JUST A FEW OF THE NAZIS' 1,500,000 CASUALTIES ON RUSSIAN FRONT

All of them are suffering from frostbite, having been inadequately prepared for winter campaigning. Just how many of the 1,500,000 casualties admitted by the Germans on the Russian front were put out of action by General Winter is not revealed.

NAZIS IN BAD WAY

Russian Offensive Continues to Smash German Lines.

MOSCOW, March 18: So-viet central armies are reported today to have encircled a German garrison at Gzhatsk, 100 miles west of Moscow and the closest foothold to the Russian capital retained by the Nazi invaders. It was to Gzhatsk that the Germans withdrew after disastrous defeats at Mozhaisk and Borodino.

The German lines have been badly broken and there is fighting in the streets of Kharkov.

MEMBER IS HERE

T. D. Pattullo Paying Visit To Prince Rupert Today

T. D. Pattullo, former Premier of British Columbia and now Member of the Legislative Assembly for Prince Rupert, arrived in the city on the Prince Rupert this morning from Victoria to pay a visit to his constituents here. He is a guest at the Prince Rupert Hotel and will be here until Saturday night when he will return south. Mr. Pattullo will tonight address the annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Liberal Association and during his stay here, will take up a number of matters pertaining to the affairs of the constituency.

Mr. Pattullo made the following statement in regard to northern highway matters:

"No time should be lost in connecting up British Columbia at proper focal point with whatever road may be put through to Alaska. Notwithstanding any disabilities of the course now being pursued, British Columbia should proceed intelligently and without delay. It is obvious to everyone that, during the past generation the democracies have been dallying in smug complacency in complete lack of appreciation, or shall we say disregard of what has been transpiring in the totalitarian countries. Now, of course, we are ready to rush at anything to endeavor to accomplish something that should already have been accomplished. When you find high authority opposed to road construction for fear that the enemy may use it against you, is comparable to argument that what is the use of building ships when they are likely to be sunk."

VICTIM OF SLUGGING

Gust Ross, Well Known Taxi Operator, Attacked by Fare—Still in Hospital.

Gust Ross, well known local taxi operator, is a patient in the Prince Rupert General Hospital suffering from an injury at the base of the skull sustained shortly after midnight last Friday when he was the victim of a slugging attack in his own car.

A fare called at the taxi stand, took the back seat and asked to be driven to the Rusbrook Heights area. Arriving in that vicinity, he requested to stop and it was then that the attack occurred.

Ross was not rendered entirely unconscious although somewhat stunned and was able to cry out whereupon the assailant decamped.

A Royal Canadian Air Force station wagon happened along and brought Ross into the city. He has since been in hospital.

BIG AREA IS MINED

British Admiralty Announces Bay of Biscay and Waters Off Coast Dangerous.

LONDON, March 18: The Admiralty issued a warning today that all of the Bay of Biscay except for a twenty-mile strip along the Spanish coast and thousands of square miles of the Atlantic southwest of England "are dangerous to shipping."

The Admiralty said that any vessel disregarding the notice did so at its own risk.

Such notice would usually mean that the defined zone had been mined.

DESTINY OF DOMINION OF CANADA

Will Be Connecting Link Between Anglo-Saxon Democracies, Major Bond Declares.

Railways Playing Vital Part in War

Traffic Now Seventy-Five Percent Higher Than In Previous Peak Year

CHICAGO, March 18: That Canada was marked by destiny to become the connecting link between the two great Anglo-Saxon democracies—the United States and the British Commonwealth of Nations—was the keynote of an address delivered by Major F. L. C. Bond, D.S.O., president of the American Railway Engineering Association at the forty-third annual meeting of the association which opened here yesterday and which was attended by representative officials of the various railroads throughout the United States and Canada.

In his address Major Bond, who is vice-president and general manager, central region, Canadian National Railways, and one of the few Canadian railroad executives to hold the position of president of the association, stated that "epochal events have taken place since the last meeting, the significance of which stagger our imagination but never our resolve.

Needless to say, our common enemies are strong, subtle, fierce and resolute. Nothing will defeat them but sheer fighting for all we are worth and with endless supplies of arms and equipment."

Major Bond pointed out that the railroads are the greatest war machine on the continent and the originating end of the vital lines of communication which reach around the world in both directions from North America.

He touched upon the fact that peace-loving nations invariably suffer heavily at the outset of any conflict with an aggressor nation and that democracies never are at their best until thoroughly aroused.

North American Tradition.

He emphasized the "North American tradition—whose people are wholly dedicated to the pursuits of peace, a pattern of how all civilized nations should live together" and continued: "Regardless of transient differences of opinion which intervened in years gone by, I feel sure we can all agree that the brotherhood of arms in this war and the last war is assuredly disinfected of old sores and your neighboring dominion to the north feels with pride and some justification that we are destined to be a connecting link between the great branches of the English-speaking world and the principles of righteousness for which it will ever stand."

The part the association had played in the adjustment of the railroad industry to war services was emphasized by Major Bond. He pointed out the organization served as a reservoir from which to draw qualified personnel for advisory technical committees to perform some special service on short notice. He stated that recently one committee had been formed to consider a temporary revision of specifications for track material at the instance of the war production board. Another com-

Some United States Naval Losses Are Announced—Japanese Are Now in For Fiercest Campaign of War.

WASHINGTON, March 18: (CP) — The United States Navy announced today that a Japanese invasion force concentrated near Salamaua and Lae in New Guinea had been smashed by American and Australian air forces with the sinking or damaging of twenty-three Japanese vessels including twelve warships. Losses inflicted on the enemy were accomplished with loss of but one light plane. Japanese ships sunk and probably sunk were two heavy cruisers, one light cruiser, five transports or cargo ships, one gunboat, one destroyer, one minesweeper—a total of eleven consisting of six warships and five others. Two destroyers were listed as possibly sunk and ships damaged were listed as one cruiser, one large destroyer, two transports which suffered direct bomb hits, one trooper, three transports, one aircraft tender and one gunboat, a total of ten consisting of four warships and six others.

