He finds Prince Rupert recognized as a key port on the Pacific in a measure that it has not been recognized before.

UNSANITARY CONDITIONS

Editor, Daily News: May we call attention to the regrettable lack of even simple sanitation at the construction camp on Acropolis Hill.

The men living in these camps have not even access to water for washing, except that of the creek passing through this area, which is used for sewage purposes at a point upstream from the location of this camp. Drinking water has to be carried a considerable distance in buckets. No hot water is available except from the wash-house of the Army Barracks some 400 yards away and use of this is allowed only after 6:30 when there just isn't any.

It is the opinion of this organization that such a condition is absolutely a menace to the health, not only of those employed on this work in particular but to the health of Prince Rupert in general and, therefore, will definitely retard this phase of our war effort which should be our first consideration. Men are badly needed, and their fullest efforts must be encouraged but this can not be expected under such deplorable conditions.

Attention has already been called to the unsanitary condition of the creek running through Cow Bay.

Surely, Mr. Editor, these conditions should be corrected, particularly in view of the fact that our population is increasing daily, and therefore, the possibility of epidemics will increase. The danger becomes all the greater while the conditions referred to exist.
