

# British Bombers Strike Tunisia

## Allied Troops Are Speeding Across Algeria—Hitler Says Toulon Not To Be Occupied

Rommel's Routed Forces Have Now Retreated to Well Within Libya in Their Headlong Flight—Berlin Claims British Naval Losses and Queen Elizabeth Torpedoing

LONDON, Nov. 12 (CP)—British bombers were reported to have struck the first blow today in the battle for Tunisia, North Africa, attacking an airdrome near Tunis where Axis airborne troops and planes were said to be massing as Anglo-American soldiers raced toward the Tunisian frontier from the west. Tunisia, a French protectorate, is a buffer state between American-occupied Algeria and Italian Libya.

Adolf Hitler's High Command claimed that Axis planes had bombed Algiers and scored hits on two aircraft carriers, two cruisers, two destroyers and a big merchant ship, also asserting that the huge British liner Queen Elizabeth had been torpedoed in the North Atlantic. Allied troops were meanwhile reported speeding across Algeria to combat any Axis attempt to seize Tunisia and to help trap Axis armies retreating from Libya. A British communique said that the mass of Marshal Erwin Rommel's tattered Africa Korps had reached a point between Bardia and Gambut, well inside Libya, under violent attack by Allied aircraft.

### The French Fleet

While Hitler tightened his grip on southern France, Italian troops occupied Corsica. The German radio said that three Nazi armed divisions had reached the French Mediterranean coast but a cautiously worded broadcast from Vichy said that the Germans, by decision of Hitler, would not occupy Toulon, home of the French Mediterranean fleet, because Vichy Navy commanders there had pledged themselves to resist "all aggressors." Although this indicated the Germans were satisfied Vichy could take care of Toulon itself if the Allies attacked, the report could also be interpreted to mean that French sailors were determined to fight the Germans if they attempted to enter. There is still some confusion as to the position of Vichy France in regard to the campaign in North Africa. While Algeria and Morocco have surrendered at the order of Admiral Jean Darlan, Marshal Petain is said to have ordered the French colonies to fight on. Casablanca, Oran, Rabat and Algiers have all been taken over by the Allies. General Henri Giraud has taken over command in North Africa and is collaborating with the Allies. The Germans have taken over complete control in Vichy including the radio station.

## COLLIERY SLOWDOWN

Department of Labor Spokesman Sees This at Cumberland

OTTAWA, Nov. 12—A spokesman of the Department of Labor said yesterday that it was known miners of the Canadian Collieries at Cumberland, Vancouver Island, have begun a slowdown which has reduced the output to 85 percent. The slowdown has followed the finding of a war labor board against an increase in wages.

## AXIS MOVE TO AFRICA

Vichy Hears That Turkey is Girding Herself Against Withdrawal from Russia

LONDON, Nov. 12—The Vichy radio says that all soldiers, sailors and airmen of Turkey have been ordered to join their units. This report coincides with others to the effect that one-quarter of the Nazi force are being withdrawn from Russia and being crowded southward through the Balkans towards North Africa.

## NEWS FROM ALEUTIANS

Seven Zeros Reported Destroyed At Attu—Jap Merchant Ships Hit

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 12—The Department of the Navy announced that seven Japanese Zero fighter planes had been destroyed in an attack on Attu Island at the tip of the Aleutians. It had been reported in September that the Japanese had withdrawn from there. Two Japanese cargo ships have also been attacked in the Aleutians by United States bombers.

## MIGRATION FORBIDDEN

Movement of Workers From City To City Banned

A new regulation forbidding movement of workers from city to city except by permit, is being enforced by Selective Service. The regulation is designed to give Selective Service tight control of the dwindling labor supply throughout Canada.

No worker may now leave one city to go to another in search of work without first getting a permit from the Selective Service bureau in the city in which he resides. If permission is granted, the workers is required to state his destination and to report to Selective Service officials at the new point immediately on arrival. That means that if a worker in Prince Rupert wanted to go to Vancouver for a job, he would require if there was work available for him in Prince Rupert. If there was, he would be refused permission to move. If there was not, he would be given a permit and told to report to Selective Service in Vancouver.

