War News

MacARTHUR POLICY RECOGNIZED

ELBOURNE-It is officially announced here that all governments cerned have recognized General Douglas MacArthur as supreme mander of United Nations sea, land and air forces in the south-Pacific sphere. It is expected this announcement will be foled by the launching by General MacArthur of the all-out offene against the Japanese.

CORREGIDOR HOLDING OUT

SHINGTON-Corregidor, American fortress at the entrance of Bay, still stands. Its big guns yesterday silenced three Japshore batteries. Five new air raids by the Japanese on the tress have been repulsed. The United States War Department toannounced the fall of Cebu city.

FRENCH SHIPS FLY SWASTIKA

OSCOW-A Russian commentator, broadcasting from Moscow esterday, said that forty French warships were already flying the wastika of Nazi Germany, having changed from the tricolor of France since the accession to power of Former Premier Pierre Laval as chief of the government.

THE BATTLE OF BURMA

EW DELHI-United States flying fortresses, it was announced tohave staged a devastating raid on Rangoon, the principal port Burma, now Japanese-held. The American planes were also active where in Burma. In spite of heavy Japanese anti-aircraft fire all eturned safely. Under pressure of Japanese forces, largely superior in numbers, the British are still withdrawing along the Irrawaddy tiver, setting miles and miles of rich oil country ablaze as they fall k. Six thousand of 8000 oil wells have been put to the torch and the emaining two thousand will also be fired if the Japanese advance entinues. To the East Chinese defenders, under the American General Joseph Stilwell, continue holding firm with stout resistance alhough threatened along the upper Sittang River. The Japanese, in their endeavour to reach the highlands before the rainy season sets in, are continuing efforts to cut off the Mandalay-Lishio railway line, an important traffic artery leading towards China, Forty thousand idians have been evacuated from Burma by the Indian Navy.

RUSSIANS STILL ADVANCING

SCOW-Another important point on the central front west of you has been recaptured by the Red Army from the Nazis as the assian frees improved their positions elsewhere all along the front. The Soviet troops are now but eighteen miles from Smolensk, once Chancellor Adolf Hitler's headquarters in the Russian campaign. The ierman High Command acknowledges power Russian assaults but as they have been repulsed. Heavy fighting continues around ryansk, 210 miles southwest of Moscow, and the Russians are rerted to be now in the suburbs. The spring thaw continues to slow p land lighting operations in some areas almost to a standstill.

ROYAL AIR FORCE NOW

Six Hundred Planes Used In One Day's Attack on Reich and Only Seven Fail to Return

LONDON, April 18—The measure of air superiority which Britain now enjoys over Germany is indicated by the fact that, of six hundred planes which engaged yesterday in the heaviest and most spectacular raids so far carried out against Nazi held territory from the French invasion coast for hundreds of miles deep into the Reich, only seven bombers failed to return. The scale of the Royal Air Force's constant attacking against the enemy now ranks with the worst that the Luftwaffe ever gave Britain. daylight attack made on Augsburg, textile, submarine and aircraft factory centre in Bavaria, INUL MITU compared with that which Germans delivered upon Coventry in the devastating raid on that city. The British planes were back on the attack again today for the seventh straight day of raiding in the greatest air offensive of the war to date. Last night Hamburg was heavily battered, Berlin radio said. Vienna and Munich stations were off the air.

During the first two weeks of April it has now become known that more than two million bombs were dropped on German territory, in an invasion attempt on Austra-Canadian bombing squadrons have been carrying their share of the weight in these operations of the Royal Air Force, particularly in the night raiding.

The British bombers and fighters are meeting with surprisingly little resistance from the enemy. No person shall finish a pair of trousers made of wool cloth with cuffs or cause such to be finished with cuffs by others for his

Retailers may, however, finish with cuffs any suit sold by them from stock prior to and including April 6th-but these alterations must be completed by May 1st, when Order A-39 becomes effective.

"In the case of sales from stock from now on, retailers are to finish trousers at required length and not deliver suits with un-

"In the case of cuffed trousers in stock, these may be sold until stocks are disposed of.

"All savings of cloth must be retained by the vendor and in turn disposed of for much needed salvage. This is published for your information and to avoid

misunderstanding and confusion. The regulations as outlined above are now in effect.


