BEER SALE BEING CUT

Can no Longer be Bought in Taverns During Evening for Consumption off Premises

VICTORIA, Dec. 21—The British Columbia government announces that beer parlors effective immediately will not be allowed to sell bottled beer for consumption off the premises after 6:30 in the evening.

LONDON, Dec. 21—Six German planes made a bombing attack on a southeast coast English town Saturday. Three of the enemy planes were shot down and the other three were damaged.

ENLIST IN AIR FORCE

Six Young Local Men Accepted For Air Crew

Fines Totalled \$1,407.50 With Ninety-five Prosecutions Resulting in 94 Convictions

There were ninety-five prosecutions in city police court here during the month of November and fines and costs totalled \$1,407.50 as compared with \$740 in the same month last year.

RATIONING BUTTER

Canadians, Starting Today, Are Limited to Half a Pound a Week

OTTAWA, Dec. 21 (CP)—Coupons for rationing of butter went into effect across Canada today with the quota for each person set at one-half a pound per week.

OTTAWA, Dec. 21—Speaking in a radio broadcast last night, Donald Gordon, chairman of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board of Canada, announced a butter rationing plan for Canada effective today.

The ration allowance is one-half a pound of butter per person per week.

Purchases of butter henceforth will be by use of the brown coupon "C" in present ration books.

A two-cent per pound reduction in butter price is also provided for, effective a week hence.

Generally speaking, the butter price will go back to October 30 level.

Mr. Gordon told of "an acute shortage of butter in certain areas." There had been normal production of butter this year, he said. Consumption had shown a steady increase until two months ago since which time there had been a "sudden and unpredictable" increase.

Mr. Gordon announced that butter rationing would be in charge of L. B. Unwin, administrator of consumer rationing of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

The ration would allow normal quantity for every household, ensure fair distribution and prevent hoarding.

The ration coupons will have specific starting and expiry dates. Coupon No. 1, good today, and Coupon No. 2, good December 28, will both expire January 3.

Present butter stocks of householders must be reported by January 5 and coupons surrendered to cover same.

"Don't buy butter until you need it for immediate use," admonished Mr. Gordon. "It is a patriotic duty to avoid all waste of butter."

It was known on Saturday that Mr. Nelson would make his announcement last evening by radio of butter rationing becoming effective in Canada this morning but the Wartime Prices and Trade Board appealed at that time for co-operation in avoiding premature publication of speculative or rumor stories in order to prevent possible disturbance in shopping centres.

Canadian Pacific Air Lines Plane, With Thirteen People Aboard, Lost Near Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Dec. 21 (CP)—Search for a Canadian Pacific Air Lines plane missing with thirteen aboard swung north of this city today as air line company officials disclosed that the aircraft, manned by a pair of veteran pilots, asked for landing instructions just before disappearing at dusk yesterday.

Captain Ernest Kubicek and Captain William Holland were at the controls of the transport which took off from Prince George yesterday and was last heard from a few miles north of Vancouver just before it was due to land.

Stewardess Edna Young and ten passengers, identity of whom is so far not disclosed, were also on board.

The plane was due here at 6:30 p.m. It asked for landing instructions but, when the controller called back, he could get no acknowledgment.

The plane had been a little earlier sighted over Harrison Lake about sixty miles from here.

FRENCH TO AID ALLIES

General Eisenhower Makes Announcement in Regard to Use of Merchant Fleet

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Dec. 21 (CP)—General Dwight D. Eisenhower announces that part of French merchant shipping in northwest African ports will be used directly "in the Allied cause" and the remainder will be employed in supplying French Africa's economic needs.

CAPE TAKEN BY ALLIES

Australians and Americans Make Break-through to Sea on Northwest New Guinea

MELBOURNE, Dec. 21—General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters announce that the Allies have captured a cape in a break-through to the sea on northwest New Guinea Island, Australians and Americans co-operating.

Capture of Cape Endiaderne from the Japanese on Friday came after the most bitter fighting so far in the New Guinea campaign. Allied bombers destroyed a Japanese light cruiser in a convoy attempting to get to Japanese bases at Salamaua and Lae.