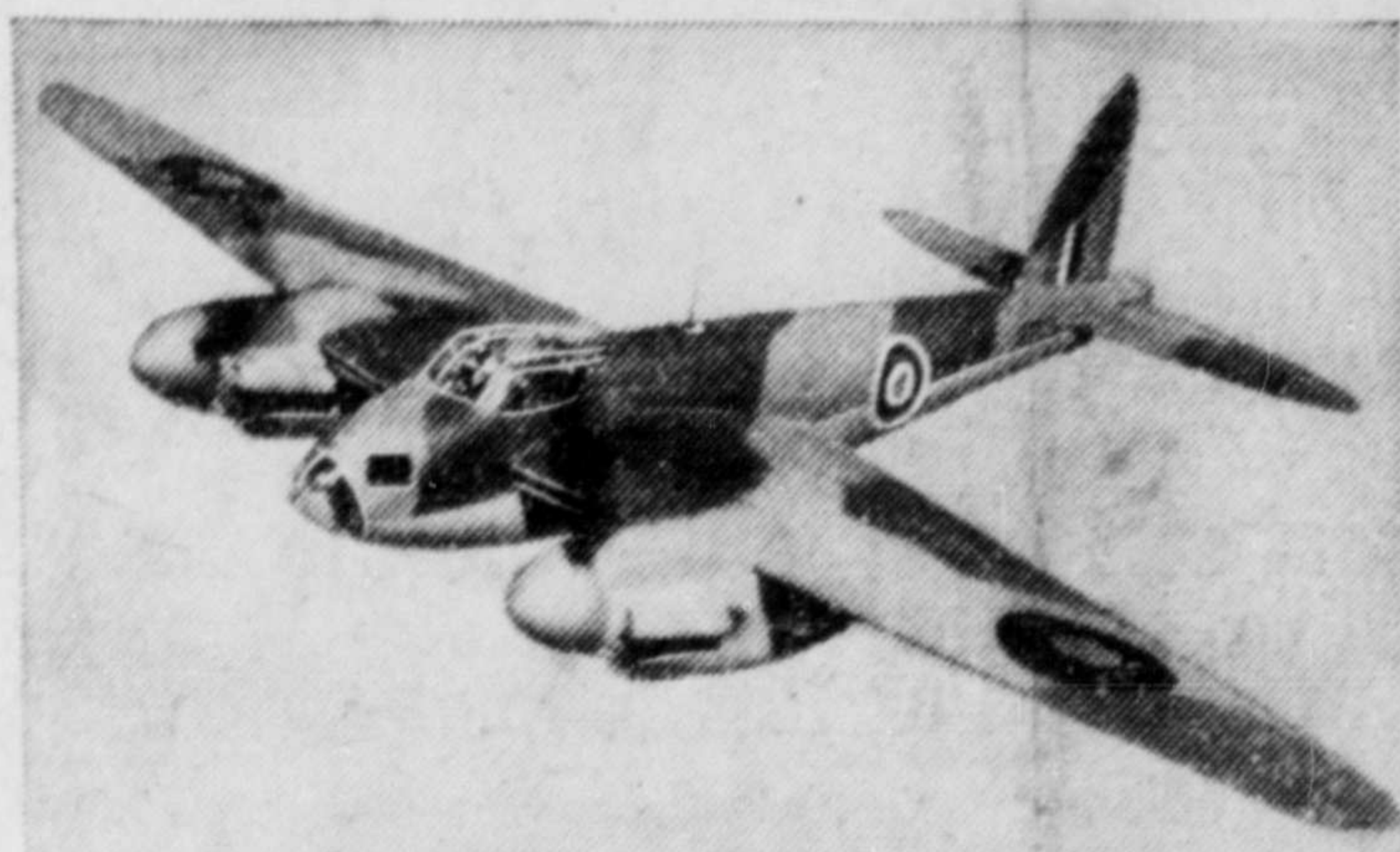

## PURCHASE OF BONDS

Canadian National Employees Bought More This Time

MONTREAL, Nov. 12—Increases in the dollar value of subscriptions and in the number of individual purchasers of Third Victory Loan bonds are shown in the list enumerating these transactions among employees of the Canadian National Railways issued yesterday by D. C. Grant, vice president in charge of finance for the system.

The total amount of bond purchases by employees in the campaign just ended was \$4,642,250, as compared with a final total of \$4,578,500 obtained during the second Victory Loan campaign.

