## SUFFERED SHIP LOSS

Enemy Deprived of Reinforcements As Decisive Battle Gets Under Way in North Africa

LONDON, Dec. 3 (P) - British naval guns have sunk four more enemy merchantmen and two destroyers bound for Tunisia with reinforcements for the Axis in a decisive battle for Bizerte and Tunis in which opening shots were apparently already fired, it was announced today.

The timely naval blow was struck on the night of Tuesday and deprived the enemy of sorely needed fresh strength to face Allied troops converging on the bomb-battered Axis strongholds after smashing a German counterattack which touched off the heaviest fighting so far in the Tunisian campaign.

#### Condition at Cemetery . . .

Complaints are heard of the maintenance of the cemetery. The care of private graves in this as in cemeteries generally is primarily a matter of private responsibility and arrangement. There is certain general maintenance work, of course, that is of a public charge. It is fitting that every effort should be made to assure that this is attended to because it is in keeping with our sentiments and sensibilities that the place of the dead should remain hallowed and respected.

There may, of course, be difficulty in doing all that is desirable in this case as in many other things during these times of concentration of all resources on matters concerned more directly with the prosecution of the war and the essential works and services. But there should be no unavoidable neglect.



#### CANADA'S YEAR OF ADVENTURE IN DIPLOMACY ON WIDER SCALE

(Continued from page 1)

Canada was given a seat on the Pacific War Council in Washington, with Hon. Leighton McCarthy, Minister to the United States, representing the Dominion.

Prime Minister Mackenzie King most Canadians are slow to realize the importance of these connections in foreign capitals and prophesied still greater growth of the foreign service.

This year, after months of waiting, the Canadian legation staff arrived home from Tokyo and was absorbed by the External Affairs Department.

Brig. Georges P. Vanier, minister to France until the Germans overran that country, returned to Canada in 1940 and eventually became officer commanding Military District No. 5 (Quebec). Last month he was appointed minister to the CzechoSlovakia and YugoSslavia all now located in London.

Other appointments this year made L. Dana Wilgress, deputy minister of trade and commerce, first minister to the Soviet Union Maj.-Gen. Victor Odlum, former Canadian High Commissioner Australia, first minister to the Chinese Republic; and Warwich Marriage Of Chipman, K.C., Montreal lawyer Chipman, K.C., Montreal lawyer first full-time minister to Chile.

To Australia Mr. Justice T. C. Davis, associate deputy minister of War Services, was appointed high commissioner to Australia to fill the vacancy created by Gen. Odlum's appoint ment to Chungking.

Growth of the diplomatic corps in Ottawa has been proportionate to Canada's increasing representation abroad. Fully accredited ministers plenipotentiary now here from 13 countries, eight them appointed to legations established in 1942.

One foreign legation was closed -that of France, whose minister, Rene Ristelhueber, came to Ottawa just before the fall of France and remained as representative of the ments to compel the co-operation Vichy government.