Moreover, Allied attackers demolished many small boats, motor boats and three enemy seaplanes were shot down. Shore installations, including anti-aircraft batteries and aircraft runways, were damaged.

These are a few illustrations of what must be expected in constantly increasing measure," Major Bond concluded. "We fully realize that we are confronted with an entirely new set of conditions but we stand prepared and qualified to deal with them."

Functions of Railways.

The vital and little known part played by Canada's biggest war industry—the railways—was stressed by Major Bond. Among the points brought out by Major Bond was that Canadian Railways traffic is now 75 percent higher than it was during the peak year of the great war of 1914-18 and that it is twice as large as the total volume of traffic moved in the year 1938.

Major Bond found that, although railway traffic in Canada is now larger than it had been at any time in the country's history, no serious congestion has occurred. But a note of warning was sounded when he added that, while "we have so far been able to maintain the high standard of freight service established prior to the war, naturally, the ever-increasing production of war munitions and supplies will place heavier burdens upon the railway which must affect less essential services."

Other essential war services given by the Canadian railways were outlined by Major Bond when he said: "The large ships of the railway companies are turning out arms and equipment of all kinds for the land, sea and air forces on all fighting fronts. The steamships owned by the railways have played a tremendous part in the war and, as must be expected, have suffered battle casualties. Ten thousand Canadian railwaymen have enlisted in the armed forces."

In New Capacity . . .

For the first time since this constituency sent him to the Legislative Assembly in the fall of 1916—just over a quarter of a century ago—T. D. Pattullo is in Prince Rupert today in the capacity of a private member—Prince Rupert's own exclusive representative. As such, we are pleased to welcome him home and we are sure that he will receive a hearty welcome from his many old friends.

The magnitude and import of international and national events these days tend to pale things purely provincial into insignificance. Yet there are many important functions that it is in the jurisdiction of the provincial administration to carry on.

Mr. Pattullo, while a private member, is nevertheless a figure of national prominence by virtue of the eminent position he has held in the public life of this province since first he was sent from here to Victoria. All the more valuable, therefore, as a result of his experience and influence, is he as Prince Rupert's private member.

Good News From Australia . . .

"The most cheering news for us since the war in the Pacific commenced" is the way commentators describe Australia's reaction to the appointment of General Douglas MacArthur as commander-in-chief of the United Nations for the Battle of Australia.

Prime Minister John Curtin and other prominent Australians, as well as newspapers, including the influential Melbourne Sun, have for some time been urging the appointment of the "miracle man of the Philippines" to this post.

The United Nations may not have parity in air or naval forces in the Southern Pacific. Japan may have the advantage of a shorter supply line than that of the United Nations. These are some of the difficulties that General MacArthur will face at the outset. But General MacArthur is by this time used to fighting against great odds, and fighting successfully. Under his command there is no doubt that the best of a fight will be made on our side.

Springtime Is Wartime . . .

Spring is coming and there are portentous events stirring on the battlefronts. Signs point to an expansion of war activities in many quarters. There will, doubtless, be many surprises for us during these coming weeks. The pattern of war will show new designs. Some of them may be shocking. Some of them may be heartening. War is war and war is not pleasant. While we retain our confidence in ultimate victory and each do all in our power to bring it about, we must also be prepared for hard blows and severe shocks and to take them in our stride. We can be realistic without being pessimistic. We can be optimistic without being complacent.

Women's Hospital Auxiliary Active

The "Canadian Thoroughbreds," annual state statistical history of the King of Sports in the Dominion published by the Prairie Thoroughbreds and Racing Association, shows rapid progress for native breeds during the last 17 years. The twelfth issue shows that Canadian breeds won \$572,730 in 1941 on Dominion tracks with a record number of 794 horses going to the post and winning 1,008 races. They captured 53.3 percent of Canadian purses compared to 17 percent in 1925 and took 47.3 of races in Canada compared to 15.5 percent 17 years ago.

Leading breeder in 1941 was Col. R. S. McLaughlin of Oshawa, Ont., with R. James Speers of Winnipeg, second. Their positions are reversed for the 10-year-history in which Speers' thoroughbreds from the Whittier Park Stock Farm won 75 races for a collection of \$57,022 against 96 wins and \$48,330 for Speers.

Third in the 10-year review comes H. C. Hatch of Toronto, who had 40 horses winning 396 races and whose earnings totalled \$329,150. Hatch, however, captured top honors for a single money winning horse in 1941 with his Budpath, winner of the King's Plate at Toronto and the first Canadian Derby at Winnipeg. Budpath returned \$15,840 in 29 races during the 10-year period 1925-1934. Gay Parisian, bred by the same stable in 1924, ranks second money-winner, \$37,010. Bred by the late A. Layzell of Calgary, third, at \$37,610.

The records show that Beau of the West, bred by Seagram Staples, Waterloo, Ont., in 1929, remains the leading Canadian money-winner, amassing a total of \$49,730 in 29 races during the 10-year period 1925-1934. Gay Parisian, bred by the same stable in 1924, ranks second money-winner, \$37,010. Bred by the late A. Layzell of Calgary, third, at \$37,610.

Harry Giddings of Oakville, Ont., came up with the top two-year-old, the fleet Ten-To-Ace, which

lost only one race in seven starts. Ten-to-Ace, one of the fastest horses developed in the Dominion, returned \$10,730 to its owner during the year.



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
