TO THE VOTERS of Prince Rupert

The city plebiscite, on the question of the appointment of a City Manager, was held at the joint request of the Trades & Labor Council and the Chamber of Commerce. Ninety-five percent of those casting a vote were in favor of such an appointment being made.

The plan at that time was such as to allow complete control of civic administration by a manager. An elected mayor and small council would have had nominal power only.

We believe that conditions now demand the utmost efficiency in the operation of civic affairs and, to this end, are in favor of the appointment of an Executive Officer-but with this difference: that he be at all times subordinate to the elected council. We re-
