectively. The Chinese also claimed successes on half a dozen other central China fronts and announced that, while fresh expeditionary forces awaited only the word to enter British Burma, troops already massed there were taking up designated positions. The rout of the Japanese at Changsha is being completed with the Chinese in pursuit of the remainder of the Japanese force of 120,000 men.

WIFE OF PREMIER IS BUSY

Mrs. Churchill Chairman of Russian Aid Committee And No Figurehead

LONDON, Jan. 9: (CP)—Chairman of the Red Cross \$4,500,000 Aid-to-Russia Fund; which raised almost \$1,800,000 in the first fortnight of its existence, is Mrs. Winston Churchill. The prime minister's wife is no mere figurehead.

PHILIPPINES LOOK DARK

All-Out Attack By Japanese on Remaining American Positions Believed Imminent.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9: (CP)—The outlook in the Philippines was bleak today with the invaders massing men for an assault against last positions of the American forces fanning out from Corregidor Island fortress in Manila Bay.

AIMING AT SINGAPORE

Heavy Fighting on Malay Peninsula Now Centres Around Slim River and Kuala Lumpur.

SINGAPORE, Jan. 9: (CP)—On the Malayan front, British Far East headquarters said, an all-day battle raged yesterday in the Slim River sector fifty miles above Kuala Lumpur as waves of tank-paced Japanese infantry attacked on the main road to Singapore. The defence of Singapore may hinge on this battle for Kuala Lumpur which is developing into major proportions. Fighting has been heavy and casualties numerous on both sides. The British forces are taking up their stand on the Slim River banks.

VANCOUVER DARKENING

Colorful Lights of Granville and Hastings Streets Off—Street Illumination Permissible

VANCOUVER, Jan. 9: (CP)—The fairytale of colorful lighting on Vancouver's two main thoroughfares—Granville and Hastings Streets—was darkened last night and will probably remain so for the remainder of the war. Under new partial black-out regulations, only the street lights were left on.

ROBINS ARE HERE EARLY THIS YEAR

Two fine plump robins which have been hovering around Walter Longwill's home on Second Avenue at Ninth Street since New Year's Day are early birds indeed.

GOES BACK AT THEM

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WANTIME HAUL

LONDON, Jan. 9: (CP)—A safe containing money, war savings certificates and stamps valued at about \$30,000 was stolen by thieves who broke into a suburban post office during the blackout.

STRONG R.A.F. BOMB

LONDON—Numerous fires were left burning after a strong Royal Air Force bombing last night, the fourth consecutive night of attack on that uneasy haven of the German battleships, Scharnhorst and Gneisenau. Docks at Cherbourg were also bombed.

POSITION OF FINLAND

MOSCOW—While Helsinki newspapers say that Finland is weary of war, wants food and would make a separate peace, Soviet military quarters hint that reinforcements are being made for a knock-out blow against Finland which already has given up active resistance.

DISCUSSING JAPANESE

OTTAWA—Ottawa and British Columbia officials are still conferring in regard to the Japanese position on the Pacific coast but no announcement has been made of plans. Hon. George Pearson, minister of mines, says that there is a general feeling that the Japanese should be moved inland from the coast. However, the general feeling here seems to be that there is no immediate danger. Only thirty-three Japanese have so far been interned, it is revealed.

BRAVE STAND OF MARINES

WASHINGTON—Seven and not five Japanese warships were sunk before 400 United States marines gave up the fight at Wake Island, it has been revealed. They were a cruiser, four destroyers, a submarine and a gunboat. All the men who engaged in the defence of Wake Island have been cited by President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

JAPAN FOREIGN OFFICE BURNS

TOKYO—One half of the Japanese Foreign Office building has been burned down. An over-heated stove is given as the cause of the fire.

MOVING HEADQUARTERS

SINGAPORE—Military headquarters for the Far East may be moved from the Malay Peninsula to the Netherlands East Indies but this does not imply any diminution of determination to defend Singapore.

RIBBENTROP IN BUDAPEST

BUDAPEST—Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop of Germany is conferring with Admiral Horthy, dictator of Hungary. An extraordinary session of parliament is called. Full mobilization has been ordered.

MUSSOLINI WORRIED

ROME—Premier Benito Mussolini is worried about the situation in North Africa. Fearing a possible invasion of Italy, Il Duce is reported to be calling his army of occupation home from the Balkans.

IN FLIGHT TO TRIPOLI

Axis Forces Abandon Agedabia in Effort to Elude British Trap in Libya.

READY FOR BIG FIGHT

Both Joe Louis and Buddy Baer Expect To Win Out Tonight

SEEKING PROVISIONS

CAIRO, Jan. 9: (CP)—With land supply routes under almost incessant assault from the air, the Axis has attempted by sea to provision the retreating Libyan corps of Lieut. Gen. Erwin Rommel, the British command announced today, but coastwise ships drew a storm of direct hits from the Royal Air Force.