It is possible the third loan total may be increased by reports from remote areas. As the solicitation throughout the system was carried out according to the regional areas set up for operation purposes, there are distant places from which reports are delayed in reaching regional headquarters in Winnipeg, Toronto and Montreal. After that the reports are forwarded to system headquarters in Montreal.

In the third campaign the total number of individuals subscribing through the National system was 52,953. During the second campaign the total number of individual employee subscribers was 46,311.

The amount of \$4,642,250 of bonds purchased by Canadian National employees is in addition to and quite apart from a subscription of \$10,852,690 effected officially by the Canadian National Railways, including bonds purchased for the company pension and insurance funds.

## BELLS TO BE RUNG

Bells to be Heard Next Sunday in Celebration of Victory

LONDON, Nov. 12—Prime Minister Winston Churchill announced yesterday that church bells would be rung next Sunday throughout Britain to celebrate "our victory" in Africa. It will be the first time in two years that church bells have rung in England.

The Prime Minister said he had instructed chiefs of staff to disregard "public clamor" in planning future operations.

## BLOCKING JAPANESE

Retreat to Buna Made Difficult By Land and Air Attacks

MELBOURNE, Nov. 12—The Australian forces are blocking the retreat of the Japanese to Buna on New Guinea Island. Allied planes operating from recaptured Kokoda are blasting the Nipponese on the jungle trails.

## ARMISTICE DAY HERE

Three-fold Observance by Canadian Legion Last Evening

Armistice Day was observed by the local branch of the Canadian Legion in three-fold manner last evening, tribute being once again paid to the memory of departed comrades. First there was a parade of members of the Legion, under President Dr. R. C. Bamford, and members of the Women's Auxiliary, under the president, Mrs. William Rothwell, to the cenotaph for the laying of wreaths. Then there was a banquet in the Commodore Cafe with about eighty veterans in attendance after which an informal gathering appropriate to the occasion took place in the Legion Hall.

In addition to the Legion organizations, wreaths were placed on the cenotaph by the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, Oddfellows and private parties. There was prayer by Capt. Stewart, padre of the Midlands. At the banquet Capt. Stewart said Grace and there was a period of silence in memory of the war dead.

Arrangements for the entertainment following the banquet had been made by an efficient committee.

The evening went very quickly with songs that everyone knew and rendered by very good talent. Among those contributing to the success of the evening were Chief Yeoman Brown, S. McPherson, J. Salter, Bob James, Bert Teng and others. Claire Davis and Syd Thomson provided the music on this occasion. George Cripps gave a short and humorous talk and Lt. Col. Evitt took the opportunity of thanking the Legion for all that they had done for the service boys in the past.

The evening came to a close in due time, all hoping that, before the next occasion came round to celebrate the Armistice, it would be possible to observe it with peace once again on earth.

## FIRE LOSS NOT HEAVY

Alarms in Prince Rupert So Far This Year Have Totalled One Hundred and One

During the month of October the city fire department here responded to nine alarms, bringing the total of alarms for the first ten months of 1942 to ninety-seven as compared with sixty-two in the corresponding period of last year.

Since November 1 there have been four alarms. There was no damage of consequence from fire in October nor has there been so far in November.

EDMONTON, Nov. 12—New liquor regulations in Alberta make a limit of a 40-ounce bottle per person a day and one gallon of wine. The new closing time of beer parlors is 10 p.m.

## Smuts Speaks Of War's End

LONDON, Nov. 12—Field Marshal Jan C. Smuts, Prime Minister of South Africa, today called the Anglo-American pincers movements in North Africa as "the most amazing transformation in the shortest possible time" and declared that, if this offensive policy is resolutely followed, the African victory may yet become a prelude to the end.

## ASSAULT LESSENER

Sharp Reduction in German Air Activity in Russian—First Line Units Believed Moved

MOSCOW, Nov. 12—Sharp reduction in German air activity over the Stalingrad front was reported today in Soviet military dispatches which noted that the Nazis were using outdated planes and dropping only small bombs. This, it was thought, might indicate the shifting of first line units to other fronts, perhaps to southern Europe.

