

### Mainz Pounded Again By R.A.F...

LONDON-Powerful British air squadrons rained high explosives and incendiaries in Mainz again during the night as Nazi raiders ended London's long freedom from attack by bombing the outskirts of the capital. The attack on Mainz, its second successive night assault, was accompanied by raids on Nazi airdromes in the Low Countries with five planes lost overnight. Pre-dawn raid over Greater London was the first since July 30. Casualties were reported as seven killed and at least three injured.

### U.S. Planes On European Front . . .

LONDON - It was announced here today that United States Army fighting planes have entered the European fray on a large scale for the first time, engaging in thirty-one operational sorties in the past forty-eight hours.

### Australians Recapture Kokoda . . .

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Australia - Australian troops reoccupied Kodoka yesterday. The action was supported from the air with repeated dive bombing attacks on Japanse troops.

### Prepare Drive For Stalingrad . . .

MOSCOW-Hitler's invasion armies were reported massing huge numbers of troops for an assault on the Volga steel city of Stalingrad today and at the same time the German highcommand said that other Nazi columns had captured Elista in a thrust more than halfway across the Caucasus toward the Caspian Sea. Elista lies only 175 miles from the vitally important city of Astrakhan, the loss of which would be a serious blow to Russia's riverborne line of war supplies. Far to the north the Germans admitted that the Red Armies were battering heavily at Nazi defence works in the Voronezh and Rzhev sectors southeast and northwest of Moscow with the Russians taking the initiative at both points.

## Marines Stop Jap Counter-Attacks In Solomon Battle

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Australia, Aug. 13 (CP)-United States Marines appeared to have won the first round in the seven-day old battle of the Solomon Islands today, beating off furious Japanese counter attacks at three invasion beach heads. A correspondent of the Australian Broadcasting Commission said it was be-

lieved that the Marines, strongly reinforced, had broken the Japanese hold on the Tulagi area which Congress Campaign sites in the southwest Pacific. It may be presumed that this fundamental contradiction in the terms of the C.C.F. appeal to the country is being discussed in party circles, for it is unworthy to believe that its leaders will continue indiscriminate agitational appeals to the "have-nots" once they realize that the responsibilities of office may descend upon their shoulders. For, if office is won in that way, it is certain that it cannot be maintained by similar methods. The hard realities of life will impinge upon the members of a C.C.F. government very rapidly indeed and a swing away from the dangers of this contradiction would become inevitable.

Nevertheless the growth of the C.C.F. is such that the two older national parties which today split between them more than 200 of the 245 seats in the House of Commons must face the fact that one or the other of them is bound to go down if the C.C.F. makes serious national inroads into their strength. changing situation as to material and war requirements it will not be possible to publish this schedule but it will very shortly be circulated to all employment offices and will serve as their basic guide in determining the relative order in which requisitions for labor should be filled or employers permitted to engage labor.

During the last two months concerred effort has been made by National Selective Service, the Unemployment Insurance Commission and the Civil Service Commission to expand and improve the south. the employment service. The results of this program are already beginning to be felt but a very much larger program of expansion and improvement is starting. The total present staff of 2,600 will probably be more than doubled in the immediate future.

No formal steps have yet been taken to reserve the employees of given industries or establishments from military service but satisfactory informal arrangements have been made with National War Services Boards, for example, not to call men for military service from aeroplane spruce production or base metal mining in British Columbia. To the extent that National Selective Service can help to meet the demands of the armed forces. it will be possible to extend such arrangements to other essential industries which are threatened with a critical labor shortage.

At the moment the consensus of those concerned with the problem in all its phases is that it would! be inexpedient to undertake any "freezing" of labor in thier present jobs. It is thought that controls will accomplish the same general objective with more flexibility and less inequity.

To allay uneasiness and unrest on the part both of employers and employees the balance of the male population may be classified as soon as possible according to the degree of their liability for military service. This would serve to give notice to employers about the necessity for the training of possible substitutes. Many employers have not yet given much consideration to the possible necessity of employing women.

In connection with the recogfized necessity of employing a much greater number of women a eries of conferences have been held in various cities and a quick survey has been made of a representative group of the largest in- 2 dustrial plants to determine the extent to which working and welfare conditions need to be improved to facilitate such employment. Consideration is being given to the establishment of certain minimum standards in this connection, though it has not yet been definitely decided to what extent this should be done directly by the Dominion Government.
