**ENEMY ENTREI ED**

London Admits That Bizerte and Tunis Will So Easy

SHOWDOWN FIGHT

LONDON, Dec. 4 (CP)—Allied troops massed for a new showdown with Axis forces in Tunisia today after a bitter 48-hour battle to recapture key points on the approaches to Tunis and Bizerte. An Allied spokesman said that losses in the last two days were heavy on both sides and the edge in an impending test "will go to the one who regains his strength more quickly." The scene of action is a triangle formed by the town of Tebourba, Djeldeida and Matour, situated astride the vital railway between Tunis and Bizerte.

LONDON, Dec. 4—British military authorities admit that Axis forces have been successful in entrenching themselves in the Bizerte-Tunis area to such an extent that the capture of those two Tunisian strongholds will be considerably "delayed." With activity overhead greatly increased on both sides, the Allies have also temporarily lost their control of the air although eight Axis planes were shot down and fifteen damaged yesterday with no Allied losses. The battle for Tunisia was described as being in a "state of flux."

There has been a huge tank battle in which both sides suffered heavy losses. This engagement took place fifteen miles west of Tunis and lasted through two days and two nights. United States and British forces are now regrouping for another battle.

Medical and Hospital Service Greatly Enhanced by New Installation

The Prince Rupert General Hospital, as a result of new installation which has just been completed, is in possession of an X-ray plant such as only the larger cities boasts. Of particular advantage in diagnostic work, it provides better control, better quality and better plate from a radiographic unit which will be a great asset in medical and hospital service here.

The new unit is one hundred percent shock proof, eliminating entirely any possibility of high tension shocks due to high voltage. It also provides the "spot film" technique combining fluoroscopy and radiography to make a permanent record of fluoroscopic image.

C. C. MacKenzie of the Victory X-Ray Corporation, who has been here this week carrying out the installation, left this morning for the interior and will visit Hazelton, Smithers, Vanderhoof, Prince George, McBride, Quesnel and George Wells on his way back to Vancouver.

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

LISBON, Dec. 4 (CP)—Dispatches from Lourenco Marques, Portuguese East Africa, said today that Axis submarines sank three United Nations vessels in the Indian Ocean this week including the 10,000-ton British liner Llandaff Castle reported to have been carrying one thousand South African troops toward Durban on leave. Dispatches said that only forty survivors are known to have been landed.

MAY SERVE XMAS MENU

But Restaurants Must Have Permission to Serve New Items

VANCOUVER, Dec. 4—With the Christmas season approaching, the services administration of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board notifies operators of restaurants that they are permitted to offer the same special Christmas menu as provided in their establishments last year. The prices, however, must not exceed those of a year ago and the quantity and service must be maintained.

Before new items are offered on the menu, whether in a special dinner or otherwise, the prices of such items must have the approval of the Board.

Applications for new Christmas specials should be made early to the Services Officer, Wartime Prices and Trade Board, Marine Building, Vancouver.

The services administration also informs restaurant operators that it is quite in order to advise the public that tea and coffee will be served with meals only.

The ration and service departments leave it to the restaurateur to determine what constitutes a meal.

If any restaurant operator is unable to serve tea or coffee, requested by the consumer with meals, the operator must reduce price of the meal proportionately. The minimum should be a reduction of 5¢ in listed price of the table d'hote meal.

Francois Lake Ferry Grounds

Capt. Jack Nicholson Does Good Act For Capt. McKinnon

FRANCOIS LAKE, Dec. 4—The Francois Lake ferry ran aground east of the north side ferry landing on Friday last in heavy fog.

Captain Jack Nicholson was speedily on hand with his powerful tow boat and pulled the loaded ferry into deep water undamaged. He laughed as he said:

"I've been waiting for this chance as Skipper McKinnon pulled me off twice last summer and this is the first chance I have had to reciprocate."

NAVAL WIN FOR YANKS

Scored Decisive Victory Over Japanese in Solomon Islands

MELBOURNE, Dec. 4—Japanese forces on New Guinea Island have been divided into three groups each of which is surrounded by Australian and American forces. Nevertheless the enemy are putting up stiff resistance against the slow but steady Allied advance.

Twenty-one Axis planes were destroyed in an Allied air attack on Timor Island.

