All applicants for benefit should register at the employment and claims office immediately on becoming unemployed because the nine-day waiting period only commences from the date a claim for benefit is made.

If the claim is not made for nine days after a worker becomes unemployed it means there is just that much-delay in his obtaining benefit. It has been found in a number of cases that applicants] have been disappointed when they found that the waiting period started only from the date of their

Co-operation With United States In Defence Of Alaska

VICTORIA, June 18: — The Canadian government attaches considerable significance to Japanese landings on the Aleutian Islands, declared Lieut, General Kenneth Stuart, chief of Canadian Army staff. now temporarily in command on the Pacific Coast, in a radio broadcast last night. General Stuart disclosed that squadrons of the Royal Canadian Air Forte were already operating along with United States Army and Navy aircraft in Alaska and that Canadian anti-aircraft guns were being set up.

The general revealed that the Royal Canadian Air Force squadrons and Canadian antiaircraft units had been operating for some days with the United States forces in Alaska. He did not reveal details but said that the disclosure was authorized by Hon. J. L. Ralston, minister of national defence.

Declaring that he attached "considerable significance to the latest Japanese move," General Stuart said it was obviously an attempt to neutralize, destroy or occupy such air bases in the Aleutians as can be used for jumping off points for raids on Japan by short-based air-craft. It was also true that, if Japan can hold her gains in the Aleutians, she will be much closer to Canadian objectives than she was before.



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
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
