> OTTAWA, Feb. 4: (P-Movement of Japanese out of defence areas of British Columbia has already begun on a voluntary basis, it was stated by an official here today. The date when compulsion will be used in the case of Japanese not Canadian citizens will be decided in a few days and will likely begin soon.

Requests for Japanese workers have come from provinces as far east as New Brunswick, chiefly from lumber camps, a spokesman said. Such movements would be voluntary with the lumber camps paying the Japanese prevailing wages and part of the transportation costs. The movement would probably be by carload or even trainload.

The same source said it was suggested Japanese fishermen from the coast might be employed on the Great Lakes but the proposal had not yet been studied sufficiently yet.