SPRINGBOK'S SANTA

Cape Town dispatches say 300 tons of Christmas mail has left South Africa for the Union's fighting troops in the Middle East, East Africa and Madagascar.

AIR FIGHT GOES ON

Little Activity on Ground in North African Fighting During Week end

AXIS DIVERTS FORCES LONDON, Dec. 21 (CP)—The Axis was reported today to be moving forces from Tripoli and diverting men and material even from the hard-pressed Russian front in order to make an all-out effort for Tunisia in the wake of a two-day military and political conference at Adolf Hitler's headquarters.

LONDON, Dec. 21—The first of Marshal Erwin Rommel's retreating Afrika Korps have reached Tripoli in the retreat toward Tunisia. There has been further bombing by the Allies of Tunisian ports.

During the week-end, there was but small scale ground activity in North Africa. There was little if any contact by the British Eighth Army with the retreating Axis forces in Tripoli.

Principal activity was in the air with strong points being bombed by Allied planes.

King to Speak Christmas Day

LONDON, Dec. 21 (CP)—The King will broadcast a message to the British people throughout the Empire on Christmas Day at 7 a.m. Pacific Daylight Time.

GREAT RED ARMY ADVANCE CONTINUING FROM END TO END OF 2,000-MILE FRONT

Hitler and Stalin are Personally Directing Their Campaigns—Nazis Leave Dead and Dying Behind as Well as Quantities of Arms in Flight

REDS ROLLING WESTWARD MOSCOW, Dec. 21 (CP)—The Red Army rolled westward on the middle Don front today, piling up new German dead on the snow-covered plains and adding new villages to three hundred already recaptured.

LONDON, Dec. 21—Dissatisfied with the trend of the campaign which now sees the Russians on the offensive from one end to the other of the 2,000-mile front, Chancellor Adolf Hitler is taking over personal command of Nazi forces in Russia.

HEAVILY BOMBED

Allied Aircraft Very Active Over Germany, France and Low Countries

LONDON, Dec. 21 (CP)—The Royal Air Force pounded at Germany's great inland port of Duisburg—at the junction of the Rhine and Ruhr rivers last night in a swift follow-up of a great daylight raid by flying fortresses which yesterday dared swarms of German fighters to penetrate deep into occupied France.

The Air Ministry said that a strong force took part in the Duisburg attack which was "heavy and concentrated" and left many large fires burning.

In the daylight raid, the principal target for which was an important airfield eighty miles southeast of Paris, three hundred United States, British, Canadian, Polish, French, Belgian and Czech planes took part, six flying fortresses failing to return.

American flying fortresses and Liberator bombers shot down more than forty enemy aircraft in dog fights on this sweep deep into occupied France on Sunday.

ADVANCING IN BURMA

Penetrating Swamp and Jungle, British Are Now Less Than Sixty Miles From Akyab

NEW DELHI, Dec. 21—In Burma the British advance under General Sir Archibald Wavell continues with the port of Akyab, and eventually Mandalay, the evident objective.

A heavy air attack accompanies the land advance which has now reached a point through forty miles of swamp and jungle to within sixty miles of Akyab to which the Japanese are falling back without resistance.

"No contact has yet been made with the enemy," said an official communique in announcing the advance. Both Akyab and Rangoon were bombed during the week-end.

One of the main Red Army forces is advancing from the southwest and another in the Voronezh section. Smashing the German front, the Russians have penetrated to within sixty miles of Kharkov.

With the whole German army endangered, nine Nazi divisions and one battalion, all consisting of 130,000 men, are in full flight before the Red Army drive from Voronezh, half-way between Stalingrad and the central front.

There is now definite danger of the whole German siege force at Stalingrad being trapped.

The Russians are advancing not only in this one particular area but all along the entire two thousand miles front from the Baltic to the Black Sea.

As Berlin admits although minimizing reverses, Soviet authorities at Moscow say "we are now battering the Germans and will continue to do so until the whole country is liberated."

MORE AXIS SHIPS SUNK

Three Vessels Sent to Bottom by Allied Submarines and Fourth Is Hit

LONDON, Dec. 21—British submarines have sunk three more Axis supply ships in the Mediterranean and a fourth was sunk by a torpedo.

