American Subs Preying On Japs

WHITTLING DOWN JAPS

United Nations Airmen Continue To Attack Nippon's Air Power North of Australia

MELBOURNE, May 28.—United Nations airmen continue to steadily whittle down Japanese air power from newly captured bases to the north of Australia. In six weeks two hundred Japanese aircraft have been destroyed or damaged. Yesterday one enemy plane was brought down over Port Moresby and six others damaged.

MESSINA BOMBED

Increased Aerial Activity Between Axis and British in Mediterranean Sphere

ROME, May 28.—The Sicilian city of Messina has been bombed for the second night in succession. Five of the attacking Royal Air Force planes were brought down, and Italian communiques says, Axis planes are claimed to have attacked British bases on the Libyan Desert and destroyed thirteen planes.

JAPS MOVE OVER INDIA

Aerial Reconnaissance of Defences Of Northeast Portion Of Country Being Made

CALCUTTA, May 28.—Following the conquest of Burma, Japanese reconnaissance planes are now active over the defences of north-east India.

CONDITION IS GRAVE

Fears Entertained For Reinhard Heydrich, Protector Of Bohemia And Moravia

BERLIN, May 28.—The condition of Reinhard Heydrich, acting Reich protector for Bohemia and Moravia, shot by a would-be assassin yesterday, is reported today to be grave. Heinrich Himmler, chief of the Gestapo, is coming from Berlin to direct measures following the attempt upon Heydrich's life.

Local Trains Running Again

Traffic Restored On Line Of Canadian National Following High Water Interference

Following tie-up of the line owing to high water and washout conditions, traffic is being restored on the Canadian National Railway in and out of Prince Rupert today. A fish express extra was dispatched at 10:50 this morning for the East. The train, which was due here at 11 o'clock Tuesday night, is now reported arriving at 5 o'clock this afternoon. The regular passenger train, which should have left last evening, will be getting out about 9 o'clock tonight. The train, due from the East at 11 o'clock, is reported to be running on time.

MORE HAMBURGER

LONDON, May 28.—Through shortage of "casings," sausage manufacturers are having to sell an increasingly large proportion of loose sausage meat which housewives cook as rissoles.

Air Raid Is Inevitable

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 28.—Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson said today that the War Department considered a Japanese air raid on the United States as inevitable as a return blow for the attack on Tokyo and other Japanese cities.

IS SAFE IN PORT

United States Destroyer Eludes U-boat Pack—Disposed Of One Or Two

ST. LUCIA, British West Indies, May 28 (CP)—The United States destroyer Blakely reached port last night after coming safely through an attack by a wolf pack of Axis submarines. The Blakely was crippled by torpedoing in a first submarine attack off Martinique on Monday. She was making a twenty-mile run from Fort de France, where she put in Monday, to this island under her own power when the enemy attacked her.

The detailed outcome of the battle is not disclosed but is indicated that one or more German submarines were destroyed although whether in encounter or in earlier operations is not clear.

Twin Canadians Youngest Hosts

Beaming Babies of Army Officer And Wife Get Spot In Social News Early

LONDON, May 28.—London's youngest hosts are Mark and Ann, twin son and daughter of Lieut. R. Brian Meredith of Canadian Military Headquarters, and Mrs. Elizabeth Meredith. The twins, believed to be the first born in the Canadian army overseas, issued formal invitations to tea at the swank Mayfair Hotel in the West End after their christening at Brompton Oratory. The beaming tots, bundled in their christening dress, greeted their guests with the wave of a chubby finger.

The twins, christened Mark Allen and Nowell Ann, were born at Gerrard's Cross in Buckinghamshire February 21. The boy weighed six pounds and two ounces and the girl seven pounds, three ounces.

Lt.-Col. M. C. O'Neill of Ottawa and Edmonton, assistant principal Roman Catholic chaplain at C. M. H. Q., officiated at the ceremony. The godparents were Sgt. Leader Dunc MacDonald, former Montreal sports writer and now an R. A. F. intelligence officer, Mrs. Meredith, a native of Edmonton, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. N. Johnson of Victoria.