## Suspicious of Japanese . . .

Many people are suspicious of the Japanese living in this country. This is for the same reason that Japanese people are suspicious of British people living in Japan or Japanese-controlled China. The Japs believe that, if the British in their country get an opportunity to serve Britain, they will take it and the Canadian people here believe that if Japanese here find an opportunity to serve Japan, they will take it. This would be true in many cases although there are probably some Japanese in Canada who realize that they are much better off here than they ever could be under Japanese rule.

Canada has already committed one bad error in supplying Japan with scrap iron and other material for the arms and ammunition that took the lives of good Canadians at Hong Kong. Others are being killed by the use of similar material in the Malay Peninsula. If the same people who committed that error are allowed to commit another error which will cost more Canadian lives there will be searching questions asked and probably direct action taken to prevent any further errors. The editor of this paper was threatened last year for trying to prevent scrap shipments from here. It is possible that the policy advocated may not be popular in some quarters but it is time we had a showdown.

## How Long Will It Last? . . .

In spite of the adaptability of German people to being kept well under control there are possibilities that they may not be controlled indefinitely. Prior to the advent of Hitler as a leader, a considerable number of Germans are said to have been on the verge of revolution more than once. And yet at that time they had plenty to eat, drink and wear. Now that living conditions are anything but pleasant and are gradually getting worse there may be trouble within the year. Much of the ability to hold out depends upon how the Germans keep to their determination to fight or die. If they are hungry and poorly clothed they are apt to weaken.

## NEWCOMER'S IMPRESSION

Francis Lake Man Writes to His Old Home in Saskatchewan.

A man living in the Burns Lake district has written to the Macklin (Saskatchewan) Times as follows:

"Please convey to our many friends who read your paper our best wishes for Christmas and 1942. Although we would like to write to each one, it is quite impossible this year. Being fresh to stony work makes even ordinary business an undertaking but, with the extra Christmas business, we are kept busy all day and often do not close at night until after ten.

"Where we are living is rather like living back in Evesham Village, substituting Burns Lake for Macklin. They laugh at me here because I am always saying 'Bring us so and so from Macklin, will you?', but suppose I will get used to the new names soon.

"We can hear the trains leave Burns Lake some days. We have no railway here but instead have the big trucks to and from Vancouver. They bring our stuff up right from Vancouver to our door.

**BROWN SOUP STOCK**  
 6 lb. shin of beef  
 4 qts. of cold water  
 1/2 cup sliced onion  
 1/2 cup diced carrots  
 1/2 cup diced turnips  
 1/2 cup diced celery and leaves  
 2-3 sprigs parsley  
 1 small bayleaf  
 2 cloves  
 Sprig or pinch marjoram  
 1/4 teaspoon pepper  
 2 teaspoons salt  
 Cut meat in small pieces; crack bone. Put half of meat in soup kettle, add water, let stand 30-40 minutes. Scrape marrow from bones, melt and when hot add remaining meat and brown on all sides. Add to meat and water in kettle; bring slowly to boiling point. Simmer 3-4 hours. Add vegetables and seasonings, continue simmering 2 hours. Strain and cool. Makes 3 quarts stock.

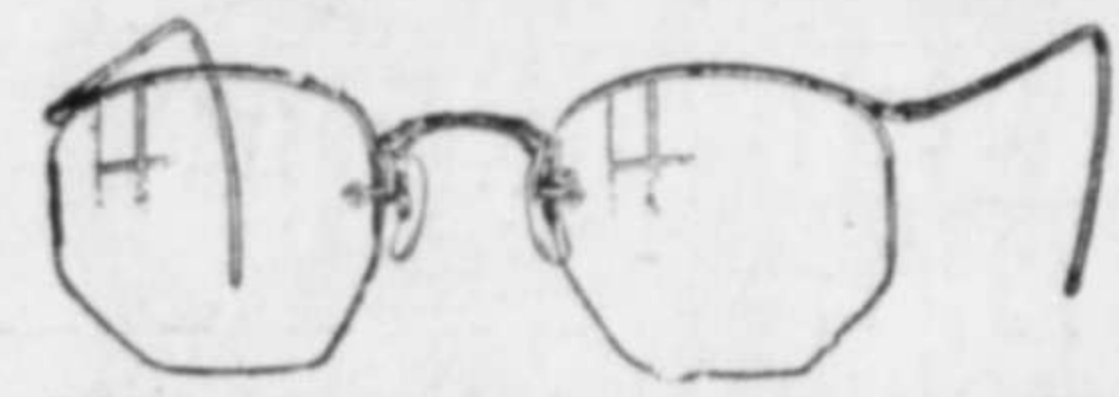