187 DEGREES DROP

The greatest variation of temperature—187 degrees—has been recorded in northeastern Siberia where the mercury hit a winter low of 94 degrees below zero and a summer high of 93 above.

**EDITORIAL**

**Empires in Evolution . . .**

A statement by Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands on the postwar status of the Dutch "kingdom" (empire) is profoundly democratic. The plan she outlines would not only greatly advance self-government but would set up in the world one more closely integrated system of collective security which could take its place as part of that broader system which must defend world peace after this war. The Dutch kingdom would become a second Commonwealth of Nations similar to that which has evolved from the British Empire.

Queen Wilhelmina's statement helps to light two indistinct phases of postwar development. It shows how the principles of the Atlantic Charter can be applied in the Pacific and promises that the benefits of that document will not be limited, as some of its critics have feared, to a favored group of nations. It also illuminates the unfolding pattern of the world beyond the war—a pattern, it should be observed, which is already swiftly developing despite timid reluctance in some quarters to look farther than military victory.

Should the different characteristics of the French Empire permit a similar development when it is restored to a free France, a large part of the world would consist of Commonwealths of self-governing peoples—regional organizations within what might well be a universal framework. The interests of all these Commonwealths would touch at many points, and their defence problems would overlap.

Queen Wilhelmina's statement is not so revolutionary as it may sound to those unfamiliar with Netherlands colonial policy. In the first twenty-five years of Wilhelmina's reign—she has ruled the Dutch kingdom for some forty-four years—the Hollanders' attitude toward Indonesian natives underwent a fundamental change. The phrase "our brown brother" and the omission of the word "colony" from the revised Constitution in 1922 illustrate the development of Dutch thought twenty years ago.

This is not to say that Dutch attitudes have kept pace with native demands. But the Dutch have shown a readiness to educate the natives for political leadership and responsibility, and have permitted them to acquire experience in government through councils so organized as to provide important places for native leaders.

Whatever the shortcomings of colonial rule by the white races in the past, a mere relinquishment of control of colonial areas could only lead to something much worse. Yet it is encouraging that two great colonial powers, Britain and the Netherlands, are alike committed to something more than a return to the status quo after the war.

British opinion has long recognized such a return to be impossible. Its pledge of freedom to India and its surrender of extraterritorial rights in China are proof of this. Queen Wilhelmina's statement shows that what is happening in the British Empire is part of a world trend. It helps to assure all peoples that the trend will be well established before this war is over.

"GIVE ALASKA TO JAPS" DOCTRINE DISCUSSED

port that he proposes a peace dishonorable otherwise than in surrender of Alaska to Japan.

You may say: "But Wilkins' proposal is so preposterous that it's silly, illogical. Why dignify it by discussion?"

Too long this disregard of the fantastic, the preposterous, the illogical with respect to Japan has been at the bottom of our failure to understand the intentions and the dangers smouldering in that Oriental people with its racial inferiority complex — here used in true meaning, not in the sense which the vernacular gives in error to the term.

The Jap has fooled us too often, and usually without intent, because he has followed a course which to us was silly and illogical — but which to the Japanese in their arrogant conceit and delusions of grandeur seemed entirely sound.

In elaborating this thesis independently only a few weeks ago, Lewis B. Schwellenbach, United States district judge, and former United States senator, wrote this journal:

"A foe who is unaware of his own shortcomings is often a most dangerous foe. Our whole policy toward Japan has been based upon the calculation that Japan would do 'the expected thing, the reasonable and the logical thing.'"

What has all this to do with Sir Hubert Wilkins' newest aberration?

Only this: Whether he realizes it or not, Sir Hubert in his reported advocacy of surrendering Alaska to the Japanese is using the platforms of the United States in time of war to deliver enemy propagand.

This doctrine has been preached by Japanese propagandists in the past. Those Japanese can have no voice in America today, but we find an ally of ours, perhaps in innocent ignorance, serving them by advancing this preposterous proposal.

Take it seriously, regardless of how absurd it may seem, because the Japs take it seriously, and seem to have no trouble in finding friends to support them—Sir Hubert Wilkins today, the Japan Society and its lawyers and lecturers tomorrow.

