

off Tobruk. The German and Italian forces on the one hand and the British on the other are now back to where they were in 1941. However, the Royal Air Force in North Africa is today on numerically even terms with the Axis and Tobruk defences are stronger than they were. It is agreed that there will be heavy fighting and that the enemy will make an immediate attempt to seize Tobruk. Enemy tank forces are admittedly stronger than the British. In the British withdrawal to new defence positions along the Egyptian border, El Adem, Sidi Rezegh and Acroma all were given up.

TWO BATTLESHIPS DIRECTLY HIT

WASHINGTON-An official statement in Washington on Monday's sea and air battle in the Medfterranean between United Nations and Axis forces announces that United States bombers, which came from bases in North Africa, scored direct hits on two Italian battleships-one the 35,000-ton Littorio and the other a 25,900tonner.

The men living in these camps have not even access to water for washing, except that of the cree passing through this area, which is used for sewage purposes at a point upstream from the location of this camp. Drinking water has to be carried a considerable distance in buckets. No hot water is available except from the washhouse of the Army Barracks some 400 yards away and use of this is allowed only after 6:30 when there just isn't any. It is the opinion of this organi-