CAN SUPPLY LARGE ARMY

American General Speaks Of Possibilities Of Support Of Second Front In Europe

LONDON, May 28.—Lieut. General Somerville, chief of supply of the United States Army, here with other leading American army officers to confer with the British in regard to the general military position of the Allies, particularly, it is believed, in regard to the possibility of opening up a second front, says that the United States is ready to supply a large scale European battle front with men and supplies. This can be carried out, Somerville says, in spite of the shipping situation and commitments of the United States to Australia, China and Russia.

PARATROOPS GET EXTRA

LONDON, May 28.—Paratroop officers get about 90 cents a day more pay than officers of other army units and other ranks receive an extra 45 cents, Sir James Grigg, War Minister, told Commons.

Brazil Plane Has Sunk One Nazi U-Boat

RIO DE JANEIRO, May 28.—A high Brazilian source said today that one of the Axis submarines recently destroyed off the Brazilian coast was attacked and sunk by a Brazilian plane piloted by Brazilian crew.

REFUNDING OPERATION

Premier Hart Announces Plan for Taking Care of Maturing P. G. E. Obligations

OTTAWA, May 28 (Canadian Press)—Premier John Hart announced today the conclusion of negotiations in connection with partial refunding of a \$20,160,000 issue of Pacific Great Eastern Railway stock, debentures carrying provincial guarantees and maturing next July 15.

The refunding will be by a new issue of \$16,000,000 worth of direct provincial obligations secured by sinking funds and appropriations.

Lifting of Ban Upon Communist Paper Is Asked

LONDON, May 28.—The British Labor party, in annual conference here, asks the lifting of the ban on the Communist newspaper Daily Worker but has rejected a proposal to co-operate with the Communist party.

KHARKOV FIGHTING

Victories Are Claimed in That Area Both by Berlin and Moscow

REDS ON INITIATIVE
MOSCOW, May 28 (Canadian Press)—The Germans are being forced to give ground in the Izyum-Barvenkova and Kharkov sectors, the Russians declared today, indicating that the initiative of both battlefields remained in the hands of the Red Army. Front line dispatches said the Germans were trying to dig in on new lines but constant heavy pressure was forcing them to fall back.

BERLIN, May 28.—The German High Command claims an outstanding victory over the Russians in the Kharkov area, 165,000 prisoners and a large quantity of equipment having been taken. On the other hand, Moscow claims that 2400 Nazis have just died before Kharkov with a number of German tanks destroyed.

KINHWA IS CAPTURED?

This Is Tokyo Claim—Chungking However Denies Its Truth Yunnan

TOKYO, May 28.—Japan today claimed the occupation of Kinhwa, capital of Chekiang Province and important key city to central China, around which fierce fighting has been in progress for days. (Chungking claims that the Japanese are in headlong flight in Yunnan Province to the south with staggering losses). It is also announced that Kinhwa is still in Chinese hands.

WINNIPEG, May 28.—The Canadian Legion, in convention here, amended its constitution whereby any British soldier, sailor or airman with an honorable discharge from the fighting forces may become a member. The Legion favors compulsory service for every able-bodied man in the reserve army.

Two Enemy Ships Sunk; Heavy Cruiser Believed Damaged

Undersea Craft of United States Are Active With Good Effect In Far Western Pacific

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 28: (CP)—The United States Navy announced today that American submarines in the western Pacific Ocean have sunk two Japanese ships, probably sunk a third and damaged a fourth, the latter a heavy cruiser. This is at least a partial answer to the assertion of Premier Tojo to the Japanese Diet at Tokyo yesterday that naval protection for Australia had disappeared since the Battle of the Coral Sea.

WILL RUN FOR GOV'T

Civilian Governments Offer to Forego Profits of Observers' Training Schools

OTTAWA, May 28 (Canadian Press)—Hon. C. G. Power, minister of national defence for air, announced tonight that civilian companies operating nine observers' schools for the Royal Canadian Air Force have offered to run the schools on a non-profit basis apart from five percent return on capital investment and "to return to the crown all profits which have accrued from their operations since inception of the schools."

Labor Freezing Measures Under Consideration

WASHINGTON D.C., May 28.—The United States is considering the adoption of measures to "freeze" skilled workers in essential industries such as is now being done in Great Britain and Canada. This would prevent men moving from one job to another.