LONDON, Nov. 12—Prime Minister Winston Churchill called upon "all Frenchmen worthy of the name to stand together" at a moment when their nation had been struck down by its "German taskmaster."

## WOOD TOY NEW VOGUE

Lots of Other Toys of Wood Will Be Prominent in Parade This Wartime Christmas

OTTAWA, Nov. 12—The big news on the Christmas buying front this year is that Santa Claus has swapped the yule log for toys. What with restrictions on the delivery of Christmas trees and the practical certainty there will not be as many as in the past, and with all the other regulations that beat toy drums into bren guns and tricycles into tanks, dark tints begin to appear in the very rosy Christmas picture.

But the Price Board said it won't be as bad as it sounds. Santa Claus, with one eye on the list of prohibitions from the Munitions Department, the Prices Board, Selective Service, National Defence, Cabinet Council and a couple of dozen administrators, was sawing his way to victory. In brief, said the board, it would be a wooden-ty Christmas—but what toys.

### Wood and Wood

Reports reaching Ottawa give assurance that the parade of wooden soldiers will only be the start. They will be supported by wooden tanks, universal carriers, bombers, fighters, battleships, cruisers, destroyers, submarines, gas motorcycles and automatic rifles, all made of woods least needed for war purposes.

The latest communique from Santa Claus' headquarters goes something like this:

"Progress is being made on all fronts, with reserves of wood, cardboard and paper called into action to a greater extent. Jigsaw puzzles are going strong. Books on history, sociology, statistics, engines and science appear to be among the things grown-ups want. Books may crackle a bit when they are opened since flexible glue supplies are short, but the contents are as good as never.

Educational toys, paint sets, sculpture sets, bubble sets, neck-lace-making sets, serving kitchens and plastic dishes are coming into action."

### Ahem—the Tax

The communique had a note of caution. The Christmas buyer, it said, should keep in mind a little thing called the excise tax which clips 25 percent additional on jewelry and similar non-essential items.

But, for the juvenile faced with the problem of pleasing grown-ups the North Pole bulletin had the encouraging news that while retailers might be short there are leather goods, fascinating wooden necklaces, and other ornaments made from sea shells and macaroni.

"Woodenware for silver, plastics for metal," is coming to be a Christmas slogan. Of course, said some authorities, the supply of wood is not limitless and lumber is a vital war commodity. Restrictions apply to it as to almost everything else a person wants at Christmas. But informed sources said Santa's work is well-advanced for this year and there should be plenty of merchandise for Christmas.

The Claus postal department said that Christmas mail should be cheaper to buy, but no lighter this year. War regulations decree that no greeting card may be manufactured or finished which will be sold at retail for more than 25 cents including envelope, except for cards manufactured with special permission, special greeting cards or personal greeting cards.

And all the administrators, coordinators, deputies and dollar-a-year men said Santa was a fine fellow and began brushing up their "Merry Christmas" diction.

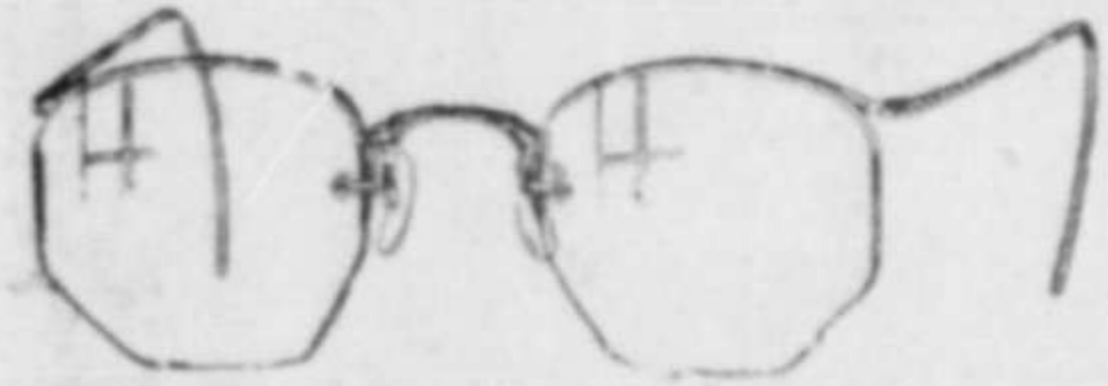