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PLAN FOR REDUCTION OF FOOD COSTS BY SUBSIDY IS ANNOUNCED BY ILSLEY

Coffee, Tea and Oranges Among Commodities Listed Under Scheme to Relieve Cost of Living

Speaking from Ottawa last evening Hon. J. L. Ilsley, minister of finance, made several statements on behalf of the government relating to further control of the rising cost of living in the Dominion of Canada. He announced plans to reduce the price of coffee, tea and other food commodities by subsidy.

Mr. Ilsley stated that the government realized the difficulties encountered by the producers of the Dominion and said that the new policy which would shortly be announced in complete detail would take these conditions into consideration.

The new policy will be based upon a system of subsidy and reduction.

He quoted as instances that the price of coffee would be reduced by four cents by subsidy and in a similar manner that of tea would be reduced by ten cents a pound. By reduction of duty oranges would be restored to their price level of September-October, 1941.

In addition to tea, coffee and oranges, there will be reductions in the prices of fluid milk and beef. The consumer will pay 2¢ a quart less for milk and the profit margin on beef will be taken by some retail dealers "to reasonable limits."

In conclusion Mr. Ilsley stressed the fact that the government's policy was to reduce cost of living for all and not for the few.

He also stated that profit margins on many commodities would be reduced and that this would contribute greatly to the general reduction.

This new policy will be costly, its actual cost to the treasury may exceed forty millions.

In his fifteen-minute address Mr. Ilsley summarized the first year of wartime price control under the Wartime Prices and Trade Board. He pointed out that during this twelve month period an increase in cost of living of two percent had been registered as against twenty percent increase during a similar period in the war of 1914-1918.

After a short devotional service conducted by Dean Gibson, the president, Bert Allen, made a few announcements regarding further work of the organization and introduced the speaker of the evening, Dr. Joseph Mandy.

Dr. Mandy gave the first in a series of lectures accompanied by movies on the subject of geology. It was a most illuminating evening for the members, many of whom have seen little of the Pacific coast which was so beautifully and accurately illustrated in Dr. Mandy's excellent moving pictures. It was an education to all the group, even to those of the members who have lived here for many years. The comparison with present-day Prince Rupert and the present-day city was immensely interesting.

Following the lecture the president conducted a quiz contest upon many and varied subjects until the refreshments were served by Miss Margaret Smith, assisted by her able refreshment committee.

The meeting closed with community singing. The fellowship hour after the evening service on Sunday night will bring the members and their friends together again.

NAZIS ARE IN DANGER

Still Being Hard Pressed by Russians Who Are on the March Everywhere

NAZIS ARE HARD PRESSED

MOSCOW, December 4 — The Germans are reported to be rushing ill-trained reserves into action on the central front east of Velikiy Luki and west of Rzhev today in a desperate effort to stop the Russian offensive knifing deep into Nazi lines. Front line dispatches said many of the German infantry units were hastily formed from technicians, engineers or air force ground crews and were led by pupils and teachers from officers' training schools.

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The result of the battle was that the Japanese lost nine ships sunk—four destroyers, two cruisers or possibly large destroyers, two transport ships and one large vessel.

One United States cruiser was sunk.

The position of the United States marines on Guadalcanal has been improved.



Housedresses

The consumer branch of the Prices Board has some reassuring news about housedresses. The clothing administration has been making a careful investigation into quality and workmanship of wash dresses and reports the standard construction of fabrics has not changed since 1939. The width of the seams has not changed and there has been no change in the composition of the dyes used, though the number of color and patterns allowed has been cut.

China

Here are some timely hints for washing your china. Whether it belonged to grandma or is just off the store shelf it is all precious these days. Never subject fine china to violent changes in temperature—for serving hot dishes, warm the china gradually in a warming oven or on a radiator—preserve lustre by washing immediately after use—use mild soaps but avoid scouring powders and steel wool—wash each piece separately—if you stack them, place pads between each one so the bottom of one will not scratch the face of another.

Christmas

Gift-giving this season will be on the light side with wartime restrictions. Why not look around home, the experts suggest. An extra watch, a radio set of some other mechanical article which is hard to get, can be repaired and will prove a welcome gift.

Potatoes

Laura Pepper, chief of the consumer section, Department of Agriculture, comes up with a suggestion for glamorizing baked potatoes, which Marion Harlow says have more vitamin C value if cooked in their skins. Slit your potatoes when baked and insert a sliver of butter and a square of quick-melting cheese—put the potatoes back in the oven just long enough to melt the cheese. Incidentally this is saving on the butter.