ONSLAUGHT REPULSED

British Forces Check General Rommel's Offensive On Libyan Desert

15 MILES FROM TOBRUK
CAIRO, May 28 (Canadian Press)—The sudden Axis offensive eastward in the Libyan Desert has driven to within fifteen miles of the key British defensive stronghold of Tobruk despite being repulsed at both flanks, it was disclosed today. This indicated an advance of about thirty miles past the British forward defence line which stretched between Bir Hacheim and El Gazala. An authoritative British statement said the enemy's presence in El Adem was not of great significance and did not mean a breakthrough since in desert fighting there was no defence line in the usual sense.

CAIRO, May 28.—General Edwin Rommel's new onslaught on the Libyan Desert against Tobruk, key to the British defence system, has run into effective opposition. Four armored thrusts of the Axis forces have been essayed by the enemy. One has been stopped fifteen miles southeast of Tobruk and another thirty miles to the south. Two others have been heavily engaged.

Insurance On War Damage

Legislation to Protect Canadians Against Loss of Property Is Considered in Ottawa

OTTAWA, May 28.—The House of Commons is today considering amendments to the bill to provide insurance against war damage. The purpose of the bill is to protect Canadians against loss of property through war action.

LONDON, Eng., May 28 ④—Lord Wedgwood said in the House of Lords: "Today all young men when they leave college are either Colonel Blimps, by which I mean Tories, or Socialists, and there is not much to choose between the two."

EDITORIAL

Petitions and Other Things...

There has come to our ears the story of a community where two petitions were circulated. The issue in one petition was to a considerable measure contradictory of that in the other. Yet there were people who signed them both. Then some of the people who had signed both the petitions, finding themselves in a somewhat inconsistent position, proposed that the authorities legalize circulation of petitions. Of course the general idea was that, if petitions were not allowed, they would not have to accept the responsibility of deciding whether or not they should sign them.

We do not intend to suggest that any attention be paid to such a proposal that the circulation of petitions should be prohibited. Such an idea would be exactly contrary to all the cherished principles of democracy such as free speech, free press, individual expression about which we all hear so much. If ever there was a gag on free expression of opinion it would be the suppression of the good old right of circulating petitions for this, that and what not.

But we do suggest that many of those who do a lot of talking about democracy do very little themselves to help its function and good name. Democracy certainly cannot survive if individuals themselves have no moral courage—if they go around signing petitions just because some one asks them to, because they think they might lose a dollar if they failed to do so and then cap the climax by protesting about people being allowed to circulate petitions.

It is no use going about talking about good old democracy, idealistic systems and such like if we are not prepared to have principles and convictions of our own and stand by them in a personal way when necessary. We cannot get reform by passing the buck—even to the government. We must have ideas and courage individually. No democratic government can be expected to be any better than the people to whom it must answer. Some sort of dictatorship might be, but a dictatorship must some time or another, if it is to effectively function, flout the will of the people.

The truth with the most of us is that, even in small things, we don't want to hurt anybody's feelings, we don't want to be unpopular, we don't want to do anything that would conceivably hurt our own interests or our own vanity. In fact, we don't want to make decisions. We don't have the courage to stand by our principles if we have any.

As for petitions about which we started to talk, they may have some value from a propaganda standpoint where questions of general welfare or matters of principle are concerned. We suspect, however, that the authorities to whom petitions are directed take the view, like we do, that one could take a petition around with almost anything on it and get a big majority of the people to sign it. A lot of people probably would not take the trouble to read what they were signing. A lot more would sign just because they were asked to. Whether or not they agree with the petitions probably does not enter their serious thoughts.

The trouble with this petition business is that it has become a joke—if not a racket in some cases. It is probably a good thing that governments don't pay much attention to some petitions but, at the risk of being charged with not being democratic, use their own judgment.

As for the most of democratic privileges—not merely petitions—the trouble is that they are too often abused rather than properly used.

Democracy is a priceless privilege which many of us either do not know how to exercise or do not have the courage to defend when even little opportunities—like deciding about petitions—come our way. Democracy is something for which we must assume personal responsibility if we are to enjoy it in perpetuity.

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