**CHRISTMAS SAUCE** — With Christmas only a few days away, up comes Laura Pepper, chief of the Agriculture Department's consumer section, with this recipe for a tasty cherry sauce to top off your Yuletide pudding. Take two tablespoons of cornstarch one teaspoon butter, one cup warm water one cup juice from canned cherries, ½ teaspoon almond extract—combine cornstarch and butter, adding water gradually, bring to a boil and cook, stirring constantly until thick. Add cherry juice and simmer 10 minutes—Add extract and serve hot—and there you are.  
 If unsweetened fruit juice is used, add ¼ cup of sugar to the recipe, mixing the sugar with the

**Red Cross News**

On Alaska Highway

A much needed Red Cross clubhouse is now being built at Dawson Creek on the Alaska Highway by the American Red Cross Society. It is a "Nissan" hut — one built of metal materials, 22' by 16'. It contains a lounging room, office and recreation room. The lounging room is furnished with overstuffed chairs, chesterfields, radio, piano, music box, writing desks, reading lamps and book cases, with many books. The recreation room is equipped with all kinds of games. Field director, Karl W. Ernst, is asking co-operation of all local women's organizations in sponsoring hostess nights. The American Red Cross plans to establish club-houses at all army camps, north to Whitehorse, as soon as arrangements can be made.

Khaki Shirts Only

Only khaki shirts are permitted for all the services for next-of-kin parcels for British and Canadian prisoners-of-war in Italian prison camps, according to information just received by F. W. Tuffrey, commissioner, B. C. division, Canadian Red Cross Society, through the British Red Cross from the International Red Cross. Civilian shoes, playing cards and leather coats are prohibited and, therefore, are no longer acceptable by the British Red Cross.

Unusual Donation

Many unusual donations are given to the Canadian Red Cross but few have equalled that of six white fox skins donated by Alex D. Brown, a lonely trapper on Moor Island, Northwest Territories. They were picked up by Sgt. Covell, R. C. M. P., while on patrol. He placed them aboard the Roman Catholic mission schooner "Lady of Lourdes" which brought them up the Mackenzie River to the outside world.

Food to Greece

The Canadian Red Cross has arranged for immediate shipment of 10,000 food parcels to help relieve starvation in Greece.

Take Work Home

Although the Nelson Red Cross work room will be closed during the holidays, Red Cross volunteers are taking work home so that all tasks may be completed before the New Year.

**CHRISTMAS THOUGHT**—Here's a word about Christmas shopping troubles from Byrne Hope Sanders the "Mrs. Consumer" of the Prices Board: "Let us be thoughtful this Christmas and let us realize that most stores have not the help they used to have. Don't blame the stores blame Hitler and Hirohito." And she asks that we refrain from asking for any service not absolutely necessary, whether in the wrapping or delivering of parcels.

**PARSLEY**—Now that vitamins are more necessary than ever before, Marion Harlow of the Nutrition Services provides a tip that should be useful. Two sprigs of parsley, says she, provide more Vitamin A than that ounce of butter we're being asked to give up each week. And it also gives a colorful touch to luncheon servings.

**RUGS**—War or no war, housework goes on and on just the same. So, to help you out, here are a few suggestions from the Prices Board consumer branch. They say to use a carpet sweeper daily and a vacuum occasionally to clean thoroughly—keep the sweeper clean, don't use soap and water on a good will scratch the pile and don't beat the rug—just shake it gently. Use padding under the carpets and fit them carefully around indentations of the room, allowing for changes in humidity to prevent shrinkage. Rotate positions of furniture and, to restore the color of rugs, dip a cloth in clear water to which a few drops of ammonia have been added. Wring cloth almost dry and go to work. Just a word of warning: don't use soap and water on a good rug.

**PILLOWS** If you're getting ready for Christmas guests, here are a few hints from the experts on washing pillows—prepare plenty of warm, soapy water—wash the pillows by kneading and squeezing, or with a suction washer until no more dirt comes out—rinse in lots of warm water and hang to dry in a windy spot. Suspend the pillows from a clothes-line or tree by tying one corner of the tick with a string—shake from time to time while drying to prevent the feathers from matting.

**WINDOWS**—To avoid those "steamy" windows that come with winter, rub over the glass with a cloth dipped in a mixture of equal parts of glycerine and methylated spirits.
