WAR IN EGYPT QUIET

CAIRO-The war in Egypt has slowed down to a sparring match with either side waiting for the other to make a move which cannot be long in developing. work. General Sir Claude Auchinleck's army is based on El Alamein with General Erwin Rommel's Axis forces in a semi-circle to the east. While the battle has subsided for the meantime to more patrol activity, it is evident that both sides are preparing for a speeding up of the pace with a view to bringing about an early issue. Air activity is as fierce as ever with the Allied bombers concentrating on the lengthened Axis supply lines. British and United States planes have reached out as far as Bengasi while the Nazis have attacked the Delta of the Nile by air.

SITUATION IS CRITICAL

MOSCOW-Moscow admits that the situation in the face of the all-out Nazi offensive is most critical since the enemy were before Moscow a year ago but do not concede the Nazi claim that the important railway city of Norezevh, east of the Don River, has been captured.

RED ARMY HITS BACK AT ENEMY

Area Although Voronezh Still

DON RIVER BARRIER

MOSCOW, July 8: (CP)-Holding grimly to new lines and counter-attacking strongly in some sectors, the Red Army reported today that it had slowed up the mighty German onslaught against Voronezh, key link between Russia's central and southern armies. The counter-attacking Red Army was reported tonight to be wiping out German bridgeheads on the east bank of a bitterly contested river (apparently the River Don) in the Voronezh sector and was repulsing successfully all further enemy efforts to cross the stream. Violent combats still raged along the river course but light enemy units which reached the east bank were reported destroyed and the bulk of the German forces held on the west

MOSCOW, July 8:-With the admission that the situation is the gravest since the enemy was at the gates of Moscow last year, it was officially announced in a Russian communique today that the Red Army had been forced to withdraw again "before the most powerful force ever put into battle." However, the Soviet forces are still holding the important railway centre of Voronezh in spite of Nazi claims to having taken it. A new Soviet line has been drawn up between Voronezh and the Don River. 
